## Garza County News Briefs

### Welfare Board Meets

## Higher Property Values Set

Anyone trying to buy a houseplace in Post knows there is just not much land to be bought.

What there is to be bought is selling from \$50 a front foot to \$75 a front foot or from \$2,000 to \$3,000 a lot.

This can be figured out to be approximately \$14,300 an acre to \$21,450 an acre.

Today's laws demand that all property be reappraised every five years and be taxed at market value.

School funding by the state is based on this law and all people who are being taxed at market value expect all other people to be taxed equally.

In Garza County the major portion of the property tax burden is carried by the oil industry.

## Fire Not Believed To Be Arson

A fire last Friday evening at the Templa Bautista Church caused an estimated \$5,000 to \$7,000 in damage.

No one was injured in the blaze, which was reported to the Post Volunteer Fire Department at 6:09 p.m.

The church is located in the 400 block of Main St at Avenue M.

Fire Marshall Ray Bagby says the fire apparently started in the wall above a window in the Sunday school room on the south side of the church building.

The blaze was contained to that room, but smoke damage is reported throughout the building and the sanctuary.

Bagby says that a state fire marshal inspector is visiting Post to help determine the cause of the fire, which Bagby does not believe was arson related.

There are currently four deputies working patrol, one jailer and one chief deputy, in addition to the sheriff.

Commissioner Herbert Wall requested that the sheriff (Jim Pippin) be specifically requested to appear in person at the joint meeting, May 28.

Commissioners approved the low bid of \$12,460 by Jerry Osborn for repair of windows, painting and installation of storm windows at the court house.

on by the jailer at the required 15 minute intervals.

"Our dispatcher also serves as jailer during the daytime," Timms explained, "and it is really impossible for her to do both jobs all the time."

"What we need to do is add a full time jailer for the daylight hours to alleviate this situation," he added.

The jail standards inspector also found that ventilation is not adequate and that visitation controls needed to be improved.

## Overtime, Jail Get Attention

A joint meeting between the city council and Garza County Commissioners' Court was requested by the commissioners at their regular meeting Monday to discuss the resolution of overtime for sheriff's deputies.

The overtime situation has become an issue following the recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling "Garcia vs San Antonio," where the court ruled that salaried employees of municipalities and other government units must be paid overtime.

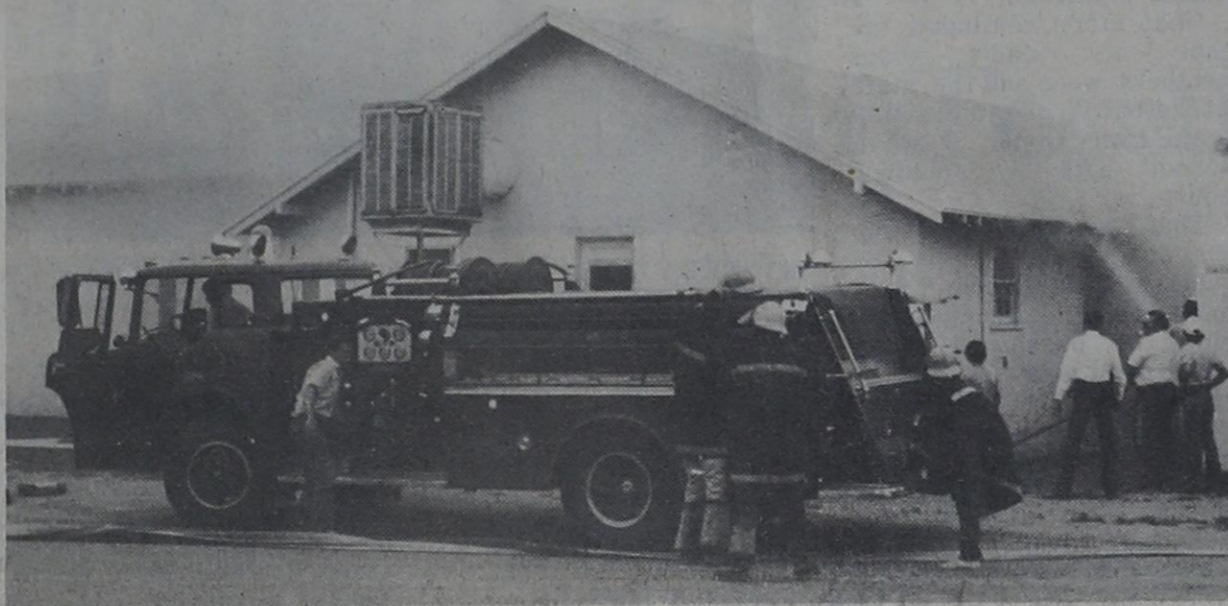
Garza County chief deputy Bill Timms told commissioners that the hiring of one additional full-time deputy would resolve the overtime situation in the sheriff's department.

"Deputies have been putting in 50-60 hours a week, and it looks like this has been going on for quite a while," Timms explained.

The new chief deputy also outlined the recent Texas Jail Standards inspection and corrective action taken by the sheriff's department.

The most serious violation of the state standards is the lack of personnel to monitor inmates during daytime hours.

The state inspector noted that during the daytime inmates were not checked

## Brazos River Bridge Repairs Completed

Officials with State Department of Highways and Public Transportation have announced that on May 16 they will lift an emergency load zone limit for a bridge about six miles east of Post.

The announcement means that vehicles weighing 80 thousand pounds or less will be able to drive over the bridge on U.S. 380 which crosses the Brazos River.

Meanwhile, the highway department hopes to begin construction later this year on a new bridge at the same site.

An emergency load limit

of 38 thousand pounds was placed on the current structure in March as a safety measure after the highway department determined the bridge structure had weakened due to age and heavy loads.

Since then the highway department has made improvements to the bridge which is used extensively by oil industry trucks.

"Our special bridge crew spent about a week at the site adding extra support to the bridge", said J. W. Gooch, Maintenance Supervisor for all highways in the 17 county Lubbock

area. Highway personnel will make weekly inspections of the bridge to make sure the extra support will do the job said Gooch.

Despite the removal of the emergency load limit, Gooch said that vehicles over 80 thousand pounds will not be allowed on the bridge.

"Special permits will not be issued for this bridge.

That means trucks with loads over the legal limit will have to detour around the bridge."

The highway department will continue to ask law enforcement officials to aid

in keeping loads over 80 thousand pounds off the bridge.

Highway officials hope to let a contract in August for a new bridge which would be built just to the south of the current structure.

Construction will begin a few months later.

The highway department estimates the new bridge will cost \$1.2 million.

## S&WCD Celebrates Observance May 12-18

The Garza Soil and Water Conservation District will join the nationwide observance of Soil Stewardship Week during the week of May 12 to 19, 1985, announces District Director Sam Ellis.

"Tomorrow Together" is the theme of the 1985 observance.

As the 1985 booklet for the observance points out, human survival depends on other living things: the grasses the grain, fishes and birds, wild and

domestic animals.

And we all depend for our basic necessities on soil and water.

Together, we must think about ways to preserve and renew the topsoil from which all our food comes.

Together, we must work to purify and protect our waters.

In 1985, the soil conservation movement in America marks its fiftieth anniversary.

During the Dust Bowl era of the '30s, conservation

districts, local units of government, were founded to take soil conservation information and techniques out to farmers and ranchers.

But their task has grown. Now construction sites, school yards, shorelines and parks from erosion.

And they are involved in work to clean up the nation's waters.

Since 1955, the National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil

I recall a summer trip with a group of my East Texas family in 1955 when our two-car caravan stopped at a roadside park just west of Lubbock on the way to Carlsbad, N.M.

My great-aunt and adult cousins spread out the table cloth on the park table, put out all the pre-cooked goodies as we younger folk pranced around under the warm, blue skies.

Just about the time the lunch was ready to serve, my Aunt Lela, who had taught school at Forsands and other great West Texas spots, announced that we'd

We all quickly piled things back in the two cars, and slammed the doors and rolled up the windows...that was in the days before air conditioned autos.

About an hour later, we dusted ourselves off and tried to eat sandwiches gritty with sand.

It was an interesting experience.

But thanks to the efforts of the Soil Conservation Service and the soil conservation districts, the problem today is a whole lot better.

This being soil conservation week, I thought it only proper to say a word of

thanks to the farmers, ranchers and soil conservationists for their untiring efforts to control erosion... and sand storms.

Rusty Dean stopped by the office last Wednesday morning, informing me of the winter-like conditions on top of the caprock on the Gail Hwy.

I stuttered just a bit about breaking my routine and going out there with my camera, when Rusty said, "If you don't get your camera and go out there I'm going to tell Vukad..."

I got my camera and left immediately...like any good newspaper man would do.

Victor and Iva Hudman have had some fascinating trips recently...and in sharing some of their travels Victor was reminded about his first day in school at Post.

"I didn't know that you played ball inside a building," Victor explained, "having gone to school in the country, we played out on the dirt."

On his first day in school in Post, about the sixth or seventh grade, Victor said the teacher told him and Joe B. Taylor to go to the gymnasium to get a ladder. "When we got out in the hall, I told Joe, 'I sure hope you know what a gymnasium is, I've never heard that word before,'" Victor admitted.

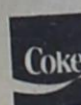

Abuse Advisory Council.

She explained that a total of four adults had been assisted by the Garza County counselor and the counselor has taken numerous phone calls as a result of a recent program at the school.

The board meets monthly and provides a monthly update to the commissioners.

David Newby reported to the court on the progress at the park, complaining "the performance has not been good on the swimming pool bath house or the concession stand."

Newby said that it appears the contractor has not sent enough people at any one time to get the job done.

The swimming pool should be open by June 1, Newby added.

He told commissioners

that the control panel for all the electrical lights will be moved to the new concession stand, eliminating the individual exposed switches now in use.

"This will be a much better situation," Newby added, "and especially correct a serious safety problem."

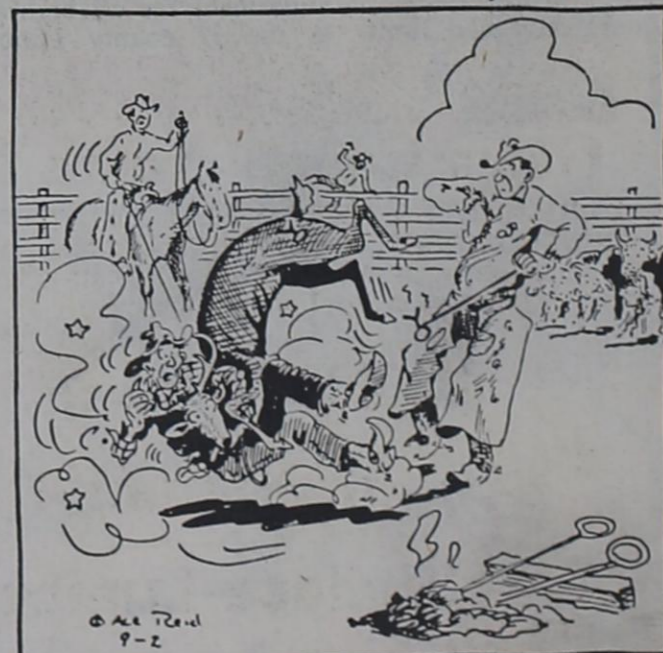

## Tax Appraisals

They have paid their share without too many comments or complaints, stating only that the local people should pay their fair share.

The State Property Tax Board hires independent appraisers to check the value of all property and make a report which is available to all interested parties.

In 1983 the vacant lots in the City of Post assessed value on the tax rolls was reported at only 74 percent of market value by the State Property Tax Board.

Since then the demand has been greater and the market price has increased.

Taking all of this into consideration, the Garza County Appraisal District has been forced to reappraise the land in the City of Post.

All people will receive a notice of reappraisal.

Anyone who believed their land has been overvalued and would not bring this on the open market, should meet with the Appraisal Review Board June 5, 1985 at the courthouse.

special technique of her own, which adds charm and a unique quality to her paintings.

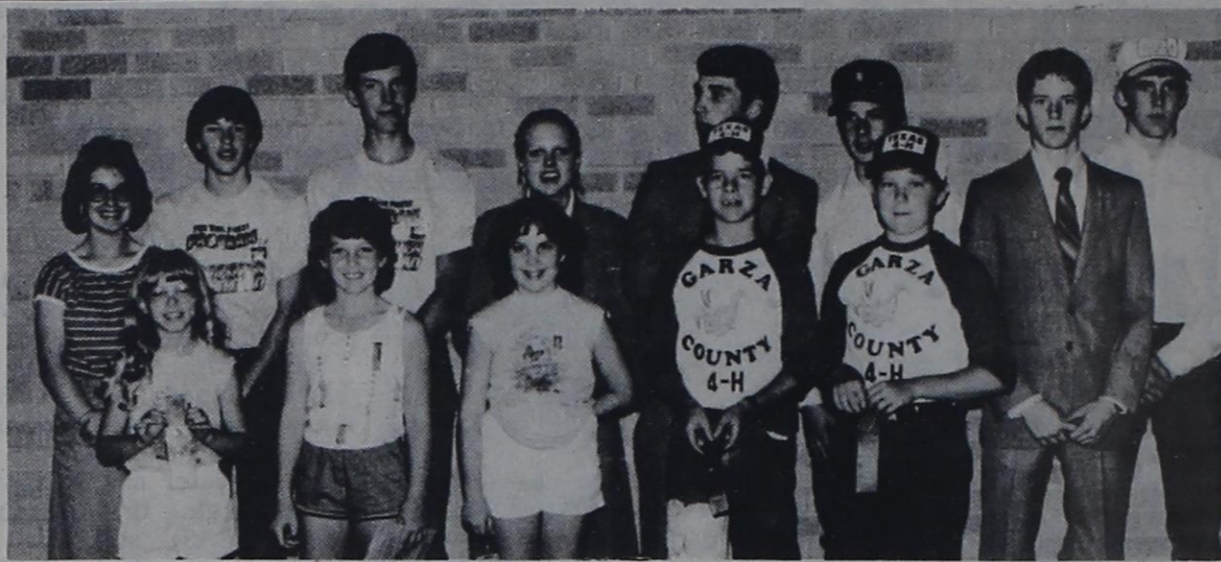
The class is limited to 18, but a waiting list will be kept.

4-H Leaders Have Many Roles

4-H volunteer leaders help boys and girls plan and conduct 4-H projects, meetings and activities.

Organization, project and activity leaders plan and work together as a team to support boys and girls in planning and conducting the total 4-H program.

Organization leaders help officers involve all members in planning and conducting community club meetings.

They also keep a record of boys and girls in the club.

One of the big responsibilities of the organization leader is to recruit project leaders to work with boys and girls in projects they choose.

Project leaders guide and help boys and girls plan and carry out their projects through group meetings and personal visits.

They often work with 4-H'ers on group projects.

Activity leaders guide and help boys and girls plan and conduct specific activities and events, such as project shows and method demonstrations.

Junior and teen leaders are boys and girls who assist organization or project leaders in working with other 4-H members in planning and conducting club or project group meetings.

They frequently will take complete responsibility for project group meetings or activities with some support from adult leaders.

# State Puts Burden of Taxes on County

Garza County Judge Giles W. Dalby said today that "the state has found a way to get through the legislative session in Austin without raising any state

taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes will probably have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Judge Dalby indicated that the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public school, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.

"The way this works," Judge Dalby said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to

raise revenue for state programs.

This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees.

"The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even."

The judge said that counties only have four sources of revenue: property tax, fines and fees, and federal revenue sharing.

He said that revenue sharing "has been going down for several years,

and that the administration proposes to eliminate it by October 31, 1986.

Revenue sharing averaged 16 percent of county budgets statewide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11 percent.

It's dropped even more since 1982 and will be gone entirely by late 1986," the judge said.

"Taxes have to be increased even more by the county if inflation causes increased costs.

"And while the state is taking more of historical county revenue, legislators are devising ways to have

the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would be handled by the state.

"The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay."

"What this means," the judge said, "is that the federal government is passing costs to the state, the state is passing costs to the counties and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising taxes.

"They're not. Local government has to do it for them," Judge Dalby said.

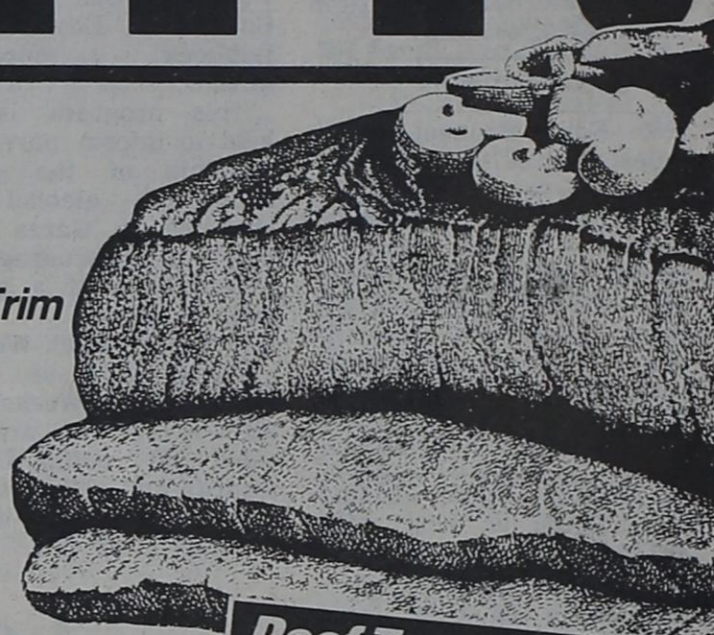
