### New Address System Will Speed Mail

The postoffice department has ost 30,000 employees to the armed forces and due to the influences which the war bears upon the quantity of mail the volume has more than doubled.

Due to this condition the post office department was forced to establish a system under which effect on June 22 and after that books, the OPA pointed out that untrained employees could rapidly distribute mail.

Under this system a city which has branch post offices and stations established at strategical places throughout its confines, establishes a district for each branch post office or sub-station. This district is given a number, such as 1, 3, 5, 10, 30, etc.

Mail addressed to large cities in addition to the usual street address and number also contains the district number. An example of the new type of address is:

Effective measures suggested for reventing and avoiding recurrent ttacks of "athlete's foot" are:

I. Dry carefully and thorough-

ly the spaces between the toes. 2. Use a mild alcoholic solution on these areas after drying

3. Liberally apply a plain, unscented talcum to those areas and sprinkle it freely in socks, stockngs, and shoes.

4. Wear socks that are absorbent but not too coarse. Shoes should be well fitting but not too tight; sufficiently roomy but not large enough to chafe and rub,



#### Care of Pressure Cooker

Anyone fortunate enough to have the use of a pressure cooker are spending this week in Peters- should take the very best care of

> Keep the safety valve of the ooker clean. If it is the ball and ocket type, wash it after each ising. Soak these parts in vinegar r kerosene to remove food deposits and corrosion. A toothpick may be used to keep the opening of the gauge clean. Never let water stand in cooker. Keep I clean and free from odors at al times. To remove odors and stains use the juice of a lemon, 2 table spoons vinegar, or a handful of Irish potato peelings with two quarts of water and process at 5 pounds pressure for 5 minutes. Always store the cooker where there a no danger of jarring or breakng the gauge. Crumpled paper stored in the cooker helps to aborb excess mosture.

Tin and enamel coatings scratch easily. This causes the steel base to rust, and the rust weakens the walls of the cooker. Avoid sharp blows, over-heating, boiling dry, or cleaning with harsh abrasive powders. Heating grease or fat at high temperatures in a tin plated cooker may cause the tin to melt; therefore the cooker should not be used for rendering lard or searing

The edges of the lid should be cept free from rust, food, dents, ind chipped spots to prevent the lid from leaking steam. Always be sure to have enough water to prevent cooker from beiling dry. If the lid sticks or the cooker leaks steam, rub the edges with cooking oil before replacing the lid on the cooker if the cooker lid is the type that does not have a rubber

#### Wheat May Have To Be Piled On Ground In Area This Year

J. M. Mahoney, Santa Fe railroad general superintendent transportation, said much of the 1943 wheat now beginning to move, probably will have to be oiled on the ground.

Equipment formerly made available for the wheat harvest is being used by the military forces. he said, and a near shortage o cars exists now, two weeks before the deluge of harvest grain. Authorities say the 1943 wheat must remain in local storage until its movement becomes a war time

necessity. Mahoney said the motive power shortage is just as seute as the ar shortage, pending delivery of 100 locomotives the Santa Fe has had ordered for a long time. About 7,500 cars are being repaired and carliners are being installed for handling grain. The crop has been estimated this year by railroad officials as better than an average yield, although it is believed to be 25 to 30 per cent

below last year.

About 70 per cent of the wheat crop in Texes and Oklahoma is adjacent to the Santa Fe. A movement of 40,000 cars is anticipated. from Texas, Colorado, western Kanasa and Oklahoma Mahoney sald 40,000 cars handled last year's harvest rush and since then the total of all ha reached 106,000. Present storage is 58 percent filled with last year's grain, the survey reveals, which means there is space for 122,720,000 bushels of new wheat, and about 500,000,000

bushels to be taken care of. Hale county last Wednesday reported the first load of 1943 wheat brought to an elevator. The grower estimated he would combine about 25 bushels an acre from his crop. The yield is under last year.
