## Bob, Monk Palmer Honored as Outstanding Citizens

Bob and Monk Palmer were named as Outstanding Citizens of Post for 1984 during last Friday evening's annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The brothers were recognized for their consistent personal contributions to a wide variety of community events and organizations.

Last year's Outstanding Citizen, Mayor Giles McCrary, announced the selection, explaining the numerous activities that the Palmers have helped in making Post a better place to live.

This is the first time that two people have shared jointly in the selection, but as Mayor McCrary explained, "this is truly a team and together this year's honored citizens are most deserving of the recognition."

Outgoing Chamber of Commerce president Bryan Williams III also presented a special award to Gerry Burton of the Lubbock

Avalanche Journal, citing her for the positive publicity she has provided to Post through the years.

Judge Giles Dalby told the approximately 250 people attending the banquet that the Post Economic Development Corp. is working on a variety of industrial prospects, but at this time there are no commitments from any one industry.

"Most who come to look are surprised at the size of the facility," Judge Dalby explained.

Following his report on the PEDC, Judge Dalby introduced the featured speaker for the evening, former U.S. Congressman Kent Hance of Lubbock.

Hance praised the spirit of Post and its determination to recover from the loss of the Burlington plant and offered a few ideas on the current political discussions in Washington.

"The budget deficit has to be cut and defense cuts will

have to be included," Hance said.

He also said that the state of depression in agriculture is a frustrating problem, mainly due to the lack of understanding by non-agricultural congressmen.

"We just do not have the votes from farm areas," he added.

Hance also said he is opposed to the current tax reform proposal by President Reagan because it would be a serious blow to the petroleum industry.

Chamber of Commerce president Charles Wallace introduced new directors Victor Ashley and Dick Tanner. New director Jay Pollard was unable to attend the banquet.

Other directors are Patty Kirkpatrick, Don Glidewell, Bill Terpening, Mike Barber and Jack King.

## High Speed Chase Ends in Post

What started out as a possible ticket for failure to dim headlights, turned into a two-county high speed chase, sometimes in excess of 100 mph plus.

It all began in Lubbock last Saturday morning at approximately 1 a. m. when a Lubbock DPS unit attempted to stop a late model Monte Carlo for failure to dim headlights.

The suspect vehicle did not stop, but continued on US Hwy 84 towards Slaton with the DPS unit in pursuit.

The vehicle attempted to run the DPS unit off the highway but failed continuing East on Hwy. 84.

When the DPS patrol car attempted to stop him again, the suspect swerved into the unit, causing him to wreck the DPS unit.

Local DPS patrolman, Louis Cardinal was listening to the activity on his radio and when he heard Lubbock DPS calling their unit 5317 with no answer, Cardinal assumed that the patrolman had lost the vehicle or had him stopped.

But what he didn't know was the vehicle involved in the chase was still headed for Slaton and did go through Slaton, running a road block.

Cardinal was then approximately three miles Northwest of Post headed towards Slaton.

Continuing on towards Slaton for six or seven more miles, he turned back towards Post when he was advised by Lubbock DPS that Slaton Police were now in pursuit of this suspect vehicle heading towards Post at a high rate of speed.

Cardinal turned back around Northwest and made visual contact with the vehicle.

After crossing the median, Cardinal's headlights came in contact with the vehicle, he turned on his spotlight and red and blue grill lights and clocked the vehicle at 98 MPH.

After the suspect vehicle passed Cardinal, failing to stop, Cardinal waited for the Slaton PD unit to pass and he turned in pursuit of the Monta Carlo.

After advising Lubbock DPS he was in pursuit and

confirming the license number given, Lubbock advised Cardinal to stop the vehicle by any means possible.

Cardinal pulled along side the suspect and when he did, the vehicle attempted to ram the DPS unit Cardinal was driving, but Cardinal was able to avoid collision and fell in behind the vehicle and out of the way.

Following the attempted collision, Cardinal notified Lubbock DPS that the driver of the vehicle had tried to ram him, and asked permission to fire on the vehicle and permission was given to do so.

While still attempting to stop the vehicle, Cardinal fired nine rounds of ammunition at the vehicle with five confirmed hits.

When the caravan, (now including the Slaton Police Department, Post units, Marc Gray and J. W. Jolly) entered the Post City Limits, Cardinal advised the subject was slowing down before entering the curve coming into Post.

When the suspect did slow down, Cardinal forced the vehicle onto the shoulder of the road in front of C & C Well Service. After stopping the suspect, he attempted to start his vehicle again.

After being arrested and taken to the Garza County Jail where a test was given on alcohol content, the suspect, Andres (Andy) Castro, 24, of Lubbock, was charged with felony DWI and two counts of attempted capital murder against police officers.

Castro was released to the Lubbock DPS and remains in Lubbock County Jail where bond has been denied.

**Dear Editor**

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal ought to be proud of itself. It has proven to the people of Lubbock and surrounding areas that indeed this newspaper (LAJ) is truly biased and not really interested in Justice or Freedom of anything, certainly not speech or press, but rather political power and money.

The particular issue I wish to use for an example is the Justiceburg Reservoir. With the help of the Avalanche-Journal the people of Lubbock are looking at the very real possibility of paying well over 200 million dollars for water THEY WILL NOT BE receiving or using.

However, in addition to paying for a reservoir that will in fact belong to the BRA (Brazos River Authority), the people of Lubbock will also be required to reimburse the BRA for any run-off into Possum Kingdom. That's not all. According to the contract between Lubbock and the BRA in Section 10 labeled "Unconditional Promise," "City (Lubbock) shall make payments to Authority at such times as shall enable authority, (Brazos River Authority) to pay all Capital Costs (principle payments and interest on bonds plus costs incident to servicing of bonds plus such deposits into reserve funds and other funds as may be required by any Resolution meaning Resolution of the Board of Directors providing for the issuance of Bonds) from the money thus paid. The payments agreed to be made in the preceding sentence shall be made EVEN IN THE EVENT OF A TOTAL FAILURE OF THE WATER SUPPLY AGREED TO BE MADE AVAILABLE UNDER THIS CONTRACT."

That means folks Lubbock is unconditionally responsible for all aspects of the financial burden of the Justiceburg Reservoir. Let me also quote from a

letter written March 5, 1982. This letter was accepted as summary reply memorandum, by the Hearings Examiner of the Texas Water Commission, to establish the attitude of the City of Lubbock has about its people and surrounding areas. "The additional studies (geological studies) proposed by these witnesses (from Camp, Dresser and McKee) all involved extensive original investigation which duplicates much of the investigation already performed by the Applicant.

While the opponents of the project are entitled to require the City to put on evidence demonstrating that all applicable statutory requirements have been satisfied, and further entitled to question and rebut such evidence, the Protestant's (landowners) participation in this regard must be kept in perspective. The Protestants are simply property owners. They have no right to second-guess the City's management decisions regarding its long-range water supply, nor do they have a right to delay the City's application for months or years while they collect additional data to satisfy themselves that the City's studies are correct."

Considering that Lubbock has made studies of other more viable water sources, but refuses to make those studies available to the public, I think the landowners in question have every right to second-guess the City's decisions.

I wonder how many people know Freese and Nichols not only did the engineering and feasibility study for Lake Thomas, and Stacy Dam as well as the Justiceburg Reservoir. How many people are aware Freese and Nichols are also the pending builders and planners for the Justiceburg (Continued on P5)

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
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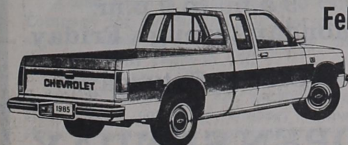
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## McClellan, Wuensche Wed in Double Ring Ceremony

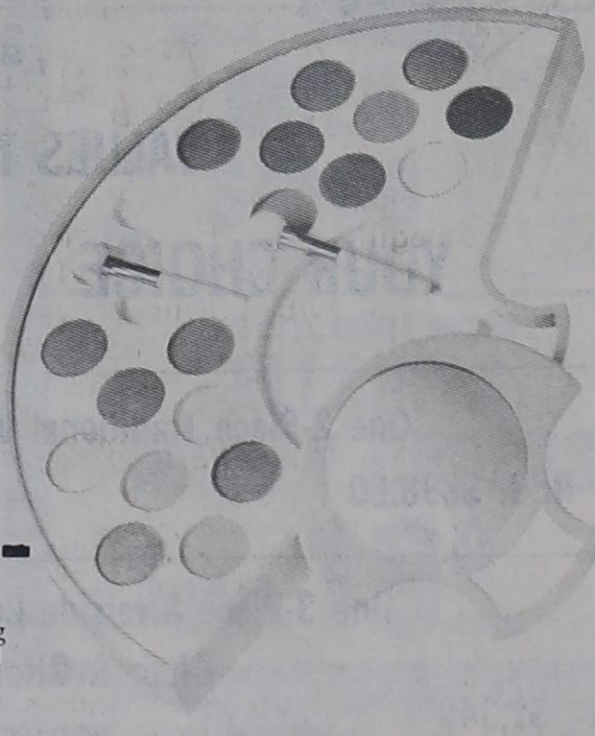

L.E. (Sonny) Nance, a native of Garza County, was honored at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth Jan. 28, 1985 at the L.E. "Sonny" Nance Register of Merit Hereford Show.

Nance was a founding co-chairman of the commercial heifer show at Fort Worth, the only one in Texas.

In 1955, when he joined D.C. Hall in a registered Hereford herd, he aimed for larger framed animals.

With his foundation of HH Real Onward 203, he built a herd and later brought into the herd the blood lines of Britisher, D4, and Line One. By crossing the Onward and Britisher lines, Nance

developed the currently popular Yellow Design line.

Until recent years, his herd included 500 registered Hereford cows and another 500-600 bulls and calves.

He has been one of Texas' largest registered operators. Nance and Hall-Nance breeding Herefords have been shipped to 39 states and several foreign countries, including a heifer that produced the first registered Hereford calf in San Salvador.

Other foreign market placements include Spain, Portugal, Mexico, South Africa and the Iron Curtain country of Hungary.

He has served as president of the Texas Hereford Association and the Fort Worth Hereford Club.

He is secretary for the Stock Show and a director of the TSCRA and the Texas Livestock Marketing Association.

Nance is a director of the InterFirst Bank-Gateway in Fort Worth, a member of the official board and lay leader at Haslet United Methodist Church, a past director of Ridgelea Country Club and a past president of the Northwest Independent School District.

He still has ranching interests in Garza County.

Nance graduated from Post High School and Texas Tech University and is the son of Mrs Elton Nance of Post.

Although seat belts are available and have been conclusively proven to reduce fatalities, relatively few people use them.

About 98 percent of the people who were killed in automobile accidents in Texas during 1983 had seat belts in the car, but did not use them.

It's estimated that if all

Texans had worn seat belts, 1,300 drivers and passengers would not have died in 1983.

**Storing Food in Open Cans**  
Acid foods should not be stored in cans after opening.

This includes foods like tomato juice, fruits and fruit juices and drinks.

Storage in open cans increases iron accumulation.

Lead may also be picked up from soldered cans that have been opened, and this lead intake is not healthy.

Metallic flavors also result from acid foods left in opened cans.

If you're not immediately going to eat the food left in cans, empty the contents into clean glass or plastic containers.

Training sessions are being offered to leaders from across the US.

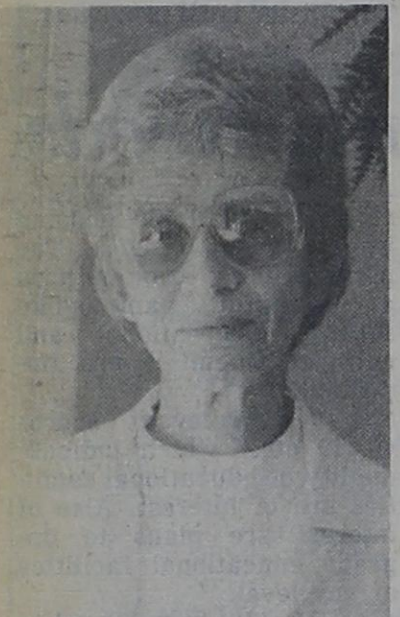
Topics include puppetry, the arts, outdoor gourmet cooking, and leader support workshops. Leaders may choose their topic based on openings.

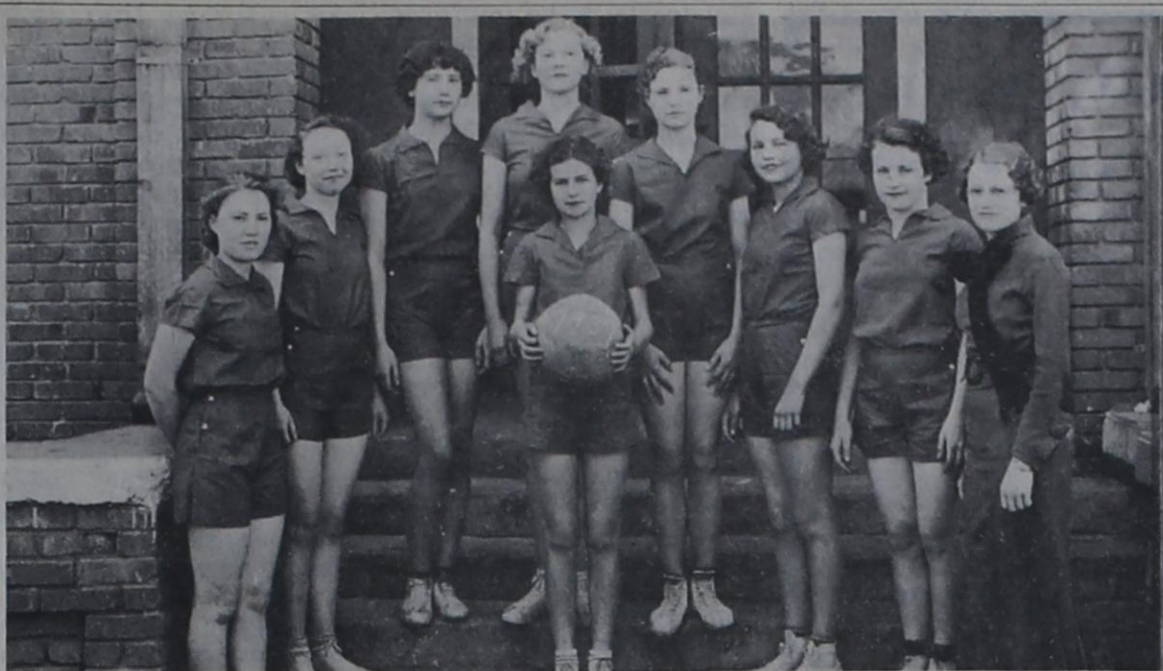

## Dangers of Heroin . . . .

Heroin is an opiate narcotic drug made from morphine.

It has an effect similar to morphine, but is much more poisonous and much more habit forming.

Other drugs in the opiate group include opium, codeine, meperidine and pargoric.

Opiates, such as meperidine (Demerol) are synthesized or manufactured.

Heroin, (junk, smack) accounts for 90 percent of the opiate abuse in the United States.

Heroin can be white or brownish powder which is usually dissolved in water and then injected.

Most street preparations of heroin are diluted, or "cut", with other substances such as sugar or quinine.

Heroin tends to relax the user. When injected, the user feels an immediate "rush."

Other initial and unpleasant effects include restlessness, nausea and vomiting.

The user may go "on the nod," going back and forth from feeling alert to drowsy.

With very large doses, the user cannot be awakened, pupils become smaller, and the skin becomes cold, moist and bluish in color. Breathing slows down and death may occur.

When a person becomes dependent on heroin, finding and using the drug often becomes the main focus in life.

As more and more of the drug is used over time, larger amounts are needed to get the same affects. This is called tolerance.

Opiate users may develop infections of the heart lining and valves, skin abscesses and congested lungs.

Infections from unsterile solutions, syringes and needles can cause illnesses such as liver disease,

tetanus and serum hepatitis.

When a user stops taking the drug, withdrawal usually begins within four to six hours after the last dose.

Withdrawal symptoms include uneasiness, diarrhea, abdominal cramps, chills, sweating, nausea and runny nose and eyes.

The intensity of these symptoms depends on how much was taken how often and for how long.

Withdrawal symptoms for most users are stronger approximately 24-72 hours after they begin and subside within 7-10 days.

Sometimes symptoms such as sleeplessness and drug craving can last for months.

The four basic approaches to drug abuse treatment are:

1. Detoxification (supervised withdrawal from drug dependence, either with or without medication) in a hospital or outpatient setting.
2. Therapeutic communities where patients live in a highly structured drug-free environment and are encouraged to help themselves.
3. Outpatient drug-free programs which emphasize various forms of counseling as the main treatment.
4. Methadone maintenance by using methadone as a substitute for heroin on a daily basis to help people lead productive lives while still in treatment.

Patients in methadone maintenance programs also receive counseling, vocational training and education to help them reach the ultimate goal of a drug-free normal life.

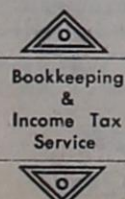

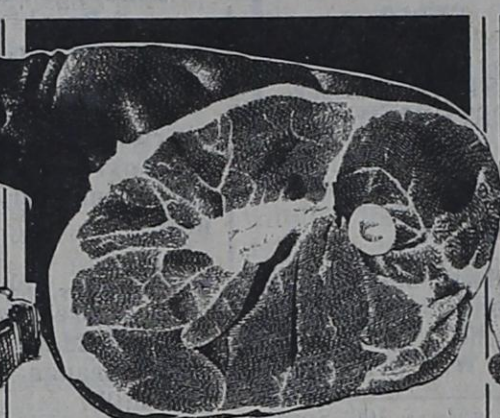
