David Newby honored for 'dream come true'

David Newby was honored at the open house of Garza's new senior citizens center in the Algerita Hotel Sunday afternoon as "the man who made a dream come true." Some 140 persons, including several out-of-town guests were on hand for the occasion, drank punch, ate cookies, toured the brand new \$41,000 center, and applauded as Newby was presented a brass gallery tray by the Garza County Heritage Association and a framed 1978 membership certificate of the Texas Historical Foundation.

In presenting the membership in the state foundation, Mayor Giles McCrary pointed out in a short speech that the hotel was "first a nightmare before it became a dream."

He called it a nightmare because although listed on the national registry of historic places, it had been condemned for public use "as unrepairable."

That nightmare had to be turned into a dream before it could through Newby's efforts to bring it into a reality, Mayor McCrary said.

Mrs. Ruby Kirkpatrick as head of the Garza Trail Blazers, the senior citizens club, presented the tray to Newby.

Rental housing loan of \$206,000 sought

The Post Community Housing, Inc., which operates the 14-unit rental housing project at 13th Street and Avenue S has applied for a \$206,000 FHA loan to build 10 more units on the same site.

James Mitchell, president of the non-profit corporation, told The Dispatch this week that plans have been completed and submitted to the FHA office in Waco to build five more duplexes and a small combination storage-office building.

The problem involved is that the FHA has not changed its construction ceiling from \$17,500 per unit in the present inflation.

Estimated cost of the new units will be around \$18,400

Decision on vacancy due soon

The Garza County Commissioners Court Monday interviewed five of the six applicants for appointment as Garza County's new tax assessor-collector to succeed T.H. Tipton, Sept. 1.

The court is hopeful of interviewing the last applicant and announcing the appointment by Aug. 1 to give the new county officer time to get his or her feet on the office floor before Tipton actually steps out.

In other actions, the court:

Tentatively approved a new ambulance agreement to which the county court, the sheriff, the city council and the hospital trustees will be signees.

Approved a \$2,000,000 liability policy with Bryan Williams & Son to cover elected county officials and full-time county employees at a cost of \$1,834.

Accepted George Mindia's bid for the concrete work in the 4-H building which will be remodeled to county use.

Approved a motion to request the return of the material road fund to Garza (See Decision due, Page 12)

61-year-old depot closed

The Santa Fe railroad closed its Post depot Monday after 61 years of local service.

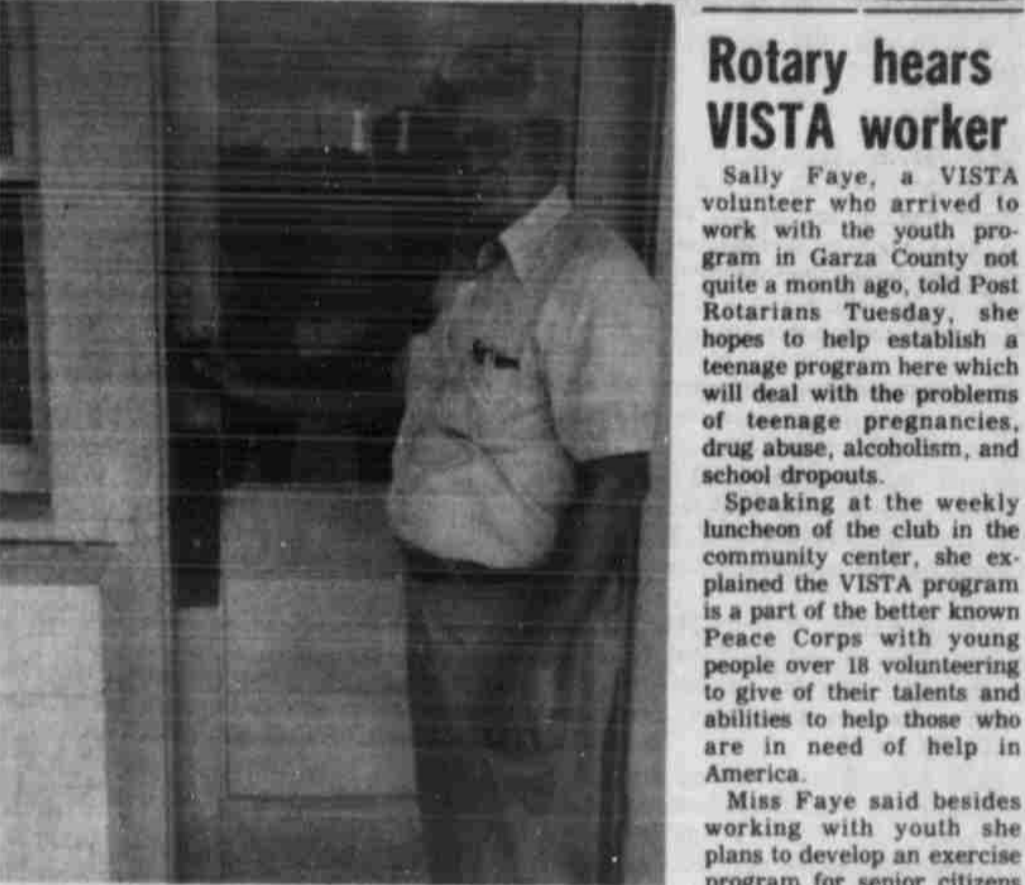
Depot Agent Jess Compton locked it up for the last time at 4 p.m. in the afternoon. He took a day off Tuesday and went to work Wednesday in the Santa Fe depot at Tahoka.

Santa Fe Superintendent K.C. May of Amarillo told The Dispatch the depot was closed because "there wasn't enough business left in Post to support an agent."

The hearing to close the depot was held in Austin before a referee of the state railroad commission last March. Every shipper of record for the last three years was notified of the hearing, but no protests to the closing were made at the

Garza finally gets moisture

A large part of Garza cropland north of Post got much better moisture in weekend showers than Post as cloudy, cool skies Saturday and Sunday teased the local community.

All told Post officially received only .29 of an inch with most of it — .18 of an inch — falling last Thursday with .07 more on Saturday and .04 additional on Sunday.

Farmers in the Hackberry area reported two and three inches of moisture with Southland, Pleasant Valley and Calgary also reporting good moisture.

The heat wave, which saw seven straight days of 100 or above high daily temperatures, broke on Thursday when the thermometer dipped slightly to highs of 99 for three days through Saturday.

It was a cool 85 for a Sunday high with only a 91 Monday.

Sally Faye, a VISTA volunteer who arrived to work with the youth program in Garza County not quite a month ago, told Post Rotarians Tuesday, she hopes to help establish a teenage program here which will deal with the problems of teenage pregnancies, drug abuse, alcoholism, and school dropouts.

Speaking at the weekly luncheon of the club in the community center, she explained the VISTA program is a part of the better known Peace Corps with young people over 18 volunteering to give of their talents and abilities to help those who are in need of help in America.

Miss Faye said besides working with youth she plans to develop an exercise program for senior citizens which could be expanded to include both middle-aged and youth.

Mike Flanagan was inducted into the club as a new member by Jack Alexander.

President Tom Power announced he had appointed Henry Wheatley as chairman of the club's new water committee which the Rotary district governor asked to be formed in every club in the district. Other members are James Mitchell III, Curtis Hudman and Syd Conner.

Our growing tourist biz

In case you haven't noticed Post now has two "business streets" — and the new one is really growing.

The Main street business district is five blocks long, from the courthouse to the railroad track. You can add a block to that on the other side of the Santa Fe crossing and then you're driving along Post's "oil street" almost all the way to the cemetery.

But looking the other way, Broadway is over a mile long from the railroad overpass to the start of the climb up the Cap. And it's here where Post's major business growth has occurred in the last five to 10 years.

Broadway has some 26 retail businesses lining in on both sides now, not counting the highway department "block" on the south end.

Of course, the reason for this growth is the "customers" who zip up and down US-84 through Post. Broadway has been widened now as a highway thoroughfare with this million dollar plus improvement apparently guaranteeing solid highway traffic through Post for the foreseeable future.

If you look closely on Broadway, there are only five to eight residences remaining for the entire mile. Many have been cleared away for retail businesses and parking lots. Because of no parking on Broadway, every new business there has to include its own parking facilities.

It's only a guess, of course, but we would estimate that the dollar volume of business on Broadway now far exceeds that of all retail business on Main Street.

There are still some building sites left on Broadway and if things continue as they are now going, most of them are going to fill up with businesses in the next few years.

The north half of Broadway — beyond Main Street — already is pretty solid with businesses. The development to come probably will be mainly on the south half of the highway thoroughfare.

Post with its Broadway development has a real retail business stake in its "highway" or "tourist trade." It is difficult to translate this "tourist business" into actual dollars and cents, but we would guess it is much larger than some of the state tourist figures indicate.

We feel these figures on a city or town's dollar volume in the tourist business are based mostly on eye estimates and not close research into sales tax figures.

The Dispatch has always been a staunch promoter of Post's tourist business. We would suggest with our growing volume of business and the widening of Broadway that we need to give it even more careful consideration.

We feel sure that Post's Cactus Garden at 10th and Broadway is an eye-catcher. We doubt if our "sextuple oil well" gets the tourist attention it rightfully deserves because it is not on the highway.

We need to cultivate tourist dollars in every way we can. That can best be accomplished by generally being friendly and helpful to travelers. Post has a fine reputation in this regard.

Certainly it is important that we all realize and appreciate for the good thing that it is, our tourist business. The ones who have high business will be trying the hardest of course. But through recognizing the importance of the "Broadway payroll" and the "Broadway cash flow" we all can be alert to help and continue to improve the situation.

The Santa Fe is not one of these, however. Its industrial development still keeps the stockholders in dividends.

But rail service today is basically confined to carload shipments for the long haul — and even much of that is no longer profitable.

There will continue to be as much railroad freight service here as customers want, but things have changed and there is no real demand left.

It is significant that the depot was closed after a hearing in which no one objected to the closing. It is also significant that the railroad saw no need to even notify the Post community of its intentions until it became established fact.

Post's railroad era of 60 years virtually ended this week with the closing of the Post depot and the reassignment of its only local Santa Fe employe to run operations at Tahoka.

As the Santa Fe superintendent of the division said in Amarillo Tuesday, "It's just a case of there not being enough railroad business left in Post to support a depot agent."

As the airlines and the truck lines have expanded in the last decade, the railroads have contracted. A government corporation has had to take over what little railroad passenger service is left and many railroads have slipped into bankruptcy or near bankruptcy.

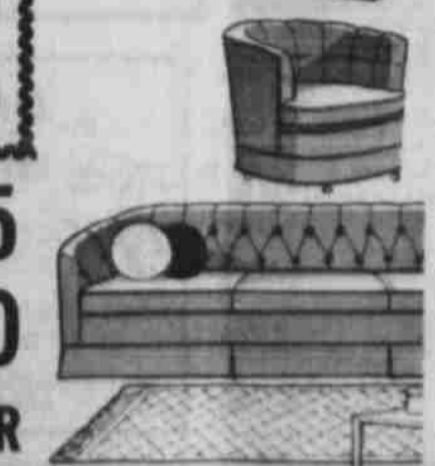
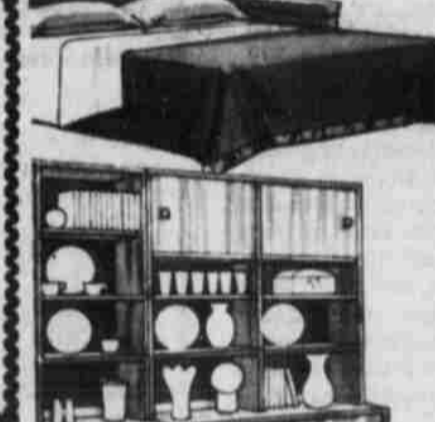

Hunting, fishing guide now available

LUBBOCK — The 24-page "Guide to Texas Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations" for 1978-79 is now available at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices across the Panhandle and South Plains with license vendors also furnishing copies for the general public.

These booklets are designed as a guide only and specific questions about each county should be directed to local Texas game wardens and P & WD offices. The new regulations will become effective Sept. 1, 1978 and will list game and fish regulations for a period of one year ending Aug. 31, 1979.

Texas has such a great variety of hunting and fishing opportunities for the outdoorsman along with different seasons, bag limits, and restrictions that it is necessary to list the basic hunting and fishing rules county-by-county in the guide.

A locator map of the state listing all counties including those with special seasons on antelope, javelina, aoudad sheep, prairie chicken, pheasant, mule deer, and chachalaca is presented in the center of the guide.

Information on hunting and fishing licenses is included along with the correct method of attaching tags and permits to the various species of game that require these special tags.

Special sections on fur-bearing animals, lake regulations, general saltwater fishing information, protected species of wildlife and tropical fish and aquatic

plants are also included. On back of the new hunting and fishing guide is a form to be used by persons who witness a game violation and want to report the violation to the P & WD.

Texas is too large and vast for the Texas game wardens working the counties assigned then to catch or apprehend all the game and fish violators. When a game violation occurs, it is the people of Texas who lose, and if the violation is not reported, the violator will assume no one cares but the P & WD. Only with the participation of concerned citizens and their testimony can Texas game wardens apprehend those who vandalize private property and steal our wildlife resources.

Work on the 10-block paving project here was begun last week by the Lubbock Asphalt Co.

City Manager Pete Maddox said dirt work was completed on West 15th for the pouring of curb and gutter. Other blocks to be paved are on Third street and one block on East Seventh.

The Lubbock work was having trouble with their cement machine and planned to begin curb and gutter work as soon as repairs can be completed.

Wayne Stevens, job superintendent for the project, estimates the paving will be completed in early September, providing "Post doesn't get a lot of rain."

Stolen rifle is recovered

Sammy Zapata has been charged with possession of stolen property after sheriff officers found a rifle which had been stolen here last December in his home at South Avenue H and East 4th St.

Zapata was arrested last Thursday after officers armed with a search warrant found the rifle which had been stolen from the car of Verle Brown of Justiceburg when parked at the Western Lounge.

Two rifles were taken in the vehicle break-in but only the Savage lever action 30-30, which Brown says is an antique, was recovered.

Zapata was released Friday on a \$2,500 surety bond.

Garza drought loans available to Oct. 11

Congressman Omar Burleson advises that although nearly 2,400 Texas farmers have either interviewed or filed drought loan applications totaling approximately \$28 million the SBA Regional Office announced the opening of six (6) more offices to serve those Texas farmers who have not yet applied.

For Garza farmers who suffered drought damage and resultant financial hardship, the filing deadline is October 11, 1978, which is unchanged from the original

date established when the disaster was declared. "Before the deadline occurs doubtless there will be more applications filed and the SBA is therefore moving some of the existing offices and opening new locations as well in an effort to be as accessible as possible to the 220 counties that are eligible for drought disaster loans", said Burleson, "including 29 in the 17th Congressional District."

The Disaster Offices will be located in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Harlingen, Lubbock, Temple, Lardo, Amarillo, Pecos, Marshall, and Abilene. The Laredo, Pecos, and Abilene Offices opened July 5. Each office will be open from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. daily, Monday thru Friday.

SBA Disaster Office Managers are recommending that the farmers come in person to pick up an application and then return it in person. This assures that the application is complete, which in turn expedites processing of the loan.

The following information should be submitted with applications for drought loan assistance.

1. A copy of the legal description of land, i.e., deed, mortgage, real estate contract, etc. (If real estate is to be offered as security.)
2. Copies of tax records. The applicant should keep the originals as file copies.
3. A copy of the latest ASCS notice (form 476) for allotments and yields.
4. If claiming a loss on pasture, indicate type of pasture, (timber, grass, good improved, or excellent

The new ambulance agreement sets out specific duties of Hospital Administrator Ed Zintgraff as the administrator of ambulance service. He will be responsible directly to the ambulance committee which shall consist of two county commissioners, two city councilmen, two hospital district members and administrative parties of county and hospital district.

Zintgraff's duties include total responsibility for ambulance operation, maintaining a 24-hour call system for ambulance personnel, recruiting and training of all substitute personnel, developing a policy and procedure manual for ambulance operations to be approved by the ambulance committee.

Maintain all record, initiate billing and collection procedures for all accounts, provide in-service education, establish administrative bylaws subject to committee approval, employ a chief ambulance operator at a salary of \$500 monthly payable by the ambulance committee, submit monthly income and management reports to the ambulance committee, and perform all duties as mandated by the committee.

The city-county ambulance

general fund will be responsible for all expenses for maintenance of emergency vehicles. All expenses above revenues will be split by city and county. Insurance will be split between city and county. The CETA program will provide a bookkeeper.

The agreement also sets out that the city and county will provide the hospital with a paging system, and that the sheriff's department will be responsible for dispatching the ambulance and providing a back-up attendant.

Garza Memorial Hospital agrees to be the base station for the administrator, chief ambulance operator, bookkeeper and emergency vehicles; provide a licensed vocational nurse or registered nurse for emergency situations as ordered by a staff physician; and receive no monies from the operation of the service.

Depot closed-

(Continued from Page 1) has been in a steady decline for the last decade.

Passenger service was discontinued through Post nine years ago and with it went mail service via railroad mail car.

The Western Union service was pulled out of the depot and freight service here dropped considerably when Burlington developed its own truck service for delivery of Postex Plant products.

Only an occasional car is shipped out by Postex now. It was just a few months ago the Santa Fe Trail Lines truck service was shifted to Merchants Freight docks here.

The Santa Fe had six or seven employees working here during the oil development in this area during the 1950s, Compton recalls.

But the LCL — less than carload freight service — went the way of other railroad services here. Like the Railway Express, it was discontinued.

There will still be rail freight deliveries here with one local freight going each way almost daily between Amarillo and Sweetwater with the local paper work handled at the Santa Fe office in Slaton.

As to the future of the depot — and the present one is the 1916 original — the railroad has no future plans for the building.

Supt. May told The Dispatch the railroad probably will sell it but not for use as a public building which would draw a crowd "too close to the main line track."

Many such depots are sold as warehouses for feed storage, he said.

He said it is against railroad policy for such old buildings to be converted into museums because of the people they would draw too near the main line.

May told The Dispatch the Post depot is only one of four of this type built in this area. The others were at Lubbock, Snyder and Sweetwater and those at Lubbock and Sweetwater already have been torn down.

(Continued from Page 1) of Defense, Clements went to Washington in 1973 where his management abilities made him known as "the man who ran the Pentagon."

In Washington he oversaw the daily operations of 3,000,000 employees and administered an annual \$100 billion-plus budget.

His grandfather was a muleskinner and helped to found the town of Forney, outside of Dallas.

Clements was born in Texas, was an Eagle Scout in his youth, and turned down several college football scholarships so he could work as a roughneck in the South Texas oil fields and support his family during the depression.

He attended classes at Southern Methodist University. At the age of 28 he bought two used drilling rigs and established his own business, the Southeastern Drilling Company. Today, SEDCO, Inc., is one of the world's largest drilling contracting firms, employing 7,000 people.

The old Cumberland School Building in Dallas serves as SEDCO's corporate headquarters. Clements bought and restored the building, which has been designated as a historical landmark by the Texas State Historical Commission.

Clements got started in politics as a precinct worker and poll watcher in the 1952 Eisenhower campaign and in 1972 served as state co-chairman in Texas of the Republican Presidential campaign.

Both former President Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan will appear together at a Sept. 12 fund raising dinner in Dallas for Clements and his gubernatorial campaign. It will mark the only time these two Republican leaders have campaigned jointly and shared the same platform on any candidate's behalf.
