The commander was stationed in Washington when he was first sent to the United States: He came to Washington the same time as Winston Churchill did, "Tomorrow I'm going to the wild west rodeo which is passing through the city. I understand they are very good and somewhat more exciting than our dull old circuses at home." he related in another portion of his letter.




