#### TEAM SETS HIGH MARK ....

Meriting congratulations upon being the first Post High School aggregation to advance to a state playoff of any sort within recent years is the girls' basketball squad, which will be in Waco Monday for opening round games of the state McCamey League tournament.

In this day of spirited high school athletic competition, any team which advances as far as a state tournament has accomplished a feat of which it, the school and the city may well be proud. When one considers that there are several hundred girls' basketball teams in Texas, qualification for either the McCamey tournament or the Texas Interscholastic League meet is quite an accomplishment.

Competition at the Waco tournament will be rugged, to say the least. Coach N. R. King's girls probably are not rated pre-tournament favorites, but the fact that they have qualified for the meet is proof that they have a chance to cop the championship, which would mean an intersectional game with the lowa Me-Camey tournament winners.

The Post girls may feel sure that their fellow students and townspeople are behind them 100 per cent and pulling for them to go all the way. Incidentally, it would boost the girls' morale just before game time to receive more tangible proof of this backing-such as congratulatory telegrams from local groups.

Win or lose at Waco next week, this year's team has, in sharing the District 6-AA title and being selected District 11 AA representatives in the McCamey tournament, set a high mark for future cage teams at Post High School.

#### IN HALF THE TIME ....

This week, Garza County workers launched their 1953 fund drive for the American Red Cross, with the county chapter hopeful of attaining its \$2,251 quota in two weeks-half the time set for the nation-wide campaign.

This year, as in no other year since the war, it'll be to any county's credit to reach its Red Cross fund quota in as short a time as possible. This year, the Red Cross needs more money, largely to expand Red Cross blood collections for production of gamma globulin, the new weapon against paralytic polio. Extra funds also were added to provide a Red Cross recreation program for servicemen abroad.

Leroy A. Lincoln, national fund chairman, said the \$93 million goal set for the nation is "the absolute minimum" needed by the Red Cross to finance its services. He said if the need is to be met "Americans everywhere must answer the call of their less fortunate neighbors in full measure."

Post and the other communities of Garza County form only a small segment of the area in which the nation wide fund campaign is under way and our \$2,251 quota is only a small part of the \$93 million goal. But, by reaching or exceeding our quota and taking it for granted that other counties will do likewise, we'll have had a hand in raising the money needed by the American Red Cross to carry on its ambitious and highly humanitarian program throughout the coming year.

#### Texans In WASHINGTON By TEX EASLEY, Associated Press Washington Service

WASHINGTON, Feb. (P)-Sen. Price Daniel of Texas did a top notch job selling the Senate Interior Committee on the special claims of his state in regard to the submerged lands issue.

That, in itself, was not surprising. He knew the subject, since it was his stepping stone to Congress. And most of the committee members long since have been persuaded to 'Texas' side because the case has been aired out time and again over the years.

So, the most noteworthy thing about Daniel's appearance before the committee was the unintentional job he did of selling himself.

A freshman member of the senate and a newcomer to the Interior Committee itself. Daniel as an individual was as much a matter of interest as his subject when he sat down in the witness chair to speak in support of states ownership tidelands legislation.

What Gillette did to the old-fashloned razor, this new movement is doing to brushes and paints.

#### **Homes And Furniture**

For several years families have been able to buy upainted and knocked down furniture; but the prices were high on the latter. Today, however, one needs to buy only ply-board and certain metal clamps from a lumber dealer. For a small fee the lumber dealer will cut the pieces as needed for tables and chairs.

The big development has been in young people building their own homes. Two couples will buy adjoining lots, make joint contracts for the foundations, and then go ahead with different plans. These plans can be bought with complete details for ordering, cutting and erecting the house. For heavy work, when two men are needed, they help each other. The only outside help needed is a plumber. This may explain why a prominent columnist stated "The new President's Cabinet consists of eleven millionaires and one plumber!"

Another suggestion is that you become a salesman on commission for some lumber dealer to sell "Build-It-Yourself" houses. It would interest almost every young couple to at least hear your story. It also might be combined with the real estate business. Before building a house one must secure the land.

I have often wondered why house builders do not sell furniture and home furnishings. Or why furniture dealers do not sell houses. This is a combination which should appeal to many customers and should be advertised in the local newspapers.

# Garza Hospital Explains Policy For Hospital Charges ---

The Board of Trustees of your hospital feels that there is a need for explanation of the fees charged by the hospital. In the past there has been some misunderstanding regarding this matter and an effort shall be made to explain the policies of the hospital. In the event that there is any question whatsoever, you are urged to come to the hospital office or telephone and an explanation will be made.

The hospital office is concerned only with the charges for hospital services and is in no way connected or concerned with the fees charged by the attending physician, whether the charges of the physician are for hospital patients or office patients. The hospital does not collect money for the physicians. The physicians' charges are made by his office. In the same manner, the physician does not collect accounts for the hospital and charges paid in his office are not for hospital charges.

Charges for hospital rooms or hospital beds include all meals, nursing services, but do not include medicines, hypos, or dressings. Compared with lodging accommodations in a first class motel or hotel, if one remembers to include meals and all necessary room service, one will find that hospital room charges are comparable to charges in motels and hotels.

Your local hospital is a member of a national prepayment hospitalization group which has strict requirements for membership. The bulk of these requirements concern fair and just fees for services. Certain charges must be submitted to the home office of this organization and he approved as being just and fair. The charges that must be approved include all laboratory, X-ray, emergency room, operating room, delivery room, drug and medicine charges. Your hospital is under contract to charge all patients the same rates whether they are members of any particular group plan or not. When these lists of fees were originally submitted, it became necessary to lower some charges in order to secure approval, this being the case in most small hospitals. The group plan judges what is a just fee on the basis of averages of fees charged in the West Texas area. This presented a problem that is commonplace in small West Texas towns, Nurses and other such trained hospital workers generally do not want to move to

Your hospital does not have cots to be used when someone must stay with the patient, however, when the other bed in a semi-private room is not in use, it is available at \$4.00 per night. We do not feel that this price is excessively high. It has very little to do with the welfare of the patient and is an extra that is not necessary to efficiently treat the patient. The customary charge in other hospitals that have cots is \$1.00 per night for a cot with a hard pad no linen. We are making available a full hospital bed with complete. linen and bedding and a Simmons innerspring mattress. If someone must stay with the patient, guest meals are served for \$1.00 if desired

It must be remembered that extensive Emergency Room services can be expensive in very short periods of time. X-rays. for instance can cause charges to increase rapidly. X-ray charges have increased not more than 10% in the last 15 years, yet your hospital is equipped with \$8000.00 worth of X ray equipment. Blood plasma and Whole Blood are usually the most postly item in extensive emergency room treatment. The hospital must buy plasma at a high cost and must necessarily pass this cost on to the patient receiving the plasma. 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small towns with very little entertainment and scarce housing, therefore it becomes necessary to pay these people 25% to 35% more than places such as Lubbock, Abilene, Sweetwater, tec. Therefore, when your hospital must adjust its charges to conform to larger cities and pay more to operate. your hospital is working with a decided handicap-

Despite rumors to the contrary, your hospital is as low in its charges as any hospital in the area, lower in most cases. in spite of the fact that it is complete and is the most modern in an area including most of the Southwest.

A patient's hospital bill can be increased appreciably by the patient himself, if he feels that he requires a private room, these rooms are from \$2.50 to \$3.50 higher than the most common type of room available. The majority of the rooms or beds available in your hospital are rooms containing beds for two patients and with bath, the charge for which is \$9.50 per bed per day.

The following examples are estimates of specific types of cases. The room charges for semi-private (two-patient) rooms. with bath are used and the length of time that the operating room is used is based on average cases. The drugs are necessarily estimated, no two cases being exactly the same

The Board of Trustees invites you to compare these prices against any recent bills for equivalent service from any other hospital in this area. If there is any appreciable difference, they would be most happy to know about it. This hospital is the property of the taxpayers and every effort is being made to operate it in the best interest of the taxpayers. It is costing approximately \$6000.00 per month to operate at the present time and every effort is being made to get the hospital on a self supporting basis, income is necessarily the only factor that can accomplish that result. There is no desire, however, to make unfair charges for services in order to reach that end but rather to make just charges and to operate efficiently in order to keep overhead at a minimum. If you expect to need hospital services, come by and let us give you an estimate. We shall be pleased to have the opportunity.
