State Collects \$13,155 Set at Dallas Game Law Fines

More than 300 Texas hunters paid fines last month for viola-tion of game laws according to the director of law enforcement or the Game and Fish Commis-sion. In all 461 persons were ar-rested for hunting and fishing violations. They paid \$13,115.35 in fines and costs. Four served jail terms. of the Game and Fish Commis-

jail terms.

Despite warnings about hunting with unplugged guns, 49 paid fines for carrying shotguns with more than three-shot capacity. Next on the list 46 paid fines for killing too many doves.

Failure to have hunting and fishing licenses brought fines to 98 persons. There were 39 arrests of automobile hunters and seven for headlighting game animals. Quali hunters also got in too big a hurry and 37 killed them out of sesson.



County Agent's Column .

The Show Committee of the Callahan County Junior Live-stock Show met Monday night at the courthouse in Baird, Work on the show catalogue is progressing nicely, and the book should be ready to go to the printer within a few days. The show will be med at the Sheriff's Posse Rodeo Grounds on January 16, with judging to begin promptly at 9 a. m.

Weeds rob your livestock of good grazing, and in addition, use four to eleven times more water for growth than grasses. To have more grass for next year's grazing, G. O. Hoffman, extension range specialist, advises spraying with one pound of 2, 4-D per acre. One application will usually give good weed control throughout the growing season. This method of pasture weed control method is economical, costing about \$2 per acre.

Brucellosis is a costly disease to livestock producers of Texas. Cattle infected with brucellosts suffer 20 percent loss in milk production, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian. They calve on the average of every one and one-half years rather than yearly. In addition,

The most common thought is to "bulld terraces and all troubles will be solved". Often times this is not the case. Most cultivated fields having water problems will need some type of water course for disposal of excess water.

Natural depressions in fields are the best and most commonly used areas as drainageways for excess water. Such drainageways or waterways, as commonly referred to, may be used to carry outside water through fields, or carry water that is being discharged from terraces, or both, provided some form of vegetation is established to protect the soil from erosion.

A waterway should have vegetation well established in it before carrying additional water. This will possibly call for delay in the construction of terraces a year or two, but it is an important step in establishing stable conditions. If vegetation is not present, the concentration of water will cause scouring and cullying that may even cause more problems than are solved.

The type of vegetation used in waterways will depend upon location and type of soil. There are several locally adapted grass es such as Sideoats grama, KR bluestem, Bermuda, Western wheat. Green Sprangle top, Switchgrass and others that may be seeded. Costal grass is sometimes sprigged in waterways also. For information on seedbed preparation and planting dates, contact your local Soil Conservation Service technician or District Supervisor.

The minimum size of the waterway will depend upon the drainage area. It is very desirable to have the grassed area

large enough to be managed for economical returns as a grazing area, seed production or a hay meadow.

The waterway area, if properly selected, should be the highest producing land in the field for grass because in the natural depression, the slope is the flattest and the soil is the deepest. Also, the waterway being a collecting area for the excess run-



Net state collections from gasoline taxes in Texas for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1959 were \$169,640,025, by far the largest single item of income from within the state. Yet, he said, out of last year's total gasoline tax collections the sum of \$42,410,006 was diverted to the general fund for purposes not even remotely related to the building or maintenance of highways.
