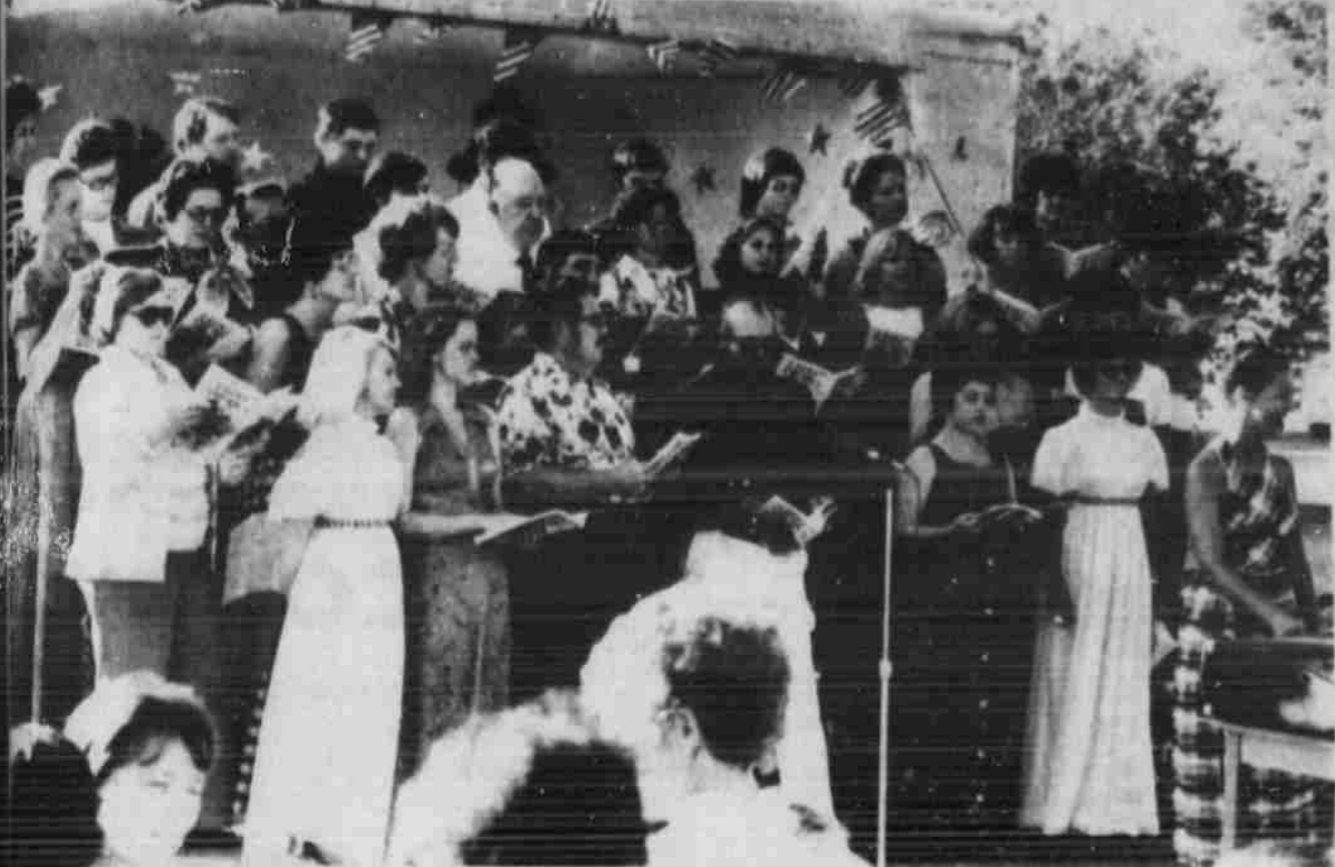


# Voices and bells salute 200th birthday of freedom

## Hospital's board buys monitor

Garza Hospital directors, expressing disbelief they hadn't actually voted to purchase a vital monitor for the hospital before agreeing to do it months ago, made unanimous purchase of the machine for approximately \$9,800 the first order of business at their July meeting Thursday night.

The machine, to be used to monitor mother and child just prior to birth, arrived recently but had not been paid for.

Wayne Childers, vice chairman of the board, presided at the meeting in the absence of Don Huntley, who announced his resignation to Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker that he was resigning.

Hospital directors in the presence of a written resignation voted to act upon Huntley's resignation and asked Hunsaker to write Huntley and ask him to put the resignation on file.

Directors had quite a discussion over a letter of resignation submitted by Dr. Chana who left in late June for El Paso.

Directors will hold a special meeting to approve a letter to Dr. Chana on method of handling insurance checks portions of which are owned to the departed physician and portions to the hospital.

Hospital Administrator Hunsaker explained to the directors that the hospital will owe approximately \$417 to Medicare for Hospital board, Page 12)

## Two are found dead in wrecked plane

A four-day search for a missing Morton flyer and his six-year-old son ended about 5 p. m. Tuesday when the wreckage of their single engine Piper Tripaceer plane was found on the Beggs Ranch in Kent County, only a few hundred

yards across the Garza County line 15 miles east of Post.

Both James Dale White, 31, the pilot, and his son, Bradley, obviously were instantly killed when the four-place plane plunged nose first into the ground during Friday night's thunderstorm in the area.

Both bodies were literally torn to pieces by the terrific force of the impact.

The pair had been enroute home to Morton from a fishing trip at Fineland in East Texas. They had refueled at Cleburne about 6:30 p. m. Friday.

Reports received by lawman that a pilot passing over the area Monday "had received a distressed signal from a plane down in a sandy riverbed" prompted the search to begin in Kent County Monday and spread across eastern Garza County all day Tuesday.

Some 30 search planes over the holiday weekend had concentrated their efforts Saturday and Sunday in the Aspermont area and further east.

Half of a wing, which had fallen off the plane, was first spotted as a Civil Air Patrol search plane about 5 p. m. The rest of the plane was found a mile away a few minutes later about a mile north of US-380.

County Judge Giles Dalby and Sheriff Gene Gandy said the plane apparently was plunging straight down when it hit.

CAP pilots theorized either that lightning had ripped half a wing off the plane causing the crash or the storm's turbulence had torn the half wing from the plane.

Judge Dalby and Sheriff Gandy had agreed Monday night to conduct a thorough Garza county search and Gandy assigned three deputies and Dalby three of his cowboys who

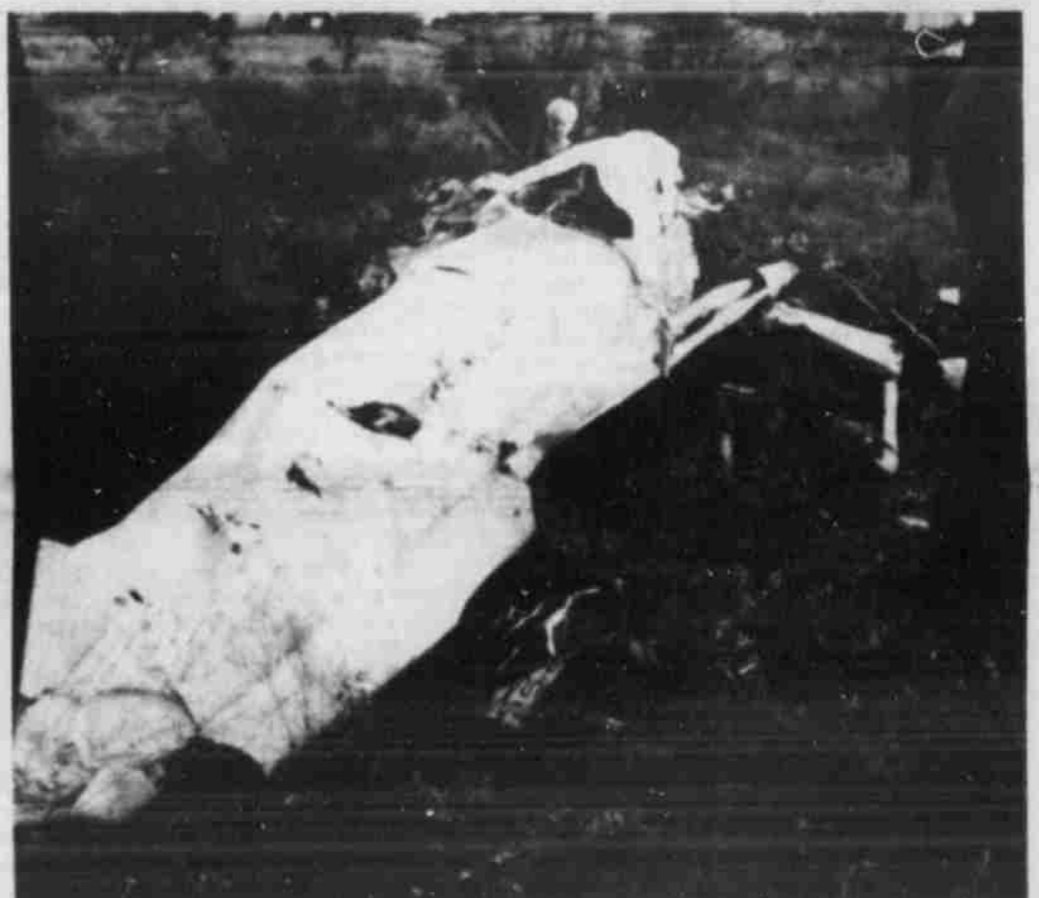

## Museum open house success

The Garza Museum Association celebrated the bicentennial with a two-day open house Saturday and Sunday afternoon at the Garza Museum in which a number of temporary displays and one more permanent display — an early day chapel — were opened on the ground floor.

The chapel is representative of Post's 1915-25 era, a period of rapid church development in which some churches would share the same meeting place on alternate Sundays.

The chapel display includes pews and a pulpit used for 50 years by the Friendship Baptist Church at Close City, an early model pump organ donated by Winnie Tuffing and a variety of other donations which include a collection plate, fans, pewter bread plate, and communion table.

This gives the museum a second more or less finished display room to go along with its kitchen which has been completed for some time.

The museum showed a temporary start on a ranch room and a farm room with some interesting items from early days in both categories.

These included the saddle used by Edd Scott, one of Garza's best known early day cowboys and now owned by Walter Boren and the mounted head of the last longhorn steer in Garza County.

A C. W. Post room is planned in honor of the town founder of Post as the museum already has many mementoes of Post's starting the town, but there was not enough time to put together an adequate display in time for the bicentennial observance.

Creating considerable interest at the weekend open house was a framed collection of pictures of the Post sanitarium's rooms as they looked during the days

Without a doubt, the first temporary display in the first room inside the front door drew the most attention over the weekend.

It's the story put together in artifacts of Garza's earliest inhabitants, dating back 12,000 years, by Frank (Chief) Runkles, one of the founders of the museum organization and recognized as one of West Texas' leading archaeologists.

In a 15 by 20 foot room, Frank's displays take one from the "Folsom Man" who hunted huge bison standing eight feet high at the shoulder here 10,000 to 15,000 years ago, through the "Clovis Man" who hunted elephants across Garza County 12,000 years ago, through the "Archaic people" who lived in this area 7,000 years ago to the time of Christ and hunted the smaller buffalo and developed the eating of roots, vegetables and other plants because he did not have the horse to chase the

## A moral issue now

The United States Supreme Court has ruled the death penalty legal in Texas. That puts the whole moral issue of "a life for a life," or death as a prime deterrent for major crime back in the spotlight of public debate again.

Texas has 40 men sentenced to death waiting on "death row," but that doesn't mean there will be any sudden slaughter at Huntsville. Far from it. It probably will be some time before the first life is taken "in retribution."

It is difficult for the public to understand the legal arguments about the death penalty, which resulted in it being declared unconstitutional a number of years ago.

If you remember, Texas drafted a new death penalty law after the original supreme court decision banning putting criminals to death.

Now the Supreme Court has found the new Texas law has met its guidelines that death not be a cruel or unusual punishment.

The present Texas law concerning the death penalty requires that the jury, after finding the defendant guilty, must decide if the crime was deliberate, if he's likely to commit other acts of violence in the future and if the crime was unprompted.

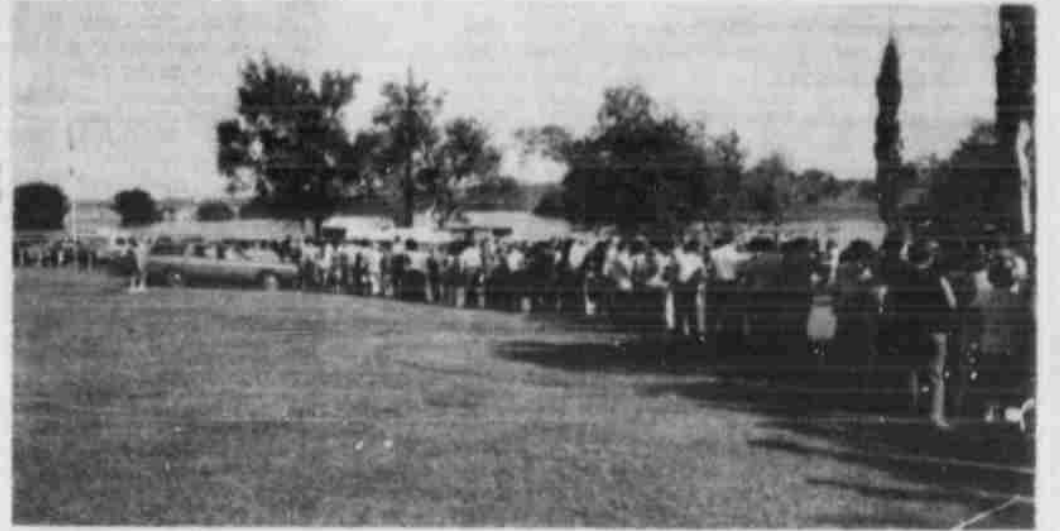

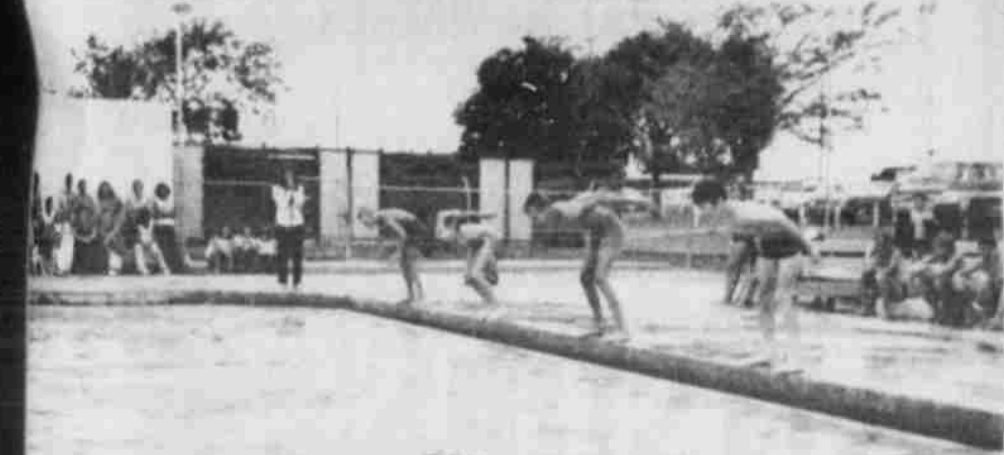

## First bale is ginned

HARLINGEN — For the second straight year and the third time in the last four, the nation's first cotton bale of the new season has been produced from an early-maturing variety developed by a Texas A&M University scientist.

The 498-pound bale was ginned June 22 from a variety called TAMCOY SP 37, developed about five years ago by Dr. Luther Bird, professor of plant pathology and a cotton breeder for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The producer was Oscar Mayfield & Sons, Cameron County farmers who also grew the first bale in 1963 and 1973.

Roy Heine, foreman of the Mayfield 777 Ranch near Arroyo City, was the man responsible for getting the cotton picked, ginned and delivered to the Harlingen police station in time to qualify for the \$2,500 premium offered by the Valley Chamber of Commerce.

## 1,128 library books are read

Library patrons had a 1,128 book reading month in June. Librarian Peewee Pierce reports.


Adults checked out 794 — 277 of them non-fiction and 191 of them "hot weather" mysteries — and youngsters took home 334 for the 30 day period.

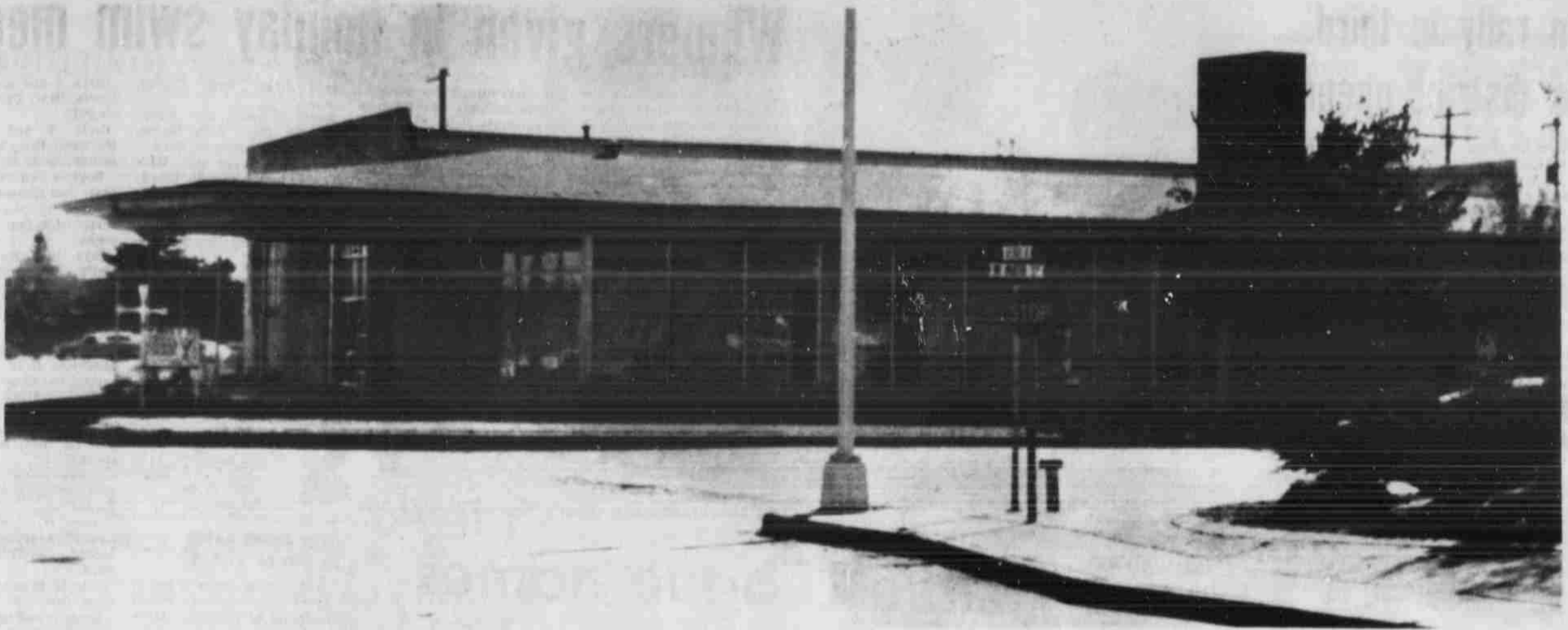

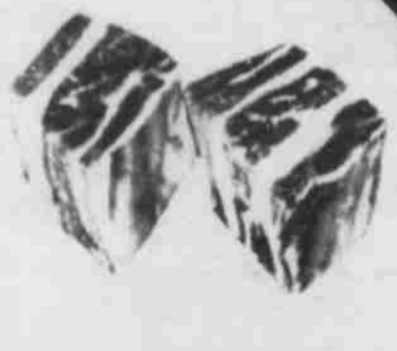

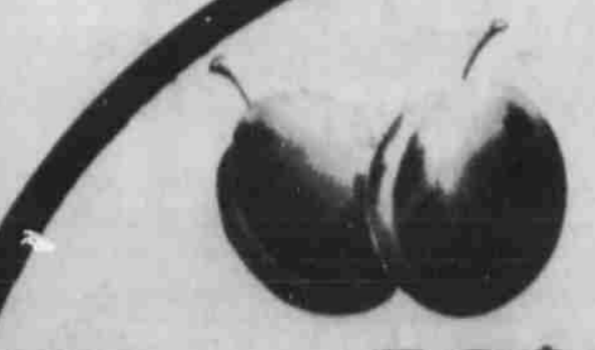

**AUSTIN**—Major House committees and Speaker Bill Clayton offered a grab-bag program to save 10 to 15 per cent on utility bills and renewed a call for a special legislative session.

Clayton said he had discussed the proposals with Gov. Dolph Briscoe. Briscoe has been cool toward a special session unless he can be convinced substantial immediate savings in gas and electric bills would result.

Recommendations include elimination of the five per cent state-local sales tax on utility bills and a new state tax credit for investor-owned utilities. The latter is supposed to save consumers 10 to 12 per cent monthly if enacted.

Tax reduction proposals would reduce state revenue about \$500 million over the next three years, but Clayton said an anticipated surplus of more than \$2 billion would make this painless for government.

Among other recommendations:

— Restructuring natural gas levies to shift \$36.6 million of the burden from Texas to out-of-state consumers.

— Prohibition of take-or-pay provisions for more than 80 per cent of deliverability in future natural gas sale contracts and a guarantee of make-up periods of not less than two years to use gas bought under such provisions.

— A requirement that the Railroad Commission hold public hearings on re-determined prices of gas and pass-through charges to consumers.

— Uniform application of all gas cost adjustments to consumers regardless of class or amount of consumption.

**ABC Head Quits**  
Alcoholic Beverage Commission Administrator Luke Robinson quit his job under fire.

Robinson pointed to disension on the commission as his reason for bowing out after only a nine months trial. He said he would not "play games with the people's business" and not break before the winds of political pressure.

The new administrator ordered a series of raids last fall and insisted on strict application of a law requiring 51 per cent of stock in establishments which sell alcoholic beverages to be owned by Texans.

**Democrats Seek Truce**

Democrats, troubled with friction over state party leadership, held summit truce talks here last week to discuss patching up differences for a unit-d general election campaign.

Texas members of the Democratic National Committee, State Chairman Calvin Guest, Bob Armstrong (who head Jimmy Carter's presidential nomination campaign) and AFL-CIO President Harry Hubbard talked over plans for the fall campaign in a three-hour session.

Guest proposed joint campaign headquarters for Carter and state and local candidates in 23 major Texas counties and cooperative efforts by all factions and groups in the party.

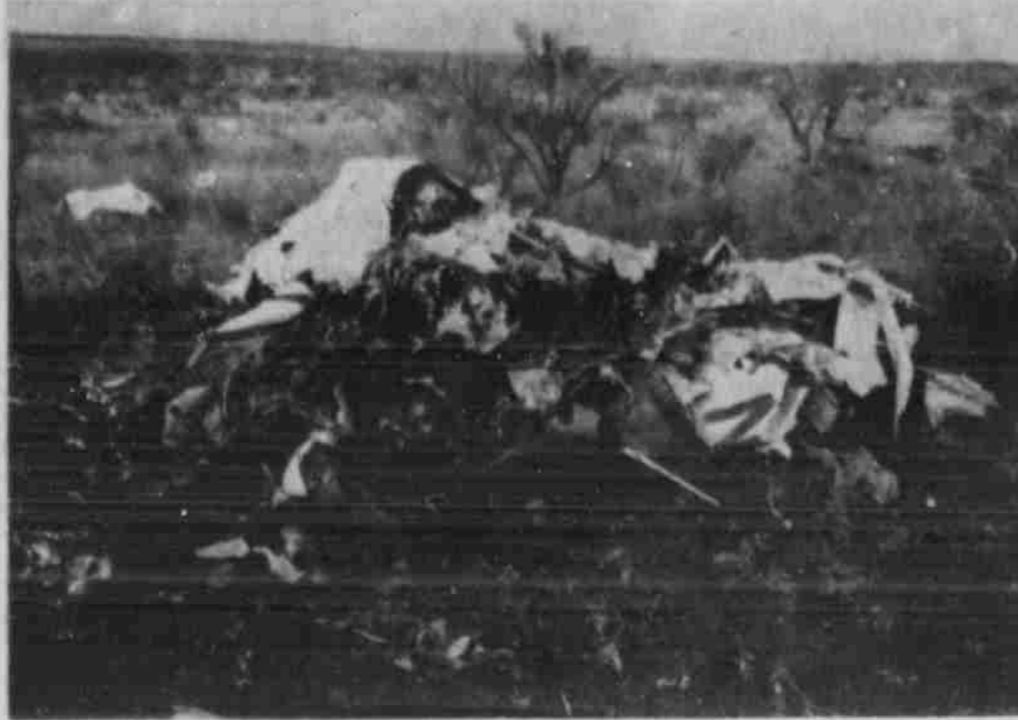
**Courts Speak**

The U.S. Supreme Court, striking down a Nebraska order against pre-trial reporting of facts about a mass murder, curbed judges' powers to censor news media in reporting criminal cases before the trial stage.

The high court left standing, however, conviction of California reporters for contempt of court in violating "gag orders" and refusing to reveal sources of information.

An Austin district judge turned down a request for a temporary injunction to knock Democratic Railroad Commission candidate Jon Newton off the ballot as ineligible, but set a July 9 hearing on merits of the suit brought by defeated candidate Jerry Sadler.

State Board of Pharmacy will appeal a Dallas court ruling that drug stores can advertise drug prices regardless of a state law prohibiting the practice.

(Continued From Page One) and Medicare for the fiscal year ending in September, 1975, instead of the hospital receiving over \$40,000 in additional payments from the government for coverage during the fiscal year.

The hospital had been notified prior to Hunsaker taking over his present job that the hospital didn't have any more money coming for the fiscal year. At last month's meeting, directors decided to ask for a Medicare audit just to find out for sure.

Hunsaker reported the auditors had been here two weeks and found that the hospital actually owed the government a little money on the year in question.

The payoff system is quite complicated. Hunsaker in trying to explain what happened to the board said in 1973 there was a change in the federal law in which a lower cost of charges limitation was added.

Hunsaker said the hospital would have to maintain a much higher percentage of occupancy under the law change to obtain added Medicare payments in the future to help offset rising hospital costs.

The hospital's occupancy rate for the last year has been under 30 percent.

The hospital administrator reported on prospects for obtaining another physician, now located in West Texas, who wants to move and is considering Post.

After the fiscal loss involved to the hospital in its contract with Dr. Chana, hospital directors declared they would enter into no future contracts with any income guarantee to physicians.

Hunsaker said the amount it had cost to bring Dr. Chana here for 80 days has not been completely determined because some of the salary paid is offset by income not yet completely billed out.

Directors agreed to take up the salary evaluation of the nursing staff at its next meeting after receiving what some called "reasonable requests" on salaries from Director of Nurses Lavern Jones. The board in January had agreed to "look at" salaries every six months.

First though, directors asked Hunsaker that the director of nurses provide an evaluation of nurses so salaries can be considered from a merit standpoint.

Attending the meeting were Directors Charlie Brown, Bo Jackson and Childers, Hospital Administrator Hunsaker, and Jim Cornish. The other director, Gene Moore, was out of the city on his vacation.

(Continued From Page One) were paired into two-man teams to search all streambeds on horseback.

In efforts to secure a plane to aid the search, Judge Dalby contacted Roger Evans of the Slaton Flying Service who volunteered use of his helicopter that afternoon. The whirlybird spent five and one-half hours on an eastern Garza search pattern that afternoon before the wreckage was finally spotted by another plane a few miles away.

To get out the bodies the fuselage had to be pulled away from the rest of the plane wreckage. "You could have ridden within a hundred yards of it on horseback and not seen it," Judge Dalby told The Dispatch.

buffalo.

The bow and arrow came into use about 800 AD at the end of the archaic period and Frank has a display of 28 different types of Indian arrow heads which have been identified as used in Texas, including the distinctive Garza point which he helped discover and name a number of years ago here in an important Indian excavation.

Runkles also had on display a vertebra of an Indian with a small flint arrow point imbedded in it to prove the point that the small arrow points — known for a long time as "bird points" — were used on big game as well as small and in war with other Indians.

Also included in Frank's display were some "trade points" which are metal points made by Europeans after they came to America for use in trade with the Indians. With the "trade points" are Indian-made metal points from metal taken from burned wagons of settlers or from other items taken from settlers and sharpened into weapons.

There also were many other Indian articles for living which these early day inhabitants of this country made from stone, bone, or a variety of other materials.

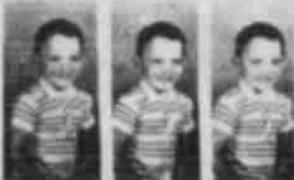
