Garza County United Way Campaign Opens...

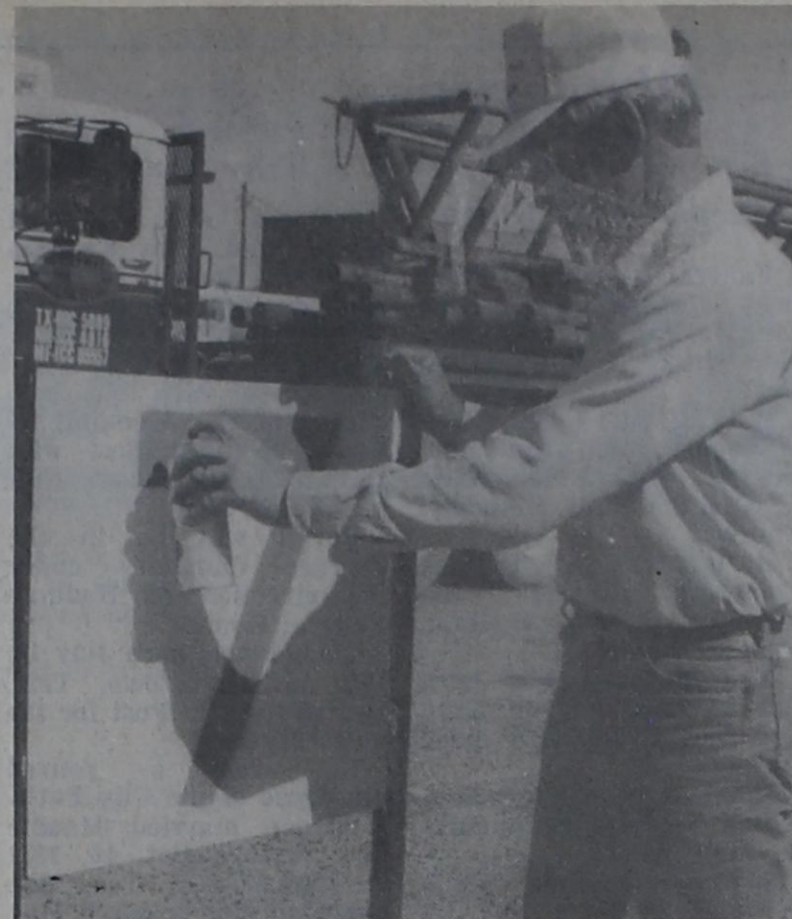
"It's an aggressive goal, but one we believe can be achieved," Garza County United Way drive chairman Wesley W. Burnett says about the 1986 campaign. Volunteers will be canvassing businesses and neighborhoods until November 27, aiming for a \$17,150 budget. Organizations which benefit from the United Way campaign will be helping with the drive. 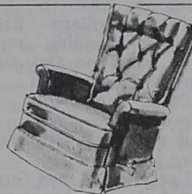

Library Offers Special Services

The Texas State Library, division for the blind and physically handicapped, offers free library service to (1) individuals who permanently or temporarily unable to read or use standard printed material because of a physical impairment, and (2) institutions which serve individuals who are eligible for the service.

Common examples of eligible institutions are hospitals and nursing homes.

In both cases, the eligible persons must be the direct and only recipients of the service.

Persons must meet the following criteria:

1. Must be a resident of Texas.
2. Must have a permanent or temporary physical disability of one or more of the following types:
 - (A) Legal blindness.
 - (B) Visual handicap--not legally blind, but unable to read standard printed material without special aids or devices other than glasses, regardless of optical measurement.
 - (C) Physical handicap--unable to read a book, hold a book, or turn the pages of a book because of a physical limitation, other than visual.
 - (D) Learning disability--

reading disability such as dyslexia, L-LD, MBI, etc., which results from an organic disfunction.

In order to apply for the service an individual must complete an application form and have it certified by a competent authority.

Some available formats and equipment are:

..Talking books--books are recorded on phono discs, and a special machine is required for their use.

These are furnished by the Texas State Library.

These are special machines which play at speeds not available on commercial machines.

It also has a tone arm clip which assists in placing tone arm on record.

..Cassette books--books recorded on cassette tape.

A special cassette player is available which plays at speeds not available on commercial players, and playback only.

A speed control--for cassette machine; allows person to increase or decrease rate of speed at which tape is played.

..Headphones--for both talking machine and cassette machine; allows individual listening; may be helpful to person with impaired hearing.

..Amplifier--A special device for use with the headphones by hearing-impaired people only; can be used with the talking book machine or cassette machine. (The State Commission for the blind will send an application for this device)

..Pillowphone--For both the talking book machine and cassette machine; solely for persons confined to bed.

..Braille Books

..Large Type Books--adult level books only.

..Music--Instructional texts and scores only; no recorded music. Playback

equipment and special attachments are provided free to eligible persons on extended loan for as long as needed. If the equipment is not being used in conjunction with recorded reading material provided by the Texas State Library, it must be returned to the State Commission for the Blind.

Upon receipt of your application you will be sent a catalog which list books available from the library. You may use these to

request books. All of this material is free, even at no charge for postage.

You may pick up an application for this service from the Post Public Library.

You will not even have to pay postage to send in your application.

"We believe that everyone has a right to read, so if you have special requirements, come by the library and let us help," Librarian Pee Wee Pierce comments.

Garza SWCD Annual Report

Garza SWCD 1985 Accomplishments

During 1985 the Soil Conservation Service furnished three man years of assistance to the Garza SWCD.

Soil Conservation Service personnel of the Post Field Office provided services to 217 of the 491 farms and ranches in the District. 137 landowners and operators applied one or more conservation practices resulting in reduction of soil erosion.

New conservation plans were developed on 420 acres and conservation plans were revised on 19,622 acres.

The following practices were carried out in the District during the 1985 program year:

Of the agricultural land in the district over 69 percent has or is receiving assistance through the Great Plains Program. To date 133 contracts have been developed on 393,951 acres in the district. To date 7 Long Term Agreements have been developed on 6019 acres in the district of which one was developed in 1985 on 2749 acres.

ANNUAL REPORT - ACTIVITIES - 1985

The Board of Directors held 12 meetings with 74 percent attendance.

One Director attended the State SWCD Meeting held in Corpus Cristi in October.

Two Directors attended the South Plains Association of SWCD's Meeting in Lubbock in February.

Three Directors attended the South Plains Association of SWCD's Meeting in Plainview in August.

An Annual Conservation Farmer and Rancher Awards Banquet was held in March 1985.

Wind Strip Cropping Helps...

by Butch Wilson
WIND STRIPCROPPING—the practice of creating a plant barrier that is designed to reduce the erosive force of wind on cropland.

If allowed to blow across unprotected fields, wind will deplete soil moisture, sandblast young plants, and worst of all wind will steal valuable topsoil.

It is expensive, in terms of time, labor and fuel to control blowing dust.

The answer to lowering these costs is wind stripcropping.

What is involved in wind stripcropping?

Basically, wind stripcropping involves the planting of either an annual crop such as wheat or a permanent grass such as weeping lovegrass in windstrips a calculated distance apart.

These strips then force the wind up off the ground, thereby reducing it's erosive force.

By lessening the force of the wind you greatly reduce or eliminate the need for sandfighting and preserve soil moisture.

Wind stripcrops, of permanent grass, planted on entire terraces eliminates the need for terrace maintenance.

When terraces are farmed they are eventually plowed down and need maintenance. When terraces have been plowed down and you get a good rain, then you've got real problems.

Normally, one terrace will over-top.

This starts a small hole in the terrace, and in just a little while you've got a broken terrace.

Once one of them breaks, chances are pretty good that the rest of the terraces will break.

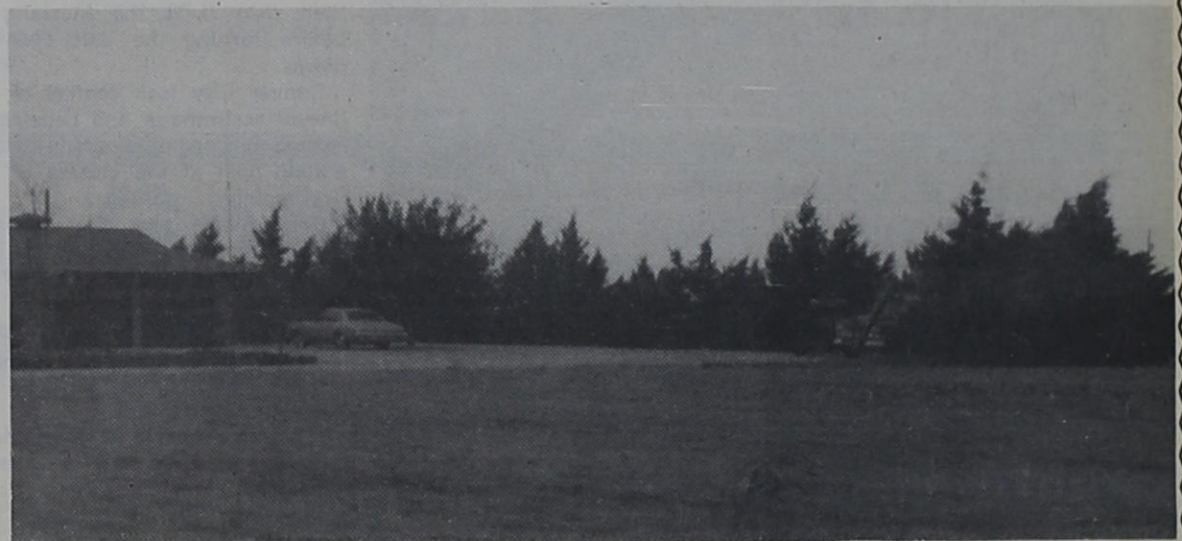
Utilizing permanent grass windstrips, such as weeping lovegrass, on terraces can eliminate this problem.

All in all, wind stripcropping is a multi-purpose alternative to help hold down soil erosion and maintain soil moisture.

These two benefits in combination with the fact that permanent grass windstrips won't spread into the field; the fact that windstrips will cut down on the number of tillage operations required; the fact that windstrips will protect young plants from damaging winds, and the fact that windstrips are economical

to establish all add up to make wind stripcropping a practice worth considering.

They also protect young crops until they get a good start.

The Garza Soil and Water Conservation District in Post has seedling trees available from the Texas forest service.

These trees are grown on the South Plains, and are adapted to this climate.

'Lopes Edge Mustangs 32-27 to Win District

There were a lot of crucial situations late in the game at Denver City last Friday night, none more critical than the fourth down decisions facing Post Antelope coach David Thompson in the closing minutes of the district contest.

"Hey coach," Thompson called to assistant coach Lane Tannehill, "GO FOR IT?" Thompson asked. "Go for it!" Tannehill yelled back.

That decision came with approximately four minutes left, with Post trailing Denver City 27-25.

The Antelopes had been stymied on three plays, and on fourth down were at the Mustang 41 yard line.

Thompson sent the play into the huddle.

Quarterback Joel Kirkpatrick took the snap from center Ron Graves, rolled to his left, set up in the pass protection pocket and fired the football on a direct line to the middle of the field to his brother, wingback Ben Kirkpatrick, who grabbed the picture-perfect pass at the Mustang 24 yard line for a first down.

Fans were on their feet...excitement filled the air. Tracy Price, who had riddled the Mustang defense all night, got two yards to the 22.

The 'Lopes called timeout with 3:51 left in the game.

Price got the call and blasted through a gaping hole over right guard to the Denver City 12 yard line.

On first down Kirkpatrick ran the

option to his left, keeping the ball to the nine.

Price went to the eight over right tackle.

Again Price got the call to the six.

On fourth down the 'Lopes called time out again, now with 1:46 left on the clock.

A tense moment settled on the field, as coaches huddled on the sideline, making a decision.

Go for the field goal and be up by one point...kicking against the wind, or...

When Joel Kirkpatrick and Price trotted back to the huddle, everyone on both sides of the field knew the Antelopes were going for six.

Using the advantage of Price's previous success, Joel peeled back from the snap, faked the ball inside to Price, rolled to his left, with Ben trailing along a few steps behind and to the left...a perfect option play.

When the Mustang defense zeroed in first on Price then on Ben, Joel tucked the ball in, cut inside, squeezing his way to the end zone.

The victory bell rang loud and clear.

With 1:41 left in the game, Price's kick gave the Antelopes the undisputed District 3AAA championship, winning 32-27.

It was up to the Post defensive unit to keep the score intact...and Denver City put on a cliff-hanger drive before the 'Lope defense stopped the effort at the Post 27 yard line with 25 seconds left in the game.

First Half

The 'Lopes took the opening kickoff and marched smartly from their own 21 to the Mustang 34 before turning the ball over on downs.

Denver City took control of the line of scrimmage and penetrated to the four yard line, before kicking a field goal at the closing of the first quarter.

Greg Storie took the Mustang kickoff at the 15, handing the ball to Ben Kirkpatrick, who raced up the middle of the field, cut to his right, broke through two would-be tacklers, then cut back to his left and was finally hauled down at the Mustang 14 yard line.

With 11:48 left in the first half, the 'Lopes opened up a three play touchdown drive...with Price getting the ball...first over left tackle to the six, then over right tackle to the four and on first down cutting around right end to the end zone.

His kick put the 'Lopes out front 7-3.

Denver City got the ball back with 7:17 left in the half, and surprised the Antelope defense as they drove from their own 26 yard line to the end zone in 13 plays, picking up five first downs along the way.

The two point conversion attempt failed, and the Mustangs led 9-7.

The kickoff to the Antelopes was fumbled at the 24, giving the Mustangs a golden opportunity to score, which they did four plays later.

With 52 seconds left in the half,

the 'Lopes looked to be in trouble, trailing 15-7.

Mike Bartlett took the kickoff at the 21 yard line and on first down Price burst through left tackle on a sprint draw to the Denver City 35.

The Antelopes called time out with 39 seconds showing.

Joel faked the ball to Price, dropped back and found Danny Foster on the end of a pass at the 21 for another first down, stopping the clock with 31 seconds.

Another quick pass, this time to Ben Kirkpatrick at the eight, the clock stopped with 21 seconds left.

Price toed the ball through the uprights, putting the Antelopes three points closer going into halftime, trailing 15-10.

Second Half

Post fans, thinking changes at half time might slow down the Mustangs, were disappointed as Denver City took the kickoff and drove 75 yards in seven plays to lead 21-10 with 8:58 left in the third quarter.

The Mustangs were smelling "upset" in the air.
