

'Gangbusters' July 4th Set in Post

Tomorrow may be one of the best July 4th celebrations in the history of Garza County...especially considering the excitement lined up at the airport and a full afternoon and evening of entertainment and fun at the city-county park.
"Bring your lawn chair, your appetite and leave your fireworks at home," Post Chamber of Commerce President Charles Wallace comments about the big day.
The airshow, which opens at the airport east of Post on U.S. Hwy 380 at 10 a.m., will include a formation

fly-over by U.S. Air Force T-38 aircraft from Reese AFB.
The Chamber of Commerce will also provide a concession stand with foot-long hot dogs and hamburgers for only \$1.50 each...along with cold drinks at only 50 cents.
The concession stand will close at noon and at the close of the airshow, the attention will switch to the park.
Entertainment, Bar-B-Q At the park, July 4th celebrants will discover a full-range of food booths and entertainment.
The Post EMT's will sell

cold drinks, the Church of God of Prophecy will have a booth with food and cold drinks;
The Post Rotary Club will offer helium-filled balloons again this year;
The Post Art Guild will offer ice cream, T-shirts and special "Tarzan and Jane" and "Fat Mermaid" photography opportunities;
The Holy Cross Catholic Church will conduct a bingo and the Holy Cross Youth will sell snow cones;
The varsity and junior varsity cheerleaders will also sell ice cream.
Other activities include the popular Antelope

Booster Club "Dunkin" booth and horseshoe pitch.
A Cabrito cook-off will be held at the VFW with judging set for 4 p.m. and a washer pitch, which starts at 1 p.m., will also be conducted at the VFW.
A July 4th golf tournament will start at 9 a.m..
The afternoon at the park will open with a flag-raising ceremony, officiated by members of VFW Post 6797.
The annual traditional Bar-B-Q plates will be available, starting at 6 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. at \$3 per plate.

Sheriff Rebuttals Commissioners

Garza County Sheriff Jim Pippin and chief deputy Bill Timms pointed out to me this week that Garza County Commissioners have overlooked the facts on the sheriff's department overtime report.
As reported in last week's issue of the Dispatch, the commissioners' called for a joint meeting with the city council to discuss the overtime situation.

Commissioners at the June 24 meeting also criticized the sheriff's department for continuing overtime after the hiring of a new deputy.
"What they overlooked was an important part of the letter we presented to each commissioner," Timms explained.
In the letter, dated May 28, 1985, Timms told commissioners:
...."Totaling with only 1

person extra in the period of one year we will pay counting time and 1/2 as days, 3,552 hours of overtime."
"With 2 officers we can cut out overtime period with exception of a major crime."
Timms also emphasized that he has worked two shifts recently as part of his contribution to keeping overtime to a minimum.
Sheriff Pippin had this

response to commissioner. Ted Aten's comments about the sheriff's duties:
"I would like to know where commissioner Aten thinks he gets the authority to set the hours the sheriff should work."
"I will work a double shift at the sheriff's office when and if I ever see commissioner Aten on a maintainer or doing any physical labor for the county precinct he is in charge of."

Justiceburg, Post Lakes Still in Court

A rehearing in the Travis County District Court in Austin on the permit to build the Post Lake will be heard July 19th at 3 p.m., according to the clerk of the court.
The rehearing is to consider the challenge by Billy Wayne Williams et al to the permit issued by the Texas Water Commission in the fall of 1982 to the White

River Municipal Water District to construct Post Lake.
Challengers contend in the court papers that there was "undue political influence" used during the TWC decision.
The TWC has denied the permit, then later reversed its decision, and extended the permit to build the lake.
That permit was approved by the TWC in

early 1983.
The current extension, which was granted last July, is also being challenged, but no date has been set for that hearing in the court.
The July 19th rehearing is to hear further evidence from both sides.
In other news about the proposed lakes, there has been no action in the same District Court concerning

the challenge by opponents to the Justiceburg Lake.
The clerk says that the case would "sit idle until either party asks for a hearing or trial."
So far, neither Lubbock nor opponents seem to be in any hurry to set a trial date.
The Post Dispatch will continue to update this story as information becomes available.

Addiction to Pharmaceutical Drugs

One of the most subtle kinds of chemical addictions is the addiction to pharmaceutical drugs.

Although taken in the beginning only for the purpose for which they were prescribed, many people find themselves "hooked" on drugs as deadly when abused as heroin or any street drug.

The reason most people take medication only when and as prescribed by the doctor, and others become

addicted is not known, therefore when taking any drug, prescribed or over-the-counter, persons need to be aware of the danger signs leading to addiction.

If you continue to take medication for pain, such as demerol, talwin, darvon and codine, long after the pain is gone, or if you are given tranquilizers for anxiety, valium, librium, miltown, tranxene, and find you cannot discontinue its use after the normal period for using the drug, it is important to consult with your doctor about the probable dependence on the drug.

Physical, and psychological dependence leads to tolerance, increasing amounts needed for the same effect.

Many people, when addicted switch doctors and pharmacies for different illnesses in order to obtain a quantity necessary to maintain their level of drug addiction.

Withdrawal from many drugs can be fatal if use is discontinued abruptly.

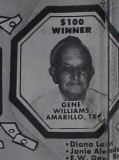

Animal Ordinance No. 349
Adopted January 10, 1983
Ordinance No. 349

AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO THE PRESENCE OF ANIMALS WITHIN THE CITY OF POST, INCLUDING FOWL, LIVESTOCK, DOGS & CATS, AND REPTILES, DEFINING THE TERMS, PROHIBITING THEIR RUNNING AT LARGE, REQUIRING SANITARY CONDITIONS, RETO RESIDENCES AND CERTAIN BUSINESSES, REQUIRING DOGS AND CATS TO BE REGISTERED AND VACCINATED ANNUALLY, PROVIDING A MEANS OF PROOF OF ANNUAL REGISTRATION AND VACCINATION, ESTABLISHING A REGISTRATION FEE OF \$5.00, REQUIRING REPORT OF ANIMAL ATTACKS, REQUIRING RESTRAINT OF ANIMALS, PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOUNDING, REDEMPTION AND DISPOSITION OF DOGS AND CATS, ESTABLISHING THE FEES FOR REDEMPTION, PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OR QUARANTINE OF ANIMALS, PROHIBITING INTERFERENCE WITH AN ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER, DEFINING VICIOUS DOGS, PROVIDING FOR A HEARING AND DISPOSITION OF A VICIOUS DOG AND FOR AN APPEAL OF THE FINDINGS OF THE HEARING OFFICER, PROHIBITING POISONOUS SNAKES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR ALL VIOLATIONS, REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the citizens of the City of Post are unduly exposed to animals running at large within the City and to resultant unsanitary conditions that threaten their health, and

WHEREAS, the threat of exposure to personal injury and rabies is very real under these conditions, Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF POST:

Article 1.

Section 5.1 FOWL TO BE ENCLOSED

It shall be unlawful for any person or legal entity to keep or harbor any hens, cocks, chickens, pigeons, or other fowls within the corporate limits of the City of Post, unless such hens, cocks, chickens, pigeons or other fowls shall be confined within an enclosure sufficient to prevent their escape.

Section 5.2 RUNNING AT LARGE

It shall be unlawful for any person or legal entity owning or harboring hens, cocks, chickens, pigeons, or other fowls to permit such hens, cocks, chickens, pigeons or fowls to be at large within the corporate limits of the City of Post.

Section 5.3 ENCLOSURES

Enclosures for fowl shall be kept sanitary and free of trash, debris, and accumulated feed and animal waste. The enclosure shall provide adequate heat, ventilation, shelter and facilities for fresh food and water, as well as an area adequate to accommodate the fowl and consistent with their requirements based on the size and peculiarities of the breed and species.

Section 5.4 FOWL WITHIN 300 FEET OF RESIDENCE

No fowl shall be permitted to become a nuisance.

The keeping of chickens, ducks, pigeons, turkeys and other poultry within 300 feet of any residence within the City of Post is hereby declared to be a nuisance and it shall hereafter be unlawful to keep and maintain chickens, ducks, pigeons, turkeys and other poultry within 300 feet of any residence of the City of Post.

Section 5.5 SAME-PENALTY

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the foregoing Section 5.4, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. Each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 5.6 - 5.9 RESERVED

Article 2. LIVESTOCK GENERALLY

Section 5.10 LIVESTOCK PROHIBITED

No livestock shall be permitted to become a nuisance.

The keeping by any person or legal entity of horses, cattle, swine, sheep, goats, mules, donkeys, and other livestock (singular or plural) within three hundred (300) feet of the residence of another person within the City of Post, Texas, is hereby declared to be a nuisance. It shall hereafter be unlawful to keep or maintain a horse, cow, pig, sheep, goat, mule, donkey or other livestock (whether singular or plural in number) within three hundred (300) feet of the residence of a person not the owner of said animal, subject to the following exceptions:

A. Livestock grazing on open pasture land which extends unfenced for more than two hundred (200) yards beyond the corporate limits of the City of Post;

B. Livestock grazing on fenced tracts of land within or extending beyond the corporate limits of the City of Post of not less than one acre so long as concentrations of livestock do not exceed five per acres.

Section 5.11 LIVESTOCK WITHIN 300 FEET OF HOSPITAL PROHIBITED

That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor horses, cattle, hogs and other livestock within 300 feet of any hospital, school, church, or residence within the City of Post, Texas.

Section 5.12 SAME-EXCEPTIONS

This section shall not be construed to prohibit any person engaged in operating any package house, slaughter house, or cold storage plant from keeping livestock for a temporary period of time, not to exceed seventy-two (72) hours, and providing that

said person otherwise complies with the general sanitary requirements.

Section 5.13 LIVESTOCK AT LARGE PROHIBITED

That it shall be unlawful for any horses, mules, cattle, sheep, swine or goats to run at large within the corporate limits of the City of Post.

Section 5.14 SAME-PENALTY

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Section or shall fail to comply therewith, or with anyone of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; that each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 5.15 SAME-IMPOUNDING

If any stock forbidden to run at large under the provision of this ordinance shall be at large any law enforcement official shall impound such stock in the public pound, and adhere to the law of the State of Texas applicable to impounding, sale and redemption.

Section 5.16 - 5.25 RESERVED

ARTICLE 3. DOGS AND CATS

Section 5.26 DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this article the following terms mean:

Animal - dog or cat

Animal Control Authority - person or persons designated to enforce this ordinance

Animal Shelter - facility designated or recognized by the City of Post for the purpose of impounding and caring for animals

At large - when an animal is off the property of the owner and not under restraint, confined within an automobile or located within ten feet of its owner and obedient to said owner's voice commands

Humane Manner - care of an animal to include, but not be limited to, adequate heat, ventilation, sanitary shelter, wholesome food and water consistent with the normal requirements and feeding habits of the animal's size, species and breed;

Nuisance - an animal that: damages, soils, defiles, or defecates on private property other than the owner's, or in public walks and recreation areas unless such waste is immediately removed and properly disposed of by the owner; causes a disturbance by noisemaking; chases vehicles; or molests, attacks or interferes with persons or domestic animals on private property

Owner - person having the right of property or custody of an animal or who keeps or harbors an animal, or knowingly permits an animal to remain on or about any premises occupied by that person

Registration Authority - Agency or department of the City of Post or any designated representative thereof charged with administering the issuance of registration under provisions of this ordinance.

Restraint - a leash or lead of sufficient strength to control an animal within 10 feet of the owner or owner's property.

Vicious Animal - 1. Any animal that shall bite, scratch or otherwise attack any person or other animal (of any type) without provocation, while the person so attacked was not trespassing on the property of the owner or person having custody or control of such animal and was not engaged in an assault upon either the owner or person having custody or control of such animal, or upon any member of the immediate family of the owner, or

2. Any animal found to demonstrate fierce propensities in relation to persons, property or animals.

Section 5.27 REGISTRATION AND RABIES VACCINATION

No person shall own, keep or harbor any animal over four months of age within the City of Post unless such animal has been vaccinated against rabies and registered with the City of Post and wears a collar or harness with proof of said vaccination and registration securely attached to the animal. It shall be unlawful to affix a tag indicating the adherence to such requirements unless the animal has been so vaccinated and identified.

Section 5.28 ANNUAL VACCINATION

All animals shall be vaccinated against rabies yearly by a licensed veterinarian in accordance with the latest "Compendium of Animal Rabies Vaccines and Recommendations for Immunization" published by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians;

A certificate of vaccination shall be issued to the owner of each animal vaccinated on a form recommended by the Compendium. Each owner shall also receive a durable vaccination tag, separately numbered, indicating the year it was issued, and the attending Veterinarian-Clinic.

Section 5.29 REGISTRATION

Registration must be made by the owner within ten days after the animal attains four months of age. Registration will be free of charge if completed at time of vaccination with a resident of Garza County licensed Veterinarian. Animals vaccinated outside of Garza County will be registered by the City after owner provides proof of current rabies vaccination and pays a \$5.00 registration fee. Vaccination and registration shall be required annually with expiration on December 31 of each year. Vaccination and registration may be accomplished within sixty days prior to the expiration date. New residents must accomplish vaccination and registration within ten days of establishing residence.

Upon completion of registration, the participating veterinarian or the City of Post shall issue a durable registration tag, separately numbered, indicating the year of issuance, city, county and state. Tags are not

transferrable and should be worn at all times to aid animal control personnel in identifying animals not in compliance. The City of Post and Garza County resident licensed veterinarians shall maintain a record of all registrations issued and such records shall be made available to the animal control authorities, as well as to the general public.

Section 5.30 REPORT OF ATTACKS

It shall be unlawful for any person having knowledge of any animal attacking or biting any person or the knowledge of the whereabouts of an animal suspected to have symptoms of rabies, to fail to report the facts forthwith to the Animal Control Officers, the local law enforcement officers, or the City Manager. The report shall state the name and address of the person bitten, the time and place of the incident and the name and address of the reporter.

Section 5.31 OWNER RESPONSIBILITY

All animals shall be kept under restraint or subject and responsive to voice commands when not on the owner's property.

Every vicious animal, as determined by the animal control officers, shall be confined by its owner within a secure enclosure and shall be appropriately muzzled or caged when off the premises of the owner.

No animal shall be allowed to cause a nuisance. The owner of every animal shall be held responsible for any behaviour of their animal under the provisions of this ordinance.

Failure to comply with the provisions of this section shall be a misdemeanor.

Section 5.32 IMPOUNDMENT

Any animal found at large within the corporate city limits of the City of Post shall be impounded by the animal control authority, any local law enforcement officer or any person acting under the direction of the City Manager, in a city designated animal shelter. Animals tagged pursuant to Section 5.27 and not claimed and redeemed by their owners within a period of six full working days in which the shelter is open to the public shall become the property of the City of Post and subject to humane destruction or sale. Responsibility for redeeming a pet or for applying for ownership of an animal that has or may become the property of the City of Post, remains solely with the citizen and not with the City of Post nor with the Animal Control Authority. Animals not tagged shall be subject to humane destruction if not claimed and redeemed within seventy-two (72) hours.

Any person, at their own risk, may take up and deliver to the public pound any animal which the Animal Control Officer is by the provisions of this article required to impound. Any animal found trespassing or at large on any private property, other than of the owner of the animal, may be taken up by any person and delivered to the pound keeper. Every animal impounded pursuant to this section shall be held and disposed of as though such animal had been impounded by the Animal Control Officer.

When an animal is found at large and its ownership is verified by the Animal Control Authority, the authority may exercise the option of serving the owner with a notice of violation in lieu of impounding the animal.

In the event that the animal control authority finds animals to be suffering, it shall forthwith remove or cause to have removed, any such animals to a safe place for care at the owner's expense or to euthanize them when necessary to prevent further suffering. Return to the owner may be withheld until the owner has made full restitution for all expenses incurred and removed the causes or conditions causing the suffering.

Disposal of an animal by any method specified herein shall not relieve the owner of liability for violations of any accrued charges.

Section 5.33 REDEMPTION-DISPOSITION

Animals impounded may be redeemed by the owner upon payment of an impoundment fee of \$10.00 plus \$3.00 per day or part of any day, provided that if any animal has been previously impounded, the impoundment fee shall be \$15.00 and the per diem fees will remain \$3.00. Payment of impoundment fees is not considered in lieu of any fine, penalty, vaccination or registration fees.

Animals confined for rabies quarantine, evidence or other purpose may be redeemed by the owner thereof upon payment of the actual confinement charges of a licensed veterinarian when utilized by the City, plus other actual expenses incurred by personnel or by the City.

The Animal Control Office shall maintain all records necessary to show in detail the disposition of all dogs impounded.

No animal required to be registered or vaccinated under this ordinance may be redeemed until provisions for such registration have been fulfilled.

Section 5.34 SALE

At any time after the expiration period for redemption of impounded animals, the City of Post may sell for cash, or place any animal in suitable homes or places without further notice of any kind. Sale may be private or public. All fees and proceeds of sale collected shall be recorded and delivered to the General Fund of the City.

Section 5.35 QUARANTINE

Whenever it is shown that any animal has bitten or scratched any person, no owner or person having custody of or possession thereof, upon order of the Animal Control Officer, any Police Officer or the Health Officer, shall fail, refuse or neglect to take or permit to be promptly taken, such animal to a veterinarian to be held in quarantine by the veterinarian for a period of fourteen (14) days. No dog or animal shall be released from quarantine without the authorization of the veterinarian in charge. The total cost of confinement for the

fourteen (14) day period shall be borne by the owner.

Section 5.36 INTERFERENCE

It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to interfere with, hinder, or molest any agent of the animal control authority in the performance of any duty as herein provided.

Section 5.37 PENALTY FOR VIOLATION

Except as otherwise specified, a person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$20.00 nor more than \$200.00.

Sections 5.38 - 5.39 RESERVED

ARTICLE 4. VICIOUS DOGS

Section 5.40 HEARING

When the Animal Control Officer is of the opinion that an animal is vicious, as such phrase is herein defined, or when the Health Officer receives information by affidavit of any person that a dog has demonstrated fierce or dangerous propensities within the corporate limits of the City of Post as a time when the person so attacked was not trespassing upon the property of the owner or person having custody or control of such dog, and was not provoking or testing such dog, the Health Officer shall make known to the Judge of the Corporation Court who shall thereupon direct that a hearing be held as hereinafter provided.

If the identity of or address of the owner or person having custody, or control of such dog can be determined with a reasonably diligent search such person shall first be notified of the pendency of such hearing and summoned to appear with five (5) days before the Judge of the Corporation Court of the City of Post, said Judge being hereby vested with jurisdiction for the purposes of hearing such cases. Upon such hearing the said Judge shall determine whether the dog is vicious as herein defined. If it is determined that the dog is vicious, the said Judge is hereby authorized and directed at his discretion either to order that the dog be kept muzzled, or that the dog be kept within a sufficient enclosure, or that the dog be humanely destroyed as a public nuisance.

Section 5.41 DEFINITION

For the purposes of this article a vicious dog is hereby defined as:

- (1) Any dog that shall bite, scratch or otherwise attack any person or other animal without provocation, while the person so attacked was not trespassing on the property of the owner or person having custody or control of such dog and was not engaged in an assault upon either the owner or person having custody or control of such dog, or upon any member of the immediate family or,
- (2) Any dog that has otherwise demonstrated fierce or dangerous propensities.

Section 5.42 IMPOUNDING

If it is the opinion of the said Judge that the public health and safety requires such action, he is hereby further empowered to order the immediate impounding and continued restraint of any dog for which a hearing has been ordered under the above provisions, pending a determination of its nature in such hearing.

Section 5.43 IMPENDING ENFORCEMENT

Any owner or person having custody or control of such dog who shall attempt to impede the enforcement of this Division by refusing to abide by the order of the Judge as to proper restrictions on such dog, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 5.44 APPEAL

A person may appeal the decision of the Judge to the next meeting of the City Commission. The animal shall remain in the control of the Animal Control Officer pending disposition.

Sections 5.45 - 5.49 RESERVED

ARTICLE 5 REPTILES

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep or harbor within the corporate limits of the City of Post, any poisonous reptile.

ARTICLE 6 MISCELLANEOUS

Section 5.50 REPEALER

All other ordinances of the City of Post which are in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 5.51 SEVERABILITY

If any Article, Section, Sentence, Phrase or portion of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, such part shall be deemed severable and the invalidity thereof shall not affect the remaining parts of this Ordinance.

Section 5.52 EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and required publication. The danger to the public due to unrestricted animals constitute this an emergency measure.

Section 5.53 PENALTY

If any person shall be convicted of an offense under the terms of this Ordinance a fine shall be assessed of not more than \$200.00.

The club discussed giving pictures to a nursing home and where to go next club day on a trip to Lubbock.

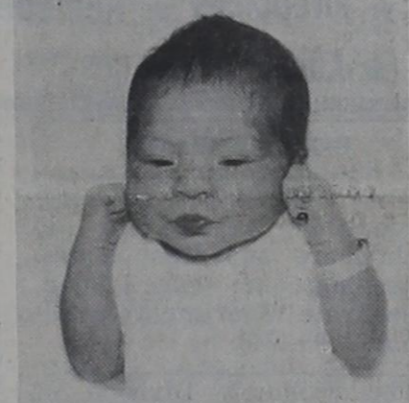
It was voted to tour the Ranch and Heritage Center

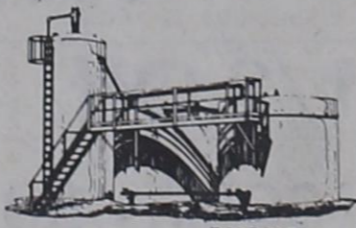



These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.


