

# Bids to be taken for more housing

The Farmers Home Administration has given Post Community Housing, Inc., the nod to take bids on construction of five more duplexes on Mesquite Drive, just off North Avenue S., where seven rental duplexes are now located.

James Mitchell, president of the non-profit local housing corporation, told The Dispatch the possible opening of the bids will be Nov. 15.

Mitchell explained that the FmHa hasn't loaned money for the construction, but wants the bids first before making a loan decision.

With inflation moving prices up so rapidly, the federal agency is now getting the bids and then making one loan for the construction if it considers "the price right."

The architect's estimated cost for the five new duplexes which would provide an additional 10 rental units is \$257,000.

Mitchell said the new units would be of better construction than the first 14 because they will include the mandatory "energy package"

with more insulation and double-paned windows.

The current 14 rental units have had 100 percent occupancy since they were opened two years ago, and despite the lowest rental charges for any such project in West Texas the authority has paid all its bill and established a sizable fund for remodeling or emergency use.

The FmHa required the local project to operate for over a year to establish a history of operation before it would consider enlarging the project.

## Harvest about ready to go

The start of "stripping" Garza's 1978 cotton crop — rated poor by a near unanimous vote — is expected to get under way next week providing open weather holds.

No one wants to guess at the ultimate bale size of the crop. County Agent Syd Conner said there are "some spots" of pretty good cotton but generally it is mighty poor. He added most bolls were small and some not even opening.

Defoliation has begun by some farmers, but there is a disagreement as to whether the crop is worth the defoliating cost. Some will wait until after the frost.

The recent five-inch rain week got much of the cotton growing again on top. Farmers who are defoliating are moving cotton trailers into the field.

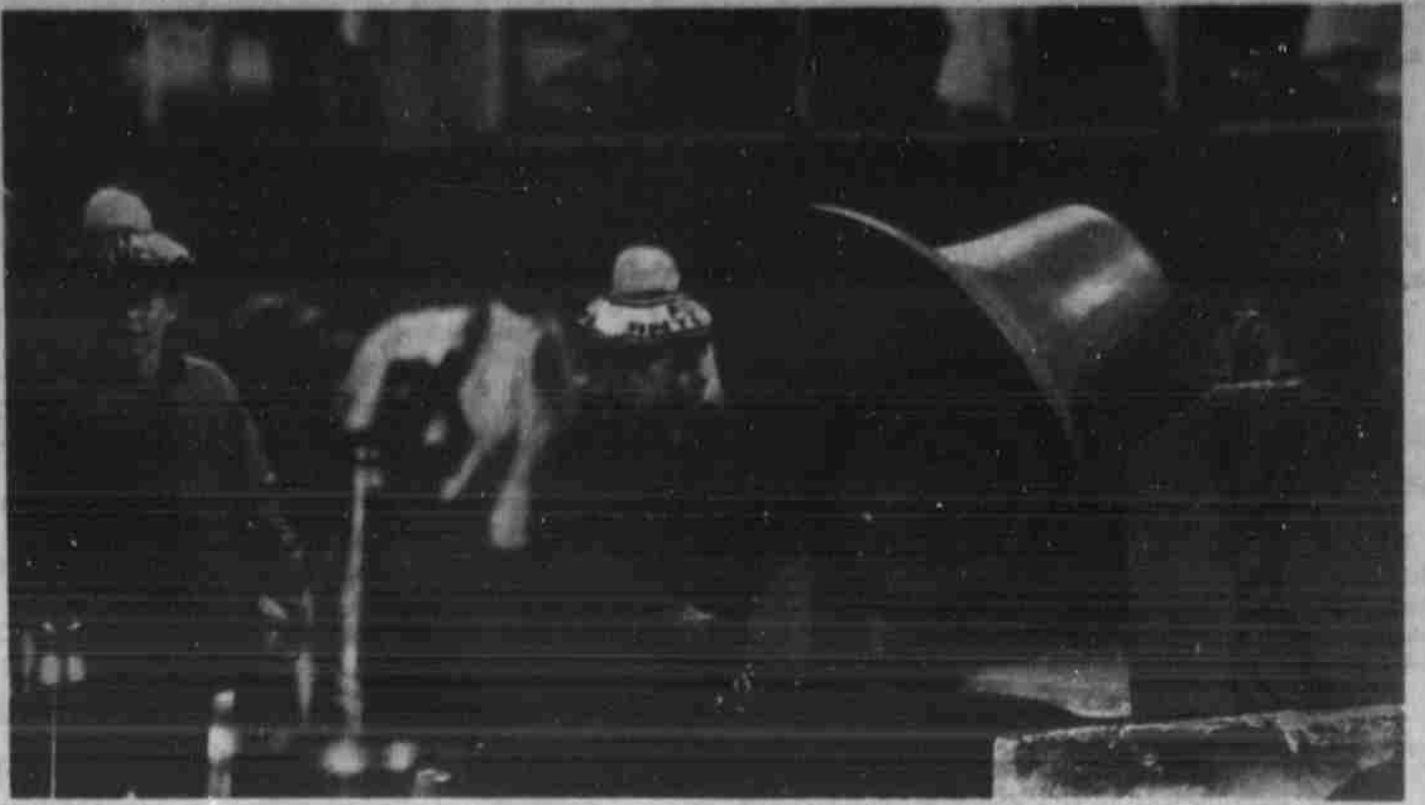
Advance ticket sales will begin next Tuesday when tickets priced at \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children will be distributed to Rotarians for sale.

## Dalby center of big ruckus

When the dust finally settled this week, three things were clear. Garza County Judge Giles Dalby doesn't support Republican Bill Clements for governor.

He remains within the Democratic party, for which he will be a candidate on the county ticket here in the November general election. And he supports John (The General) Hill for the state's highest office.

But it took a lot of talking on camera and to newspaper reporters to settle the dust.

It all started with the mailing out over last weekend of some 2,000,000 copies of a unique bit of campaign literature for Clements called "The Texas Spectorator," into Texas homes.

In many ways it looked a lot like The Texas Observer, which for years has been the unofficial mouthpiece of a liberal wing of Texas Democrats.

It was an eight-page tabloid newspaper which had a "screaming" front page headline — "Revolt against liberal spreading — Clements win seen as Dems dump Hill. Unprecedented party split back 'man who thinks like us.'"

Post and Garza County got a lot of coverage in "The Spectorator."

There were pictures of Mayor Giles McCrary and his wife, Louise, over the caption: Mayor and Mrs. G.C. McCrary of Post are backing Bill Clements for governor because, as the mayor says, "we cannot afford to go down the road toward socialism."

On that same page 5, there is a picture of winsome

Sarah Alexander, four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Alexander, wearing a big Clements governor campaign button.

Under the headline, "Young campaigner", the story read: "Sarah Alexander, 4, is one of the youngest campaigners for Bill Clements."

"She proudly wears her Clements — for — Governor badge."

"So does her father, Jack."

"And Sarah is mighty proud of Jack, too. He's an elementary school principal city councilman, and president of Garza Memorial Hospital directors in Post."

On the next page, there's a three column head reading: "Key Democrats and independents join campaign to elect Clements."

Right under the headline is a two column picture of County Judge Dalby.

The caption under the picture reads: "Judge Giles W. Dalby, a Democrat, says, 'I am voting for Bill Clements because he is honest, forthright, and I can trust him in Austin.'"

## City buys \$39,990 bulldozer for dump

The Post City Council Monday night approved the purchase of a new bulldozer for use at the city dump for the Yellowhouse Machinery Co. of Lubbock for \$39,990.

The Yellowhouse bid for a John Deere JD750 diesel crawler with Model JD750 diesel crawler with Model 6525 with hydrostatic transmission was the lowest of three received.

The new piece of equipment has a price tag of \$71,500 with \$31,510 allowed on the trade-in of the city's used bulldozer.

The council also asked City Manager Pete Madoox to see what kind of a deal the city could make with Yellowhouse on a trailer for the new equipment.

## DEBT program is off to fast start here

Post Rotarians were told at their weekly luncheon Tuesday by Diane Garner of Lubbock that three Post volunteers already have spent 115 hours of work in the year-old Development Education Birth through Two (DEBT) program here.

Ms. Garner, who is the outreach coordinator for the DEBT program, said the three are Betty Boren, Kathy Fluitt and Pat Cruse. She said currently three other volunteers — Jana McCallister, Beatriz Mesa and Tommie Williams — are participating in the pre-service training for the program.

Already 11 handicapped babies have been referred to the Post unit. Ms. Garner told Rotarians.

The volunteers work with the parents of the babies in their homes to train the parents in the training and best possible development of their children.

Already the three Post volunteers in the program have made \$2 home visits during the program's first year.

## Salute to Post's firemen

This week is a special week — National Fire Prevention Week.

Bryan J. Williams honors Post volunteer firemen with his "round the clock" protection ad on page 3. You'll find each of the present firemen on the staff in the ad with Fire Chief Neal Clary at the top.

The volunteer position of firemen is one of the most community minded jobs in town.

Post's department is an elite group as far as firemen go. They have the reputation under no-nonsense Chief Clary for topnotch performance.

That reputation has been gained not just with thankful householders around town but with area fire departments with whom they work from time to time.

Like any successful organization the Post volunteer firemen not only are well

trained and well led, but they also have a strong togetherness and spirit which carries them through sometimes tedious work and sometimes dangerous work.

Our fire department is worth thousands of dollars to local citizens in fire insurance savings because they get the job done, even the tough ones without waste of even seconds.

Their ability is reflected in the community's key rate which would be considerably higher were it not for the ability and performances of our volunteer firemen.

The Dispatch tips its editorial hat to Post's volunteer firemen and suggests to its readers that when you see them anywhere this week just tell them "thanks" for what they've done for us the past year.

## A productivity tax base

The tax relief amendment, which comes up for voter approval or rejection in November, has a section which deals with taxation on agricultural land.

Just what help the provision will give to financially troubled farmers and ranchers will be up to the next legislature — and other legislatures which follow.

The amendment provides the legislature will decide whether some or all timberland, corporate-owned agricultural land, and agricultural land owned by individuals who do not qualify under the 1966 constitutional amendment may qualify for valuation on the basis of productive capacity.

The 1966 amendment requires taxation on qualified land near urban or resort areas to be based on the income-producing capability of the land. Under the current constitution, only agricultural land owned by an individual qualifies, and agriculture must be the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

The proposed section of the tax relief amendment will not replace the current constitutional provision on agricultural land but will supplement it with a less restrictive provision.

Adoption of the tax relief amendment will not assure farmers and ranchers sizable tax reductions.

The legislature must adopt the formula to determine how to determine taxable value on the basis of productivity. With the legislature

primarily now controlled by city voting blocs the formula may not be anything close to the farmer's or rancher's liking.

Another angle is that it opens the possibility of taxing on the basis of productivity to the big corporation farms as well as to owners of timberland.

Since giving tax relief to the farmer and rancher by this formula will mean eroding the tax base of rural counties and school districts, the future of such districts could be placed in serious jeopardy.

The recent special session of the legislature adopted a financing bill which would set aside \$450 million of the state surplus to be used for this purpose in the next two years. This, however, is no guarantee for the future when the state doesn't have a surplus and the local taxing districts might be left to their own resources. Nor did the legislature determine the method of allocating the \$450 million.

The best that can be said for taxing agricultural and ranch land on the basis of its productivity rather than its value in the market place is that the present legislature by allocating the \$450 million has established a precedent for state aid to rural taxing districts for their loss of revenue.

Summing it up, adoption of the amendment would result in needed tax relief for farmers and ranchers, and although exactly how much relief remains to be determined, it is a faulty step in the right direction.

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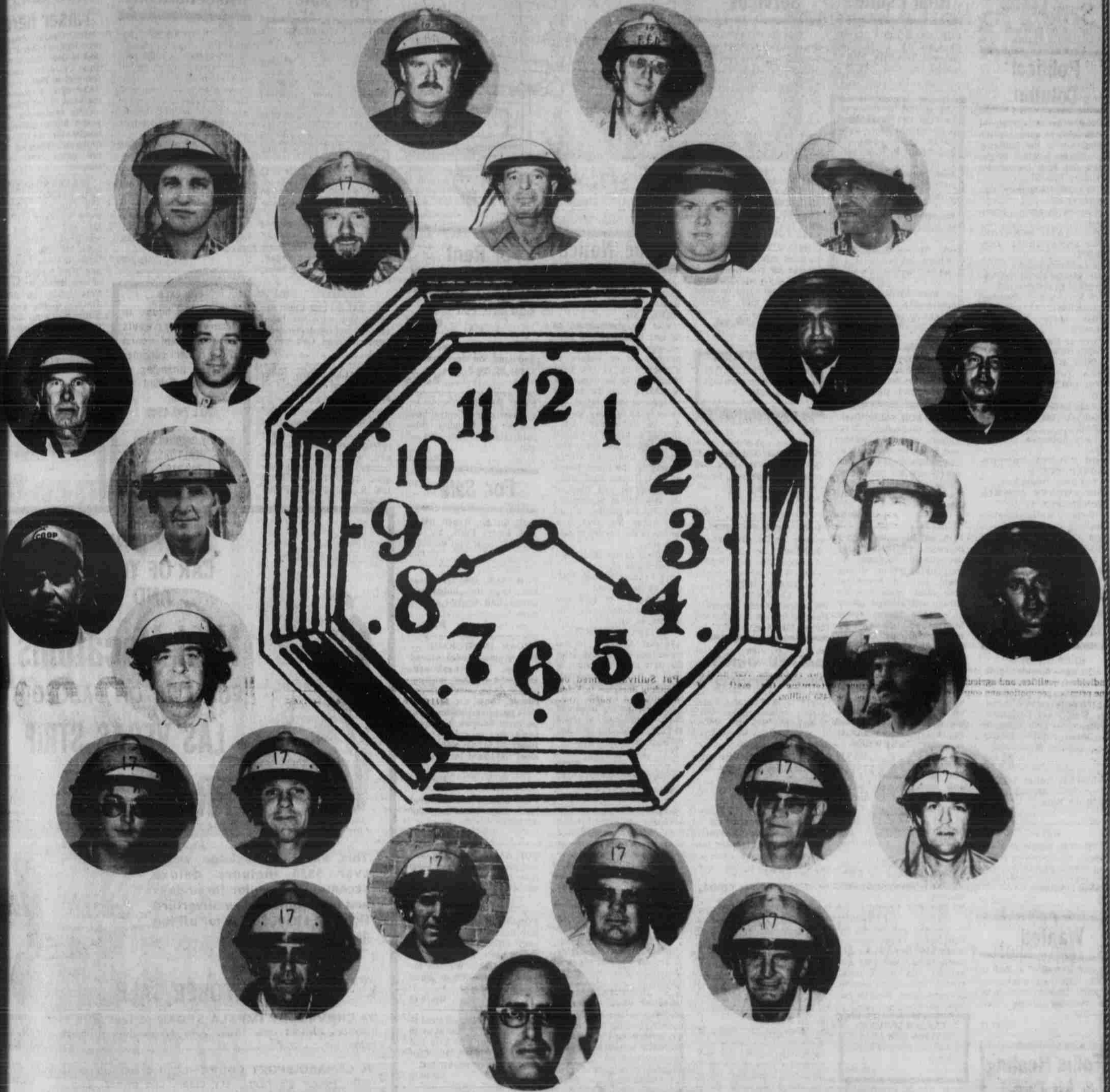

# PUC's \$15.9 million boost accepted

Bob Brummal, division manager for Southwestern Public Service Company in Lubbock, has announced that after considering all alternatives Southwestern Public Service Company has decided to accept the \$15.9 million rate increase granted by the Public Utilities Commission of Texas.

"We feel that to pursue the matter further would be an unnecessary added expense to the cities, our customers and the company," Brummal said. "However, the \$15.9 million is not enough to cover our expenses as they were presented to the regulatory bodies."

"In order to continue to build coal-fired plants and to meet our customers' needs and comply with Texas Docket 600, I am sure it will be necessary to request another adjustment in our rates in the near future."

Docket 600 mandates that SPS curtail their use of gas as a boiler fuel by 10 percent by 1981 and 25 percent by 1985.

"Of course, we are making every effort, as we have in the past, to hold the line on expenses and

continue to provide the highest quality service to our customers," Brummal concluded.

The Mustangs picked up a total of 176 yards for the night, but they managed almost none inside the Lopes 10.

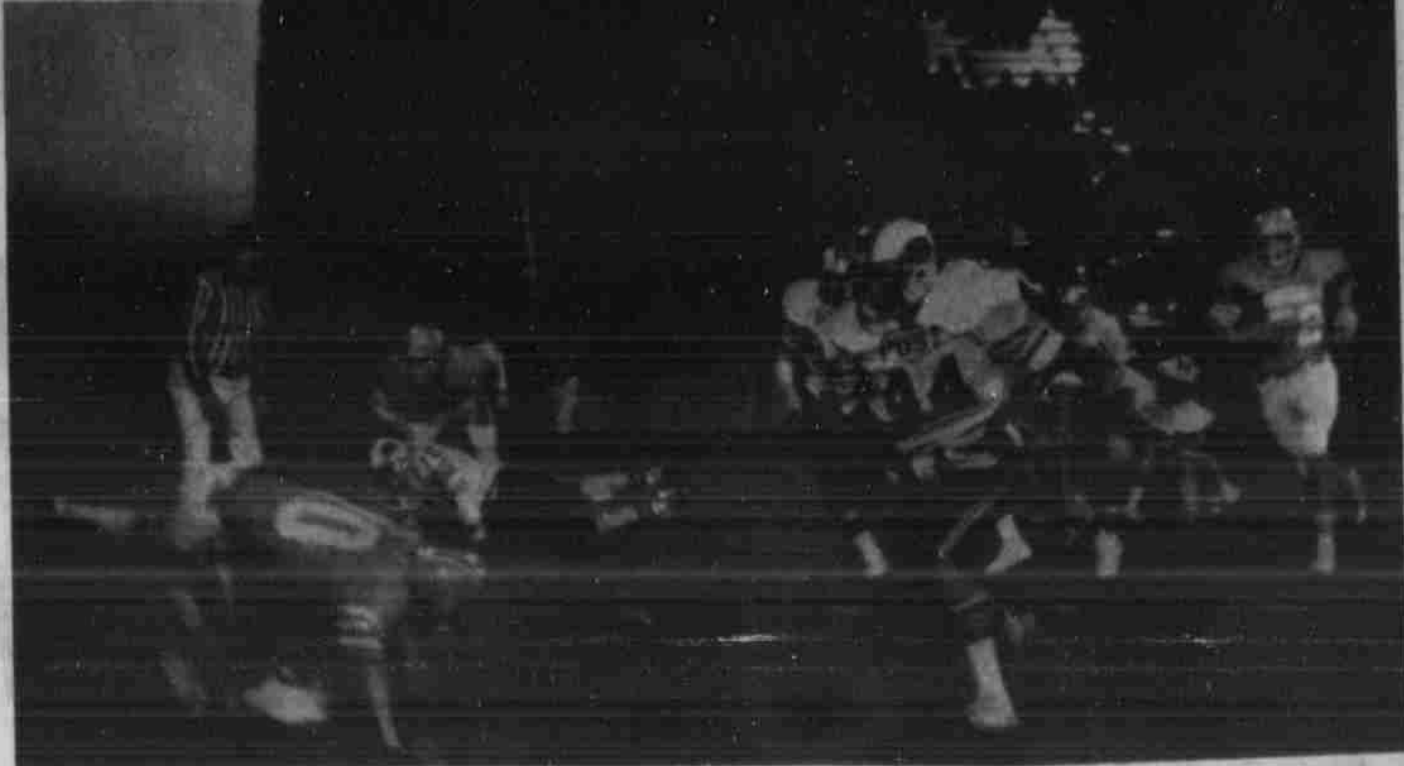
Denver City's first unsuccessful thrust came following Post's touchdown.

Three lineup changes made for Denver City saw Tim Morris starting at halfback, Darrell Reece starting at fullback; and Bryan Compton moved to split end.

All three played so well they will be starting again in those positions against Slaton.

Deb Palmer, the junior tackle who started on both offense and defense against Denver City and turned in a fine game, is doubtful for the Slaton contest. He jammed his neck in the game with the Mustangs and missed practice Monday and Tuesday.

Jay Lott will get the call on offense if Palmer is unable to play.

Clinton Curtis is still indefinitely with a broken thumb. Fullback Larry Riquiez didn't see action at Denver City because he was yet to regain full speed from an ankle sprain.

Another back, Mike Finch, saw only limited action last week because he was weakened by a hamstring pull but he is expected to be ready for an all-out effort at Slaton.

The Tigers who run a lot of sweeps and use a tailback constantly have sophomore starter at the position this year, Mike Michael Whaley, a 160-pounder.

Mike White, the 160-pound senior fullback, is a one. But the offensive star of the Tigers is Quarterback Ricky Davis, the 160-pound senior who handles kicking as well as passing and plays safety defense.

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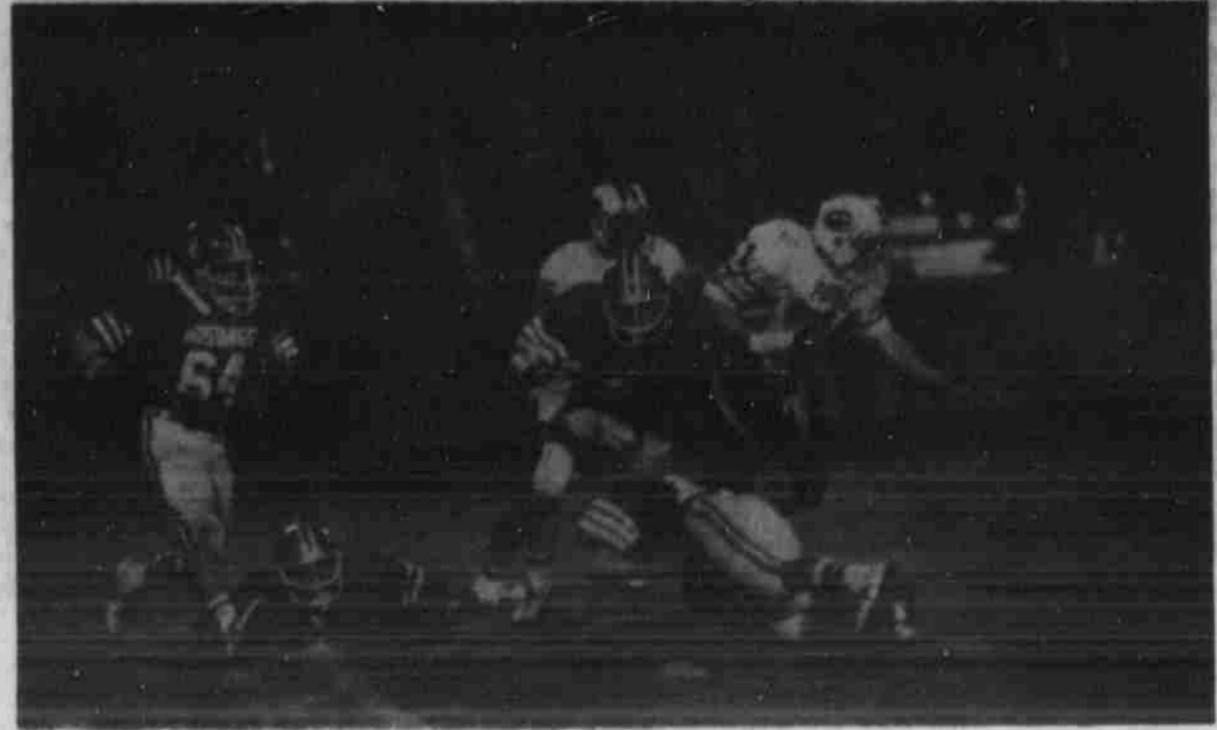

It's obvious from the information sheet, that the cheerleaders so far haven't anticipated getting any Chamber of Commerce banquet dates. Oh yes, contracts are always drawn up and sent to client outlining appearance arrangements and agreements.

Maybe, on second thought, we ought to get Danny White back next year. He got in for three plays Sunday against the Giants in the last minute. We sort of wonder what his life has been like in Big D since last spring.

made during a Clements campaign visit to Post August 10 when a reception was held for him in the bank community room.

Judge Dalby started to get phone calls about his picture Monday. He hadn't seen a copy of "the Spectator" until then, he told The Dispatch.

Dalby was a strong backer of Governor Dolph Briscoe in the May primary. When Hill defeated Briscoe, Clements backers sought Dalby's endorsement of the Republican candidate as they did most of the other Briscoe backers.

They obviously signed up a lot of former Briscoe supporters.

But Judge Dalby told The Dispatch this week he never seriously considered endorsing Clements. After all, Dalby is a Democratic candidate in the November election too, seeking another four years as county judge.

He told The Dispatch he went to Clements reception here in August only to welcome Clements to Post as the county judge and certainly not to endorse him.

But he does admit a photographer in the Clements entourage did take his picture at the reception. He says he doesn't recall signing a disclaimer which would permit the Clements people to use his picture and statement on behalf of his candidate.

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal printed a copy of the disclaimer with Dalby's signature in their Tuesday edition.

Monday afternoon, Candidate Hill snapped off a fiery statement at Clements for printing an endorsement by Judge Dalby which had never been made.

Judge Dalby said he had sent Hill's office a telegram emphatically stating he (Dalby) supported Hill and had never endorsed Clements.

On Tuesday morning, a press conference was organized in Lubbock by Hill backers to give Judge Dalby a chance to tell his side of the story.

When that press conference was over, Clements forces held a press conference at the same place for the same media representatives to explain their side, how the picture had been made and a disclaimer signed by Dalby.

Dalby told The Dispatch he had even received recently a \$1 check as a "modeling fee" from the Clements forces, but he immediately returned the check.

After the Clements press conference Tuesday, Judge Dalby had a second one and

as given a chance to refute what the Clements forces had said.

Clements himself in Lubbock Tuesday campaigning at Texas Tech University.

He said it was obvious Judge Dalby had changed his mind about backing him which was his prerogative and he didn't wish to embarrass Judge Dalby, adding if Dalby's letter had reached the publishers in time Dalby's picture would have been taken out of "The Spectator."

At least for a day or two this week a wrangle over whether Judge Dalby supported Clements or Hill turned out to be just about the biggest political news in Texas.
