

Hospital employees get 5 cents an hour raise

Garza Memorial Hospital employees at their November meeting last Thursday night voted the hospital's 32 employees a 5 cents an hour raise, effective Dec. 1.

The contract with Dr. Ricardo Rodriguez guaranteeing him \$4,250 a month and other benefits to continue his medical practice in Post.

The salary increase for hospital staff averages as a 10 percent overall.

Hospital Administrator Ed Zintgraff, who recommended the blanket increase and of individual salary adjustments, assured the board that the hospital has the funds for the increase and still has a cushion after paying off the due from the bank and other expenses.

The increases would bring the lowest paid hospital employees — some nurses' aides and others — up to the federal minimum wage of \$2.65 an hour when the newly voted new federal minimum becomes effective Dec. 1.

Zintgraff told the board that hospital salaries here are competitive with other hospitals in this West Texas area, but that the increase is needed as a morale booster to enable the hospital to employ high caliber personnel.

He said the registered nurses situation is good and he hopes to cut nurses' overtime to a very small percentage of salary costs.

The board and administrators agreed that with this increase a change would be made from a six month salary review to one each year.

The contract with Dr. Rodriguez had been agreed verbally some time ago, but this action was to approve a written contract signing the same night Dr. Rodriguez who was present at the session and administrator Zintgraff on

behalf of the hospital. The contract does not make Dr. Rodriguez a hospital employee, but terms him "an independent contractor" with the hospital having no supervision over him in his practice.

The hospital guarantees Dr. Rodriguez \$4,250 per month less the total patient charges made by the doctor for that month. In other words the hospital would pay only the difference between \$4,250 and what the physician bills out each month.

The hospital also (1) provides the doctor with one full-time employee, the qualifications and compensation of said employee to be (See Hospital, Page 12)

Retirement plan for county is adopted

The Garza County Commissioners Court Monday by a split vote of 3 to 2 selected a retirement plan for county employees offered by Insurance Associates over the state retirement plan available to county and district employees.

The court first turned down the state plan on a 3 to 2 vote with Commissioners Herbert Walls and Ted Aten voting in favor and Commissioners Mike Cisneros and Buck Craft and County Judge Giles Dalby voting no.

The court then approved the Insurance Associates plan both a retirement system and life insurance coverage with the voting reversed, Cisneros, Craft and Dalby approving, and Walls and Aten voting no.

After that decision was made, the court voted unanimously for the county to invest six percent of the (See Retirement, Page 12)

The 1978 Garza United Fund climbed over the \$5,000 mark here early this week with still a long, long way to go to reach the \$10,750 goal.

The total Wednesday morning stood at \$5,221.50, Drive Chairman Jim Cornish reported.

But he said this figure is deceiving.

"We have given all division drive chairman until today or tomorrow to get in their cards and donations," Cornish said. "In many cases we have received nothing so far from many of these divisions."

When these divisions report the total should jump rapidly.

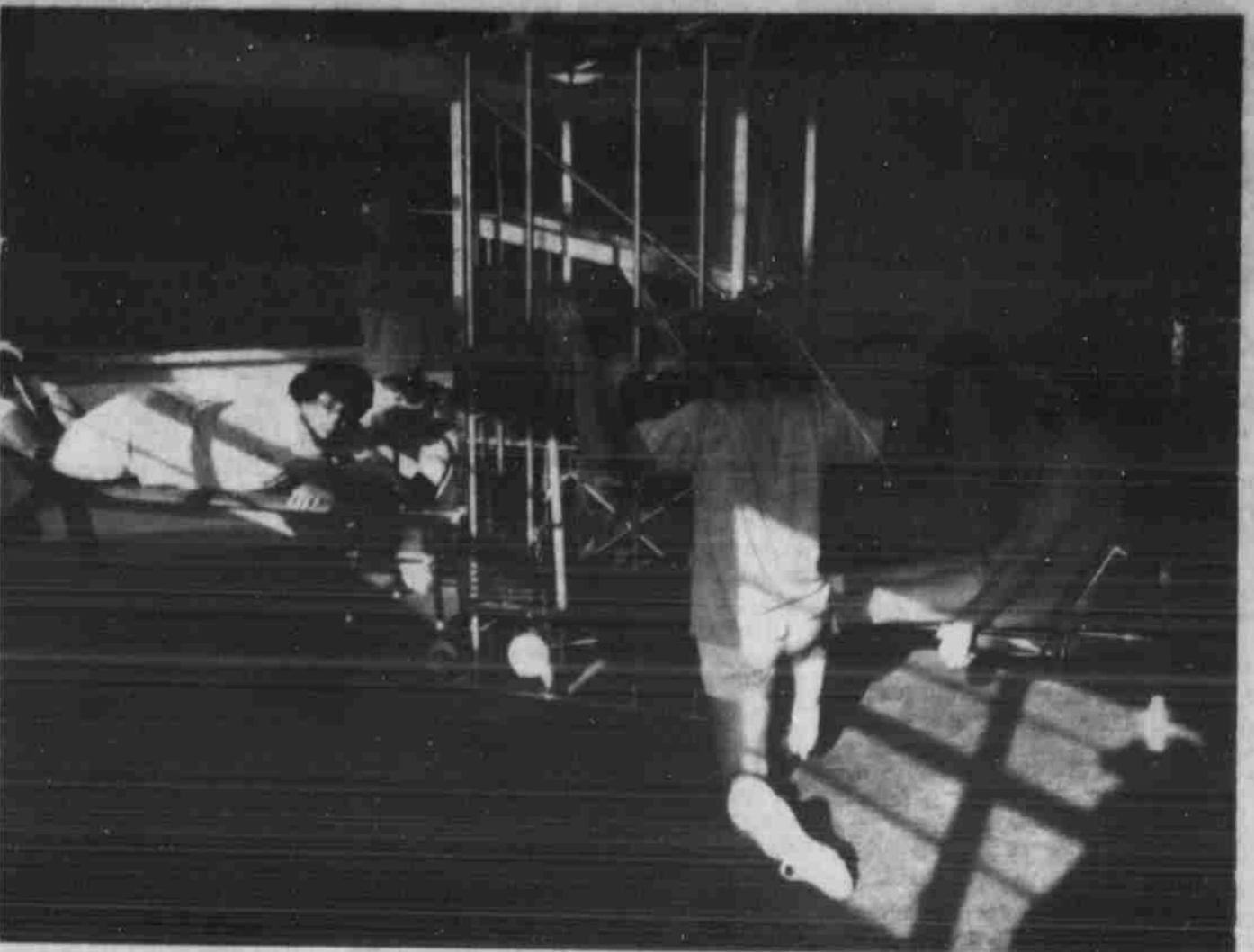
Leading off the program was the First United Methodist Church bell choir which played "Joyeux."

Post man charged in hit-run accident

Ora D. McDaniel of Post is out on \$5,000 bond on a charge of failing to stop and render aid after a Slaton teenager was sideswiped by a car on FM-669, three miles southwest of Post near the entrance to Boy Scout Camp Post Sunday afternoon.

Brent Oden, 14, the accident victim, was brought to Garza Memorial Hospital and kept overnight before being released.

He suffered a one and three-quarter inch laceration on the left side of his head and minor contusions and abrasions down the left side of his body.

Oden was waiting by the roadside with his two cousins, Jimmy and Jerry Oden, also of Slaton, according to the investigating officer's report, when the accident occurred.

The car which struck the youth was headed toward Post and continued without stopping.

McDaniel was arrested at his home here after investigative work by the sheriff's department.

He was arraigned in justice of the peace court where the \$5,000 bond was set. The charge is a third degree felony. The case will be submitted to the next grand jury here.

School audit is accepted

Post school district trustees received and accepted the audit for the 1976-77 school year at their November meeting Monday night.

The audit showed total revenues of \$1,885,489.26 with only \$428,589.69 of that coming from state sources, against an expenditure of \$1,518,470.63.

The representative of the auditing firm of Hearn, Criswell and Robison commented that school investments have been made as they should have been made.

The Post school district has received the top auditor's rating for the way it has handled some \$14 million in local and state funds and a half million in federal funds over the past 13 years.

Trustees decided not to rent the former teen town building but to retain it as a storage facility. It now has over 100 boxes of school records stored there.

The action came when the Post Art Guild asked to rent a portion of the building.

Trustees had only a small agenda.

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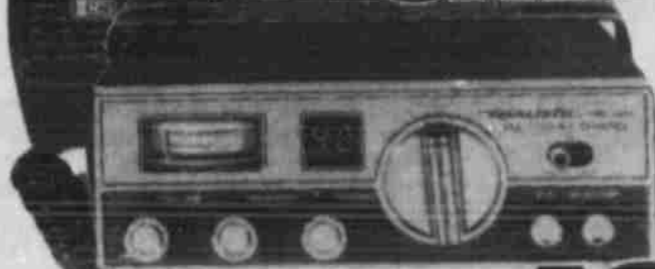

Fruits, vegetables offer economy buys

COLLEGE STATION — Fresh fruits and vegetables offer some top economy buys at Texas grocery markets this week, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

FRESH FRUITS — Items in best supply at the most economical prices are cranberries, grapefruit, oranges, apples, tangelos, tangerines, bananas and grapes.

In selecting cranberries, look for plumpness, good color and size uniformity. Also, they are easy to freeze. Simply put the original package in the freezer.

FRESH VEGETABLES — Fresh potatoes and onions are this week's "spotlight items" for thrifty choices. Other good values are cooking greens, hardshell squash and sweet potatoes. Additional economy buys are pumpkin, carrots, broccoli, eggplant, cabbage, rutabagas and green peppers.

POULTRY — Fryer chicken prices have "fluttered" upward slightly, but whole chickens are still an economy choice. In egg buying, Grade A, large-size eggs generally are the best value, although prices are a bit higher. That trend likely will continue through the holiday season as demand for eggs increases.

PORK — Good choices include smoked picnics, fresh shoulder roasts and steaks, assorted chops and liver.

BEEF — Specials focus on beef chuck roasts and steak, round steak, ground beef, liver and some of the more tender cuts, such as sirloin steak. Also, consider bone-

less cuts, because they do offer more servings from each pound than most other cuts.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Impulse buying may send family food costs soaring. Avoid haphazard food buying by planning menus and then making a shopping list from them. This can keep trips to the store down to one a week and mean even more savings.

Fine cast presents a good production

If a playwright takes a serious novelist, adds a generous dose of the mysterious world of spirits, seances and dead wives, serves it up comically in the countryside of Kent, England, in the 1940's, he will have plagiarized Noel Coward's "Blithe Spirit," presented by the Post High School Drama Department Saturday night at the Primary Auditorium.

David Morrow made a suitably stuffy Charles Condomine, who wishes to explore the world of occult as a way to research a novel he is writing. Later David adequately faced the harried situation of being a husband with two wives. Donna Josey depicted Charles Condomine's sophisticated wife Ruth, who has no doubts about Charles' love and no worries about Charles' previous and now deceased wife. However, with the entrance of Madame Arcati, portrayed with gusto by Terry Smith, the Condomines' lives move from staid to confusing.

Terry, one of the finest character actresses to perform for Post High School, did not miss another opportunity to add to her reputation by her zany portrayal of Madame Arcati at the seance.

Following the seance, Danna Giddens arrived as the ghost of Elvira, Charles' first wife. Some of the best scenes in the play had Charles, Ruth, and Elvira having three-sided conversations while only Charles, Elvira, and the audience could hear and see everything. Ruth evidences that sophistication cannot cover up jealousy. As Ruth, Donna

got suitably flustered talking to thin air while Danna, as Elvira, was suitably evanescent as she floated around the stage. Technically, this part of the play seemed as difficult to stage as the obviously difficult seance and Miss Jane Tice did a fine job of directing the whole thing.

Leanna Davis, as the maid Edith, provided the misleading element to the play. At the outset, we were led to believe she was simply a clumsy maid and not until the final scene, did we realize, to paraphrase an old cliché, "the maid did it!" Edith had been the cause of the ghost's returning. (As those who missed the play might not know, Charles is surrounded by the ghosts of his two wives before the final curtain.) Tim Tatum and Cindy Polk as Dr. and Mrs. Bradman and Amy Thuett as the unseen Daphne rounded out the cast.

We were fortunate to see a fine high school cast and crew overcome a very few miscues to present a good production of a very difficult and sophisticated comedy.

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FHA extends deadline for loans to Dec. 2

The U. S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has extended to Dec. 2 the deadline for farmers in Lynn and Garza counties to apply for farm emergency loans to cover losses caused by this year's drought.

Agriculture Rob Bergland for applications under drought that would expire before Dec. 2, provided the designations are based on disasters that have occurred on or after July 1, 1976. The Secretary's action was taken under requirements of recent emergency loans legislation (PL 95-89) signed by President Carter.

Farmers lacking other sources of necessary credit may apply to FmHA for loans to offset losses or revive farming operations. Under the schedule of interest rates as revised by PL 95-89, loans are made at a rate of 3 percent on the first \$250,000 borrowed against actual loss, 5 percent for additional amount off-

setting actual loss, and 8 percent for loans not based on loss but needed to continue farming or make major adjustments in farm operations.

FmHA emergency loan applications for farmers in Lynn and Garza Counties are received at the agency's county office located in Tahoka, Texas.

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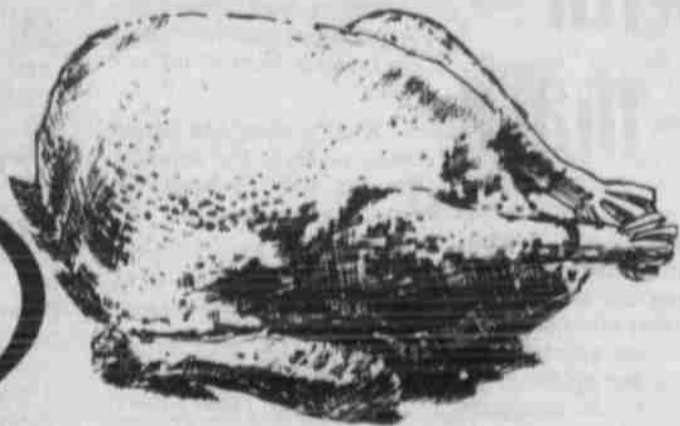

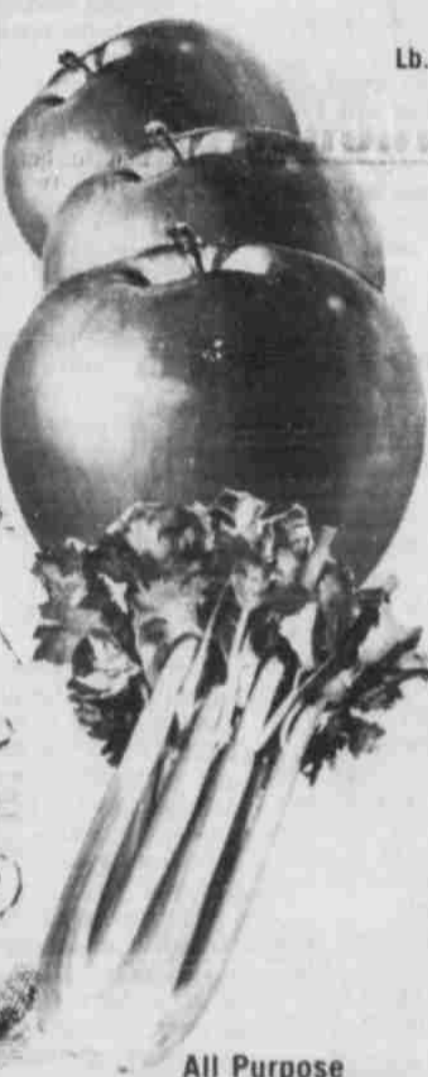

Area cotton prices drop \$2 to \$3 bale

Over one million samples have been graded by High Plains Classing Offices through Friday, Nov. 11. Around 248,000 samples were graded last week, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of USDA's Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. This compares with only 111,000 graded by Nov. 11 last year, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Prices paid growers declined \$2 to \$3 per bale the week ending Nov. 11. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 51 and better, staples 30 through 32, mikes 3.5 through 5.3 for about 43.25 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41 and 51, staples 30 through 32, mikes 5.0 and higher brought around 40.00 cents per pound, Dickson said. Predominant grades from High Plains Classing Offices this week were grade 31 at 23 percent, grade 41 was 32 percent, and grade 32 accounted for 21 percent. Staple lengths were most-

ly staple 31 at 30 percent, staple 32 was 30 percent and staple 33 accounted for 16 percent. Micronaire was mostly in the desirable 3.5 to 4.9 range and was 84 percent of the total. Around 12 percent was higher and 4 percent was lower. About two percent were reduced one grade because of grass and one percent for bark. Average breaking strength was 87,000 pounds per square inch for High Plains cotton. Gins paid growers 57 to 70 dollars per ton for cottonseed, mostly 63 to 64 dollars. 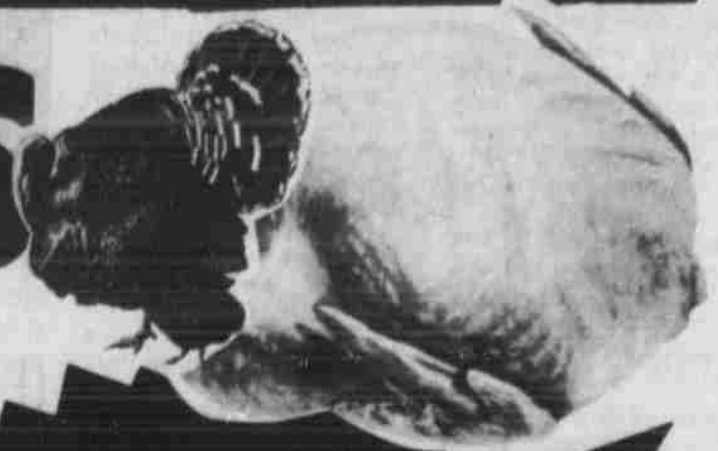

(Continued From Page One) within the sole discretion of the hospital, (2) allows the doctor a 33 1-3 percent discount on all laboratory work performed by the hospital for the doctor, and (3) pays the doctor \$1,600 upon the execution of the agreement.

The \$1,600 is in lieu of the hospital paying the doctor's malpractice insurance and hospitalization insurance as had been verbally agreed.

Dr. Rodriguez in the contract agrees to render all necessary medical and surgical services in Post, to maintain adequate records to maintain a full-time residence in the county, to maintain regular office hours amounting to at least 40 hours per week within the city, abide by all hospital bylaws of the medical staff, perform such other duties as the board of directors of the hospital may from time to time reasonably direct, including "on duty" and "on call" assignments, furnish at his own expense all labor, services, material, equipment and supplies which will be necessary to complete the contract, and to provide and maintain an automobile, home and office telephone at his own expense.

Dr. Rodriguez, who is practicing in the hospital, will move into new office quarters in the extreme west end of the hospital when conversion of three patient rooms into the new office quarters is completed in about a month.

In the only other major action by the board, besides paying the bills, directors voted to terminate the hospital's contract with Continental TV of Overland Park, Kans., for the leasing of 16 black and white television sets and two spares for rental to patients because the Kansas firm has failed to live up to terms of its agreement to keep the sets in repair at their own expense. Of the 18, eight are now operative.

The hospital board authorized the hospital administrator to enter into a seven-year contract with RCA Commercial Products of Dallas for the lease-purchase of 15 color TV sets, to

be kept operative by RCA, at a monthly cost of \$134.32 with the sets available for purchase by the hospital at \$1 each at the end of seven years.

The hospital has been paying the Kansas firm slightly over \$150 monthly for the black and white sets, but having a continual hassle trying to keep them operative.

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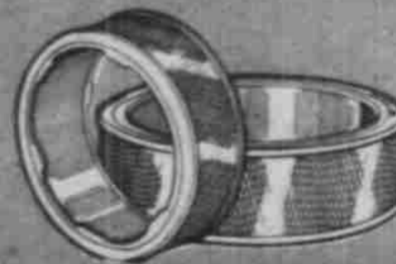


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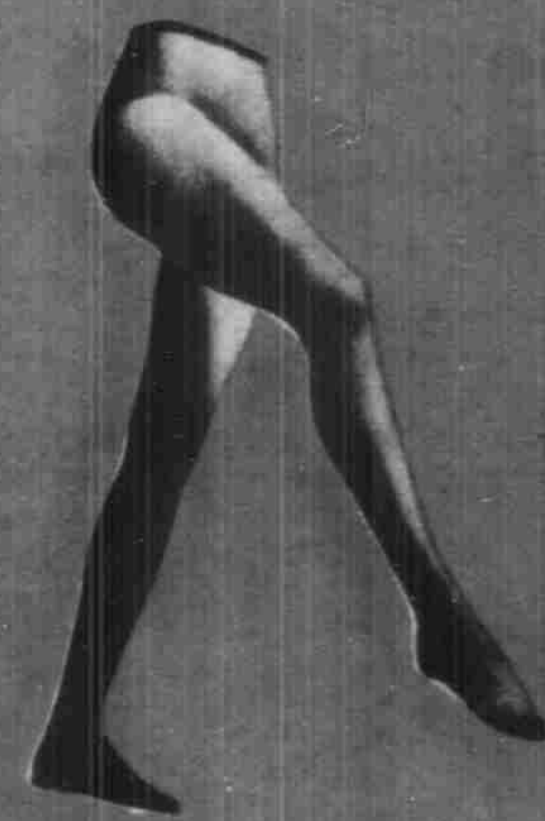


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
