Council Lowers Outside Water Rates

Post City Council member Lewis Holly, after stating that he was satisfied "they are doing a whale of a job," nominated Donald Windham for another term on the Housing Authority Board, which was unanimously approved during last Monday's city council meeting.

Last month Holly had expressed serious reservations about the procedures of the housing authority, but expressed his admira-

tion Monday night for the board's smooth operation.

The council voted to amend the water and sanitation rates, setting an out-of-city limits rate of \$5.50 for the first 5,000 gallons and \$1.10 for each additional thousand gallons.

The rates reflect a change to the October 1, 1984 ordinance, which set the out-of-city water use at \$5 for the first 5,000 gallons and \$1.50 for each additional thousand.

Members of the Caprock Water System, represented by Darrell Jones as spokesman, complained to the council about the \$1.50 rate, although the system has not been charged the higher rate since the implementation of the October 1 ordinance.

Holly told them they should request annexation, pay city taxes and get the same rates as city taxpayers.

Maxine Earl also told the

group that if they choose to live outside the city limits, they have to realize that water rates will be higher.

The council also changed sanitation rates, charging office buildings and the courthouse \$20 per month and motels and hotels at \$12.75 per dumpster and \$1 per hotel or motel unit.

Mike Barber informed the council of his plans to build a subdivision west of 10th Street, to begin with nine lots with restrictions.

Pioneer Doctor Dies

Dr A.C. Surman, a respected and loved Garza County pioneer physician and civic leader, died last Friday in Lubbock.

So much of what Doctor Surman gave to Post and Garza County are daily reminders of his enthusiasm and persistence for his community.

A man with a great sense of humor...last January when a group of local friends published a full page ad in the Dispatch to celebrate his 98th birthday, Dr Surman muttered, "wonder why they didn't wait until I turned 100?"

There are hundreds of people today who mark their very beginnings in life to Dr Surman...who administered to the births in Garza County for 51 years.

In January 1982 the First National Bank purchased a full page ad in the Dispatch, honoring Dr Surman on his 95th birthday.

This tribute says a lot about Dr Surman and his contributions to this community:

"You came to us in 1913 fresh out of medical school at Galveston to become associated with Dr A.R. Ponton in the operation of the then newly built Post Sanitarium, a fine hospital for a wide West Texas area which you called 'the best west of Fort Worth.'"

"Even after it was closed in World War I you stayed and built a medical practice which literally covered thousands of square miles that in the early days you traveled day or night in your trusty Hupmobile.

"That was before this country had any idea of what paved roads were and during which it wasn't so unusual for a farmer to hang a lantern atop his windmill to guide you to his lonely farm house on a night call.

"Along with Dr Glen Kahler and Dr D.C. Williams, you helped provide the essential leadership required for this community in the planning and construction of Garza Memorial Hospital.

"Fitting indeed that this hospital, with its commu-

ity support as strong today as it was at its birth, will also celebrate an important anniversary this year - its 30th.

"This means, Doctor, you were 65, at the age most men retire, when the hospital opened its doors.

"But you went on to serve us another dozen years before stepping down on your 77th birthday in 1964.

"You were so good too with many community chores. You along with Tom Bouchier and Rube Jennings were instrumental in providing leadership to build and finance White River Lake, together with community leaders from Spur, Ralls and Crosbyton.

"That lake is still recognized today as the best planned, best financed and best operated of any in Texas by the state water board.

"You served us 12 years on our school board, twice as its president, through some mighty tough years when educational dollars

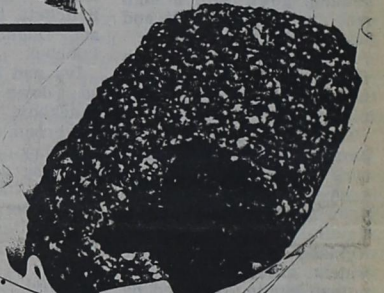

Directional Markings are There to Follow

Ever wonder what the small arrows on the seam-lines of a pattern piece are for?

Many home sewers simply ignore them, but understanding and using the arrows correctly can take a home-sewn garment out of the homemade category.

The arrows on a pattern piece are called directional stitching markings.

Seams should be stitched in the direction indicated. For instance, stitching up one side of a skirt and down the other side will cause the grainline of the skirt to become stretched so that the skirt becomes lopsided.

But, if you stitch both seams with the grain in the same direction, both sides of the skirt will be the same.

Stitching with the grainline, or directional stitching, means stitching in the direction the fabric threads lie along a cut edge.

On a few cut edges, the seams may fall exactly on the lengthwise or crosswise grain.

These do not need to be directionally stitched.

But, other pieces should be stitched with the grain to avoid a stretched or twisted seam line.

To stitch with the grain, you must determine which direction it runs.

The process is like petting a cat.

Run your hand down its back to go with the grain; rub your hand from tail to head and you are going against the grain.

By running your finger along the cut edge, you will determine the direction of the grain.

If the threads lie smooth, you are moving with the grain; if the edge frays, you are moving against the grain.

If you forget how the pieces were marked after you remove them, simply follow the rule of stitching from the widest part of the garment to the narrowest, or from the greater area to the smaller.

For example, stitch skirt seams from the hem to waist; stitch armhole seams from the shoulder to the underarm, stitch the neckline from the shoulder to the center, stitch the underarm seam from the armhole to the waistline.

Directional stitching rules change when working with pile fabrics and fake furs.

These fabrics always require stitching with the nap to prevent distorting the fabric surface.

Good Nutrition Helps Make You Feel Better
Good nutrition plays an important part in feeling good.

Nutrition is the food you eat and the way your body uses this food.

Nutrition affects your physical and mental performance as well as how you look and feel.

Good nutrition means

eating the proper amounts of foods. This depends on your age, sex, amount of physical activity and your state of health.

The Daily Food Guide gives a plan for sound eating habits and includes the following groups:

Milk Group - two or more servings a day for adults, three servings for children and four servings for adolescents and pregnant women.

Breads and cereals - four or more servings a day.

Vegetables-fruit group - four or more servings each day.

Meat, fish, poultry and beans group - two or more servings a day.

Fats, sweets and alcohol group - use with caution. May be used to provide additional calories as needed.

It is not necessary to have three square meals per day to be well nourished.

Americans are snacking more and feeling guilty about it.

According to a national survey conducted this year by the Wheat Industry Council, two-thirds regularly snack between meals.

Snacks can be nutritious and fit into the daily food guide.

For example, yogurt, ice cream and cheeses can be snacks from the milk group.

Muffins, crackers, breads and popcorn are from the bread and cereal group.

Fruit juice, fresh fruit, raw vegetables and raisins and other dried fruit are part of the fruit and vegetable group.

Cold meats, nuts and seeds are part of the meat, fish, poultry and beans group.

Also remember that several small meals a day often provide for top efficiency and performance rather than one or two large meals.

You can plan ahead when you're away from home too.

Take nutritious, carry-along snacks such as fruits, nuts and canned vegetables or fruit juices.

Helen Akers Retires

Plans to retire inevitably cause a person to reminisce a bit.

I am no exception.

Concluding thirty years of federal service (of which the last twenty one have been with Social Security), many thoughts flass across my memory.

Lyndon B. Johnson was President when I started my career with SSA.

Folks filing for retirement benefits at that time had been born in 1899.

Few of our claimants' births had been recorded.

We established their age on "other" evidence.

Few years have gone by that Congress did not pass amendments to the Social Security Act.

However, the two amendments that are most vivid in my mind were the Medicare amendments of 1965 and the Supplemental Security Income amendments of 1972.

The Medicare amendments created a tremendous workload for us and was far reaching legislation.

For the first time, every aged American was potentially eligible for health insurance.

Few families were unaffected by this legislation. Most of us had parents, uncles, aunts or grandparents who qualified for this protection.

We literally "kicked the bushes" to be sure all eligible individuals were contacted.

As part of this effort we had extended office hours in which we kept our office open until nine o'clock every Thursday night.

The Supplemental Security Income program also brought about a large workload.

For the first time our

agency was administering a program which was based on financial need.

This type program had formerly been administered by the State--now the program became federalized.

This is a separate program from regular Social Security, with different qualifying factors.

Other thoughts flash across my mind.

Not only have we had literally thousands of changes to the Social Security Act, but social changes, too, have occurred.

In fact, I recall that in 1970 female employees of our office were granted permission to wear pant suits to work.

We did.

I've held the positions of

Development Clerk, Service Representative, Claims Representative and Operations Supervisor.

Consequently, I've dealt with members of the public from all walks of life--with varying degrees of formal training--with different levels of understanding.

Regardless of my position title, I've always found the work to be technical, interesting, exciting and rewarding.

During my career I've been proud to be a federal employee and have tried to provide the type service I'd like to receive.

DPS Slows Trucks

A recent Texas Department of Public Safety task force of 60 state troopers descended on Wise County and during a one-week period made 5,442 traffic contacts, filing 2,086 traffic cases.

The effort was an attempt by the DPS to slow down the heavy truck traffic in answer to the numerous complaints from motorists on U.S. Hwy 380 between Denton and Brideport and on State Highway 114 from Decatur to Dalls.

Garza County trooper Gary Briley was one of the troopers working the special task force April 22-26.

Task Force coordinator Capt. Billy Melton, as reported in the Wise County Messenger last

week, said that 772 cases were filed against truck drivers and 1,312 cases against drivers of other type vehicles.

DPS officials had announced more than a week ahead of the impending crackdown, but the department announced last week that the next task force will be a surprise.

"The pre-publicity gave many truckers an opportunity to plan vacations during the week," the Messenger reported.

The Messenger also said that check points were set up on US Hwys 81-287, US 380 and SH 114, checking all trucks.

"We feel it was a highly successful operation for several reasons," Captain Melton is quoted in the Messenger, "there has been

only two accidents this week involving trucks which is a great improvement."

"If they (truck drivers) would slow down to the speed limit and operate within the legal weight limit and drive in a sane manner, it would eliminate a lot of their troubles as well as ours," Melton adds.

"We'll be back soon, and the next time we'll come unannounced," The DPS captain concluded.

In addition to the traffic citations issued, the task force gave out 979 written warnings and arrested 95 people for outstanding traffic warrants.

There were 20 DWI arrests and 1,191 for speeding.

God's great love, works and mercy were introduced anew as a sacred solo by a Billy Graham evangelistic team soloist.

"How Great Thou Art" became almost immediately popular. Today it continues to bring believers to a reverence before the greatness of God.

As a beloved hymn of praise and thanksgiving, it proclaims a bold witness.

Many lands and many people proclaimed its words and music.

All attest God's greatness is unbounded by nation, churches, boundaries of any earthly status.

May all God's creatures resound, "How great thou art, How great thou art."

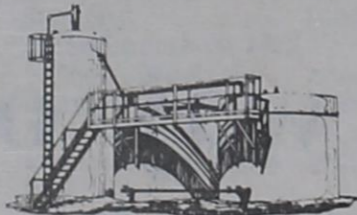

agencies, medical and other professional groups and should include consideration of appropriate behavior and role modeling by adults as well as youth.

3. Develop health values by capitalizing on the high regard youth have for their bodies and good health.

4. Help develop parent support groups, parent action groups, family life skills and parent drug and alcohol education programs.

5. School policies should be clear on possession of drugs and alcohol both on and off school property. School policies can address such issues as enforcement, referrals for treatment when appropriate, and the comprehensiveness of drug-alcohol curricula. To have the greatest impact, policies should be fairly and uniformly enforced.

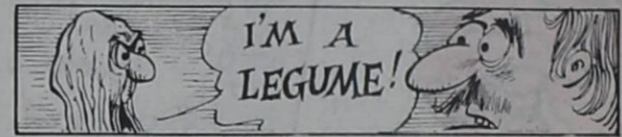

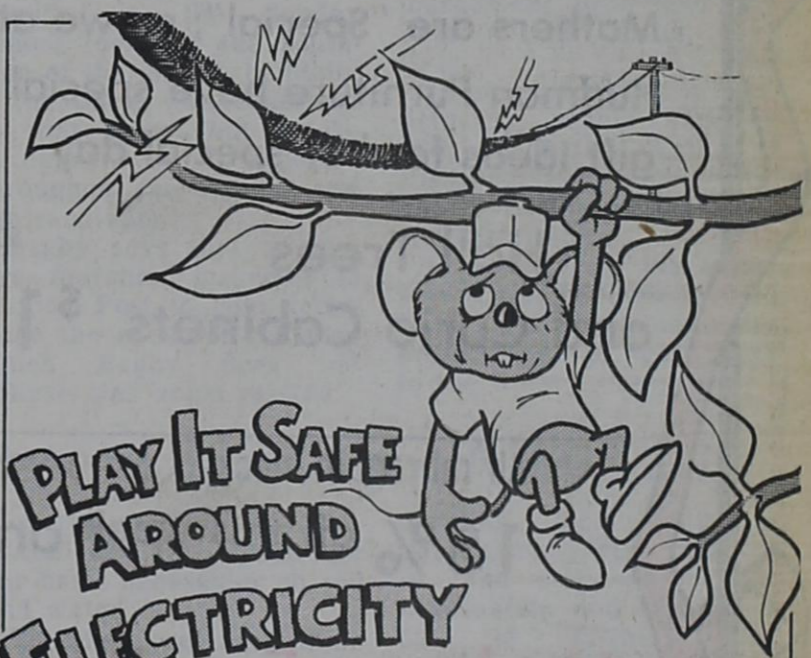

- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

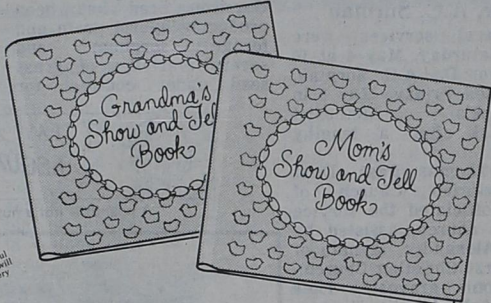

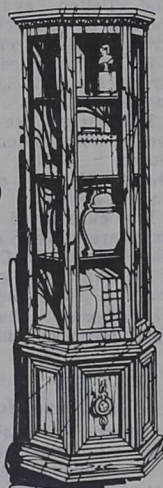

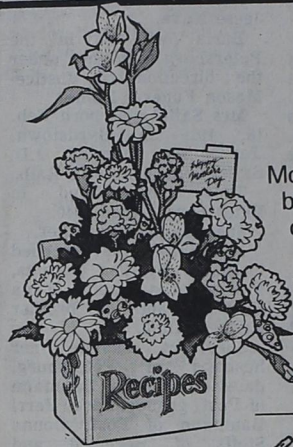
