## Amendments Get Scrutiny

I will attempt to give voters some idea of the various amendments on the ballot in next Tuesday's election.

Although I will state my personal feelings about these amendments, they are only my opinions.

**Amendments One and Two** - This is the widely talked about state-wide water plan. I plan to vote for these amendments primarily because I feel Texas needs a state-wide plan and I think it will benefit West Texas particularly.

**Amendment Three** - This will give municipalities the same authority to replace or relocate water mains as they currently do with sewer lines. Makes sense to me, check yes on this one.

**Amendment Four** - Gives the state authority to sell permanent school fund land and use the money to buy other parcels of land. I plan to vote no on this one, I just don't like the way it is worked.

**Amendment Five** - Health care revisions, on the surface looks like a good deal...but check a little closer...it could have the devastating effect of closing smaller hospital districts, especially the way the state is trying to unload more and more financial burden on local taxpayers. Vote no on this one.

**Amendment Six** - Will give the state authority to move state prisoners to other states for confinement. I don't like it, another attempt to shift burden to someone else. I'LL VOTE NO TO THIS ONE.

**Amendment Seven** - Provides for additional justices of the peace in Chambers County...who cares? Unless you live in Chambers County...I don't like the way we put out constitutional amendments to satisfy local problems. This should be a no.

**Amendment Eight** - Authorizing bonds to be used to help veterans through the Veterans' Housing Assistance and Land Program. Hard to say no to this one, the program hasn't cost taxpayers in the past. I sort of like the idea of the state of Texas working its own veterans' program...it fits into my idea of The Republic of Texas, independent from the federal government. I'll vote yes on this one.

**Amendment Nine** - The way it is worded, sounds like a good idea...give control of operating budgets to a group of legislators or the governor or some sort of thing like that. Trouble is, voting for this amendment will give more power to the governor and legislature, something I am opposed to...they already have too much power as it is.

**Amendment Ten** - Sounds good...set up a bond system to finance farm and ranch purchases. I just can't see the state getting into the risky farm and ranch business. Seems to me we already have enough ways through other means...this should be a private industry program.

**Amendment Eleven** - Changes the way indictments and criminal charges are worded, to

give the state more leeway in the way the legal wording is submitted. This amendment is written to offset a few cases that were dismissed by the court due to improper wording. Opponents argue that the amendment would take away some protection that has been traditionally held by grand juries. Tell you the truth, I'm not sure how to vote on this one.

**Amendment Twelve** - An attempt to clarify certification of state law when federal courts are involved. Opponents say this will slow down the already turtle-like pace of court cases. Just on the principle of "enough is enough" I vote against this one.

**Amendment Thirteen** - Creates a Judicial Districts Board to determine the

various judicial districts... sounds to me a lot like the state school board, another attempt to corner all power in Austin. No, I don't like the sound of it at all.

**Amendment Fourteen** - Abolish certain county offices in certain counties. I don't care if our own Senator Montford is sponsor of this amendment, I think it is just one more example of patch-work changes to the constitution. Either change the thing for all counties or let it alone.

Oh, be sure you vote, if for no other reason to get the water plan.

If you would like to review for yourself the details of these amendments, a copy of the booklet is available at the Post Public Library.

## Post THD Crew Recognized

The Post Maintenance Section of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has been recognized by district officials for outstanding work.

By being named "Section of the Month," the Post section is now eligible for the "Outstanding Section of the Year" award which will be named later.

## 'Nutcracker' Performance

Ballet Lubbock performs its annual holiday classic, "The Nutcracker" by Peter Illyich Tchaikovsky on Sunday afternoon November 24, at 2 p.m. at the Post School Auditorium.

This delightful classic ballet has become an annual Christmas tradition throughout the United States and is being performed in the city of Post sponsored by the Caprock Cultural Association.

"The Nutcracker" was adapted after the story "The Nutcracker and the Rat King" by E.T.A. Hoffman.

It was first presented at the Maryinsky Theatre, St Petersburg, Russian, on December 17, 1892.

Dancing the roles of the Prince and the Princess are Leonid Lubarsky, Artistic Director of Ballet Lubbock, and Jennifer Lamberts, Company Member.

Lubarsky was born in the USSR in 1949.

In 1968 he graduated from the Kirov School in Leningrad.

He was soloist and principal dancer of the major Soviet Ballet Company and the Kirov Ballet.

In September of 1978, Lubarsky emigrated to the United States in search of artistic freedom.

He served as Acting Artistic Director for the Krassovska Ballet Jeunesse of Dallas and Principal

Instructor and Ballet Master for the Jackson Ballet Company.

He assumed the role of Artistic Director of Ballet Lubbock (formerly Lubbock Civic Ballet) in 1980.

Guest appearances with companies across the United States include the Kassamon Ballet Company in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; The Krassovska Ballet Jeunesse of Dallas; and the Lafayette Ballet Company in Lafayette, Louisiana, where he was in charge of auditions and a Master Class.

He has also served as coach for the National Ballet of Panama at the International Competition in Jackson, Mississippi, and as choreographer for the 1983 Spring Production of the Lawton Ballet Company, Lawton, Oklahoma. His won performance reviews praise his strong technique, particularly his spectacular leaps.

As Artistic Director for Ballet Lubbock, Lubarsky has established for the company a repertoire including the "Nutcracker", excerpts from "Don Quixote", "Les Sylphides", concert numbers from "Shostakovich", the second act of "Swan Lake", and original choreographies, "Montie Csardas" and "Texas Fantasia".

Tickets will be on sale in Post for adults \$10 and students \$5.

"Extra curricular activities are extra...students should know they have to pass before they can enjoy the fun of the extras."

One of the bulwarks of this nation's greatness has been our encouragement of our youth since the beginnings of formal education to be involved in activities outside of the classroom.

Our great educators have consistently through the years emphasized the "well-rounded" student as the one with the best chance to succeed in this complex world.

Being able to crack the books is important, yes, but it is by no means the whole answer, and that attitude certainly doesn't build whole people.

And punishing good students, teaching them that being involved in extra curricular activities are not important, is a travesty to our youth.

I well remember the valued lessons I learned in Brownsville schools, where my valued teachers encouraged me to participate in out-of-classroom activities.

In fact, a student then would not be nominated for membership in the National Honor Society unless he or

The groom is a 1975 graduate of Brownfield and is employed by Halliburton in Snyder.

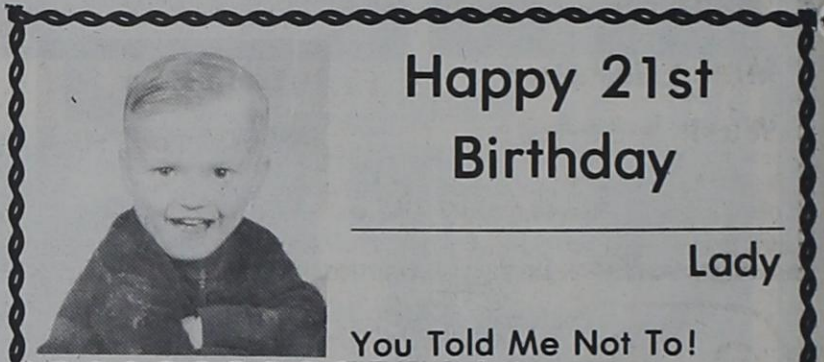

### More Milk Means Less Osteoporosis

Osteoporosis has been called "the silent epidemic" for good reason. Osteoporosis -- a weakening of the bone structure -- is a condition that develops over time.

A woman may not know she is developing this condition until she develops a "dowager's hump" or experiences broken bones from even minor falls in her later years.

The best prevention for osteoporosis is an adequate supply of calcium daily over the lifespan.

Yet research studies show that most adult women are consuming less

than the recommended two servings a day of dairy products.

Nutritionists are also concerned about the future of the growing number of teenage girls who drink carbonated beverages rather than milk with meals and snacks.

No matter what your age, it's not too late to change your eating habits so you can get the calcium necessary for strong bones throughout life.

Add more dairy products to your diet:

-drink milk at meals and for snacks

-eat cheese as a snack or add it to other foods like sandwiches.

-eat yogurt.  
-when you make creamed soups, use milk instead of water.

-serve calcium-rich desserts, such as ice cream, custard or pudding.  
-add powdered milk to soups, casseroles, sauces and beverages like cocoa.

While increasing calcium intake is the key step in preventing osteoporosis, there are also some other

Death from inhalants is usually caused by a very high concentration of inhalant fumes.

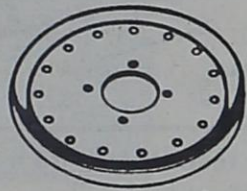

Adams took the punt at the 19 yard line, setting up an 81 yard touchdown pass and run play.

With 4:15 showing on the clock, Kirkpatrick rolled to his right, threw the ball to Bruce Crenshaw at the Post 35, and the speedy receiver showed his acceleration down the right side line, out running Indian defenders to the end zone.

With 4:01 left in the first quarter, the Antelopes led 14-0 following Price's extra point kick.

Going into the second quarter, the Indians were on the move, driving to their own 47 before punting.

Crenshaw took the ball at the 20, hit the right side lines and blazed a trail to the end zone...only to have the play called back on a holding penalty.

### One More Time

With 9:06 left in the first half, the Antelopes opened up a 10 play drive, highlighted by a key third down reception by Ben Kirkpatrick on the 34 yard line, keeping the drive alive.

The march to paydirt started at the Post 17 following the marking off of the penalty.

After the first down play from Kirkpatrick to Kirkpatrick, Adams went around right end to the 41.

Ben pounded over right guard to the 44 and on third down Joel picked up the first on a keeper through right tackle to the 46.

Adams ran the draw play over left tackle to the 25 yard line and then Ben hauled in a pass and broke tackles to the nine yard line.

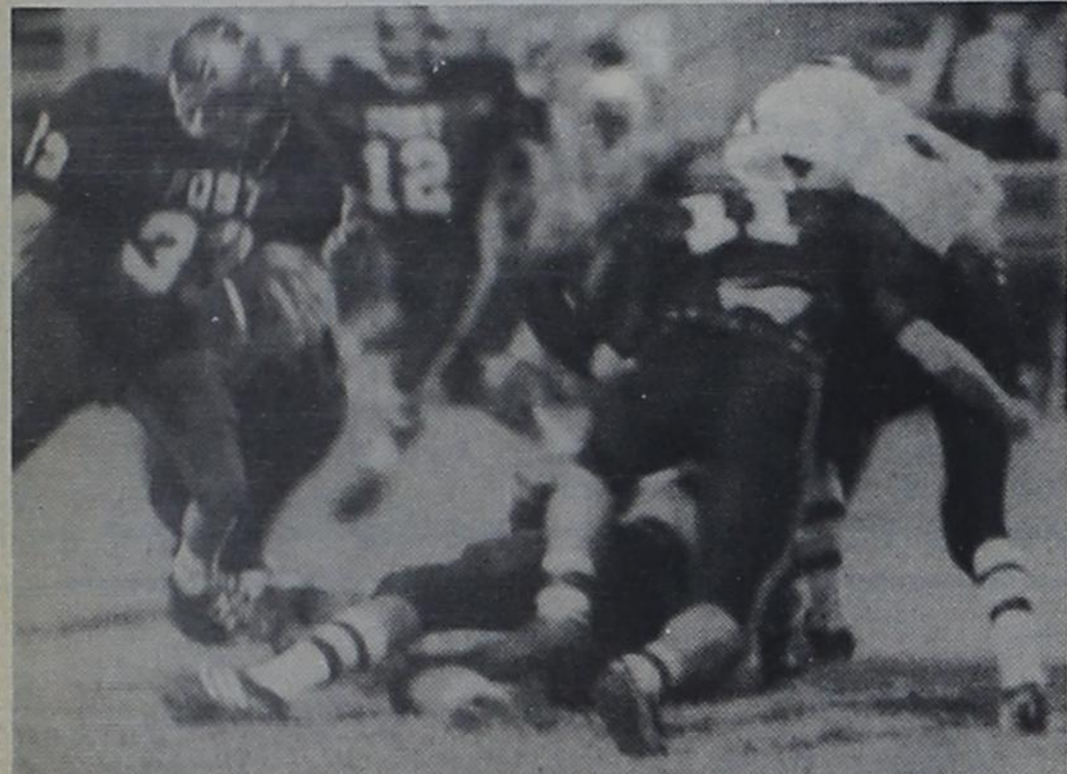
Hair got his second touchdown of the night running behind the blocking over the right side, breaking two tackles on the way to the end zone.

The drive started at the Post 41 following an attempted squib kick.

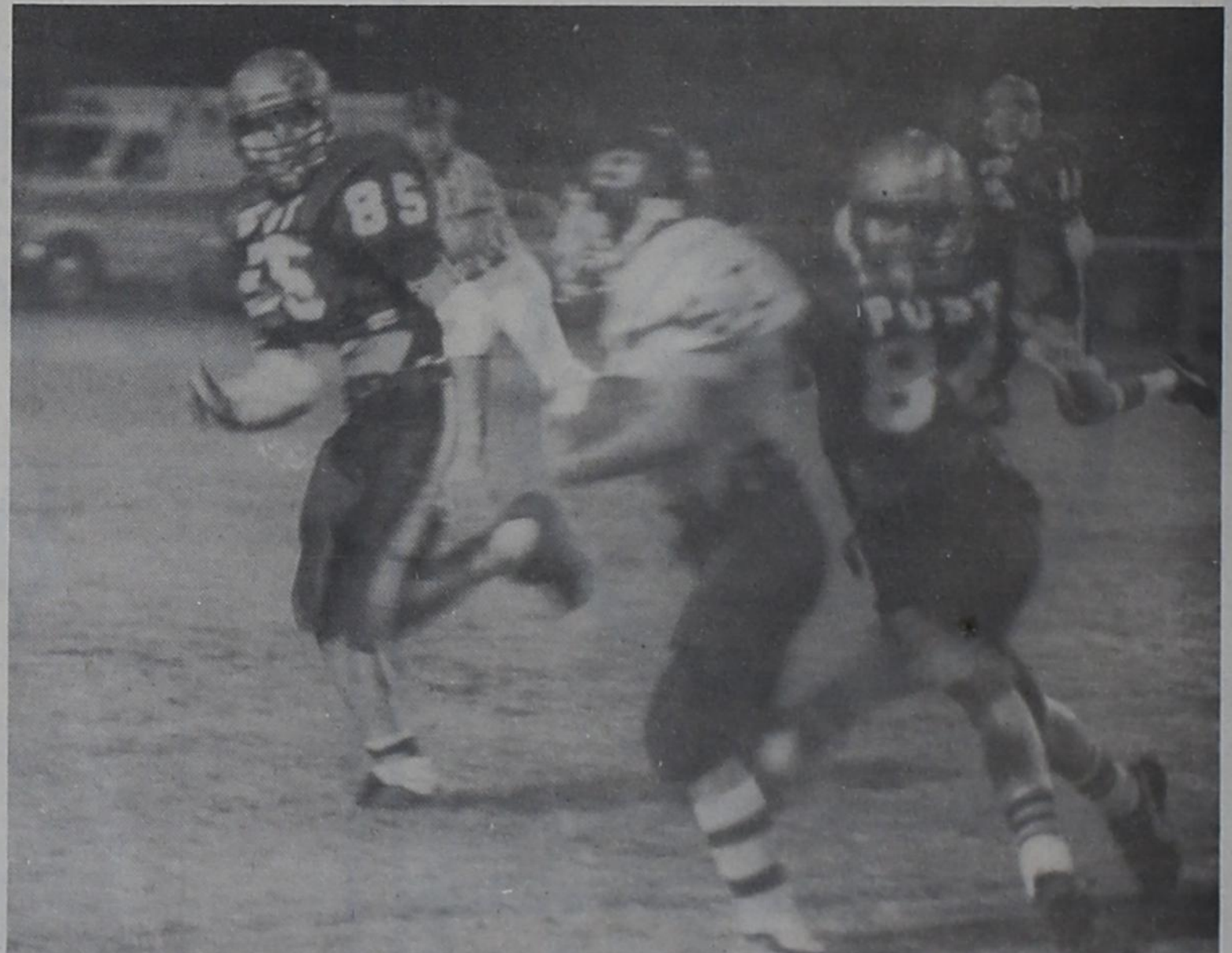
The Antelopes travel to Denver City Friday for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

 "James Mock, Tim Tanner and Keith Craig played an outstanding game," Post Antelope coach David Thompson comments about last Friday's 35-6 win here over Seminole.

The Antelope offensive line controlled the line of scrimmage with their patented quickness and strength.

"I thought Clay Cowdrey, Mock, Delton Osborn, Benny Hair, Rodney Oden and secondary players Sam Hardin, Bruce Crenshaw, Greg Storie and Steve Pena also played extremely well," the coach adds.

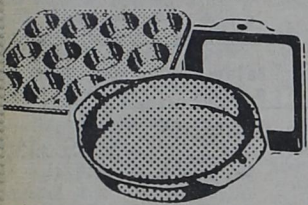

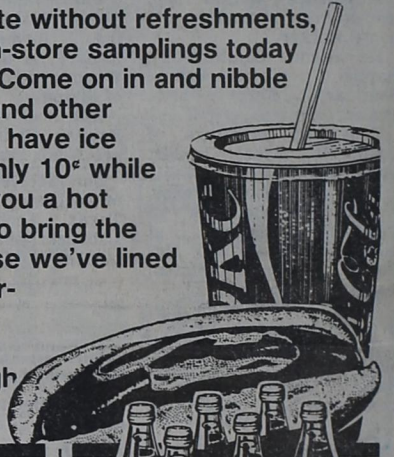

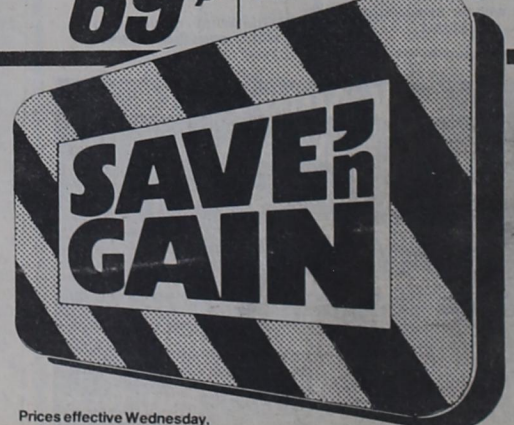
