## Summer recreation fund again approved by city

### Director sets start for June 1

The Post city council voted Monday night at its regular April meeting to pay two-thirds of the \$3,800 requested by program director Joe Giddens for operation of the 1974 Summer Recreation Program for children, which is scheduled for a June 1 start. Garza County will provide funds for the remaining one-third of the budget, Giddens told the council.

Giddens said last summer's program attracted 345 children, showing "a vast improvement over previous programs."

"In our judgement, it was an extremely worthwhile program for our community," the program director said.

Also on Monday night's meeting, the city council:

—Tentatively agreed to include in its new budget funds requested by directors of the Post Special School to pay the \$100 a month salary of a teacher's aide at the special school for the term beginning next September.

—Voted not to grant a request by the Post Public Library board that the city pay half the librarian's salary after the federal Emergency Employment Act, which is now paying the salary, terminates April 30.

—Set 1:30 p. m. Friday as the time for swearing in two re-elected and two new city councilmen;

—Set 6:30 p. m. Monday, April 22, as the time for interviewing applicants for the position of chief of police;

—Voted to erect a street light on Osage Avenue, subject to approval of residents;

—Heard a report from City Atty. Pat Walker that officials of General Telephone Company of the Southwest will meet with the city council at a special meeting Thursday, April 18, to discuss the company's telephone operations here.

—Voted to set up a purchase order system for all departments of city government, with details to be worked out later.

—Voted to continue contacting property owners on a summer street paving program, but to set up a program for the summer no later than the end of April;

—Accepted the resignation of

newly-elected City Councilman W. G. (Bill) Pool Jr. from the Public Housing Authority Board and from the City-County Park Board;

—Canvassed the results of Saturday's city council election and referendums on a community-youth center and urban renewal project;

—Approved March bills for payment.

The council's action to

finance two-thirds of the Summer Recreation Program came after hearing a brief report from the program director, who also presented each member a prepared report on the program's operation last summer and the plans for this summer.

The council commended Giddens and his staff for last summer's program, which one councilman referred to as

"outstanding" in comparison with similar programs of previous years.

Mrs. Ruth Ann Newby, treasurer of the Post Special School, and Mrs. Nelda Dalby appeared before the council to request financial aid from the city to pay the salary of the teacher's aide beginning in September.

Mrs. Newby said directors

### SENTENCED TO 7 YEARS IN PRISON

## Clifford Redman found guilty marijuana sale

A Garza County District court jury of four women and eight men found Clifford Redman guilty Wednesday afternoon of the sale of marijuana here last year.

The jury sentenced Redman to seven years in prison and District Judge George Hansard denied a defense request for probation. The defense served notice it will appeal.

Redman took the stand in his own defense Wednesday morning and was followed by seven other witnesses for the defense, Dale Clary, John Perez, Gilbert Harper, Lesa and Tresa Mason, Orlan Criswell and Nick Fuentes.

The defense witnesses generally testified that Martin Valenzuela, the undercover agent who had been hired by the city and worked under Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman, had tried either to get them to smoke marijuana with him or buy marijuana from him.

Valenzuela was the key state witness in the trial. He spent almost all Tuesday afternoon on the witness stand and was called back for additional questioning Wednesday morning.

He took quite a verbal hammering from defense attorney, E. Warren Goss of Lubbock.

Also called to testify by District Attorney Joe Smith were Sheriff Holleman and Pat Donley of Lubbock, a chemist of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Members of the jury were Charlie Cooper, Jimmy Bartlett, Julius E. Tanner, Bill Davies, John W. Gist, F. D.

Wheeler, Ozell Williams, Mrs. Jerry Melcher, Mrs. John T. Tatum, Mrs. T. F. Davis, Mrs. T. J. Cook and William Edward Gandy.

The defense rested its case at 10:30 a. m. yesterday. District Judge George Hansard of Lamesa delivered the charge to the jury, which was followed by the closing arguments of both Smith and Goss.

Judge Hansard then recessed

the proceedings for lunch with the jury to report back at 1:15 p. m. to begin its deliberations.

The trial began Tuesday morning.

In the first of the marijuana sale cases to be tried here, a district court jury "hung" 9 to 3 unable to reach a verdict, Jan. 31 following a two and one-half day trial in which James McAfee was the defendant.

## Both referendums carry, four city councilmen chosen

Dr. William C. Wilson and W. G. (Bill) Pool Jr. were elected to the city council for the first time Saturday and Jim Wells and Fred Myers won re-election to their council seats.

The local physician, who led the bulky field of 12 declared candidates with 195 votes, will replace Donald Windham at the

council table. Pool won the one-year unexpired term left by the resignation of E. R. (Buster) Moreland.

The largest field of candidates in years failed to attract an equally large response from the voters. Only 359 went to the polls Saturday to get with the seven absentee ballots cast earlier.

Both "straw votes" carried handsily — the community-youth center won quite handsily, in fact.

The urban renewal project, first step toward possible federal funding for some Post renovations proposed by Texas Tech students, carried 205 to 87.

The community-youth center carried by over 7 to 1 with the vote being 254 in favor to 39 opposed.

The voting for the two-year city council terms: William C. Wilson, 195, Jim Wells, 185, Fred Myers, 145, all elected;

Jim Jackson 140, Donald Windham 102, Lonnie Gene Peel 92, Ray Bagby 55, Jerry J. Riedel 44, Don Noel, a declared write-in candidate who got into the race too late to get his name on the ballot, polled 18 votes.

Pool received 157 votes for the one-year unexpired term, followed by Leslie Brown with 117, and Don Ammons with 75.

In the Post school trustee and hospital district elections, incumbents won re-election without opposition.

A. C. Cash was re-elected to place 4 on the school board with 71 votes, and K. W. Kirkpatrick was re-elected to place 5 with 70 votes. Seventy-seven votes were cast, with Kay Hays polling 2 as

## Rotarians told of 'textile spread'

The textile industry "is coming to West Texas", Jim Parker, director of the Textile Research Center of Texas Tech University, told Post Rotarians at their Tuesday luncheon in City Hall.

The ground-breaking April 26 in Levelland for the new Japanese textile plant which will employ open end spinning is only the beginning, according to Parker who has been in the textile business all of his life.

Parker said that "we're real excited at the Textile Research Center because West Texas cotton is doing better than California cotton or Delta cotton for open end spinning."

The speaker broadly hinted that other plans are in the works to bring more textile plants to West Texas.

He said West Texas is a good place for the textile industry because it offers (1) a good labor supply, (2) because this state has a good tax structure for industry and no state income tax, and (3) because of the availability of certain raw materials.

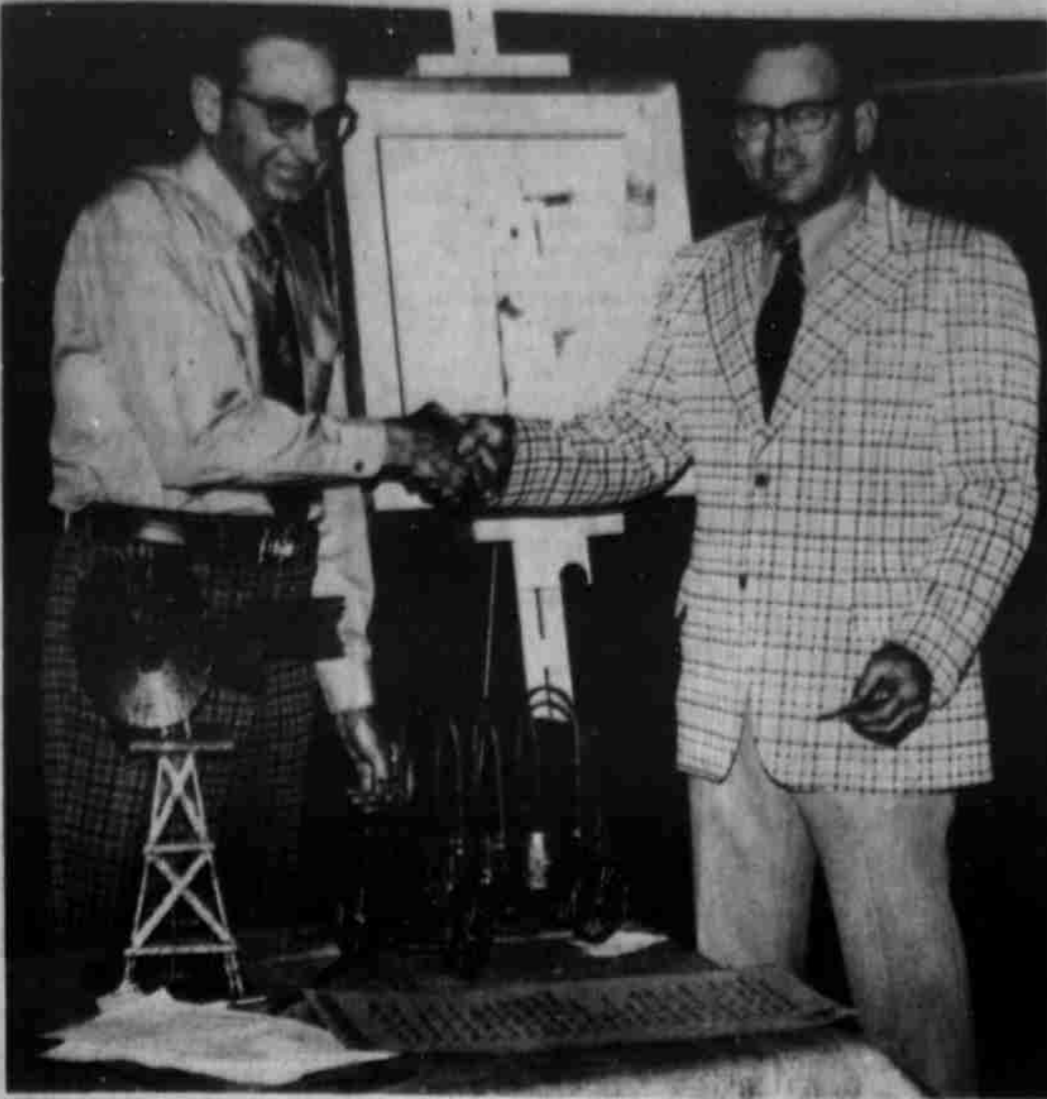
"We're encouraging them to come," he declared.

He urged his hearers to encourage young people who want a good career to come to Texas Tech and study textile engineering.

Parker pointed out that the textile engineering school graduates at North Carolina last year averaged seven job opportunities from which to choose at diploma time.

Parker was introduced by Ed

## \$975 purchase awards paid at 1974 Easter Art Show

A total of \$975 in purchase prize awards, including a \$300 multiple donor award, went to artists in the Post Art Guild's annual Easter Art Show held here Palm Sunday.

Mrs. Marie Neff, president of

the Post Art Guild, and other members of the organization termed this year's two-day show "outstanding" in every respect.

Held in the junior high school gymnasium, the two-day show

attracted paintings in nearly every media and small sculpture from artists and sculptors throughout the area. There were a larger number of visitors than usual, many from out of town.

Tom Ryan of Stamford, a Cowboy Hall of Fame artist, judged the show.

The multiple donor prize check of \$300 was paid to sculptor Bill Craig of Tahoka for his "Eclipse" (a windmill) and "Chuck Wagon", two pieces of welded sculpture that were presented to the Garza County Museum by the multiple donors.

### Approval \$948,000 loan for Lyntegar

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Cong. Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$948,000 REA loan to the Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc., at Tahoka, serving Lynn, Berden, Garza, Andrews, Dawson, Gaines, Lubbock, Hockley, Martin, Terry and Yoakum counties.

The purpose of the loan is to finance service for 546 additional consumers; to finance 107 miles of distribution line; provide one new mobile substation and to provide system improvements.

## Justiceburg Community lease agreement okayed

Post school trustees Monday night approved a five-year \$1-a-year lease agreement with Justiceburg Community, Inc., adopted a 1974-75 school calendar which will see classes begin Aug. 26 and end May 29, and voted support to the county in obtaining a youth service worker with federal funding.

K. W. Kirkpatrick was elected president of the trustees in the annual reorganization of the board following the spring

election, succeeding A. C. Cash. Other board officers named were Bob Macy, vice president; and John Boren, secretary.

The lease agreement with the Justiceburg non-profit community organization gives control of the Justiceburg lake, water supply, some grazing land near the lake to the community group. The Post school district "inherited" the property when the Justiceburg school district consolidated with the Post school district.

The Post district has been trying to work out a legal way to place this property in Justiceburg control ever since the consolidation but has had to follow state requirements for school district property.

Mrs. Ruby Williams, a member of the Criminal Justice Council Planning Committee of SPAG, appeared before trustees to explain a new youth service worker plan as a part of the overall state plan to reduce crime and delinquency.

She said it would be 100 per cent funded by federal and state agencies and would include the salary of the youth service worker, office help, office rent, equipment and necessary supplies for one year.

Mrs. Williams said she sought only the cooperation of the schools if such a youth worker is obtained and pointed out he could serve as a youth counselor and work as a truancy officer.

She said she has become

## 450 compete in 92-mile Enduro

Approximately 450 motorcycle riders from nine states took part in the Lubbock Trail Riders' annual Caprock Enduro at the L. Lay Ranch here Saturday.

With Henry Bostick of Lubbock, Tex., winning the senior division and Jay Callaway of Lubbock winning the 16-and-under

division, more than half the 450 starters finished the grueling 92-mile race, according to Jack Lott, U. S. National Enduro manager and a member of the Lubbock Trail Riders' organization.

There were three casualties in Sunday's race, which was the toll in previous years. Last said the casualties included a broken leg, a broken arm and what was

thought to be a broken rib, but turned out to be a

less serious injury.

The race started at 8 o'clock Sunday morning and was over about 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Jay Callaway, the Southland youth who won the 16-and-under division is a former Post youngster.

Contestants were from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Tennessee, Ohio and Louisiana.

Lott said the number of contestants taking part was "better than expected" considering the energy crisis. He said it "remains to be seen" whether another Enduro will be held in the fall of this year.

## City sales tax check highest

The City of Post last week received its largest sales tax check from the state since sales collections began here Jan. 1, 1971.

The check was for \$14,305.30, netting sales for the last quarter of 1973, which included Christmas season sales. The check was \$664.80 larger than the previous largest check of \$13,640.50 for the last quarter of 1972.

The newest check brought the total share of sales tax since Jan. 1, 1971, to \$1,000,000.

City Secretary Wanda Wilkerson said the City of Post has just received its quarterly revenue sharing check for the quarter ending July 1, 1974 for the amount of \$14,230.

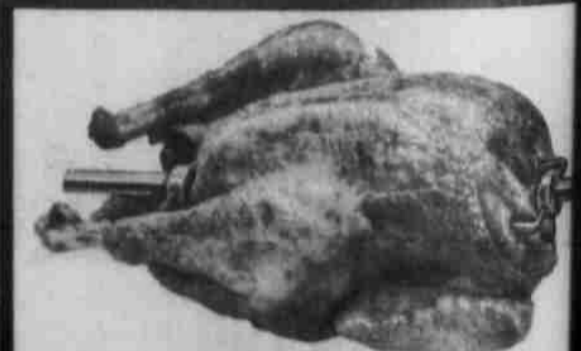

### Listening Post By GEORGE L. MILLER

Holy Week has come. That time of the Church Year between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday that Christians celebrate in remembrance of the last week in the life of Christ is here.

I was thinking about Holy Week, and suddenly realized there are few good books or stories that I can think of that have something to do with Easter themes. Christmas has Charles Dickens' classic, "A Christmas Carol." Or if you don't care for Scrooge and his ghostly companions, you surely enjoy Moore's "Twas the Night Before Christmas." O. Henry gave us "The Gift of the Magi" and Van Dyke penned the tale of "The Other Wise Man." Each of these Christmas stories has achieved the status of classic.

But what classic about Easter occurs to you? There's a touching children's story called "The Country Bunny and the Little Golden Shoes" by Dubose Heywood that I have always enjoyed. But I could hardly call it a classic — it never has achieved that kind of fame or recognition.

Low Wallace wrote a novel called "Ben Hur." It's a "Tale of the Christ," and the crucifixion is a crucial scene in the book. Yet you hardly think of it as an Easter story. Thomas Costain's "The Silver Chalice" and Lloyd C. Douglas' "The Robe" stress themes from the last week of Christ's life — but I can't call any of them Easter novels.

There have been some books that used the Passion Story with tremendous effect. One in particular that comes to mind is "Barabbas" by Par Lagerkvist. This novel won the author the Nobel Prize for literature in 1951. It is the story of the man who was freed instead of Christ, and how his life was changed

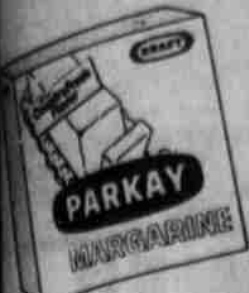

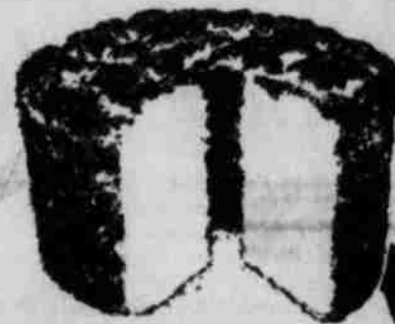

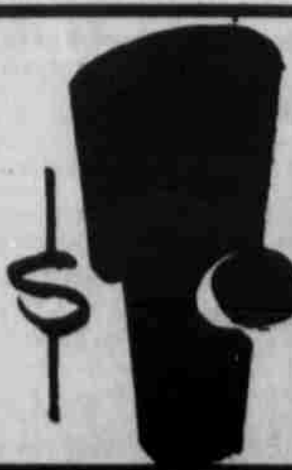

# Antelopes win District 5AA track championship

## First loop track title in long time for Post

The Post Antelopes won their first district track and field championship in at least 20 years last Thursday by scoring 98 points to lead a seven-team field at Denver City.

"We didn't win many first places and we didn't qualify many individuals for the regional, but we feel that the championship trophy we brought home from Denver City was a well-earned one," Coach Tannehill said.

Mrs. Rochelle Rombokas is teacher of the school, which is located in a Public Housing Authority residence formerly occupied by the Child Care Center.

The council voted not to grant the library board's request that the city pay the librarian's salary beginning May 1 after hearing the city attorney explain that "technical legalities" are involved.

Authorized a \$300 allocation of 1973 revenue sharing funds to the Post Special School and took under advisement the school's request for funds from the 1974 revenue sharing application. Mrs. Nell Dalby represented the school in an appearance before the board.

Authorized purchase of 12 additional chairs for the courtroom.

Accepted the annual court audit from Auditor A. A. Davis of Lubbock after Davis reviewed the audit and made recommendations to the court.
