# Council Sets Tax Rate, Approves Budget

A group of citizens crammed into the city council chambers Monday night, with three grips.

One group was opposed to the tax increase.

Another group expressed opposition to the junk vehicle ordinance.

And one group didn't like the proposed changes to the animal ordinance.

The tax opposition came from people who thought the meeting Monday night was going to be a public election and some questioned where the "extra" money would be spent.

Council member Weaver McKamie devoted almost an hour to a detailed explanation of the city budget, pointing out that the council had pared the budget to the "nubs" and that the tax increase would only raise \$20,000 in one year, which the council has agreed to set aside to be used for street paving and water line improvements.

"Obviously, we can't pave too many streets with only \$20,000 a year," McKamie explained, "but if we are ever going to get the paving finished, we have to start somewhere."

Mayor Pro Tem Maxine Earl pointed out that the tax increase would raise most property owners' taxes by as little as \$6 to

\$13 per year.

Addressing her remarks to the complainers, Earl emphasized, "if you can not afford to pay \$6 to \$13 per year more in taxes, then we are in really big trouble."

McKamie asked one citizen, "where do you suggest we cut services? Do we need ambulances? Do we need water and sewer? Just exactly what services do you want to see eliminated?"

After the citizens had their hearing, the council voted to set the tax rate at 20 cents per hundred dollar evaluation, and adopted the 1985-86 budget.

The budget does not include any pay increase for city employees, and Lewis Earl, addressing the council, call that a travesty.

"People are your most important asset, and I think it is a shame that you are adopting a budget which does not reward your employees for their hard work," Earl said.

He also repeated his position, stated at other city council meetings in the past few months, that the council needs to double the tax rate, and get on with providing incentives to attract industry.

Earl emphasized that Post has the lowest tax rate in this area, comparing the 40-67 cents per

hundred tax rate of surrounding cities and towns.

The opposition to the junk vehicle ordinance concerned definitions.

The amended ordinance would bring the city of Post into compliance with the state law.

The council tabled a decision on amending the ordinance.

After hearing from citizens who raise livestock and sport birds, the council appointed a citizens committee to work with council member Larry Mills to revise the animal ordinance.

Several citizens at the meeting complained about inaccurate water meter readings and what they

called "the run-around at city hall" when they tried to get something done.

Attending the meeting were council members McKamie, Charles Wallace, Mills, Lewis Holly and Mayor Pro Tem Earl, along with city manager Bill Poole, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Harvey Morton.

## Fair Plans Include Music

## Water Amendment Urged

Support for the passage on Constitutional Amendments No. 1 and 2 in the upcoming November 5, 1985, general election has been announced in recent months by several state and regional organizations.

One of the first organizations to lend its support to passage of these key water issues was the Board of Directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Recent action by the Water Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been devoted to the development of a slide presentation designed to help state voters understand the provisions of these key issues.

The slide presentation highlights the provisions of each of the bonding programs and details the types of projects that could be funded under these bonding programs.

The slide presentation was designed to present the facts concerning the provisions of each constitutional amendment so that state voters could make informed decisions regarding these issues.

In a 15-minute presentation, the slide show presents information on the provisions of Constitutional Amendment No. 1 which basically provides for the issuance of \$980 million in additional state bonds for water development, transportation, wastewater treatment, water quality, flood control and water supply projects.

Additionally, Constitutional Amendment No. 2 is outlined in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce's slide presentation.

It seeks voter approval of the issuance and sale of \$200 million in state bonds to create the Agricultural (Continued on P2)

## Snyder Man Killed

Robert Wayne Cole of Snyder died at Garza Memorial Hospital October 1 at 11:40 p.m. following an accident on U.S. Highway 84 eight miles southeast of Post.

Investigating Texas Department of Public Safety officer Louis Cardinal says that Cole was thrown from the vehicle he was driving when it went out of control, crossing the median and Cole ended up on the west-bound lane.

Cole was not wearing a seat belt.

A west bound truck driver, not able to see Cole lying in the roadway, ran over the man a few minutes after the accident.

A TNM&O bus arrived on the scene headed northwest toward Post and stopped just in front of the accident.

The bus driver and a passenger left the bus and went back to the accident.

When the bus driver and the passenger arrived where Cole was lying in the roadway, they heard an approaching truck.

The bus driver ran down the outside lane of traffic waving his arms, trying to get the truck driver's attention.

The truck driver slowed his speed and then changed to the inside lane of traffic.

After changing lanes he noticed debris in the road and then saw the man lying in the inside lane of traffic.

The truck driver could not veer to his right, for the wrecked Fiat and the bus driver were there, and he could not veer to the left because of a steep median.

He tried to straddle the truck over the man.

Post EMS responded to the emergency, along with Garza County Sheriff's Department deputies.

Cardinal said that at the scene of the accident there were numerous empty and full beer cans found in the wrecked vehicle and scattered down U.S. Hwy 84.

A blood sample was taken from the deceased and sent to Lubbock DPS Lab for analysis of alcohol concentration.

Cardinal reports that Cole's vehicle apparently lost control when it ran off the shoulder of the highway, then travelled across both southeast bound lanes, through the median, rolled in the inside lane of the northwest bound traffic.

The auto travelled across the northwest bound lanes and came to rest on its wheels partially in the outside lane of traffic and outside shoulder of northwest bound U.S. Hwy 84.

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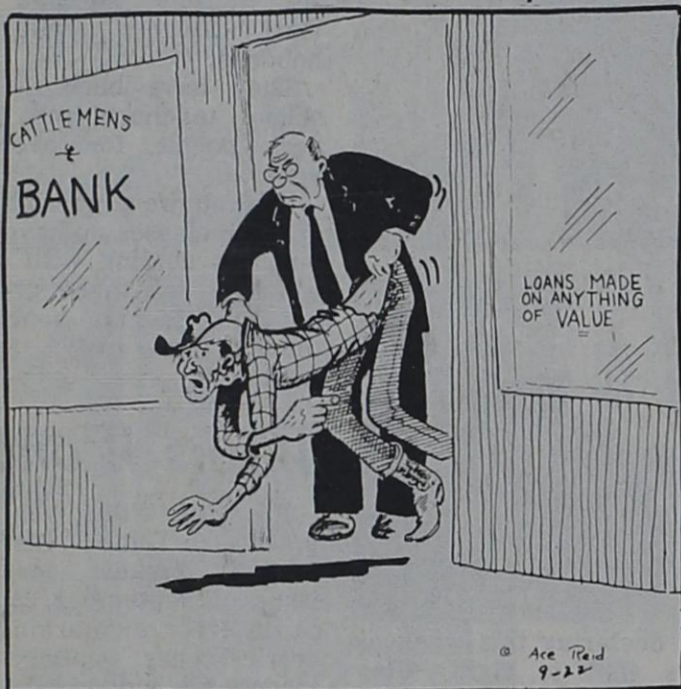

ordinance and animal ordinance.

Some of the people who pointed fingers at the city council were misinformed.

Several cornered me in the hallway, accusing me of printing inaccurate information about the meeting.

"Your paper said this was going to be a public election!" one shouted at me.

The facts are that the meeting was advertised as a public hearing on the budget and tax increase, which is required by Texas state law.

This newspaper did not say that the meeting was going to be a "public election."

I have said in this column several times that an informed citizenry is a security for democracy...a misinformed or uninformed citizenry leads to anarchy.

I got the impression that many of the people who spoke out were simply not informed, which causes me to ask this question?

Why should I take valuable personal time to attend these marathon meetings, try to make sense out of the discussions, wrestle with deciphering the material into a readable format... and then be accused of reporting inaccurately?

The very people who need to be informed about the activities of their elected officials seem to rely on the hearsay of others...it makes me ask the question?

Let me know, if you aren't interested in reading about your month-to-month elected officials' decisions, I have better things to do with my time than to sit through four to five hours of those meetings.

One thing I do want to bring out...one complainer stated as a fact that the population of Post has dwindled to around 3,000.

Even though the latest Texas Municipal League estimates clearly show Post has actually increased in population since 1980...this person and others, firmly believe we are losing population.

No matter how scientific the survey or the count, those folks will not look at the facts.

The fact is this, Post now, today, has an estimated population of more than 4,200...

In 1980 the population was 3,961.

That's growth, and in the face of a major economic setback with the closing of Burlington's textile operation.

And I am amazed that there were so many people complaining about a measly \$6 to \$10 annual raise in taxes.

We are fortunate indeed to get so much for so little.

I know, I have lived in more than a dozen cities in the past 20 years where taxes are triple what they are here, with in many cases a whole lot less to offer.

Maybe we are paying too much attention to the detractors, I don't know, but I just had to get this off my chest.

Forget what I said earlier, I will continue to report to you what your elected officials are doing... I just hope the folks at Monday night's city council meeting are not a reflection of the majority of the citizens.

Else, we are wasting valuable time and space.

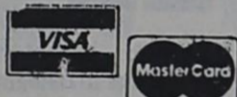



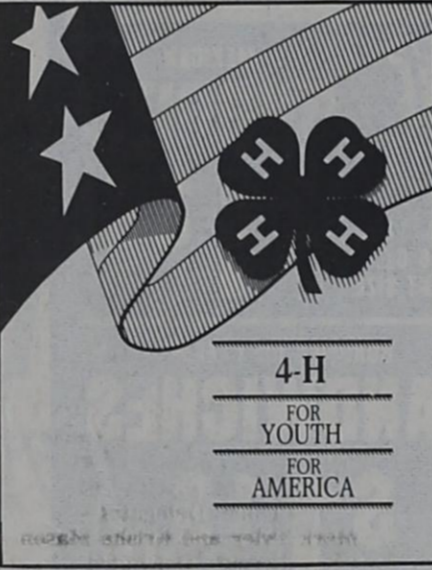

The offensive line opened the holes, running backs found the yardage and the quarterback executed at the right time as the Post Antelopes shut out the visiting Roosevelt Eagles 21-0 last Friday.

too, holding the district rivals to a total of 164 yards, only 76 on the ground.  
Tracy Price gained 86 yards in the first quarter, before sustaining a slight knee bruise, and reserve tailback Greg Adams took up the slack.  
Wingback Ben Kirkpatrick

scored twice, and quarterback Jay McCook found Bruce Crenshaw in the end zone for the first touchdown.

Fullback Benny Hair got valuable yardage on tough situations and provided solid blocking for the other running backs.

"Defensively, we are better than ever," coach David Thompson comments, "the entire defense did just a great job."

The coach pointed out that the offense played well, but needs to get better, and he pointed to the two times the team was inside the 10 yard line and unable to score as examples for improvement.

The first scoring opportunity was stymied on the Eagle nine yard line, following a 12 play, time consuming drive from the Post 32 yard line.

The defense held the Eagles, and on their second possession, the 'Lopes rammed the football from their own 44 yard line to paydirt in six plays, capped by a rolling right McCook pass to Crenshaw, who was all alone in the left corner of the end zone.

Kirkpatrick was credited with two key runs in the drive, both for first downs.

The 'Lopes got another chance to score late in the second quarter as they drove to the Roosevelt seven yard line, but were unable to convert on fourth down.

### Second Half

The Eagles moved the ball on the second half kickoff to the Post 43, picking up a first down, but on fourth down Rodney Tidwell intercepted a Jim Miller pass, setting up the 'Lopes at their own 35 yard line.

The six play scoring drive opened with Hair over left tackle to the 37, Adams over right guard to the 40 and Kirkpatrick blasted over left tackle for a first down to the 49.

Hair took the quick-opener over left guard to the Roosevelt 34, Adams sliced to the 31 and then Kirkpatrick went the distance, breaking tackles on the way, to the end zone.

Price's second extra point kick changed the score to 14-0.

A defensive battle ensued until late in the fourth quarter, with 4:36 left in the game, the Antelopes started the final touchdown drive.

Another six play drive, set back by two penalties, was capped by Kirkpatrick's 22 yard scamper, breaking through defenders on the way.
