## Recognition well deserved

Naming of Jack Alexander as Post's "Citizen of the Year" at the Chamber banquet Saturday night was well deserved recognition for this capable school administrator who has made almost "a second career" here in essential community affairs.

Jack was busy not only during the past 12 months in serving this community well, but that year was just another of many "community years" for him.

He has tackled all kinds of tough community chores with little recognition as well as accepting a leadership role in civic organizations, governmental organizations, and his church.

One of the best qualities about Jack's

community participation is that he stays with it year after year.

And he accomplished all this without neglecting his school administrative and teaching career, or family.

It is hard to say now how many years he has been a United Fund leader, a Community Action leader, or a civic and church leader.

Last week just before the deadline, he filed for a city council post in his words "to provide the voters a choice."

Post and every other community is built and sustained by men and women like Alexander who possess both the ability and the desire to do more than a full share for his or her community.

## Tall ships on horizon

Because of the energy shortage, windmills may not be the only practical item in our past to be put to future use. Sailing ships may be coming back too.

Remember the "tall ships" of America's 200th birthday two years ago that stole the celebration show? Well, maybe they're not dead either.

A Britisher by the name of Michael Willoughby has designed a huge five-masted sailing ship for the future which he says could be operated on a practical basis today.

His ship is a 12,000 ton monster, five times the size of the old clipper ships of a century and more ago. He says this huge barque could carry cargo anywhere in the world at just two-thirds the cost of conventional ships. In the right winds and weather it would knife through the water at 22 or 23 knots an hour.

Willoughby's huge ship would be 450 feet long at the waterline—the length of one and one-half football fields. Its masts would tower 187 feet above the sea trapping wind

in an enormous 72,000 square feet of sail. The ship would take a year to 18 months to build, and cost \$14 million. But it would be much cheaper to operate than oil-powered ships despite the salaries of 50 crewmen needed to man the sails.

A ship of similar size now burns 7,000 tons of oil a year at \$130 a ton. That's nearly \$1 million a year for fuel. You can hire an awful lot of crewmen for that.

The ship would have two 1,000 horsepower engines. The ship would be under sail power alone 85 percent of its time at sea and under engines alone only five percent of the time.

Willoughby, who has spent 40 of his 64 years at sea has spent two and one-half years designing this new sailing ship with slim, racy hull lines

He thinks it's an awful waste using millions of tons of oil just to push ships around the oceans.

It all sounds great to us. We hope he finds the \$14 million needed to build it.

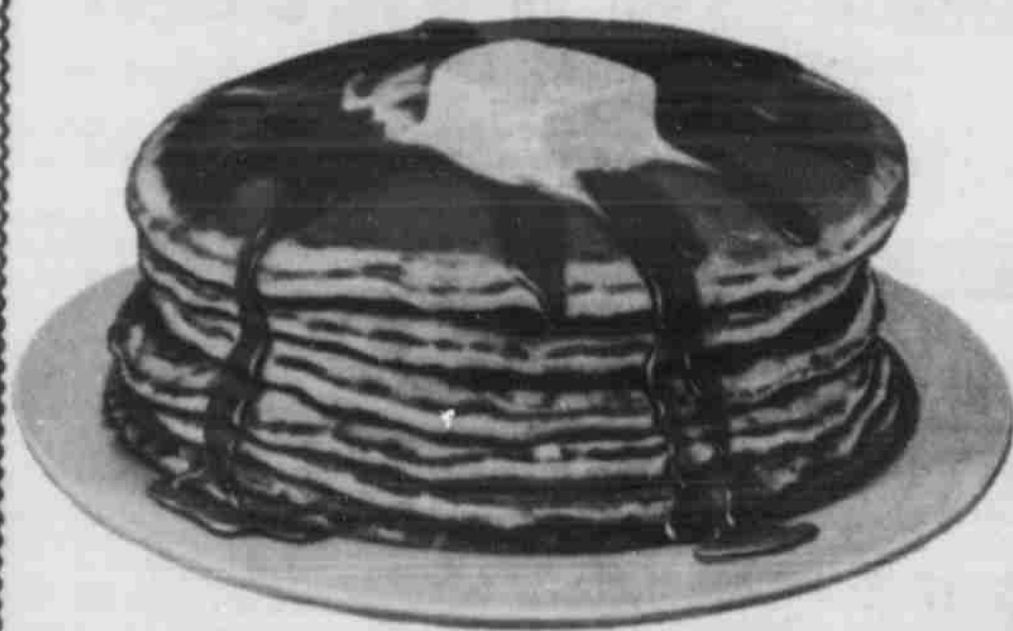

## Crippled children's clinic here Friday

The Texas Department of Health Resources will hold a Crippled Children's Services Nursing Clinic in Post Friday, March 10. The clinic will be held at the Community Action Center, 804 Pine Street, Post, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Billie Moore, R.N., Public Health Nurse from the Region 2 office in Lubbock will be in Post to conduct the clinic. She notes that services available at this clinic will include counseling for persons now taking part in the Crippled Children's Services Program, as well as counseling for those individuals who are not now on the program, but feel that they may qualify for treatment available in this program.

Persons eligible for services must be in the age group from birth up to age 21. Anyone in this age group who meets eligibility requirements can receive treatment through the Crippled Children's Program, or in the Congenital Heart Program or the Cystic Fibrosis Program, both of which are administered through the Crippled Children's Division.

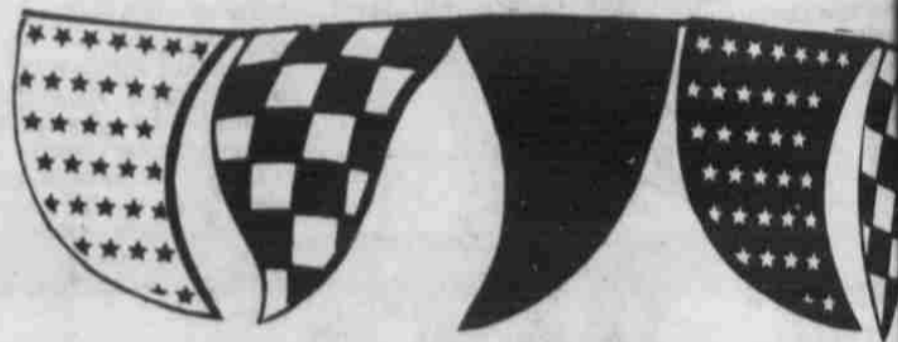

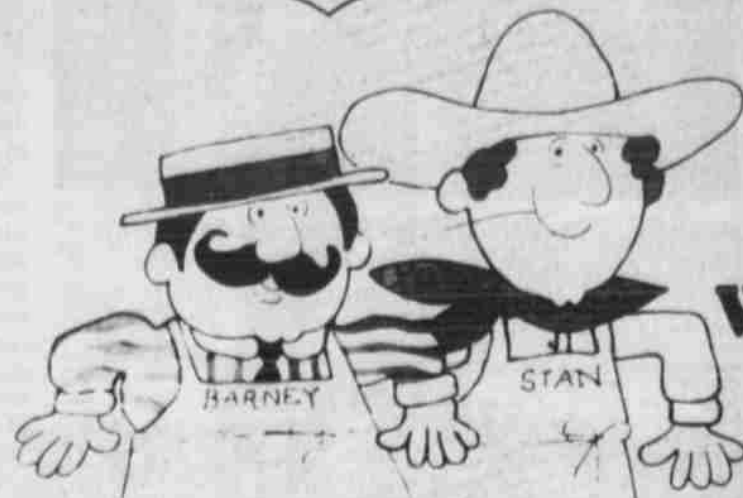

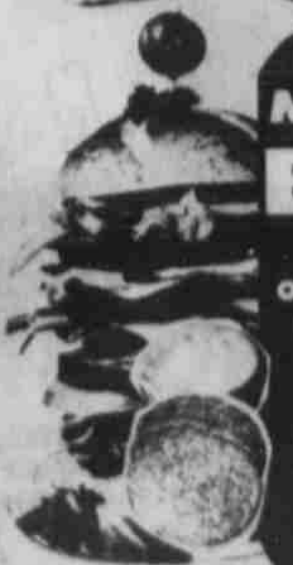

## Hunting, fishing hearing set here

**LUBBOCK** — Proposed changes in Texas hunting and fishing regulations will be listed and discussed during the regulatory hearings scheduled across Texas March 13-16.

Individuals interested in these proposed changes or who want to propose changes of their own should attend the meeting in the courthouse in Post at 10 a.m. on March 15, 1978.

These annual hearings are held every spring for the purpose of gathering information and comments from Texas citizens concerning hunting, fishing, and trapping regulations in Texas.

As a result of the Texas Legislature, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission is slated to act on the proposed changes in seasons, bag limits, and methods and means of harvesting wildlife resources at their April 13-14 meeting in Austin.

Each county hearing will include a hearing officer and a law enforcement officer, and game or fish biologist if a change in fish or game regulations are proposed for that county.

All comments made at the hearing by both P&WD personnel and the public will be recorded and presented to the P&W Commission for their consideration prior to the April hearing.

Proposed changes recommended by the P&WD will include no protection of spike bucks; closing of whitetail deer in Andrews County; increasing the Pan-

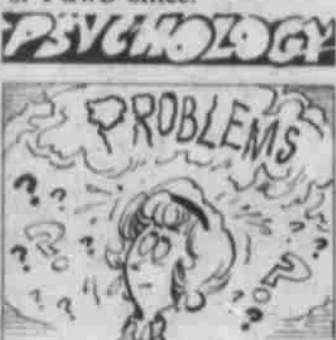
handle antelope season; separate mule deer and whitetail deer regulations; make quail seasons more uniform throughout the state.

Biological justifications for each proposed change will be discussed as increases or decreases of game and fish populations are monitored.

If these proposals meet with the approval of the public and the P&W Commission, they will become law and will be listed in the new 1978-79 hunting, fishing, and trapping regulations issued prior to the fall seasons.

Interested persons are urged to attend the hearing in their country and make their opinions known. If the person cannot attend the hearing, a proposed change can be presented at the April 14-15 hearing in Austin.

and Avenue I. All but one block on Seventh will be curb and guttered.

Property owners are not being charged for the paving because it is being undertaken primarily to solve some bad water drainage problems.

The new paving will have a hot mix surfacing over the base as recommended by Engineer R. Smith Jr., of Lubbock. The other choice was a triple asphalt surface treatment. Lubbock Asphalt bid the two choices equally so Smith chose the hot mix which he said should hold up two or three years longer before need for seal coating.

Jay Bird appeared before the council to seek paving in front of his new home on West 10th which also has a water drainage problem.

The council decided to have engineers come up with some recommendations in the next two weeks.

In another major action, the council voted to accept bids March 30 on the completion of the Post Community Center.

Councilman Bill Pool reported to the council that the architectural firm of Whitaker and Hall of Lubbock expect about five bids on this construction which the architects are trying to hold under \$100,000 at the city's request.

Pool said some of the outside trim on the center grounds, not the building itself, would have to be left off final plans if the \$100,000 maximum is to be met. That was the estimated cost for the final two phases of the center's development three years or more ago.

The only change in the plans for the building itself is that a long hall from entrance to back portion of building between youth center and large community room has been removed from final plans to hold down costs.

In other actions, the council:

Amended the city's revenue sharing to boost expenditures for seal coating from \$25,000 to \$27,000, and expenditure for the fire station addition and fence from \$15,000 to \$23,000.

Set the council's work session night of March 20 as the budget hearing date on unappropriated revenue sharing funds of approximately \$91,000. The council expects to apply all the money on current paving and community center projects.

Adopted an updated flood insurance ordinance.

Voted to advertise for bids for the proposed fire station addition.

Approved the paving ordinance, subject to several changes.

Saw a motion to accept a "block program" to provide survey and planning money for housing die for the lack of a second after attorney Harvey Morton told the council he didn't think the program would benefit Post.

The trio returned to the Spanish man's car and all the money — the big roll of bills from the black man and the Spanish man's \$800 — was placed in a red bandana handkerchief and the white man tied it up.

The Spanish man failed to catch "the switch" made at

this point. The bandana then was placed in the glove compartment of the Spanish man's car and he was told to go ahead and deposit all the money.

The confidence men got out of the car and in the Spanish man's words, "quickly disappeared."

The Spanish man took the handkerchief out of the glove compartment and unrolled it, thinking he had made \$200. To his amazement he found only a crumpled piece of toilet paper in the bandana.

By the time the Spanish man got over the shock of how he had been "taken" and went to the sheriff's department the two "con artists" were not to be found.

He described the black as between 24 to 28 years old, six feet in height and of medium build. The white man, he said, was about 5 feet, 9 inches tall, approximately 200 pounds and 25 to 30 years of age.

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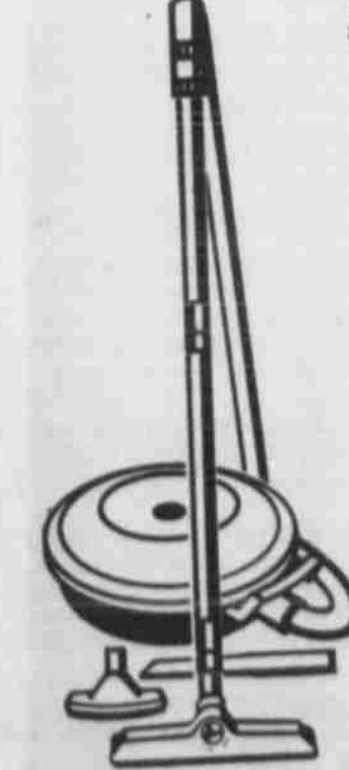


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## Pancake Supper to benefit good cause

He said that nobody knows what Landry is going to do until he actually does it. White figures Tom will continue to coach as long as he likes the work. So don't pick the year.

He spoke with poise and humor about 15 minutes and then threw it open to football questions from the floor.

White opened by saying he was "honored to be here representing the World Champion Dallas Cowboys." He termed the opportunity "one of the unexpected pleasures in being part of a winning team."

"The Dallas Cowboys," he said "are a fantastic group of individuals."

He termed Coach Tom Landry as "the greatest—not just with football, but with everything in life."

He revealed that Landry doesn't wear a hat except along the sidelines during Cowboy football games.

"It's a tradition now," White said. "He gets a new one made for every game."

White joked quite a bit about Quarterback Roger Staubach.

"Roger is a great guy—but he is getting kind of old," White said amid laughter. He added he had taken on the responsibility himself "to remind Roger every day that he was one day older, too."

In opening it up for questions, he said he would answer the first question before it was asked.

The answer he said "was one, maybe two years." The question which he volunteered the answer for was how much longer "old Roger would be playing."

White said he disagrees with those who advocate using video replays to check protested calls of game officials. White said a lot of officiating mistakes were made in the NFL this past season but the only errors he objects too is when an official makes a wrong rule call—not a judgment call—and refuses to correct his mistake when he knows he is wrong.

When somebody wanted to see his Super Bowl ring, Danny said the players hadn't gotten them yet, because it took a while to design them and bid them for making up.

As for the Cowboys' celebrated scouting system, White said the club has a library about half the size of the Post Community Center which is filled with folders on just about every college player in the nation.

White said the nation was divided into five regions with a scout in charge of each region. "Coach Landry," he added makes all the decisions on the drafting of players."

As for the Cowboys' million-dollar running back, Tony Dorsett, White said Dorsett is such a quiet guy he is hard to get to know.
