Office will open Monday for 37th Stampede rodeo

The rodeo office will open at 12 a. m. Monday at the rodeo grounds to receive entries for next week's 37th annual Post Stampede Rodeo and Secretary Tommy King expects to have a good number of entries waiting for him.

Another fast-paced three days of rodeoing is in prospect for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Aug. 5-7.

The prices remain the same as last year — both for contestants and spectators.

The Stampede Rodeo will have a new producer this year in A. J. Huffman of Lubbock. Directors and officials of the rodeo have been impressed with him.

The rodeo fare remains unchanged except for the entry fee, which this year will be a wild buffalo race.

This will be the first year for a wild buffalo race.

Included on the program will be bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle roping, barrel racing, a nightly jackpot, team roping and bull riding.

Entry fees are \$30 per person except for team roping which is \$40. Each event is figured on one head or one go-round.

One hundred dollars will be added in saddle bronc riding with all entry fees added back.

The rodeo office phone number is 495-2501. Efforts continue to see that the annual rodeo parade at 5:30 p. m. next Thursday, Aug. 11, will be a success. (See Rodeo opens, Page 12)

Kids outread adults at library in July

Another fantastic month of library usage was reported by Librarian Pee Wee Wee with 1,353 books checked out for July.

A record of over 1,600 books checked out in June.

In July, the month began to the kids with 765 juvenile books checked out and 588 adult books.

The two high months of summer reading has brought library circulation in 1977 to 7,840 books, making the library one of the best opportunities since 1970 to top the 12,000 circulation figure for the year.

Library patrons have come close to the 12,000 circulation figure in last years, but never quite reached it.

One hundred new books were added to library shelves during the month to bring to 553 the number of books acquisitions for the year to date.

3 Kirkpatricks will rope in AJRA finals

When the American Junior Rodeo Association finals are held in the Scurry County Coliseum at Snyder next Tuesday through Saturday, Aug. 9-13, it will mark the 25th anniversary of this event which Alvin Davis founded here in Post in 1952.

One of the first members of the board of directors of those first rodeos was Jack Kirkpatrick. This year he will have three of his five sons competing in the AJRA finals.

Cliff, 16 years of age, was the junior world champion calf roping at age 12 in 1973. Last year at the finals in Snyder, he finished as reserve champion in the 13-15 age group. This year he moves into the 16-19 year-old competition.

Will, 12 years old, has been in the AJRA three years. He competes in every roping event. Last year he went to the finals in 11th place and finished 7th for the year.

Another little Kirkpatrick, Joel, is 10 years old. He made his debut in AJRA at the Sweetwater rodeo in May, winning fourth in break-away roping.

He had not been too enthused about practicing for his first rodeo but got very enthused after receiving that first check. He was ready for the next one in Pecos the very next week. He placed third there. He was sixth at Midland and Andrews and third in

Hobbs. Joel rides Termite, a little horse just Joel's size.

When they back into the roping box only Joel's hat shows above the fence.

This is the third Kirkpatrick that Termite has

"trained." Cliff and Will started their roping careers on him too. Now Joel is beginning to get interested in team roping too.

Street paving here up in air right now

Getting several blocks of city streets in Post paved this summer may be more easily said than done for city and county, who plan to share the costs of the project.

City Manager Pete Maddox said Wednesday that the Kerr Construction Co., of Lubbock may not have the time to handle the work as planned.

Kerr is currently doing the Broadway Avenue widening project for the state highway department.

Maddox said he was told this week by Kerr that it is possible Kerr could get the 15th street paving from Broadway to S done, but that the city and county may have to seek another contractor.

Maddox has contacted an Aspermont contractor. The city manager said 15th street is being surveyed for the improvement, but it would be better to get a contractor to move all the dirt required rather than the city or county attempting to do it with what equipment they have.

"But the project is still on if we can get a contractor. We may have to have another bid opening," Maddox said.

The city will pay for the curb and guttering on 15th street with city and county sharing the paving of the city's northern most street which has always provided a drainage problem.

Small shower is not enough

Post received 27 of an inch of moisture in an early morning shower last Friday for its only moisture of the past week.

ions, he's getting the containers out as fast as he can," Maddox told The Dispatch.

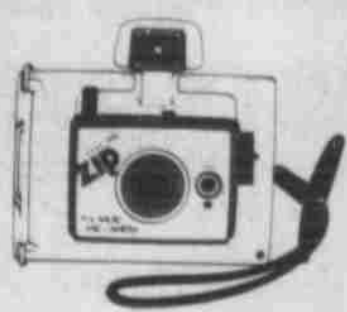
One of the problems the city is having with some residents in areas where the new automated containers are in use is that some people continue to put their trash in their trash cans instead of the new trash containers.

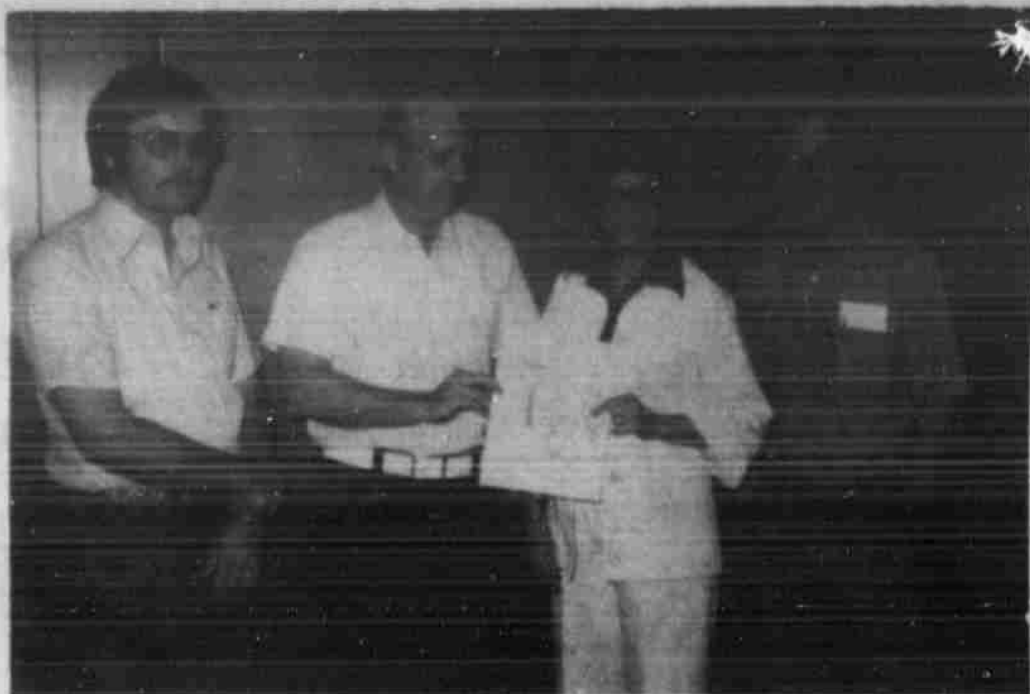
P. D. Hammett rites held

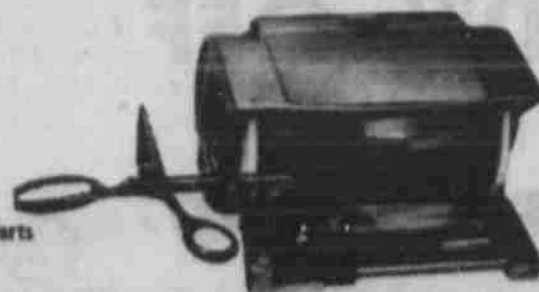

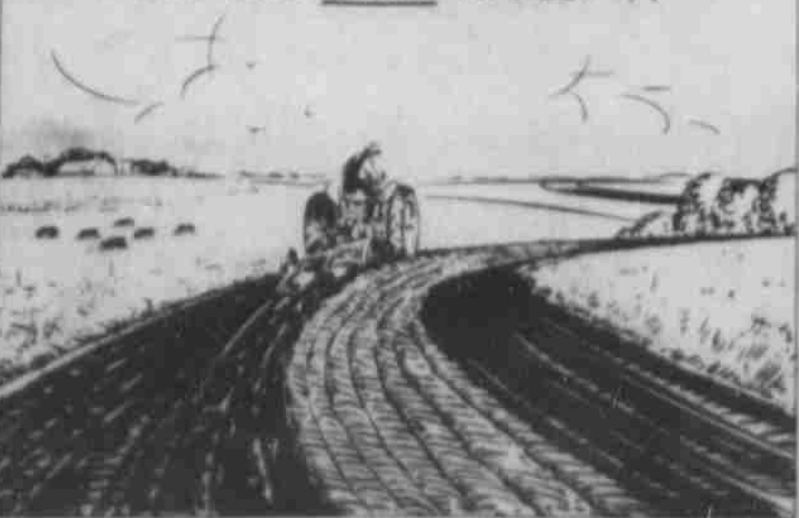

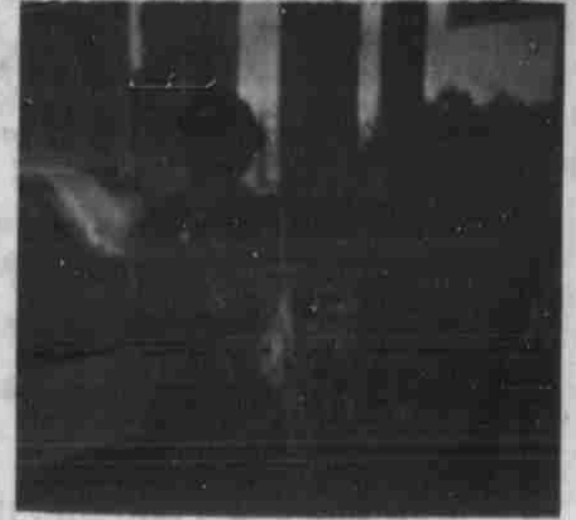
