After a discussion of the matter, the court requested Timms to contact other companies to find out their interest in bidding on the annual contract.

Treasurer Voda Gradine reported to the commissioners that "about 60 percent of the taxes have been collected."

## High School Realignment Set

Texas high school classifications and district alignments for the school years 1986-87 and 1987-88 will be released by the University Interscholastic League office in Austin at 9 a.m. Jan 30, 1986.

According to a U.I.L. spokesman in Austin, the determination for classification will be determined by the average daily enrollment in October 1985, and a "formula" which is specified in the U.I.L. constitution.

Exact positioning of student enrollment by classification will not necessarily be the same as the previous division categories.

6. You'll still be on South Eddy St.

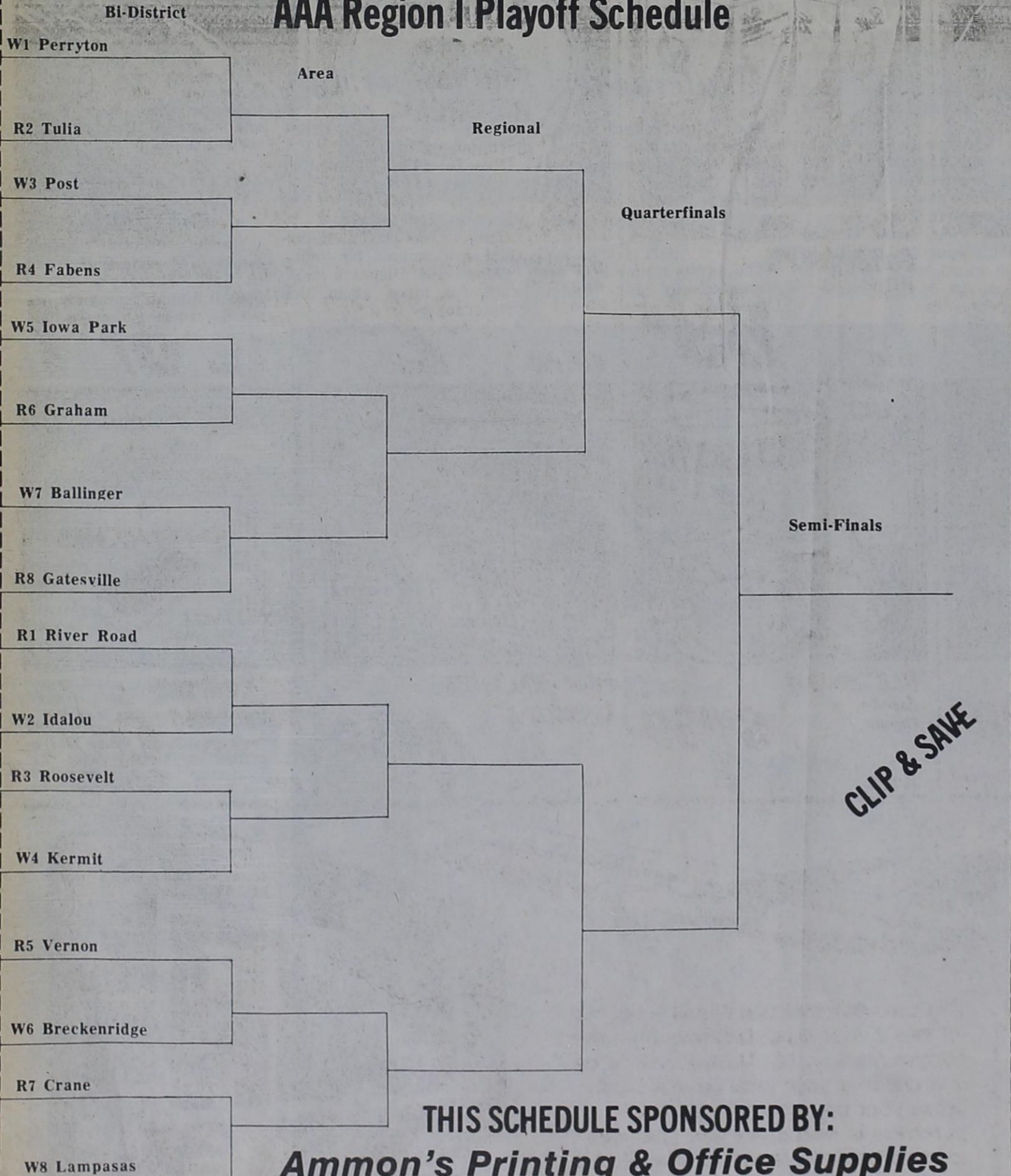

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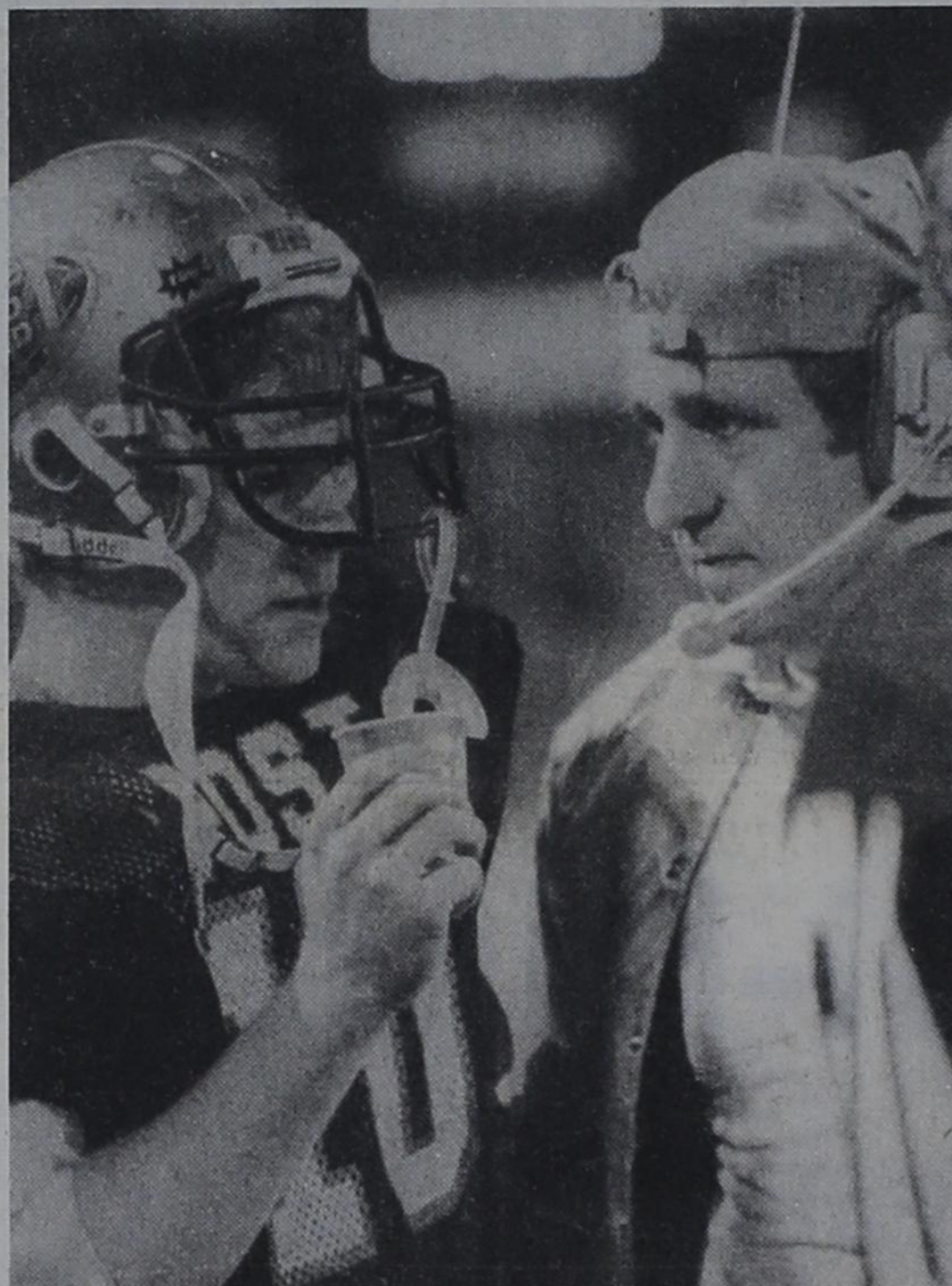

**Dana Morris Explains The 4-H Health Program**

Individual health is "near and dear" to everyone, and the 4-H Health program is one that offers lifelong benefits to all youth who

participate, says Dana Morris, Garza County 4-H Health Project Teen Leader.

Specific objectives of the program are as follows:

-Accept responsibility for maintaining and improving physical, intellectual, emotional and social health.

-Acquire patterns of living that foster concern for health and the quality of life.

-Learn about community health resources, how these resources respond or can be changed to respond to community needs, and how to use appropriately the health care systems in the community.

-Learn about environmental issues as they reflect health.

-Learn to make decisions that affect personal, family and community health.

-Learn how people grow and develop physically, intellectually, emotionally and socially throughout life.

-Participate in health service activities.

4-H members who excel in the program can qualify for awards provided by Kraft, Inc.

These include an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress for one member per state and eight \$1,000 scholarships at the national level.

**Credit Report Rights**  
A poor credit report can make it difficult for you to buy a house or car, or get certain jobs.

Yet, until recently consumers had little protection against credit reports containing erroneous, incomplete or dated information.

The Federal Trade Commission's Fair Credit Reporting Act now gives consumers some rights that can help them clear a poor credit report.

For example, if you have been denied credit or employment because of information in your credit file, you have the right to be told the name and address of the reporting agency.

Then that agency must tell you the nature, content, and source of all the information in your credit file, except medical information.

The agency must also reveal who has received a consumer report on you within the last six months, or the last two years if the

report was for employment purposes.

You should get this information free of charge if you request it within 30 days of being denied credit.

After that, you may be charged a fee for the disclosure.

You can also request in

writing a telephone interview or visit the agency in person.

The agency may require some information other than to establish who you are.

Most importantly, you can challenge incorrect, unverified or incomplete

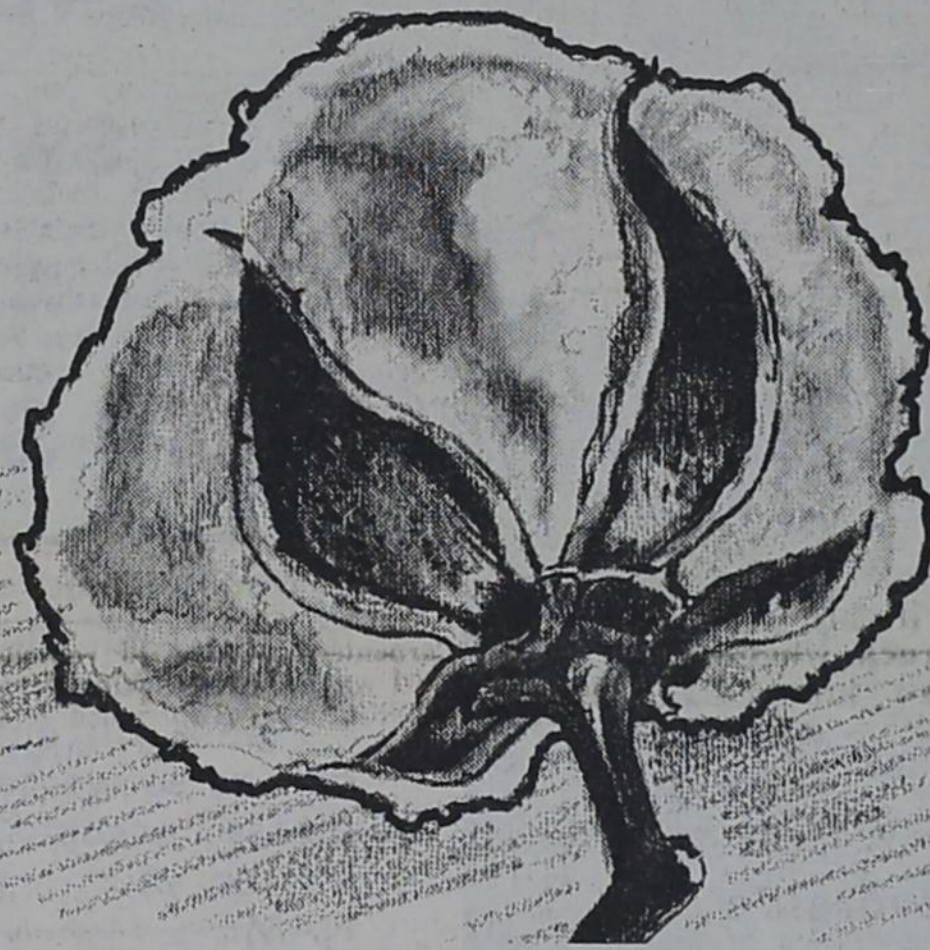
information in your files, and it must be removed.

If the issue is not resolved, you may explain your side of the story in 100 words to be included in future reports.

The agency must also inform those who have recently received the report

of any item which the agency deletes, without any charge to you.

The best policy is to maintain a good credit record and when there is a problem exercising your consumer rights may help you resolve it.

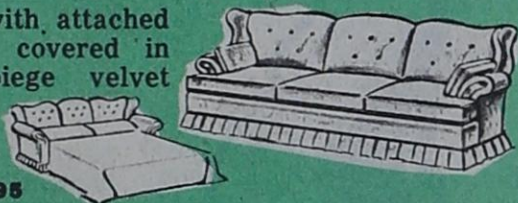
