



Annual 'rain week' big cotton boost

water yet

If there is one thing almost sure about unpredictable West Texas weather it is that the first week of June is "rain week.

If farmers didn't get enough to plant while 4.92 inches of moisture was officially falling on Post in May, the first six days of June did the trick.

With moisture recorded on five of the first six days, the moisture total for June stood at 3.13 inches here Tuesday.

That brought Post's 1978 moisture to date to 10.49 inches. Just about everything was

included, including a tornado warning for northern Garza County That came Monday night between 8 and 9 p.m. when a

howling north wind sent the rain dancing in sheets down the streets of Post. Five minutes later when the storm had passed on, the Lubbock weather bureau warming came via televi-

sion that a possible tornado

would be passing near to

Post "within a few

minutes." If that strong wind came from the tornado cloud, the warning was a mite late.

The "rain week" got under way last Wednesday night when moisture blew in with strong winds to leave an official 1.15 of an inch. according to the 8 a.m. Thursday moisture reading.

About 3 a.m. Friday another thunderstorm aroused all but the heavy sleepers here with the worst batch of thunder and lightening in recent years.

Fast start for big recreation program

tion program for Garza youth is off to its best start in the last four years with 183 youngsters enrolled through Tuesday, Program Director Joe Giddens re-

County agent traps weevils over county

The Dispatch is cooperating with Garza Extension Agent Syd Conner on providing Garza cotton farmers with the weekly count of boll weevils in Conner's nine sets of traps around the county and above the cap.

Conner explained that the traps are being checked weekly to determine if weevils are wintering in the county, and if so, where with what kind of cover.

"I've already caught wee-

vils in some of the traps which shows that weevils apparently are over-wintering in the county because there is now no cotton to attract them," Conner explained

Conner has had his weevil traps out for two weeks. There are four traps to

each set and Conner checks them every Friday.

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Texas farm land up 11 percent in year

COLLEGE STATION, -The value of Texas farmland went up to 11 percent for the year ending Feb. 1, slightly outdistancing the nationwide increase of nine percent.

The increase raised the national average from \$450 to \$490 per acre, noted Dr. William E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, citing figures from a U.S. Department of Agriculture report.

"Although the rate of increase has slowed, land markets still can generally be called strong," said Black.

While Texas surpassed the national average increase, a number of states showed an even greater increase in farmland values. Wisconsin had the steepest gain, 18 percent, followed by South Dakota, 17 percent; Maryland, 16 percent; Louisiana and Mississippi, 15 percent; Missouri, 14 percent; California, Ohio and Kentucky, 13 percent; and Minnesota, Indiana, Tennessee, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Delaware, 12 percent.

Nebraska was the only state showing a decline in farmland values for the year, down four percent. Increases of three and four percent were common in the Southwest, Southeast and Northeast.

Texas farmland is currently valued at \$316 an acre compared to \$285 in February, 1977, and \$195 in February, 1976 pointed out

States with the highest farmland values at this time are New Jersey, \$2,057 per acre; Connecticut, \$1,962 and Rhode Island, \$1,939. New Mexico and Nevada

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

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
