

Now an airplane loads with fertilizer at the factory and burries it in bulk to the fields, where it is aprayed on the ground from the air. No manual labor, no. bags, and better results.

Offsetting High Labor Costs

The rapid increase in self-service stores and coin machines is another illustration of how greater sales are handled with fewer cierks. This also reduces chances of loss to the stores from dishonest clerks who do not ring up sales properly.
