

Young doctors tell hospital board they want to stay

Dr. Ricardo M. Rodriguez and Dr. James Chua Tuan, members of the Garza Memorial Hospital directors Thursday night they would like to continue their practice in Post beyond the first year, but need help in setting up their own clinic.

The young physicians are hesitant to contract a large debt and asked trustees for help in initial operation of such a clinic.

At present the two physicians are practicing in available space at the hospital. They hope to be out of the hospital and into quarters of their own by early fall.

In other actions at the July meeting, hospital trustees heard a heating-cooling project presentation by Bruce Thornton of Lubbock, discussed the hospital's sick leave policy with a delegation of six nurses, and heard reports from Administrator Hunsaker that Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage for employees has gone up 14 percent, and that the hospital's registered nurse situation is bordering on the critical again.

Thornton, who currently is handling the hospital's air conditioning repair work, told trustees it would cost about \$62,000 to put the hospital's air-conditioning and heating in good condition and replace all present water lines with copper ones. He said this did not include repairs to walls where entry had to be made to get to pipes, but it did include essential repairs to the unit in the operating wing which he emphasized "must be fixed this fall."

Thornton stressed interconnects so that when one unit went down others could be employed to at least partially do its job while repairs were made.

While much of the work can be done at any time, he said new equipment ordered couldn't be expected before fall delivery.

At the June meeting directors heard a \$50,000 estimate for renovation of heating and cooling in all but the operating wing of the hospital, but it included repair of walls.

New city budget shows big expenditures cut

Hearing set for Aug. 8

The city council Monday night tentatively approved and called a public hearing for Aug. 8 on the city's 1977-78 budget that calls for \$155,135 less in expenditures from its three major funds.

Totalling general fund, water and sewer, and revenue sharing expenditures together, the new budget for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1 calls for the expenditure of \$555,602 as compared with \$710,737 during the current year.

This is a 22 percent reduction. The difference primarily is in the fact that the city is planning to buy few "big ticket items" next year, like an automatic trash collection system.

There are expected minor increases for salaries, and utilities. Generally, department by department there are few major increases. Estimates for the current year are for \$445,898 expenditures from the general fund, \$49,623 from revenue sharing, and \$215,216 from the water and sewer fund.

summer, \$5,000 for new car for city manager, \$5,000 for terminal building to be built at airport later this summer plus \$2,400 for meals on wheels and \$890 for additional summer recreation.

By the end of next year the water fund should have a balance of something like \$96,000, including \$66,757 already invested and some \$29,587 in cash if things go as anticipated.

Property taxes will account for \$152,390 of the city's anticipated revenue next year, but this is only about 23 percent of the city's total income.

Other big revenue items will be sales tax \$80,000; sanitation fees \$43,000; occupation and utility tax \$46,000; \$20,000 oil royalties; \$210,000 in water and sewer (See City Council, Page 10)

Employment of the new teachers completes the faculty for the 1977-78 school year barring future resignations.

The resignations include Mrs. Margaret Killian, second grade teacher; Terry Rightmire, high school math teacher; and Mrs. Beth Walker, high school librarian who has served as teacher and librarian in the local schools for the last 17 years.

Mrs. Walker and her son, Scott, will be moving around Aug. 1 to the San Antonio area where she will be a librarian in a San Antonio school this coming school year.

Sheriff Jim Pippin ran a check on the name of Gary Albright Lodge. Sure enough, the teletype message came back he was an escapee from the Eastern State Hospital at Williamsburg, Va.

Queried about Lodge, the hospital replied that the man "was mentally ill but we will not extradite."

Sheriff Pippin had Lodge safely in a jail cell trying to figure his next move.

Post man wakes to save family in fire

It's a good thing Dave Brannon, local mechanic, isn't a sound sleeper. He awoke at about 2:45 a. m. Tuesday to find his bedroom full of smoke and himself choking. He shoved his wife out of bed and ran down the hall to awaken his children in the other bedroom and get them safely out of the house.

By the time he had them out of the house, his bedroom was a sheet of flame. Brannon reported the fire by his vehicle's CB radio, via Channel 9 which is monitored at the sheriff's department around the clock.

The small house at 714 North Broadway was badly damaged by flames, smoke and water. Firemen were called back with another truck at 7 a. m. when fire broke out again in the roof.

Fire Chief Neal Clary said no one knows what started the fire but the blaze appeared to have begun in or near the bedroom closet. But it could have been a whole lot worse for the Brannon family if Dave hadn't awakened when he did.

Record June library use

Post Public Library patrons checked out more books during June — 1,603 to be exact — than they have in any month since the library opened here 10 years ago.

The new record was a combination of lively interest among both youngsters and adults. A total of 822 adult books and 781 juvenile books were checked out during the month.

The June total brings library's circulation for the first six months of 1977 to 6,487 books and is projecting the library toward a new circulation record of over 12,000 books.

All but 351 of the 1,603 books checked out in June were fiction books and included 330 adult fiction, 171 mysteries, 43 westerns, five science fictions, 178 juvenile fiction, and 515 easy books for very young readers.

Sixty-seven new books were added to library shelves during the month to bring total acquisitions for the year to date to 353.

Nine films were shown in the library during June with an attendance of 58.

Nothing wrong with water

The Ralls Banner has been "stirring things up" by reporting a deputy sheriff's own opinion on the drinking fitness of White River water by what he sees as inconsiderate people do around the lake area.

A couple of weeks ago, the Banner planked an editorial across the top of page one and edged it in solid black, entitling it, "Member of White River Board of Directors Says the Lake Water Meets Good Health Standards." That was a week after the Banner had front paged the deputy's accusation.

The editorial then rambled on to say a whole lot of things.

One Post woman, who evidently takes the Ralls paper, came in last Thursday and reported she was "boiling her water and why didn't The Dispatch alert people to what is going on out at the lake?"

Of course the answer to her question is that White River Lake water is pure and fit to drink — in fact it's a whole lot better water to drink than say Lubbock water, or the water in a whole lot of towns.

It literally is impossible to police a recreational lake area to the extent that somebody doesn't "go to the bathroom" once in a while in the lake. That happens everywhere.

We would report to the lady in question that we checked with Al O'Brien, manager of the White River water district, last week before going to press as to whether or not any health hazard is involved.

He said there wasn't, that the lake water was treated and purified in the filtration

plant.

Al didn't have to tell us what we already knew that sewage waste can be treated to the point where it easily meets all requirements for human consumption.

And tastes mighty good too. But the point is that White River lake water is not in any polluted condition before entering the plant. There are always a few "nuts" in the human barrel and if the lake is to provide recreation they must be put up with to some extent.

The Ralls Banner hints that what may be at stake here is that some Crosby County taxpayers who have no interest in White River Lake are opposed to Crosby County sheriff deputies policing the shores of the lake to enforce the law — especially that concerning sanitation — at the expense of Crosby County taxpayers.

The whole upshot in the first place may be an effort to force the lake authority to beef up its own "police force." Anyway, the lake pollution issue started by that deputy sheriff seems to have died down in Crosbyton and Ralls.

The point for Post citizens to remember is that in the White River Water District they have a water supply source which is putting drinking water at top priority, and when there is any real pollution threat you will see the White River board and O'Brien really swing into action.

Let's remember who are the water experts. Putting on a badge in Crosby County doesn't make you one.

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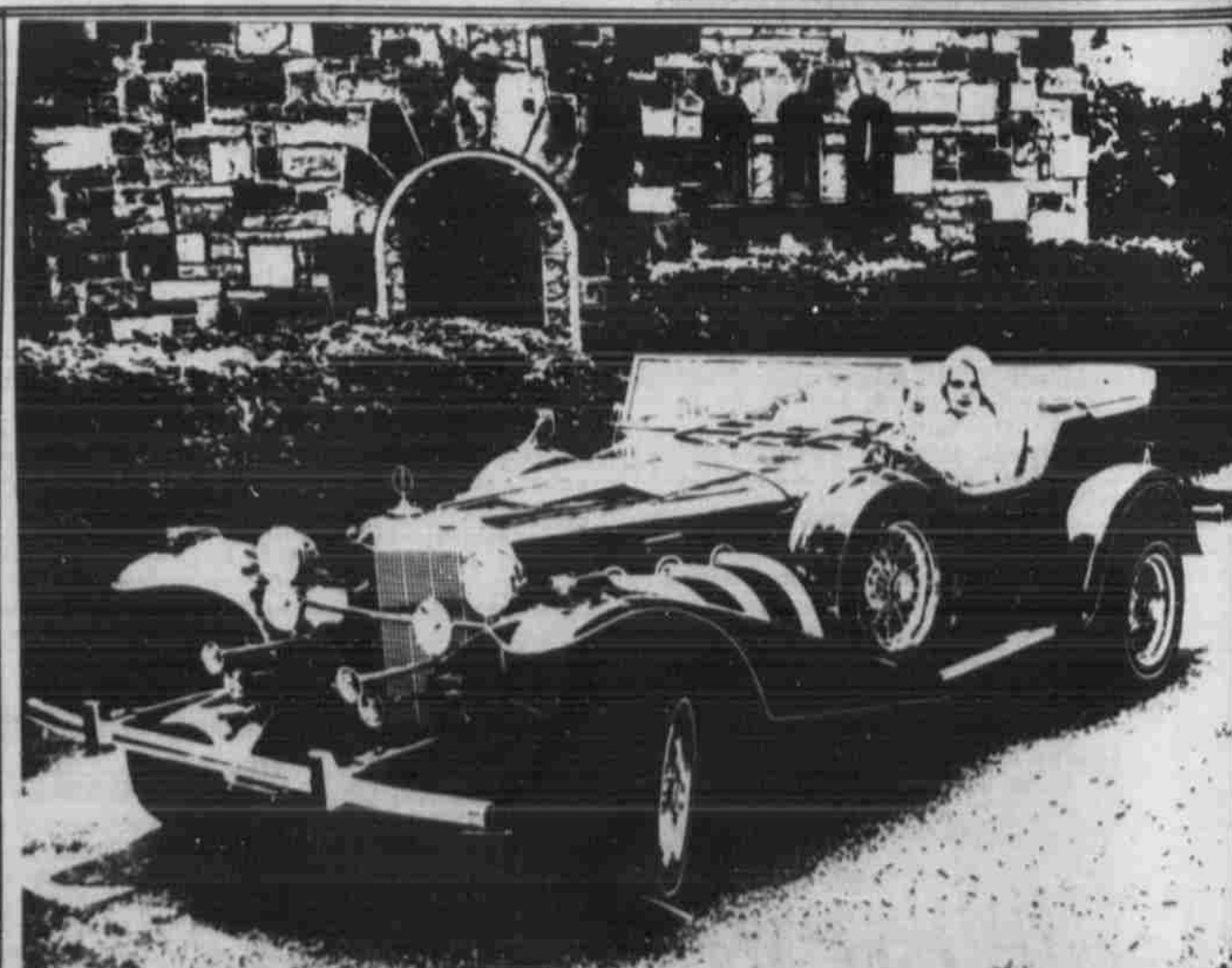

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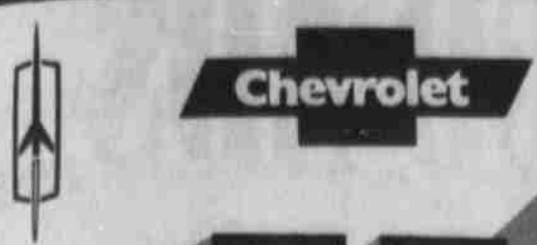

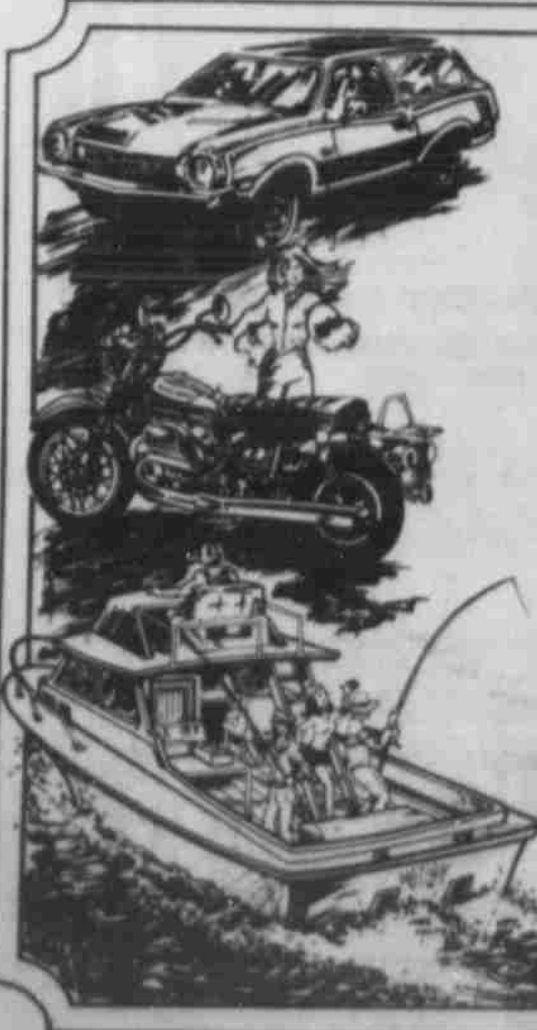

(Continued From Page One) used. Directors had indicated in December they might change this policy for economy reasons.

In the face of opposition from nurses on such a change, directors decided to continue the present policy. Some nurses also asked for a review of the hospital's retirement plan for employees, indicating they would prefer social security to the present plan.

The board expects to review the retirement plan at its special session on the heating-cooling project.

Hunsaker told the board the hospital has lost or is losing three of its registered nurses and he expects considerable difficulty in replacing them and difficulty with Medicare if he doesn't.

The board told him not to get involved with employment agencies which require the hospital to pay them a percentage of an RN's salary for getting them an RN.

The hospital report for June showed only 36 patients admitted bringing the total for the nine months of the fiscal year to date to 463. Patient days for the month were 156 with the average stay in days, 4.1, and the average patients per day 5.6. Three babies were born in the hospital during the month and 109 outpatients treated.

A total of \$19,574.55 was collected from patients during the month and \$8,000 borrowed from the bank. A total of \$19,163.44 was put on the hospital's books as total income for the month with June expenses totaling \$31,225.94.

(Continued From Page One) who will teach junior high science; Richard Wheelus, University of Texas graduate who will teach high school chemistry and science; Miss Kathy Riddle, Texas Tech University graduate, who will be an elementary teacher; Mrs. Dorothy McCook, a graduate of Abilene Christian College with previous teaching experience at Richardson, primary teacher; and Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Ward, both Texas Tech graduates who come here from Meadow.

To fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Clelia Murphy, certified librarian, is being moved from the elementary school library to high school librarian, and Mrs. Sue Cornell is leaving her teaching career at her own request to become the elementary school librarian.

Arthur Tunnel, junior high math teacher, is being moved to the high school math position and Mr. Ward will take over junior high math. Mrs. Ward will be an elementary or primary teacher.

On another subject of major interest, trustees took a long look at the government-supported breakfast program for economically deprived students, but put off a decision until their August meeting.

Trustees are expected at that time to decide either to initiate the breakfast program again for the 1977-78 school year or at least provide milk through a special state milk aid program.

The Post district was the first district in this area to initiate the breakfast program and operated it for two or three years before abandoning it because of its rising cost to district taxpayers.

A new state law will make the breakfast program mandatory for the 1978-79

school year, although not for the upcoming school year.

Lubbock school district trustees have made the breakfast program one of considerable area controversy by voting against initiating such a program.

Supt. Bill Shiver told Post trustees Monday night that he felt "from a learning standpoint" that the breakfast program is helpful. He estimates that about 60 youngsters would participate in the program at a cost to district taxpayers of between \$2,000 to \$3,000.

State Senator Kent Hance has written Shiver and school trustees and included mention of the breakfast program which he has opposed. He said he wants to know how each school system will be affected by it.

Post trustees are of the general opinion that if the state is going to make the breakfast program mandatory it should pay the full cost of it, not only a portion of that cost.

In other actions, trustees: Approved a depository pledge contract with the First National Bank here in which the bank pledges a certain amount of securities against the deposits of the school district, makes no charges on checks, and pays interests on school district investments.

Approved certificates of deposit for \$600,000 in school funds, retroactive to May 5.

Accepted the Gulf Oil bid of 40.74 cents per gallon on gasoline for the 1977-78 school year.

Accepted Tax Collector Billie Windham's report which showed \$1,440.19 collected in delinquent taxes in June plus \$215.14 in penalties and interest. The district has \$88,926.01 outstanding in delinquent taxes of which \$21,349.94 is for 1976, \$12,273.66 for 1975, and \$12,649.74 and 1964 and before with the 10 years between ranging from \$2,300.85 to \$8,732.33.

Received letters from County Judge Giles Dalby for the Garza County Commissioners Court and Manager Al O'Brien of the White River Water District concerning requests by the school district for payment of \$250 from each unit for tax services to Ira Greenfield for his six-years handling of the delinquent tax collections for the four local taxing units.

Both said they were unaware of an agreement for Mr. Greenfield's services and asked for information concerning such an agreement.

The city is yet to be heard from in the matter, although the same night it voted against paying the \$250.

The school district has worked out an agreement with Greenfield to pay him \$1,000 for his services in handling all the tax paper

While readers mull this over, we might add that the city-county park has been limping along without an official name for years. And if you want a real dilly how about the Post-Garza County municipal airport — or some such atrocity?

Actually, here are three important community facilities in which the city and county have joined hands to finance (in the case of the community center the sharing is on the basis of the city developing and the county operating.)

Some communities name such facilities after their community leaders, past or present. Others just select a name and make it official.

The Dispatch is not suggesting that we name the center, airport, and park after one, two or three community leaders. The only thing we are suggesting is that the city and county put their heads together and come up with appropriate names for all three facilities.

It isn't that there will be any confusion over parks or airport, since really we have but one of each, but we "hate" that crazy airport name — we're not sure we have it right above — and we think it might be a little more dignified to refer to facilities around the community with something more than city-county this or city-county that.

Of course we can just throw up our hands and call the community center the city-county center — and let it go at that.

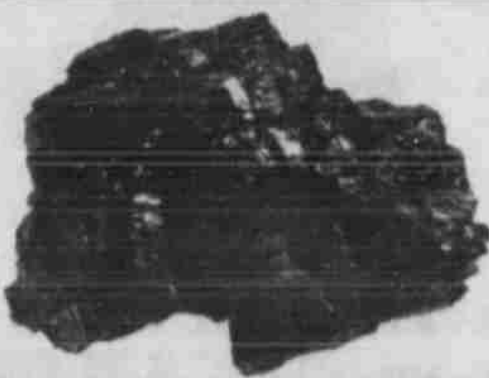
