Recently there have been citizens reading about the PEDC and confusing it as either the city of Post or an arm of the city of Post.

City council member Weaver McKamie called me late last week to explain that about the property being managed by the PEDC, thinking that it was the city

"For some reason there are people who think that PEDC is a part of the city," McKamie explained, "and somehow we need to get people to realize that the PEDC is not an official part

of the city government." I was surprised that there would be any confusion

and purposes of this group. Let's restate it one more time...the Post Economic Development Corporation is an organization established by private individuals, open to the public, designed to promote industrial expansion and economic development for Post.

And it also reminded me of the inadequate civil defense alert in our city.

One lone siren at the

courthouse is supposed to sound the alarm to warn citizens of an approaching tornado. That's great if you happen to live downwind from the

siren...or within a few blocks of the courthouse. It is obviously not strong

enough to alert the whole

Two years ago, former city manager Rebecca King introduced a proposed plan defense system...which has received little or no attention from the city council. During budget hearings

last summer, I requested at a city council meeting, as a citizen, that the proposed budget include the installation of sirens to be placed at strategic spots throughout the city. There is some money in

the current budget for civil defense, but as far as I've been able to determine, there still is no definite plan for where and how many sirens to install.

Surely there is no higher priority for the citizens of a town in this part of Texas than to have adequate warning during the dange-

Just ask the people in Matador.

And really, there is no excuse for the delay here.

I urge, on behalf of all Post citizens, that the city council take immediate action to install sirens in strategic locations throughout the city so that every resident will be able to hear the warning...before it's too late.

City Election

With Ault's resignation, there will be three council positions on the ballot in the April 6 election.

One position will be to fill the unexpired term of Ault, the other two will be for two, two-year terms.

A question about the voter registration list was raised by McKamie and Earl.

Morton explained that according to the state election code, the current voter registration list provided by County Tax Assessor Ruth Reno is not a proper list for city elections.

City Manager Bill Pool told the council that Reno would not provide a city-only voter registration list and that city employees would have to take the county-wide voter list and "line-out" voters who do not live in the city limits.

"The physical location of a voter's residence is required on the voter registration list," Morton emphasized. "It looks like we are going

to have another illegal election," McKamie commented.

"The Texas Secretary of State is responsible for enforcing the state election law," Morton added.

He quoted from Article 5 of the state statutes, which outlined the duties of the County Tax Assessor for preparing voter registration

One of the problems with the voter list is the uncoordinated voting precincts in the city and county.

There is only one voting precinct in Post, yet the

same voters are in as many as eight county voting precincts.

"What needs to happen", Morton explained, "is for the county voting precincts to include probably four voting precincts strictly in the city

The fourth quarter 1984 gross sales in Garza County showed a 4.9 percent increase over the same period in 1983, according to a recent announcement by State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The comptroller showed 122 outlets in Garza County reporting sales with a total of \$9,773,999, compared to outlets. \$9,313,082 in the fourth

quarter of 1983.

The amount subject to tax was \$3,981,125.

Lynn County showed a total of \$12,509,772 compared to \$13,501,134 with 107 reporting outlets.

Alcoholism Trap

By Glenda Baker It is said that the alcoholic is not responsible for his disease, but is responsible

for his recovery. When trapped in the progression of alcoholism, the alcoholic and his or her family find themselves caught up in helplessness and hopelessness until they seek help in understanding the disease and treatment for the illness.

Many times the alcoholic cries out silently for help while continuing to sink deeper into alcoholism.

The following is a reprint of a letter, author unknown, describing an alcoholic seeking help for his illness. An open letter to my family Dear Family,

I am an alcoholic. I need

Don't allow me to lie to you and accept it for the truth, for in so doing, you encourage me to lie. The truth may be painful, but get at it.

Don't let me outsmart you, this only teaches me to avoid responsibility and to lose respect for you at the

same time. Don't let me exploit you or take advantage of you. In so doing, you become my accomplice to my evasion of

responsibility. Don't lecture me, moralize, scold, praise, blame, or argue when I'm drunk or sober. And don't pour out my liquor; you may feel better, but the situation will be worse.

Don't accept my promises. This is just my method of postponing pain. And don't keep switching agreements. If an agreement is made, stick to it.

Don't lose your temper with me. It will destroy you and any possibility of helping me.

Don't allow your anxiety for us to compel you to do what I must do for myself.

Don't cover up or abort the consequences of my drinking. It reduces the crisis but perpetuates the illness.

Above all, don't run away from reality as I do. Alcoholism, my illness, gets worse as my drinking continues. Start now to learn, to understand, and to plan for my recovery. I need help from a doctor, a counselor, or a psychologist, a recovered alcoholic, from God. I cannot help myself.

I hate myself, but I love you. To do nothing is the worst choice you can make


