

## museum open house success

The Garza Museum Association celebrated the bicentennial with a two-day open house Saturday and Sunday afternoon at the Garza Museum in which a number of temporary displays and one more permanent display - an early day chapel were opened on the ground

The chapel is representative of Post's 1915-25 era, a period of rapid church development in which some churches would share the same meeting place on alternate Sundays.

The chapel display includes pews and a pulpit used for 50 years by the Friendship Baptist Church at Close City, an early model pump organ donated by Winnie Tuffing and a variety of other donations which include a collection plate, fans, pewter bread plate, and communion This gives the museum

There was so much going on, Dispatch Photographer Don Ammons said he needed a program to get around to everything with his camera. So much was going on, that the camera of course missed some of the events but not many

The weather cooperated nicely too. With the cotton crop getting right down to the nitty gritty of put up or shut up on badly needed moisture, two good showers were received on Friday night and Sunday evening. Saturday was a great day "temperature wise" for all the community fun and the only 'washed in' event was the joint community faith and freedom service which was held in the First United Methodist Church.

The crowds came earlier Saturday and enjoyed themselves thoroughly through the long afternoon and evening.

The Post Chamber of Commerce and the Post Ministerial Alliance which each sponsored a day of the celebration can both take a bow for jobs well done.

### Museum shows worth

The bicectennial open house at the Garza Museum points up the fact that the old sanitarium is "en the way" to becoming a first class area museum in which the pioneer ways of this country are preserved for future generations

First, the building itself is well worth preservation. It is truly a historic building that can be "saved" without being almost entirely rebuilt as the Algerita Hotel must be.

The museum association already has opened the avenue to federal restoration 'matching funding."

Now all it needs is some solid, local financial support and it should develop rapidly. Second, the temporary displays at the museum during the open house indicate that such a museum has something worthwhile to

The kitchen and the chapel appear permanent display rooms. A ranch room just needs some hard work and a farm room is about in the same category. A C. W. Post room could be a truly great one.

The Dispatch, for one, also is hoping out loud that at least some portion of Frank (Chief) Runkles' Indian history display of this area dating back over 12,000 years can be permanently housed here.

Upstairs, which of course needs some repair work, some of the old sanitarium rooms could be restored if early day hospital equipment can be found for them.

Special rooms could be kept for traveling exhibits which could be shown for brief periods.

The weekend open house proved the attractiveness of the plan. What is needed now is a solid local base of

financial support, private or public, a development of museum organization, a long range plan for development and some real "get after it" enthusiasm on everybody's part.

It is essential that these basic steps be taken quickly while Garza has such a solid group of pioneers who can advise, help and donate cherished items.

## A moral issue now

The United States Supreme Court has ruled the death penalty legal in Texas. That puts the whole moral issue of "a life for a life," or death as a prime deterrent for major crime back in the spotlight of public debate again.

Texas has 40 men sentenced to death waiting on "death row," but that doesn't mean there will be any sudden slaughter at Huntsville. Far from it. It probably will be some time before the first life is taken "in retribution.

It is difficult for the public to understand the legal arguments about the death penalty. which resulted in it being declared unconstitutional a number of years ago.

If you remember, Texas drafted a new death penalty law after the original supreme court decision banning putting criminals to

Now the Supreme Court has found the new Texas law has met its guidelines that death not be a cruel or unusual punishment.

The present Texas law concerning the death penalty requires that the jury, after finding the defendent guilty, must decide if the crime was deliberate, if he's likely to commit other acts of violence in the future and if the crime was unprovoked.

A "yes" answer to all three questions calls for the death penalty for specific major crimes subject to automatic review by the state's highest court.

We doubt if all 40 men on Texas' death row today were convicted under this new law. Many of them very probably were convicted under former laws.

What in effect the supreme court has done is to return the death penalty provision to society to decide as a moral issue. You haven't heard a lot about that in recent years. You will

Can death by hanging or in the electric chair be a real deterrent to the fast rising major crime rate in Texas and throughout the United States.

All the arguments have been on the back burner for years because the death penalty had been declared unconstitutional by the supreme court if deemed a cruel or unusual punishment.

Statistics over the years have never proved this point conclusively one way or the other.

Society today is finding it hard to protect itself. That has brought on the cry for death to the savage criminal. Now that the death penalty is back, it remains to be seen, however, if society can actually "stomach" using it.

## Who is Jimmy Carter?

The political television orgies begin next Monday night with the opening of the national Democratic convention in New York City.

All of which brings the average conversation back to Jimmy Carter, the sure-to-be Democratic presidential nominee.

In a way, we think a lot of the Jimmy Carter mystique is great. He's a small town guy who hasn't been involved in the big Washington hassle and who appears to be very close indeed to becoming our next president.

The worry we have is WHO is Jimmy

Carter? What does he stand for? Is he strong or weak? Is he middle road or liberal? What is he willing to give and to whom, for the victory? Those are all the questions wrapped up in

the one - who is Jimmy Carter?

Can we find out for sure before we mark the ballot in November? Or do millions vote for a pig in a poke?

John Connally says Carter "can't hide for long now." If so, the fall campaign will be interesting. But if he can, it also can be a dangerous one for America.

Bi Centennial Bits BY BARRY TRASK

In 1782, a transplanted Frenchman, Jean de Crevecouer, wrote of a "strange mixture of blood" in the new country, America, where "all nations are melted into a new race of

His idyllic portrayal was more romantic than factual. Before the Revolution the melting pot was scarecely lukewarm. There were few white intermarriages, mixing nationalities. Barriers were hard to surmount.

Religious convictions discouraged unions of Anglicans and Moravians, or Jews and Huguenots or Catholics and Quak-Mutual distrust was prevalent

In addition, difficulty of travel and remote communities were deterrents. Class lines, not as rigid as in England, were distinct enough to keep Cinderella from the handsome prince. In 1775, where had "we the

people" come from? Two-thirds of them were immigrants, or children of immigrants. In 20 years population had increased 80 percent.

There was a decreasing majority of colonists of English descent. Anglo-Americans constituted about 60 percent of the white population. But they were not homogeneous. Congregationalists, heirs of Puritanism, were concentrated in New England, Anglicans in Virginia, Quakers in Pennsylvania, Catholics in Maryland.

Scots from the Scottish Highlands and Lowlands and from Northern Ireland were the second largest group. Strongly Presbyterian, they challenged the control of politics by the English majority, who naturally

The third largest white group were Germans, 100,000 of were in Pennsylvania; the Pennsylvania Dutch. More settled in South Carolina. Whether Amish, Mennonites, Dunkards, Moravians, or Schwenkfelders, they kept their dialects.

The South Irish, who were Catholics, settled largely in Maryland. The Calvert family founded the colony as a Catholic haven. It was ironic that religious toleration became an issue when Protestants gained a majority

The cosmopolitan, materialistic Dutch were in New York and New Jersey. They dotted the area with their names: Harlem, Bowery, Bronx, Yonkers, Renssalaer.

One group of Calvinist, French Protestants, the Huguenots, came to America to escape persecution in France. The second group came from Nova Scotia when England broke up their settlement in Acadia. They were in the Carolinas, some in Pennsylvania, some in New York where they founded New Rochelle.

The Swedes, Swiss, Jews, Finns, or other minorities were scattered in all the colonies. None were numerous enough to form their own communities.

Gradually bars were lowered. Increased travel and communications tended to lessen tensions between colonies. Common goals dissolved differerences. Europe as well as England could claim parenthood, as Thomas Paine observ-







Recommendations clude elimination of the five per cent state-local sales tax on utility bills and a new state tax credit for investor-owned utilities The latter is supposed to save consumers 10 to 12 per cent monthly if enacted.

Tax reduction proposals would reduce state revenue about \$500 million over the next three years, but Clayton said an anticipated surplus of more than \$2 billion would make this painless for government.

Among other recommendations

- Restructuring natural gas levies to shift \$36.6 million of the burden from Texas to out-of-state consumers

- Prohibition of takeor-pay provisions for more than 80 per cent of deliverability in future natural gas sale contracts and a guarantee of makeup periods of not less than two years to use gas bought under such provisions.

-A requirement that the Railroad Commission hold public hearings on redetermined prices of gas and pass-through charges to consumers.

- Uniform application of all gas cost adjustments to consumers regardless of class or amount of consumption.



(Continued From Page One) and Medicade for the fiscal year ending in September, 1975. instead of the hospital receiving over \$40,000 in additional payments from the government for coverage during the fiscal

The hospital had been notified prior to Hunsaker taking over his present job that the hospital didn't have any more money coming for the fiscal year. At last month's meeting, directors decided to ask for a Medicare audit just to find out for sure.

Hunsaker reported the auditors had been here two weeks and found that the hospital actually owed the government a little money on the year in question.

The payoff system is quite complicated. Hunsaker in trying to explain what happened to the board said in 1973 there was a change in the federal law in which a lower cost of charges limitation was added.

Hunsaker said the hospital would have to maintain a much higher percentage of occupancy under the law change to obtain added Medicare payments in the future to help offset rising

The hospital's occupancy rate for the last year has been under 30 percent

The hospital administrator reported on prospects for obtaining another physician. now located in West Texas, who wants to move and is consider-

After the fiscal loss involved to the hospital in its contracrt with Dr Chana, hospital directors declared they would enter into no future contracts with any income guarantee to physicians

Hunsaker said the amount it had cost to bring Dr. Chana here for 60 days has not been completely determined because some of the salary paid is offset by income not yet completely



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
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
