Rex Allen's fame started in radio. He once had a program of his own on the Columbia Broadcasting System. His radio work led to a contract with Republic Pictures for whom he made 32 feature-length movies. He also made four feature films for Walt Disney before going into television. Included in his television successes is the filmed series titled "Country Doctor."

As a composer, Rex Allen has written over 300 musical numbers. He made over 150 musical recordings for Mercury Records and another 75 for Decca Records. Recently, he signed a long-term contract with Walt Disney Music Company.

In his appearance in each performance of the Fort Worth Rodeo, he will have with him his horse "KoKo," claimed to be the most beautiful horse in the world. He will also have a musical group.

1. Seat belts cut your chances of getting hurt in an auto accident in half.

2. The risk of death or serious injury in an auto wreck is five times greater if you are hurled from the car than if you remain inside... seat belts help keep you there.

3. Safety men estimate 5,000 lives could be saved each year if seat belts, properly installed, were used in cars.

These are some of the facts safety experts are armed with in their attempt to popularize the use of auto seat belts.

Seat belts, according to TSA, are a positive step a motorist can take toward safety and a constant reminder to keep his safety guard up. Also, contrary to much thinking, seat belts help reduce driving fatigue.

Is the risk of being thrown from your car in a crash exaggerated?

No! Says TSA, which reports that a recent study showed that in actual crashes, 55 percent of the doors open. Of the persons killed, 47 percent were thrown from the car.

However, experts do not claim seat belts are the sole answer to traffic accident problems, but they do know their widespread use could go a long way in reducing traffic injuries and fatalities.

## Baird, Stamford F.F.A. Boys Sheep Deal Ends Up on Film

Reporter-News Farm Editor The West Texas Fair in Abilene a month and a half ago set up a chain of events that led to the filming Friday of a major sequence in a picture, to be titled "Sheep Shape," on the Frank Windham Sr. Ranch, 22 miles south of here.

The picture is being produced by the American Hampshire Sheep Assn. of Stuart, Iowa, and is to be distributed throughout all sheep producing countries "of the Western or any other hemisphere" by the association, according to Roy A. Gilmore, Stuart, Iowa, executive secretary.

The picture is being filmed by Clover-Thompson Films of Kansas City and Filmmaster Productions of Texas, Dallas.

Harold Clover of the Kansas City firm is directing the picture. R. W. (Bob) Shirer, well-known Hereford photographer of Filmmaster and George Peters, Dallas, are cameramen and sound engineers of the film.

The major role in the picture, which is to promote Hampshire, "The World's Most Useful Sheep," is played by Frank Windham Jr., 15, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Windham Sr., and a student in Baird High School; and John Bill Oman, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Oman of Ericksdahl, a senior in Stamford High School.

The Reporter-News got into the middle of the events through a picture story that appeared on the farm page of the morning edition Sept. 27.

Here is the chronological order of events that led up to the filming of "Sheep Shape" on the Windham ranch:

1. John Bill Oman, Area II FFA president and Stamford FFA Chapter's leading sheep feeder and breeder, showed the championship flock of registered Hampshire breeding sheep at the West Texas Fair.

2. Frank Windham Sr. and Jr. saw the sheep, liked them, and proposed to purchase the seven ewes and one ram. The deal was later consummated.

3. Edwin L. Reese, Baird VA teacher, invited the farm editor to Baird when the sheep were delivered by Oman to young Windham.

4. The next morning R. W. (Bob) Shirer, in Coleman to photograph Hereford animals for some of the Coleman breeders, saw the Hampshire sheep story and picture in the Reporter-News.

5. He telephoned Gilman in Stuart, giving him the story the secretary said he had been looking for, an FFA or 4-H Club boy getting into the Hampshire sheep business with registered animals.

Monday, Gilman had Mr. and Mrs. Frank Windham Sr. and Frank Jr. and VA Teacher Reese meet him and the cameramen and Director Clover in Shreveport at the Louisiana State Fair. There was a strong Hampshire division in the fair sheep show and Alex Mackenzie of Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, was there.

Mackenzie is, in Gilman's words, "one of the truly great sheep - showmen and fitters of lambs for the judging arena."

Considerable footage was filmed at the Louisiana State Fair in Shreveport Tuesday. Gilman, Shirer and Peters returned to Baird with the Windhams and Reese.

Thursday they made some pictures of various other Baird FFA members and their projects, including Don Franke and his cotton production project. Tom and John Higgins, twins, and their dairy feeding project.

Friday the crew shot some footage of Mike Odom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bland Odom, neighbors of the Windhams, who has a beef steer feeding project, along with some commercial cattle on his father's ranch. Mike is a junior in Baird High School and he's had an active project each year he has been in vocational agriculture.

A green or yellow vegetable should be served at least once a day. These contain essential vitamins and minerals.

Because it cannot be stored in the body, vitamin (from citrus fruits, tomatoes and other fresh or processed fruits and vegetables) is needed every day.

With the addition of these to round out meals according to tastes and appetites, the well-fed family is provided with all the nutrients needed for health and growth.

Breakfast is probably the most important meal of the day because you have gone without food for such a long period of time. One-third of our daily diet must be eaten at breakfast.

Breakfast is essential to children. Fruit, meat or eggs, and cereal or bread and butter and milk should be included in every breakfast.

Three good meals a day will go a long way toward keeping you fit through fall and winter and all year around.

**I Give You Texas**

Vernon was the scene of a district championship game and I made a mistake; I arrived at the field only 30 minutes before the kickoff. The stands, including aisles, were already packed. So I climbed on top of a car back of the press box, jumped and hands pulled me up.

Another time, Childress was the scene of a district title contest. The stands were so crowded it was impossible to reach the press box, so I obtained permission to get on the sidelines. I made more yardage than any player because Red Rattikin, Childress' great back, ran only when he had the ball but I ran any time anybody had the ball.

Unusual plays recalled: Dick Todd of Crowell, later an Aggie great, broke into the clear against Chillicothe, looked back and saw he was all by himself and so he walked the last six yards across the goal line; the giant end, Rankin Britt of Ranger, caught a pass near the Eastland goal, was tackled by three small players who turned him halfway around and he backed the final five yards for a touchdown, dragging them along; and, at Brownwood, at almost the end of the game, a substitute intercepted an Eastland pass and ran 35 yards, with Eastland men blocking for him and then tackling him behind his own goal line for a safety which gave Eastland a one-point victory!

Being a sports writer has its occasional embarrassments. I was attending the pre-season district dinner which Breckenridge used to host and, during the meal, the man across the table remarked that Coach Schmidt of T. C. U. was listing huge Dan Salkeld, sophomore end, at 180.

In an undertone, I said to the man next to me, "Rags" Matthews, a T. C. U. immortal, "That reminds me that his high school coach used to list Salkeld at 165." Rags, addressing the first speaker, said, "This fellow says," indicating me, and then repeated my remark. I blushed and so did the other man. He had been Salkeld's high school coach.

Among the coaches in my Oil Belt Days (1920-30) were Dave Pena, at Eastland, who had been University of Texas captain; Blair Cherry, at Ranger, later head coach at Texas; Eck Curtis, at Ranger, later backfield coach at Texas; and W. B. Chapman, at Cisco, who went to Lubbock and, after his death in

mid-season, his inspired team went on to win the State championship.

Even when I was sports writer in Eastland or Ranger, "Chap" told me I was always welcome to attend any Cisco practice. I never accepted the invitation but felt honored at what I considered to be a tribute to my fairness and sportsmanship. When I happened to mention this invitation, however, one fan said the coach felt that I knew so little about football that I couldn't have described a play so that the Eastland (or Ranger) coach would know what to be on guard against. But I didn't dignify this statement with a reply; in fact, I forgot the remark a long time ago.

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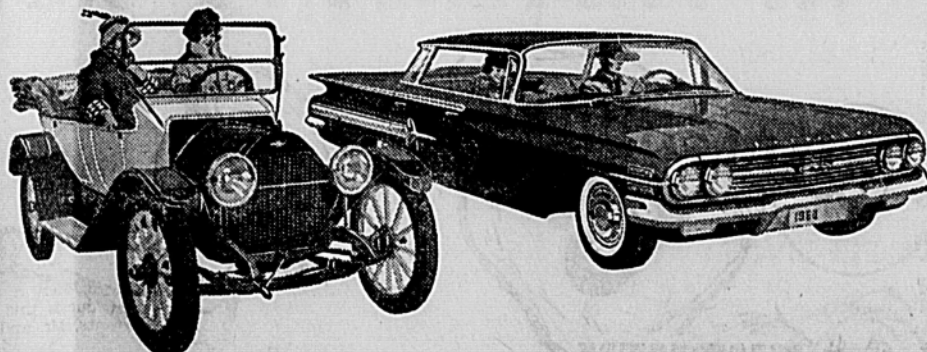

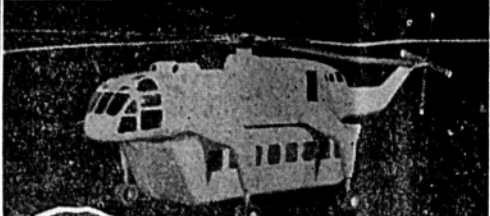

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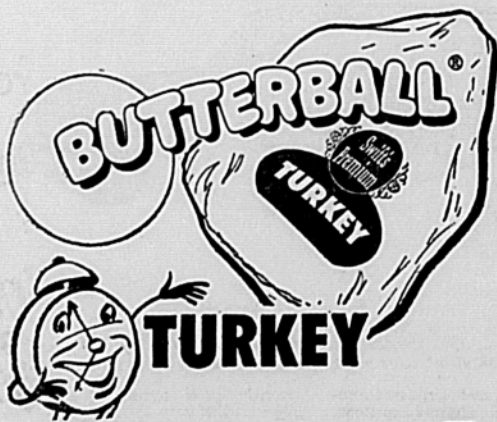

## Soil Conservation District News

Turkey Creek Watershed plans are progressing toward construction readiness, according to directors of the Turkey Creek Conservation District. Progress in obtaining easements needs to be speeded up in order to be ready for the Soil Conservation Service to make detailed designs for each flood control structure, the directors said.

Construction of the 12 planned floodwater retarding structures could begin by the spring of 1960. The government is waiting on the local people to provide all easements and rights of way, cost free. The land remains private property and is not purchased by the government. The local people participate jointly with the government in the complete watershed program by giving easements and by putting a conservation program on the land. The government will bear all construction costs of the flood control structures.

The directors of the Turkey Creek Conservation District are calling a meeting of the landowners that are involved with the flood control structures for Thursday night, Nov. 12, at the Cottonwood Community Center at 7:30 p. m. Plans in regard to when construction may be started will be discussed at this meeting.

**HIGHLIGHTS**  
It is more than a year until the day when the next President of the United States will be elected, but in Texas, the race is on.

From now until Nov. 8, 1960, may well be a year of the most feverish political activity the state has ever known.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn fired the starting gun by calling for an all-out campaign to win the Democratic presidential nomination for U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson. Rayburn called for Johnson-for-President organizations in every county in Texas.

A campaign kick-off by the man who has often been called "Mr. Democrat" gave enormous impetus to the activities of Johnson supporters. Pro-Johnson clubs, rallies and editorials blossomed over the state. Gov. Price Daniel and the state executive committee had previously pledged support.

Speaker Rayburn's sponsorship also makes exceedingly difficult the position of Texas' liberal wing Democrats who have been cool toward the senator since the convention hassles of 1956.

In 1952, Rayburn championed the liberals in their battle against a conservative party leadership working for Eisenhower. But the same group, now the Democrats of Texas Club members, will have to fly in the face of their old friend, Rayburn, if they decide on open opposition to Senator Johnson this year.

Some DOTers have pledged Johnson support. But Mrs. R. D. Randolph, leader, refused to commit herself on grounds that the senator has not declared himself a candidate.

Candidate or not, Senator Johnson is whizzing around Texas for personal appearances, scheduled at the rate of more than one a day in the months ahead.

**FAREWELL TO BENCH** — Judge John E. Hickman has announced that he will retire in 1960 from his post as chief justice of the State Supreme Court. Judge Hickman, who became a commissioner on the high court in 1935, has served there longer than any other man in Texas history.

Noting that he is 76, the judge said he felt the time had come "to surrender the duties and responsibilities of my office to someone younger."

Two other Supreme Court justices, Joe Greenhill and Clyde E. Smith, will be up for re-election next year.

**ADOPTION STYMIED** — Texas Supreme Court ruled in favor of a woman who signed papers to allow her child to be adopted, then changed her mind and sought to re-claim the baby. High court opinion was that the lower court erred in declaring the child "dependent and neglected."
