Post Dispatch Monday is hottest day in record heat wave

Most sizzle in 6 years

Post - in the midst of its hottest July within memory and the hottest summer in over six years had an over six-year high of 106 degrees officially Monday afternoon with the big bank thermometer registering two degrees higher at a sizzling

The last time it was hotter here was back on June 28, 1972 when the thermometer soared to 109.

With normally the hottest part of the summer yet to go in late July and through August, Post already has recorded 18 100-degree days to date.

This is more 100-degree days than has been recorded in any of the five previous

For July to date the high daily temperature has averaged less than a half degree below an even 100.

What makes the heat wave more severe is that there is little temperature relief at night. The daily low drops to about 70 degrees but only for a very few early morning hours.

At midnight it has been in the 80s.

Post was on a run of six consecutive 100-degree days through Tuesday. Starting on July 14 the daily highs have been 100, 101, 105, 103, and 106 Monday.

Tuesday's high was 104 degrees and at presstime Wednesday noon the thermometer here appeared to be heading upward to the 100 mark again.


in June the humidity here was unusually high, varying between 35 to 45 percent, but in the current July sizzle stretch it has dropped to a drier 10 percent. Abel Comancho, former

Dispatch pressman who is here with his family on a vacation visit from Dallas this week said Tuesday that the Post temperature Monday seemed only "in the 80" to him. Dallas has had a run of over 18 100-degree days all in a row, but the humidity there is so high the temperature feels much hotter than it does here.

The hottest day here in 1977 was a 105 on Aug. 24. Last summer Post had only 16 100-degree days and but only three of them up to the present date.

In 1972 when Post recorded its 109, the community had only eight 100-degree days, five of them in a June heat wave.

Conner told The Dispatch Tuesday that some Garza cotton is holding up well. In other fields, he said, the lack of moisture has slowed the growth down.

Although some have said there is little irrigated cotton left in Garza, Conner estimated 12,000 to 14,000 acres will receive irrigation water help this year with many pumps already running, despite high fuel costs.

On showing appreciation

Almost every town has or has had leaders whose foresight, abilities and determination have guided important community projects to completion.

But few, if any, can this year — or any year — offer a more complete and total contribution than that Post's David Newby is now completing.

David has planned, guided and built most of it with his own two hands — a new \$42,000-plus Garza senior citizens center in the virtual ruins of the historic Algerita Hotel.

Since last November, Newby has devoted almost all of his time to this project. These were not just five eight-hour work days per week either. More often than not they were six or seven day work weeks with probably more days than not 10 hours spent on the job instead of eight.

From the tedious days of last winter when he carefully leveled and repaired the floor joists one by one over the back 80 feet of the first floor Newby has done an outstanding job. He has fashioned a 3,300 square foot center of nine rooms with paneled or plastered walls, drop ceilings and modern lighting. It has a central heating and air-conditioning system with an ample kitchen. Some floors are carpeted.

For all this work he has not received a penny of compensation from anyone. In fact he has put a lot of his own into the cause. His contribution in effort alone is so great some people actually don't believe it. It is simply beyond their comprehension.

Not only that, Tom adds, but all of his work is of the highest quality. Tom adds, "You couldn't find anybody today to do it any better and few who would do as well."

David has taken the center from start to finish. So far, federal contributions via programs for the aged and local contributions of which there has been many have financed the construction. Newby expects the cost to total about \$27,000 for materials and some skilled labor for particular portions of the work.

A recent contributions drive for \$4,700 to raise what it is hoped may pay the last of the bills has reached the \$3,100 mark.

Newby will be honored Sunday afternoon by the Garza Historical Survey Commission as "Post's No. 1 volunteer" at a public reception in the new senior citizens center.

Not only will this be a deserved honor for David, but it also will give the public its first peek at the new center itself.

We can only hope that when the public sees what David has done for this community that the appreciative ones will subscribe the remaining unpledged balance of the final contributions drive.

That would express this community's appreciation best.

### Screwworm threat grows

MISSION — Additional pressure was put on Texas livestock producers and on the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program the first 11 days of July, says Dr. James Wommack.

In that interval six counties recorded their first 1978 screwworm cases and the Texas count climbed from 121 to 173. Wommack, Southwest Regional Director for Veterinary Services of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), says 41 Texas counties have tallied screwworm cases this year.







Clements, in a letter to Governor Dolph Briscoe. urged that the call to the special session of the Texas Legislature be expanded to allow the adoption of a Constitutional amendment that would place a ban on any personal or corporate income tax in Texas, unless the citizens affirmatively

vote to create such a tax. Clements recommended that such a Constitutional ban be submitted to the voters on the November 7th

These include such items such as a \$72 female apron, \$48 spotlight, \$37 gooseneck lamp, \$46 L.V.poles, \$295 suction machine and \$3,000 incubator for central supply; \$1,359 addressograph, \$1,434.35 in space library units, \$398 for Lanier transcriber, \$775 for IBM typewriter, \$50 steno chair and \$4,195 copy machine for administration; \$767 ice machine, \$200 in new dishes, \$300 for dishwasher and \$100 in new silverware for dietary department; \$3,000 for Hycel cell counter for laboratory; and \$5,000 for other miscellaneous equip-

Zintgraff proposed to double in service education for hospital personnel from \$2,000 in current budget to \$4,000 for next year.

This would include such items as sending group to Texas Hospital Association convention in Dallas, a medical record correspondence course, and the attendance of a wide variety of training courses and conventions by hospital personnel

Agreed to pay hospital personnel making ambulance runs on off duty time \$10 per run for the next two months to be sure the personnel is promptly paid. The board's ambulance committee representatives hope to recover this cost later from ambulance funds. The hospital has agreed only to pay the cost of nurses who make ambulance runs on orders of a physician because of the condition of a patient, but on many runs no other personnel is available.

Not only has it been hot here, but it has been dry as well.

Since Post received 3.36 inches of moisture in the first week of June to enable Garza farmers to plant their cotton crop, only .48 of an inch of local moisture has been recorded - .43 on July 1 and .05 on July 3.

Post had 4.92 inches in May and has a total of 11.20 inches for the year to date. With the blistering July heat wave, Post residents are using more water than ever before in the city's history

One day last week, Post used almost 3,000,000 gallons of water in a single 24-hour period, City Manager, Pete Maddox reported.

He said up to about July 4-5, the city was averaging about 1,500,000 gallons per day usage. Since then, he added, the average daily consumption of water has skyrocketed to 2,500,000 gallons

Al O'Brien, White River water district superintendent, told The Dispatch, "we're pumping water to Post now 24 hours around the clock." Usually in the summer.

the water district would pump to Post to about midnight when the local storage tanks would be full. Switching to 24 hours pumping means more water is being used in the current

June showed \$33,714.40 in income, all but \$1,051.63, from accounts receivable against monthly expenses of \$38,852,98.

The hospital admitted 58 patients during the month, 17 of them Medicare and 3 of them Medicaid to bring fiscal year admissions for nine months to 513.
