Wayne Baize of Fort Davis, Texas, will be the Art Judge at the Spring Art Show sponsored by Post Art Guild Inc.

His colored pencil drawings capture the serenity and peace of the West and the working cowboy.

His art conveys to both the cowboy and the general art public the nobility and simplicity of life with livestock.

Born in Stamford, Texas, Mr Baize began taking private art lessons while in grade school.

He later studied with Gene Swinson and Leon Hale.

During the Ft. Worth Stock Show one year, he met Tom Ryan and the two became friends.

Ryan encouraged him to pursue the style of art

which he had begun to develop.

Mr Baize shows at the Texas Art Gallery in Dallas, Mongerson Gallery in Chicago, and the Thompson Gallery in Stephenville.

The annual shows where his work appears include the OS Ranch Art Show, the Western Heritage Show in Houston, the Governor's Invitational Art Show dur-

ing Cheyenne Frontier Days, and the Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford.

His work has been in shows in St. Louis, Kansas City, New York, Los Angeles and Denver.

Magazines that have used his work on their covers include the Quarter Horse Journal, The Hereford Journal and The Cattleman.

Kindergarten Round-up

Spring Round-Up for all pupils who will enroll in kindergarten for the fall 1985-86 school term will be Friday, May 3, at 3 pm.

If you are unable to come to school, please come by the office and register your child before the end of May if at all possible.

Parents and children are requested to enter the east door of the Primary building.

The children will be directed to a room, after which parents are requested to go to the auditorium.

Parents will receive forms and general information while in the auditorium.

The following regulation

changes have been made by the State Board of Education for students in full-day-full-year attendance for state funding;

1 The Student must be five years of age on or before September 1.

(The out-of-state waiver that applies for first graders does not apply for kindergarten pupils.)

2 The student must be educationally disadvantaged according to one of the following criteria;

(a) be from a family whose income would qualify the student for a free lunch under the National School Lunch guide lines,

(b) or be unable to speak and comprehend the English language.

The annual Spring Art Show, sponsored by Post Art Guild, Inc., will be held this week at the Algerita Art Center, 131 East Main Street, from April 30th to May 5th.

It will be open to the public from 9 am. to 8 pm. on Friday and Saturday and starting at 1 pm. Sunday with the Awards Presentation at 3 pm.

Judges Wayne Baize of Fort Davis, Texas, and Ashton Thornhill, Associate Professor of Photography at Texas Tech University, will choose winners in various categories and designate those winners before the art goes on public display.

The major prizes will include (1) Citizens' Award City of Post, approximately \$400; (2) Juror's Art Choice, \$60; (3) Juror's Photography Choice, \$60; (4) People's Choice, \$25 and (5) Purchase Awards from Post Business Community and Private patrons in excess of \$2,000.

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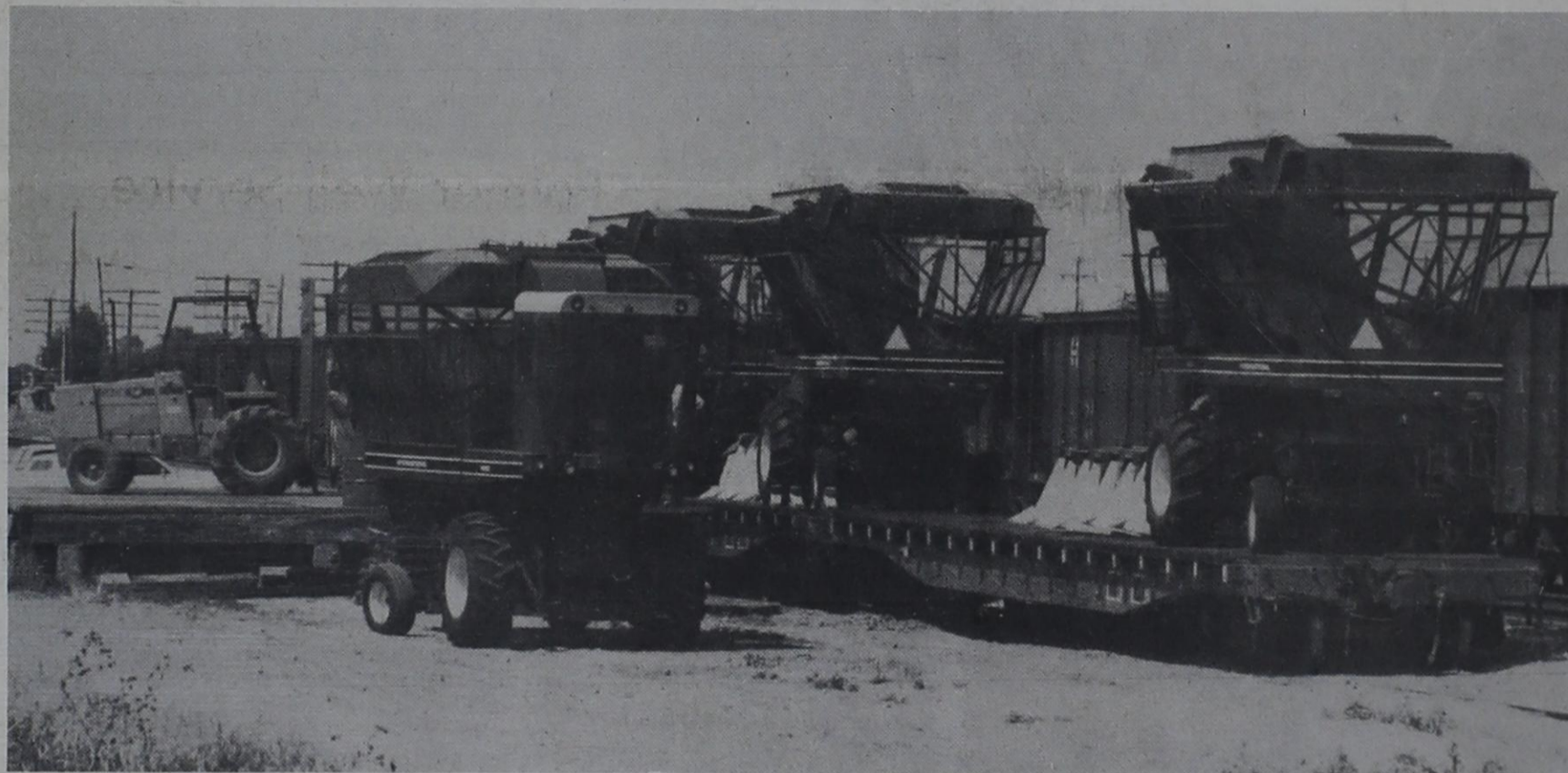

"IT'S OK TO SAY NO!" PARENTAL AWARENESS ON DRUGS & ALCOHOL SEMINAR

Purpose: to inform parents and students of the growing drug and alcohol abuse situation in Garza County and to encourage the organization of a parental support group.

PREVENTION--ONE KEY IN SOLVING TEEN DRUG, ALCOHOL PROBLEMS

Teens face decisions about drugs and drinking --and growing numbers find responsible decision-making difficult.

Parenting today's teens also has its difficulties, especially on the subject of how to approach the drugs-and drinking pressures that teens must deal with.

For parents and others who are closely associated with young people, it may be helpful to reserve judgment and look instead at some of the factors which may influence teens' decisions.

NON-USERS, THEIR PARENTS

A recent study on the relationships between peer influences, parental influence and drug use reported these findings:

Non-users were more likely to have close relationships with their parents.

Non-users were more dependent on their parents.

Non-users considered themselves as lower in social adequacy--that is, they considered themselves not so much a part of a social crowd.

Parental relationships appeared as a major factor in influencing teen drug use or non-use.

CLOSE FAMILIES HELP

In light of those research findings, it's possible to say with more certainty that close, caring families may be practicing effective prevention--possibly without being aware of it.

WHAT PARENTS CAN DO

Looking at how close, caring families work can suggest ways for strengthening every family.

At the same time, a closer look can help parents and others as they work to help young people make significant decisions.

Ultimately--and hopefully--this can affect the decisions young people make about drugs and alcohol.

Here are things parents and others can do:

Provide love, affection and attention.

Be consistent with fair discipline.

Offer encouragement.

Give youth an opportunity to express feelings and thoughts.

Provide means for youth to have successful and exciting experiences.

Use tolerance when mistakes are made.

Provide strong and respected role models.

Give youth accurate information about alcohol and drugs and related societal problems.

Help youth improve their decision-making skills--by talking through the possible results of decisions and by helping youth set priorities.

Mrs Mills, a 1976 Post High School graduate who received a BBA in Finance from Texas Tech University in 1981, also attended Western Texas College.



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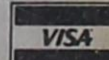
