

# Hunsaker resigns hospital post, big contract let

Garza Memorial Hospital directors at a delayed September meeting Monday accepted a low bid of \$87,824 for the complete renovation of the hospital's heating and air-conditioning systems, and accepted with regret the resignation of Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker to become effective Sept. 30.

## Cotton, Inc. head to speak at Crosbyton

CROSBYTON — J. Duker, President of Cotton Incorporated, the cotton producers research and promotion company headquartered in New York City and Raleigh, N.C. will address a public meeting sponsored by the Crosby County Cotton Club, Thursday, Sept. 22, at 8:00 p.m. at the Pioneer Memorial Museum Building here.

Established in the 1960's as successor to the industry's voluntary research and promotion effort known as Cotton Producers Institute, Cotton Incorporated is funded at the rate of \$1 per bale on U.S. production. An industry-wide referendum last fall, producers voted to increase the assessment by an additional four-tenths of 1 percent of the value of cotton.

Dealing in many areas of cotton's research needs, including cultural practices, processing and handling along with development of new cotton fabrics, the company has achieved many breakthroughs to add to producers income. Its promotional activities are on behalf of cotton are increasing in the national media. One of its campaigns currently underway is in support of 100 percent cotton denim.

"We are fortunate to schedule C.I.'s chief executive here," said J. Duker. (See Cotton, Inc., Page 16)

## Child drowns in Mexico

Molly Rose Brenden, two and one-half year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Brenden, was accidentally drowned Monday afternoon in the pool of friends in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, as the Brendens were attending a farewell party in their honor preparatory to returning to the United States.

Funeral services and burial were conducted in San Miguel Tuesday.

Molly Rose is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Newby, who have spent the summer in Grand Lake, Colo., and are scheduled to return home here Friday. They were unable to reach San Miguel in time to attend the funeral.

The Brendens are due to arrive in Post sometime this week.

Marcia and Bob Brenden have another daughter, Wanda Claire, two months old. Bob had been studying forestry at the University at San Miguel.

Hunsaker in submitting a brief letter of resignation to the board gave no reason for his decision.

The letter said in part, "As administrator, I am respectfully submitting my resignation effective Sept. 30. I have enjoyed serving the board for the past 16 months and appreciate each board member's cooperation."

Hunsaker told The Dispatch he has accepted no other position at this time, but hopes to stay in hospital administration.

The \$87,824 contract for the renovation of the hospital's heating and air-conditioning systems, which in recent years have provided hospital directors with a lot of expensive trouble, goes to Brose J. (Red) Oglesby and the State Heating & Air Conditioning Co. of Lubbock.

His was the lower of two bids.

The project calls for installing of individual coils and fans with temperature controls in each patient room, replacing the existing heating and air-conditioning system serving the surgery area, and the replacement of all domestic hot and cold water lines in the hospital, excluding the kitchen's water pipes.

Oglesby, who met with the board, said the project will take several months to complete and it probably will require three months to obtain all the new equipment needed in the installation.

Hospital directors set up a meeting with Dr. Wilson for early Wednesday and asked Hunsaker to schedule meetings with the three foreign doctors to discuss their future plans.

The administrator also is scheduling a "work session" on the hospital district budget at another special session as the budget needs to be adopted prior to the start of the hospital's new fiscal year Oct. 1.

The hospital will seek a five-year loan from the bank here to help pay the cost of the heating and air-conditioning renovation project.

The hospital report for August, presented the board by Hunsaker, showed that hospital expenses of \$39,964.94 exceeded income put on the books during the month which totaled \$30,138.38.

During the month, the hospital collected \$24,908.75 and borrowed an additional \$8,000 to help pay its bills.

The hospital admitted 63 patients during the month for a total of 262 patient days for an average patient stay of 4.3 days and an average of 8.4 patients per day in the hospital.

Eight babies were born during the month, two deaths occurred, and 99 outpatients were treated.

# Richest cowboy and Walt Garrison to OS

Two well known rodeo standouts — Tom Ferguson, world champion all-around cowboy and rodeo's first \$100,000 a year performer, and Walt Garrison, the

former Dallas Cowboy fullback turned rodeo performer and perhaps best known for his tobacco chewing commercials on television — will make their first appear-

ances at the seventh annual OS Steer Roping here Sunday, Oct. 2.

The 26-year-old Ferguson missed last year's steer roping because of a hand injury. Although calf roping and steer wrestling are his specialties in winning all-around cowboy titles, Ferguson "warmed up" for his appearance here by winning the steer roping average at Walla Walla, Wash., recently.

Ferguson has won three world titles as all-around cowboy and last year became rodeo's first \$100,000 winner. He suffered a leg injury in March of this year, which kept him out of action for a month, but he has been on the winning trail since and now has nearly \$60,000 in arena earnings and leads his nearest challenger by more than \$13,600.

A field of 36 of the top steer ropers in the Southwest, including 10 of the 15 who participated in the recent National Steer Roping Finals at Laramie, will participate here.

The big "OS weekend" also will feature a Saturday afternoon match roping between defending world champion calf roper, Roy Cooper of Monument, N.M., and Phil Lyne of Artesia Wells, 1971-72 world champion in the event who is not a regular on the professional circuit now.

Besides that there is an invitational calf roping for 50 invited ropers, a Saturday morning team roping, barrel racing, and a cutting horse contest.

The OS Art Exhibit also promises to be outstanding again this year with 37 artists exhibiting their work and over \$200,000 worth of cowboy and western art to be displayed in the OS ranch house over the weekend.

An old-timers breakfast is something new this year. It is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 2 at the ranch. (See OS weekend, Page 16)

Heard a report on a recent Post traffic survey from Bob Cameron.

Received a request from Jimmy Evans of the Post Antenna Co. for an increase of \$1 a month in the cable TV rate here, a 50 cent boost for additional connections, and a \$5 increase for installation.

A second Scurry district court jury found Pat N. Walker, local attorney and oil operator, guilty on a charge of theft by exercising control last Thursday after deliberations totaling almost seven hours.

Sentencing in the case has been delayed until Oct. 3. Walker faces a two to 10-year jail term and can be fined up to a maximum of \$5,000 for the third degree felony.

# One deputy quits as court delays salary decision

County law enforcement officers asked the county commissioners court Monday for a \$150 monthly pay boost and other benefits. When the court tabled action until next Jan. 1, one deputy resigned.

Another is considering quitting. The Dispatch learned, and a third has applied for another position.

The deputy who resigned is Carl Wilson. The resignation is effective today.

The salary issue for deputies and the sheriff was raised by the sheriff two weeks ago in a special meeting before the city council.

In a joint meeting the following Tuesday of the council and county commissioners court, he was asked to submit his recommendations before the court's public hearing on the budget Monday morning.

That brought a written request for a salary increase to \$850 monthly with cost of living increases, increase of vacation days from five to ten a year, retirement benefits, clothing allowance of \$100 per year, and comp time for holidays.

The present top deputy pay is \$700 monthly. Garza county is one of the few Texas counties without a retirement plan for employees.

Sheriff Jim Pippin had no comment to make on the situation Tuesday.

The court normally sets the salary for county officials and county employees on Jan. 1 of each year for that fiscal year. It is required by law to set the salaries annually of elected officials.

Also appearing before the commissioners court at its public budget hearing to ask for a salary increase was Justice of the Peace Racy Robinson.

After tabling the salary requests until Jan. 1, the court reviewed the proposed 1978 county budget and adopted it.

It calls for the expenditure of \$748,592 next year as compared to an estimated expenditure of \$745,982.45

## Two liquor raids here

Two groups of deputies under direction of Sheriff Jim Pippin last Thursday arrested Nathaniel Wilson at 416 N. Ave. F for selling alcoholic beverages on unlicensed premises and confiscated several cases of beer.

The officers also raided a residence at 501 Oak Street and confiscated several cases of beer and wine with Barbara Ann Ward scheduled to appear in county court this week on a similar charge.

Wilson pleaded guilty Friday before County Judge Giles Dalby and was fined \$100 and ordered to pay \$51 court costs.

## Sanders rites here Saturday

Funeral services for Sam C. Sanders, 75, of Post were conducted at 10 a.m. Saturday in the Trinity Baptist Church here with the Rev. Gene Prevo, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Philip Daniels, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene.

Sanders, a farmer and barber, died last Thursday in the Slaton Rest Home following a lengthy illness.

He came to Post in 1928, and was a deacon and longtime member of the Trinity Baptist Church. He was married to Iva Doham Sept. 20, 1931 in Roby.

## Lubbock pair off running

Two well known Lubbock political leaders, former governor Preston Smith and State Senator Kent Hance, announced plans this week for 1978 races.

Hance will seek George Mahon's congressional seat from the 19th congressional district. Smith yesterday tossed his hat back into the ring for governor again.

It was six years ago that Smith was rather badly beaten for the Democratic nomination in a wide open primary race when he was completing his second term as governor. Briscoe won the runoff primary and then the election and was reelected to the first four-year term two years later.

Now Briscoe is attempting to set up a dynasty in the governor's mansion in Austin with a third term try himself.

Just as the big Lubbock vote base was a hub for Mahon, so it can be for the 34-year-old well-liked Hance who appears determined to make a career in Texas politics.

It is too early to tell both the size and quality of his opposition for the nomination, but in the early going he looks to be in a relatively strong position.

What Smith's chances are for a political comeback are more difficult to judge. Preston's political strength—and don't forget he has had a long and successful political

career in Texas—has come in his direct contact with people, with his willingness to campaign tirelessly everywhere and talk to everyone.

Statewide, Lubbock isn't as strong a political base because West Texas gets badly outvoted at the polls on a statewide basis.

Smith contended in his long announcement statement that after a few weeks of travel over the state getting his campaign organized, he intends to discuss the campaign issues. He says he thinks it will be the first Texas gubernatorial campaign ever run on issues.

Generally, political comebacks have to be tied to something more vote appealing than the candidate's desire to get back in office to be successful.

But Governor Briscoe as basically a "caretaker governor" hasn't created much enthusiasm from anybody, except with his one-plank platform of "no new tax."

Attorney General John Hill is expected to enter the Democratic nominational battle for the governorship too and just how strong a candidate he will prove remains for the future to decide.

Out here in West Texas he is simply "John Hill who."

## Farmer may enter race

Charles W. Stenholm of Stamford, a farmer who has served as president of the Texas Electric Cooperatives and is a member of the Texas State ASC Committee, was in Post Monday afternoon on a tour of the big 33-county congressional district to test the political winds.

He may be the third candidate into the race in the near future for Omar Burleson's seat in 1978. Burleson has announced his retirement at the conclusion of his present term.

He thinks because of the geographic characteristics of his district he is one of the few farmers in the nation who has a chance to be elected to congress.

Stenholm, 38, is owner and manager of the Stenholm Farms at Stamford. He is a former vocational ag teacher and served as general manager of the Stamford Electric Cooperative for nine years. He is a 1961 graduate of Texas Tech University and obtained his master's at the same school the following year.

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## Farce election

The recent Texas legislative session voted to put 15 more amendments to the Texas Constitution before voters for decision.

Seven will be voted on in a special election Nov. 8 of this year, and the other eight at the general election in November of 1978.

None of the 15 proposed constitutional changes are important enough to excite the voters.

In accordance with the law, Dispatch readers will find the amendments briefly

The election this November will be a farce. It will cost a lot of money to hold, will attract very little interest or turnout, and in the end those seven amendments' fate will be decided by a very small "minority" of Texas voters—the kind who always vote.

Better it would have been to have voted upon all 15 next year at the general election when at least the voters would be at the polls — whether or not they knew about or were interested in the amendments.

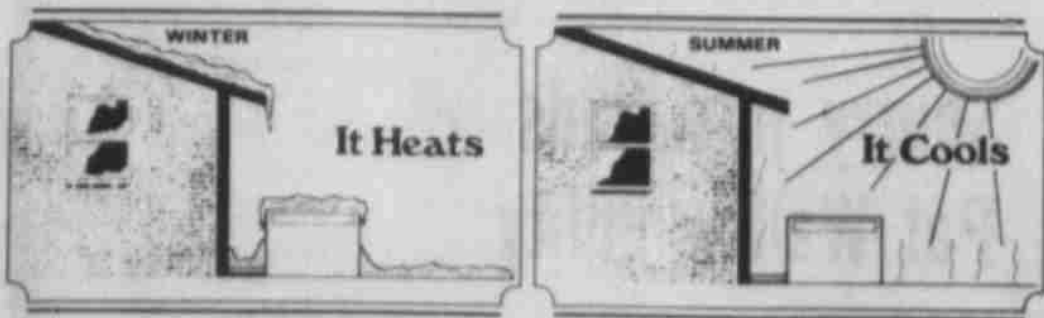

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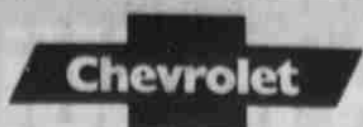

## New Texas hunting licenses available

**LUBBOCK** - The 1977-78 Texas hunting licenses are available at license vendors and all Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices across the state.  
 The licenses will be valid for the period Sept. 1, 1977 through Aug. 31, 1978. The resident hunting license is \$5.25 and the combination resident hunting-fishing license is \$8.75. Non-resident-small game license is \$37.75 and will be required for out-of-state hunters after quail, prairie chicken, pheasant, dove and other small game species. The non-resident-general hunting license is \$100.75 and will allow out-of-state hunters to bag all legal Texas species including deer and turkey.  
 These licenses are printed on waterproof, tear-resistant paper and each license will contain buck, antlerless deer and turkey tags. The date and month of kill on all tags must be marked out in ink or cut out and tags attached securely to the carcass before transporting or moving the carcass. The place and county of kill must also be filled in at this time.  
 There is a space on the back of the new license for white-winged dove, archery, and federal waterfowl.  
 A resident license is required of every Texas citizen hunting outside of the county of residence between

season in which only long bows and arrows are used, are required a \$3.25 archery stamp in addition to a valid hunting license. This includes both resident and non-resident hunters.

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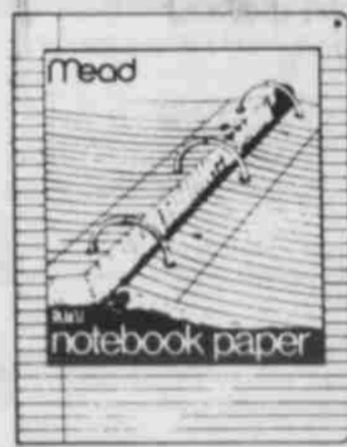


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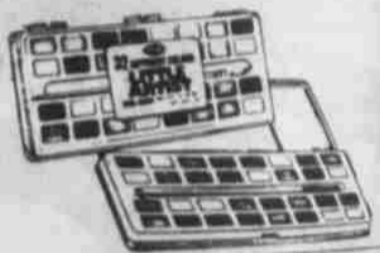
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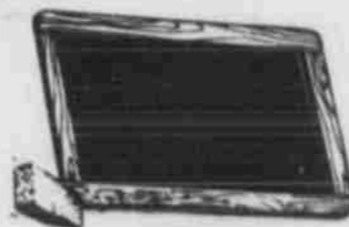
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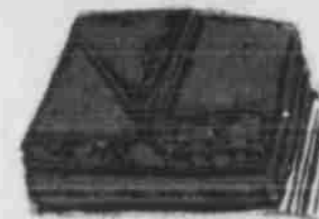
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# Lopes drive first three times for 24-0 victory

## Looney toes 31-yard FG against Coahoma

Showing unusual poise and balance in the first half, the Post Antelopes paraded 215 yards for three touchdowns and a 21-0 lead the first three times they got the ball in Friday night's 1977 homecoming game in Antelope stadium.

The red and white Coahoma Bulldogs never penetrated the Lopes' 15 yard line as Post added a 31-yard

flat for the TD. Looney converted from placement with 7:16 left in the quarter. Coahoma this time started on its 15 and punched out four first downs to the Post 42 before the drive stalled and Gary Paige punted 33 yards with Baker squirming back to the Lope 15.

This time, the Lopes cranked up to go 85 yards in eight plays. Shepherd opened it with 22 yards on a keeper. The two other big gainers were Baker's 19 and 18-yard runs, the last carrying to the Coahoma two.

From there, Fullback Booth rammed it across, the tally coming with 10:34 left in the second quarter. This time Looney's conversion kick was wide.

Coahoma got down to Post's 32 on its next possession on a 24 yard run through left tackle by Halfback Ronald Sundry, but a 15-yard holding penalty combined with a stout Lope defense ended that threat and Paige punted 44 yards into the end zone.

Starting with the ball on its 20, the Lopes went 80 yards in 12 plays. Big gainers on this drive were 24 and 16 yard runs by Baker and a 10 yard smack up the middle by Booth.

With the ball on the Coahoma six, Baker swung around right end and after three Coahoma tacklers bounced off him without slowing him down went into the end zone to score.

This time Shepherd passed to Bratcher for the two conversion points to make it 21-0 with 2:49 in the half.

Coahoma's only real threat came next when a forward pass play put the ball on Post's 24. The next play took it to the 16, before the Lope defense stiffened and pushed the Bulldogs all the way back to the Post 41.

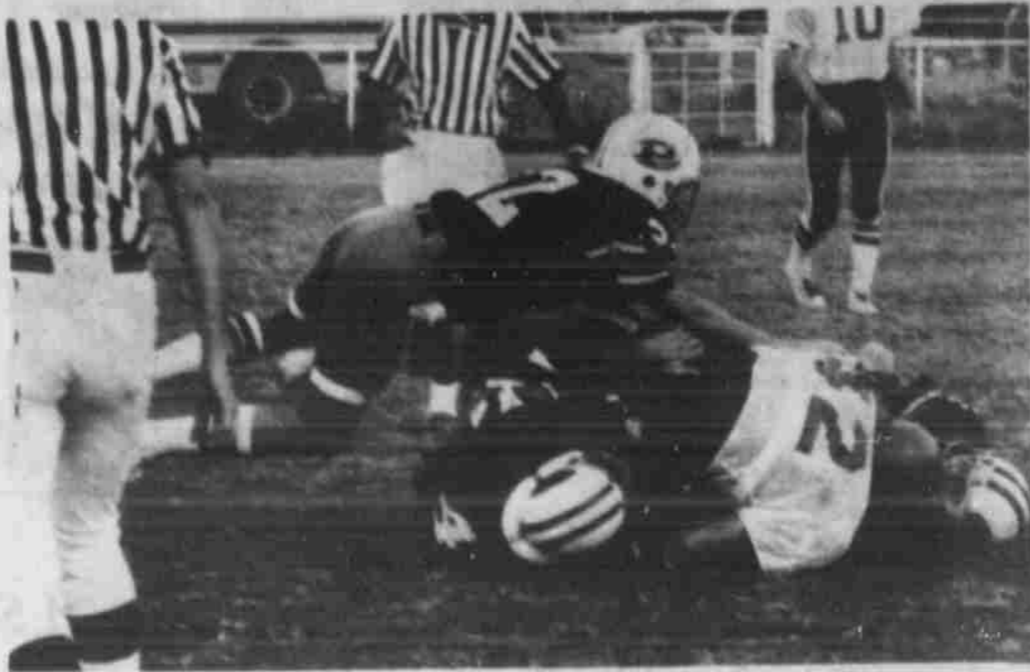
Post drove 54 yards from its 11 to Coahoma's 35 on its first third period possession but was stopped and Evans Heaton punted into the end zone.

Not much later, Tim Morris recovered Quarterback Greenfield's open field fumble on a tackle on Coahoma's 30, setting up the Post field goal. The Lopes drove it to the 14-yard-line. On fourth down, Looney went back and with the ball placed on the 21, kicked a 31-yarder through the uprights with only 18 seconds left in the quarter.

Penalties—a whole flock of them—stymied Post's efforts in the fourth period. The locals had their best scoring shot called back on Josey's "hurdle run" after Coahoma QB Greenfield had pitched back on a sweep and there was no Coahoma trailing back. Four Lopes piled on top the loose football on the Bulldogs' 44 to set up the opportunity. Two runs got a first down on the Coahoma 30.

The Lopes overcame that penalty and another five-yarder and drove it to the Coahoma nine when the clock "stopped them" as time ran out.

The locals piled up 20 first downs and 270 net rushing yards to 12 and 142 for

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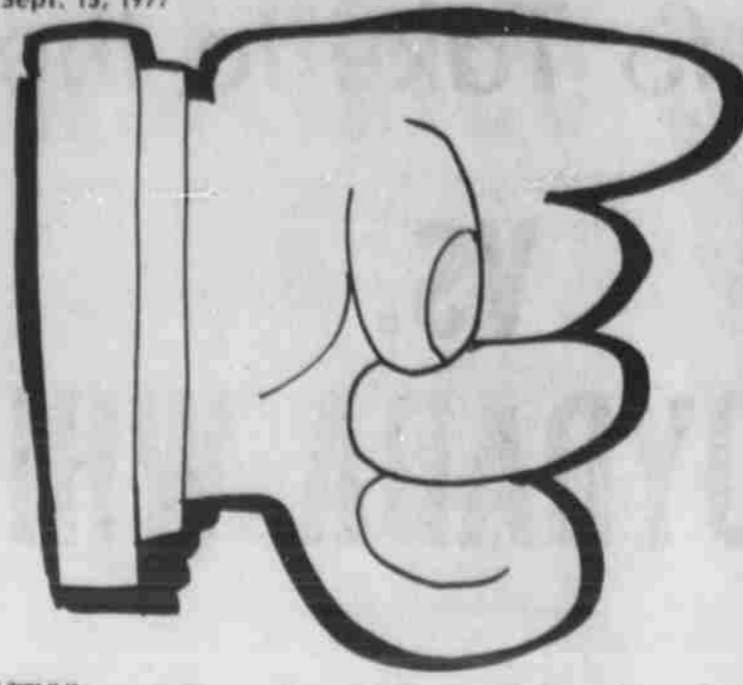

# Preston Smith to try for governor

AUSTIN — Former Governor Preston Smith Wednesday announced that he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor of the State of Texas.

Governor Smith's statement follows: "Six years ago Texas stood at a crossroad. We had laid the groundwork that would lead to an equitable school finance system, a new property tax structure and a statewide energy policy. Personal leadership by the Governor's office, an enlightened legislature and meaningful board appointments, combined with citizen effort gave us a jump on the most important decade in the history of Texas.

"Today, however, after six unproductive years, three legislative sessions, and countless board appointments we still stand at that same crossroad. The caretaker Governor who has held office for nearly six years has not seen fit to provide or inspire the type

of leadership that would move Texas forward.

"Every Texan has a wide range of motivations. We feel fear, doubt, insecurity, and prejudice when there is a leadership vacuum, but we have the capacity for courage, hope, compassion, confidence and understanding when our leadership is dynamic.

"A governor can extract either group of these characteristics from the people by his action or inaction. Our present caretaker governor has chosen not to lead or inspire us at all but rather to leave us at that six-year-old crossroad with our head in the sand.

"We have no new state taxes, but find me a man or woman in Texas whose local taxes haven't gone up because of inflation. The present state pay-as-you-go budget is running at an all-time high not because of sound management processes but because of windfall returns on Texas oil and inflation on goods and

services generated in the state. If the present governor wants to take credit for no new taxes he should also take credit for the financial devastation caused by inflation.

"During these years our caretaker Governor has adopted a 'get tough' policy for criminals, so the criminals have gotten tough and the crime rate is as high as it has ever been.

"To date there has been no property tax reform and the Texas Energy Policy consists of turning off lights in state buildings after dark as the absentee Governor goes to Washington every six months or so to protest an action by the federal government that has hurt Texas. We should be in on the planning and we will be if I'm elected Governor next year.

"No governor can run every facet of state government, but an effective

governor get positive, common-sense leadership by the appointments that are made to oversee the state's public agencies. During my previous term as your Governor, concern for the needs of the people of the state and leadership qualities were the prerequisites that appointments were based on. Today, however, residency in Uvalde County or the amount of campaign contribution to the caretaker Governor seem to be the qualities sought.

"Indeed we read almost daily of appointments left unfilled, appointees serving long after their term has expired, and in one instance we read of an appointment of a person already deceased.

# NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

# NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

# NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been therefore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

# NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

# NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

# NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

# NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

McQueen and Hall said the present junior high building, which was renovated once a decade ago, could be renovated at a cost of between \$12 and \$15 a square foot whereas a new structure would cost about \$28 a square foot.

Trustees later in their meeting voted to keep the current \$1.37 tax rate for the new 1977-78 school year instead of giving a small rate reduction to taxpayers, and apply any surplus not needed for the first two months of the school year toward upgrading facilities.

The roof is in need of repair which would cost an estimated \$4,500 and could be expected to last five to seven years. Total of replacement would cost \$8,241.75, trustees were told, but could be expected to solve the roof problem for 20 years.
