

Commission **Denies** Rehearing

On a two-to-one vote the Railroad Commission Monday denied motions for rehearing in the United Parcel Service case, reaffirming its order of January 21 granting the company authority to transport packages from point to point within the state.

Chairman Buddy Temple and Commissioner Mack Wallace voted to deny the rehearing motions filed by some 39 truck and bus companies which protested the UPS application. Commissioner James E. (Jim) Nugent voted to grant the rehearing requests.

According to the state's Administrative Procedures Act, with the denial of the motion for rehearing, the Commission's order is final. Any appeals of the grant of authority to UPS must now be made through the court system.

I feel the Public deserves to be informed of the responsibility of the Tax-Assessor (Voter Registrar) issuing and delivering voter registration lists to the City, Schools and Hospital District.

During the March 4th City Council meeting the subject was brought up and discussed that this office wasn't delivering the proper voter lists for the City Elections.

Ida Stewart, a representative from the Secretary of States office, informed me I had been delivering the proper voter registration lists to the City in the past and continue as before.

Article 2 Subdivision 4 of the Election Code states, 'In cities, towns and villages of less than ten thousand inhabitants, election precincts may be formed without regard to the wards or the corporate limits of the city, town or village." Voting Boxes 1, 3, 9, 7 & 8 are the boxes needed for city elections.

Article 5 Subdivision 13b of the State Statute does require all new voters to show the physical location of their residence. We aks all new voters to put this information on their applications.

I suggested to Mr. Pool a few weeks back the city might use a City Tax Roll in helping the Election Judge to certify if the voter was within the city limits. Thank you for letting me

write this letter to you.
