

Basinger Gets AFA Appointment

Congress Charles W. Stenholm today announced that Gregory Sean Basinger of Post was offered an appointment to the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Basinger is currently a senior at Southland Independent School District, where he is active in football, basketball, golf and drama.

Basinger is also a member of the National Honor Society and is mentioned in Who's Who Among American High School Students.

Activities outside of school include the church choir and Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Sean Basinger, son of Joe and Mary Basinger was nominated December by Stenholm, and selected through a competitive process.

More than 35,000 young people apply for Congressional nominations to the service academies each year; 8,000 receive nominations, and 1,425 enter each academy as appointees.

Basinger has indicated that he will pursue a degree in astronautical engineering, and then proceed to pilot training.

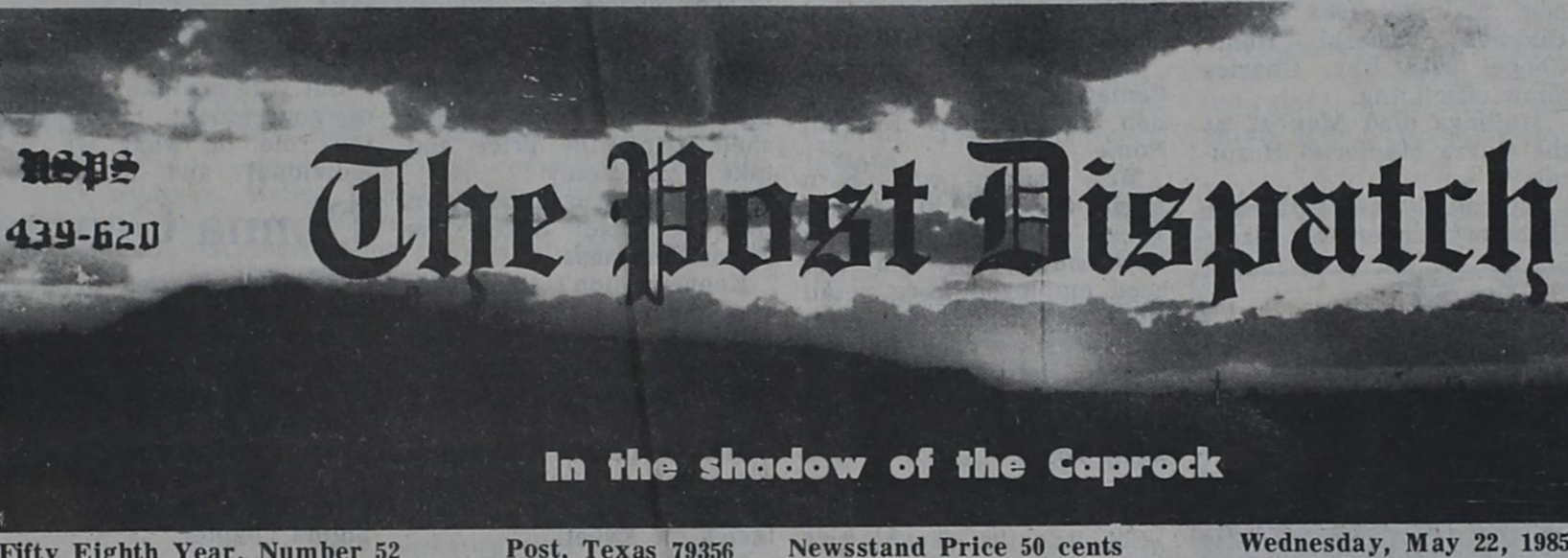
Youth Garage Sale

School Board Studies Stadium Repair

Jimmie Bartlett and Don Payne took the oath of office at the opening of last week's Post ISD board of trustees regular meeting.

Jack Kirkpatrick was elected to serve another term as president of the board, with Tom Middleton named as vice president and Royce Hart as secretary.

The board accepted the recommendation of superintendent Bill Shiver to appoint Mrs. Patricia Thompson on the Career Ladder Selection Committee, pending clarification from the school's attorney.

The decision was made following an executive session to discuss the issue.

Board members were unable to reach a decision

concerning the repair of stadium seats, but did agree that "something has to be done," and at the recommendation of Kirkpatrick, the board scheduled a meeting Tuesday morning (May 21) to continue the matter.

The discussion also centered around the best ways to correct overcrowding at the athletic facilities.

During the discussion, Middleton reminded board members that the vocational training facility is also overcrowded and that he felt it should be included in the improvements.

The board approved a contract to Jenkins and Saffel Heating and Air Conditioning of Rule, Texas on a low bid of \$5,237.50 for air conditioning the Junior

High learning center.

A request by Mrs. Amy Easterling for a leave of absence was approved.

The board also approved the training program, to be paid for by a local benefactor, for providing education in Post for special reading skills.

The students in this program are currently being transported to Lubbock.

Board members Hart and Payne quizzed First National Bank president Jack King about the interest rates paid on the school system's certificates of deposit.

King said the rates were in line with the market and that the bank provides the quality of securities mandated by law as a measure

of protection for the school.

King also reminded trustees that the bank puts thousands of dollars every year back into the community and especially school-related programs in support of 4-H, FFA and other student programs.

The board approved the renewal of a \$2,491,400 certificate of deposit at 8.0 percent interest.

Hospital Board Approves Computer Plan

Garza Memorial Hospital board members approved at the regular meeting last Thursday the bid of Professional Software Inc of Oklahoma City for the hospital computer system.

Hospital administrator Maritta Reed told board members that she had checked into the various proposals and found PSI to be the best of the three bids.

The board also approved

the transfer of \$5,750.59 in delinquent accounts to the attorney for collection.

An amendment to the by-laws got its first reading, which will bring the hospital rules into compliance with the Medicare Survey, which requires that the by-laws specify medical staff to be on rotation call 24 hours a day.

An indigent application for a diabetic patient of one of the hospital's doc-

tors was approved, pending review of the patient's employment status. Materials for the patient will be supplied for one month before reviewing the situation.

Dr. Charles McCook, D.D.S. was accepted by the board for membership to the medical staff.

The First National Bank was named as the depository for the hospital.

A new resuscitator will

be added to the surgical equipment to replace one that "is worn out." The cost of the new resuscitator is \$669.

The board also approved the installation of radiant heat panels for bathrooms at a cost of \$822.12.

Attending the meeting were Jack Alexander, David Nichols, David Newby, Zoe Kirkpatrick, David Tyler and administrator Mrs. Reed.

Sales Tax Rebate Jumps Up!

The city of Post received a sizeable increase in its Texas city sales and use tax allocation for the period ending May 3, 1985.

The increase brought Post from a deficit over last year to an increase of 9.32 percent for the year.

The check from the state comptroller was a healthy \$24,974.84, an increase of \$7,917.66 from last year's \$17,057.18.

The year-to-date total of the rebate, which represents taxable sales in the city of Post, is \$69,603.96, compared to \$63,669.49 for the same period last year.

Other area cities also showed increases with Slaton getting \$23,342.60, compared to \$22,500.24 last year.

Tahoka was up from \$7,234.84 last year to \$9,579.46 and a 13.55 percent increase for the year at \$29,430.

Crosbyton got a check for \$7,829.64, compared to \$5,087.89 last year and is showing a 39.53 percent increase for the year at \$24,984.96.

Letter to the Editor

Something for nothing. Sounds good, doesn't it? Kinda tickles the ears... but you better sit before reading this bit of news meant to enlighten those who pay the bills and

encourage those who just don't care. Indigence is a state of poverty, or refers to those in need.

Do you know that over \$35,000 worth of food stamps are dispensed in Garza County every month?

To really rattle your brains out of neutral gear, think of what is doled out in Slaton, Lubbock, Dallas, San Antonio, Houston and so forth, and that's just Texas!

Should we be against helping those in need? No, not exactly.

Observe the recipients of these food stamp goodies... take notice of their effort to shoulder some of the load...investigate their real desire to secure employment...compare year and value of their automobiles with your own...notice the interest they take in education of their children and involvement in extra-curricular school activities...and most of all, consider their attitudes in accepting something for nothing.

Now at the same time, notice the elderly folks who really need help, yet receive \$10 to \$100 per month in food stamp assistance, while others drive late model Suburbans and Ford Supercab pickups and receive over \$400 per month

"free groceries." The former group gets less, but deserves more... because they have worked hard all their lives...the latter group deserves nothing because they are willing to drain the backbone of America, the middle class taxpayer!

Sure the local farmer has it tough, a loaf of bread costs too much, a gallon of gas is too high and a gold crown isn't worth \$200.

But when fewer taxpayers are feeding more mouths, prices will continue to soar.

They have to; the money has to come from somewhere!

Back to meal time...let's go to the school lunchroom at Post ISD.

Taxation (oil companies and local taxpayers) paid for \$117,000 improvement in recent years and we can be proud of our lunchroom and the people who prepare and serve the meals there.

But 70 percent of the meals are free and reduced prices, with breakfasts offered to the same folks.

Then the majority of those kids have "extra" change in pocket to buy junk food and play video games after school.

What about dental and medical care?

Sure it's expensive, because the same people charging high prices for goods and services are the same ones feeding and keeping up health standards of the others, as well as their own families.

In May and June the Texas State Department of Health is sending a dental team to this county for "free dental care" to the "indigents."

Good deal, huh? Consider the following:

1. Will the visiting dentist be as kind to you as your local family dentist?

Not very likely, since he lives elsewhere and won't have to face you year after year.

2. Can he educate you to have fewer bad dental experiences?

It's doubtful, since you won't see him again for five years, if then, because he has 32 counties to cover.

3. Does he pay taxes in this community?

No.

4. Will he take extra kids to out-of-town games and meets, plus buy hamburgers and cokes for them while there?

No.

5. Will he give a ride home to other kids when they have practice late and are stranded at school?

No.

6. Will he make donations to local and surrounding

junior livestock associations functions?

No. 7. Will he contribute to school annual and newspaper?

No. This could go on forever, but enough is enough.

And what about free prescriptions?

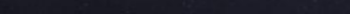

How to Understand

"No, you can't. Why can't I? Because I said so! Well, everybody does it! Well you're not everybody, you're my child!"

A time-worn argument repeated over and over again as parents and teenagers buck heads on every issue from staying out past curfew, driving before they get their unrestricted license, to drinking beer with friends on Saturday night.

How many parents give in, simply because they can't come up with a better argument than, "Because I said so,"?

Teenagers have to have a positive reason before they can understand the consequences of breaking the law or ignoring the rules of the home and society.

Thankfully, everybody doesn't "do it," as teens would have us believe, but unfortunately, the one's who do, have a very strong influence in exerting peer pressure for others to drink, take drugs and defy authority.

Parents can avoid being taken in the "everybody does it" bit by arming themselves with knowledge of the laws concerning minors in possession, and other juvenile offenses.

Also knowing about alcohol and drugs, their effect on a person's physical health and damage to their mental and emotional well-being, is of utmost importance.

It is also important to take time to set down with your teenager and discuss openly alcohol and drugs without moralizing or being shocked at how much she or he may already know on the subject.

In every study, children are found least likely to use drugs when they come from families with a clearly stated policy toward drugs.

These families also instill self-esteem by allowing responsible decision making, based on accurate knowledge, about alcohol, drugs, driving and the choice of friends with whom they spend their free time.

In almost all instances, a teenager will say no to drugs when he or she is
