Thorough moculation is necesary if legume crops are to make their best yields and to be of any value to the soil in the way of soil building. There are several different groups of these bacteria that live on legiume plants and take nitrogen from the air which is used by the plants and stored in the soll for future use. Be sure that you get the proper group for your seed. Inoculation is good crop insurance on legumes, giving a better plant, higher yields and

better quality products.

The material used in incoulation are laboratory cultures in which the bacteria or organism us been grown or introduced. One of the most popular ones is sold under the trade name of "Nitragm." Follow the directions on the
