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

Soil Conservation District News . . .

Turkey Creek Watershed plans are progressing toward construc-tion readiness, according to di-rectors of the Turkey Creek Conservation District. Progress in obtaining easements needs to be speeded up in order to be ready for the Soil Conservation Service to make detailed designs for each flood control structure, the directors said.

Construction of the 12 plan ned floodwater retarding struc-tures could begin by the spring of 1980. The government is wait-ing on the local people to pro-vide all easements and rights of way, cost free. The land remains private property and is not pur-chased by the government. The local people participate jointly with the government in the complete watershed program by giving easements and by putting a conservation program on the land. The government will bear all construction costs of the flood control structures.

The directors of the Turkey Creek Conservation District are calling a meeting of the land-owners that are involved with the flood control structures for Thursday night, Nov. 12, at the Cottonwood Community Center at 7:30 p. m. Plans in regard to when construction may be start-ed will be discussed at this meeting.
