Council Slaps Penalty on Contractor

The construction firm of Murray and Givens of Lubbock and the engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock are in "the dog house" with the Post City Council.

At its regular meeting Monday night, the council slapped a penalty clause on the contractor for failure to live up to the contractual agreements on the swimming pool refurbishing and voted to withhold a \$10,000 payment to the engineering firm until an explanation could be provided for the delays in several projects.

In addition to the problems with the swimming pool, the council is upset with the engineering firm for delays in the street and drainage improvement in East Post.

Responding to an impassioned statement by park

board member Zoe Kirkpatrick, the council reviewed the contract and instructed city manager Bill Pool to begin compiling information for deducting financial loss.

"I am here on behalf of all the children in Post who have been cheated out of one-third of their summer swimming," Mrs Kirkpatrick stated.

"It is a shame that this was allowed to happen," she added.

Among her other comments, Mrs Kirkpatrick told the council that Last Friday the contractor told her they would be in Post Monday to finish up... "they haven't showed up yet," she complained.

Other problems at the pool include a vaccum system that is not working, although park board

Commissioners, Council Approve Hiring New Deputy

The Garza County Commissioners Court and the Post City Council, meeting in joint session Monday morning, voted to approve the hiring of one more deputy for the Sheriff's Department, with the stipulation that no overtime be incurred by that department.

A stimulated discussion preceded the vote, with exchanges bouncing between commissioners Ted Aten and Herb Walls and Sheriff Jim Pippin and his chief deputy Bill Timms.

Walls emphasized his strong opposition to paying any overtime at all, while Timms pointed out that overtime is only required during vacation periods.

Aten pointedly asked the sheriff if the additional deputy would eliminate overtime, and the sheriff replied that he thought it would.

The commissioners and council members also agreed that the pay would remain the same, with deputies to receive the

same pay for 10 hours per week less work.

"We will be reviewing this situation during our budget hearings," Aten emphasized.

Deputies had been paid for a 50 hour work week.

The recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling concerning overtime pay for government employees brought the overtime question to the attention of the county and city.

In other action, commissioners heard from various civic organizations for budget requests, authorized payment of bills and reviewed the estimated tax evaluations.

County treasurer Voda Gradine told commissioners that the most recent tax evaluation estimates are \$43 million over last year.

Attending the meeting were County Judge Giles Dalby, commissioners Walls, Aten, Tommy Young and T.D. Craft along with city council members Maxine Earl, Larry Mills, Charles Wallace and Lewis Holly and city manager Bill Pool.

Funeral services for Ricky Dean Mullinix, 28, of Littlefield, formerly of Post, who was killed in an oilfield accident at 12:30 Monday afternoon, July 1, near Levelland when he fell from an oil rig, were conducted at 4 p.m. Wednesday afternoon, July 3rd in the Parkview Baptist Church.

The accident occurred at the Norton Drilling Company site about nine miles south and two miles east of Levelland.

He was atop a rig and for undetermined reasons fell 90 feet to the platform.

He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Dee Turner.

The accident is being investigated by the Hockley County Sheriff's Department. Officiating the services was Rev Clarence Tedder, Pastor of Parkview Baptist Church.

Burial was in Littlefield Memorial Park under the direction of Hammons Funeral Home.

Mullinix was born May 19, 1957 in Littlefield. He was an Air Force veteran.

He was a member of Parkview Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife Mary (Cheshire), 2 children Dillon and Amber of the home, his parents Mr and Mrs Raymon Mullinix; two brothers, Ray Jr. and Roger Mullinix; a sister Renay Mullinix; and his grandparents Mr and Mrs N.T. Millican all of Littlefield.

chairman Jack Alexander said he thinks this will be solved soon.

Pool was directed to arrange a called meeting with the contractor, representatives of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper and the council to discuss the various problems.

Alexander also requested again that the city appoint an employee to be responsible year round for the swimming pool maintenance, security and safety as well as other park properties.

In other action, the council heard a citizen's complaint from W.C. Sapp, who is an unofficial spokesman for a neighborhood group in East Post.

Sapp told the council that one land owner has several lots with hogs and cattle and is using raw animal wastes for feed.

"It is an absolute mess," Sapp tried to describe the neighborhood conditions.

"Those of us on Oak and Pine who are trying to make a decent place to live can't get it done with people like these who will not do their part," Sapp added.

Council member Lewis Holly supported Sapp's complaint with the observation that the owner of the animals, Hulen Hoyle, had been asked repeatedly since last January to do something about the situation.

Holly said that the animals, who are allowed to run loose in the neighborhood, are fed raw trappings from beef guts and chicken parts and that the odor in the neighborhood is nauseating.

No action was taken on the complaint, although Mayor Pro Tem Maxine Earl pointed out that the recently published ordinance on animal control specifically forbids such activity.

In other action, the council heard requests for budget items from the park board, EMS representative John Redman, Caprock Cultural Association's JoAnn Mock and Post Chamber of Commerce manager Lewis Earl.

A "blind corner" ordinance got its first reading, and will be considered again in August. The ordinance is designed to protect citizens and the city at intersections where visibility is poor.

There are approximately 114 such intersections in Post.

Attending the meeting Monday were Mayor Pro Tem Earl, council members Holly, Charles Wallace, Larry Mills, city manager Pool, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Harvey Morton.

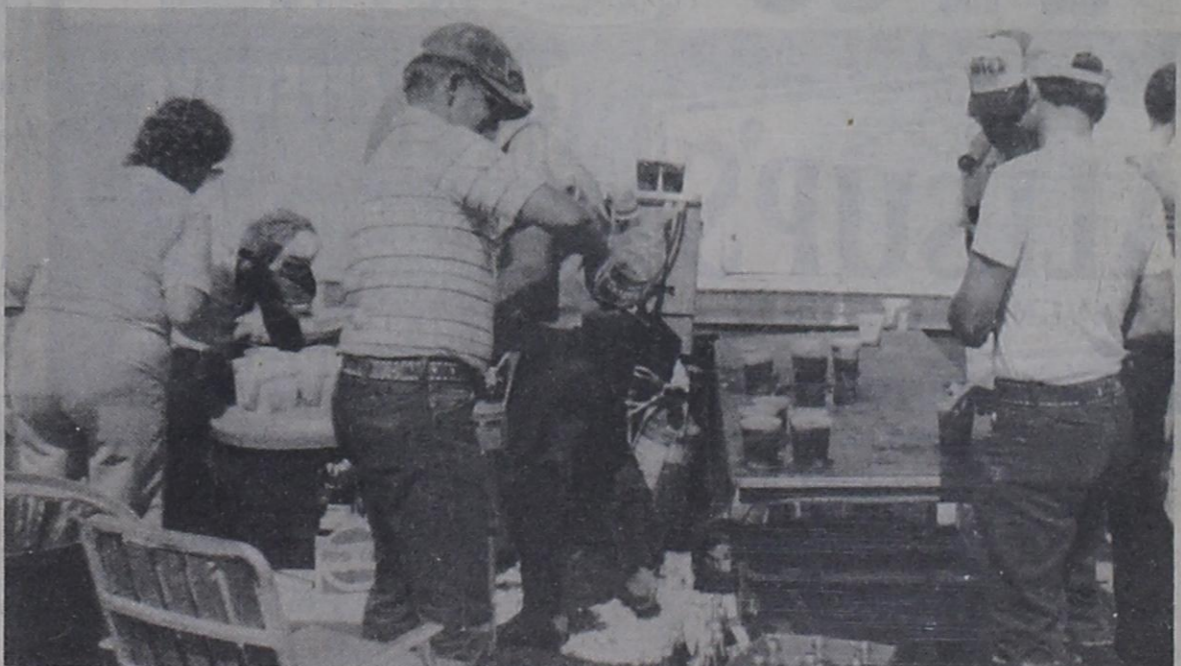

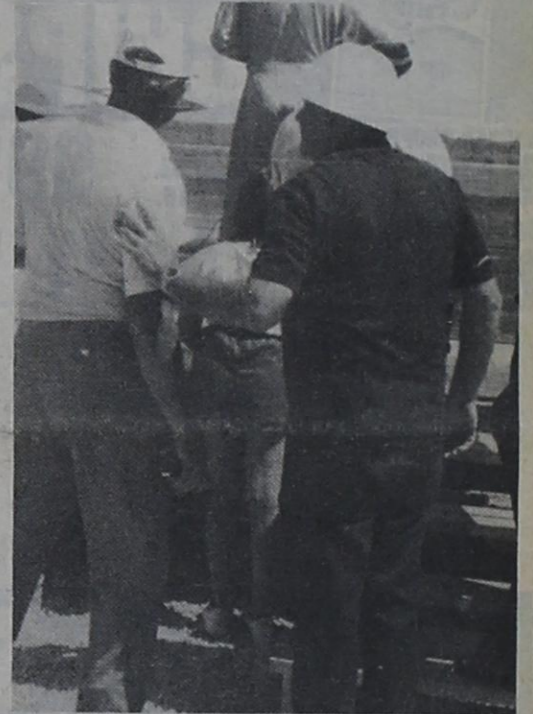

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Aspirin and alcohol taken together increase the possibility of irritation of the stomach lining and small intestine.

Alcohol when taken with insulin or other antidiabetic drugs may cause increase in the low blood sugar level.

It is important to consult your physician or pharmacist if you are unsure about the advisability of drinking alcohol in combination with other drugs being taken.

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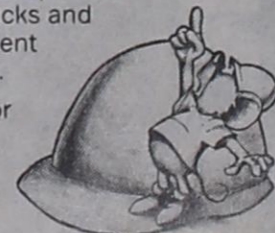
