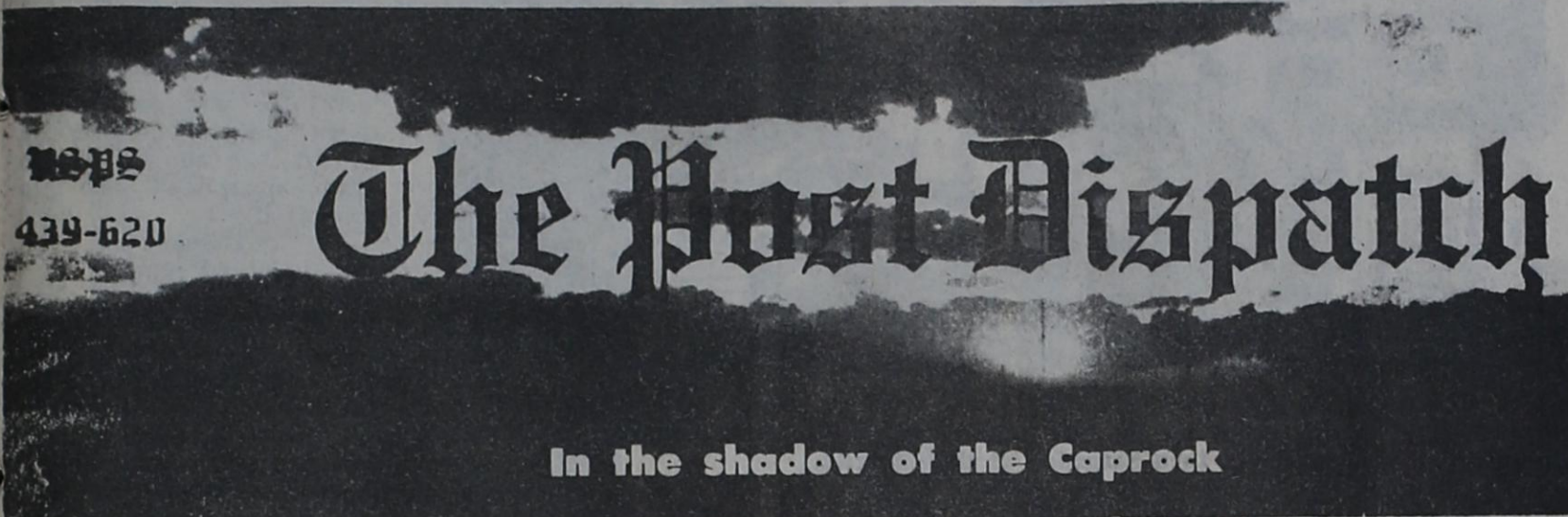
We have attempted to use our funds as a last resort and have pulled resources from the county commissioners, Hospital District, BSSH volunteer program, churches, and individuals when we could.

New Field House Gets Okay

A contract to build the new field house was approved by the Post Independent School District board of trustees at the regular meeting Tuesday, Nov. 12.

The contract with Hallmark Builders includes a specified architect and structural engineer.

The vote by the board was unanimous.

The board also received the annual audit report, getting high praises from the auditing firm of Hearn, Criswell and Robison.

"Your administration maintains excellent detailed reports and provided the most extensive accounting code of any other school district we are familiar

with, even more so than Lubbock ISD," the auditor commented.

The firm gave an unqualified audit, the best that is offered.

During the report, board members questioned why the audition firm had to balance the year-end report.

The auditor said that the Central Appraisal District had not completed the balance, therefore the auditors finished it.

The estimated extra cost to the school board was \$1,000 to \$1,500.

Board member Don Payne insisted that the appraisal district be informed that the rolls will be closed and balanced at

the end of fiscal year, and if it isn't done and the auditor has to do it, the extra cost would be deducted from payments to the appraisal district.

In other action, the board approved the renewal of certificates of deposit and discussed the new state mandated Annual Performance Report, prepared by Superintendent Bill Shiver.

After reviewing the hefty document, the board passed

a resolution encouraging the entire school staff to become familiar with the report.

No action was taken on a request from the Garza Memorial Hospital board to name a new member to the Central Appraisal District.

Attending the meeting were board president Jack Kirkpatrick, members Payne, Royce Hart, Pru Basquez, Tom Middleton, Jimmy Bartlett and Jerry Osborn.

U.S. Hwy 84 Traffic Cut to One Lane on Bridges

Beginning Thursday, traffic on U.S. 84 will be reduced to one-lane in each direction at the bridges over Sand Creek, about 19 miles southeast of Post, due to bridge construction, according to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Weather permitting, the highway department will close the northbound bridge early Thursday morning.

Northbound traffic will be detoured to the southbound bridge where it will be separated from southbound traffic by concrete barriers.

Vehicles over ten feet wide will not be allowed over the bridge and will have to take another route.

Work on the bridges over Sand Creek is part of a \$3.7 million dollar project to reconstruct five bridges in Garza County.

Two other bridges are northwest of the Sand Creek construction, on U.S. 84 southeast of Justiceburg.

The fifth bridge is about 6.5 miles east of Post over a fork of the Brazos River.

Traffic will be reduced to one-lane in each direction at the construction site near Justiceburg sometime next week, weather permitting.

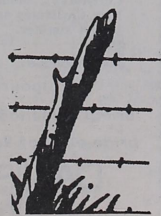

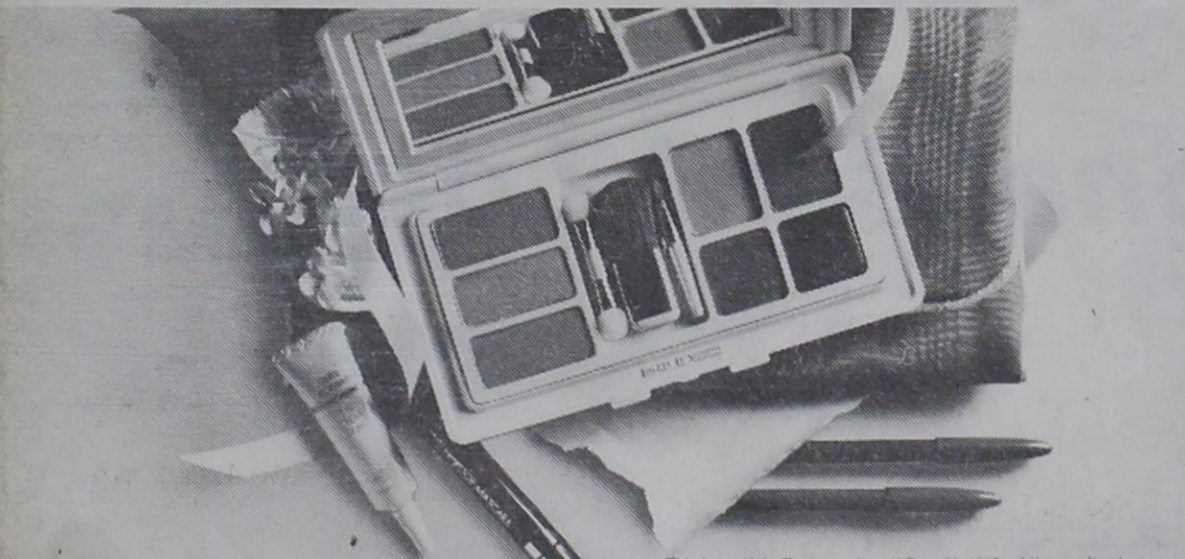

United Way Organizations Need All the Help You Can Give

\$150.00 - Medical and dental expenses for Garza county residents who reside in halfway houses and Girl's Town.

\$250.00 - Informational and educational literature (We estimate approximately 300 pieces of literature was distributed at the Health Fair in September, 1985)

\$200.00 - Assistance patients have needed to be placed at Girl's Town, halfway houses. Also, we needed to get two children out of an alcoholic home to live with their natural mother and contributed toward plane tickets for them. We purchased bus tickets for a Girl's Town resident to visit her family here. Also we assisted a family whose mother was on the verge of a nervous breakdown with expenses to enable them to move.

\$50.00 - Transportation by volunteers or purchase gas to transport patients to or from BSSH for admission or discharge.

\$125.00 - Payment of required lab fees. Blood tests are required for some patients every 3 to 6 months. Some are unable to pay. Arrangements with Garza Memorial Hospital and BSSH have put these fees at a minimum.

\$250.00 - We have four Garza County residents who are either permanent residents at BSSH or are in Girl's Town or halfway houses. They all have no income and families that are unable to provide even basic necessities such as shoes, coats, jeans, etc. We attempt to provide their needs as we are informed of them.

\$240.00 - Provide \$20.00 a month for a Garza County resident who will be at

BSSH indefinitely. She has no income and no family support. This request was made of us by BSSH staff.

\$60.00 - Purchase of birthday cards to be mailed to patients on their birthday. This is allowing for 100 cards at 40 cents each and \$20.00 for postage.

Garza County Child Welfare Board by Tom Pass

The Garza County Child Welfare Board was organized over a decade ago to provide child protection services to the children of Post and Garza county, to educate parents, and to provide support for Department of Human Resources staff people working in this area.

The Board receives funding only from donations, and an occasional fundraiser, such as selling popcorn at the recent County Fair.

The Board, however, provides birthday and Christmas gifts for any children in foster care, buys clothes several times a year, pays for emergency medical treatment, eyeglasses for foster children, and would like to help the Child Protection Worker defray costs of essentials purchased for children suddenly taken into custody.

Currently, toothbrushes, shampoo, and other items needed by foster children are purchased at the worker's expense.

The Board currently has less than \$50 in its account. In the event that we did have foster children, or an emergency situation arise, this could be a very inadequate sum.

The people of Post have always been generous in their support of the Board, and the children in its

care, but we have often had to make emergency radio and newspaper appeals for clothing or other supplies, a process which is effective, but time consuming.

We would welcome

United Way support for our program, so that with the assurance of adequate financial resources, we could devote our energies to programs designed to prevent and treat child abuse and neglect.

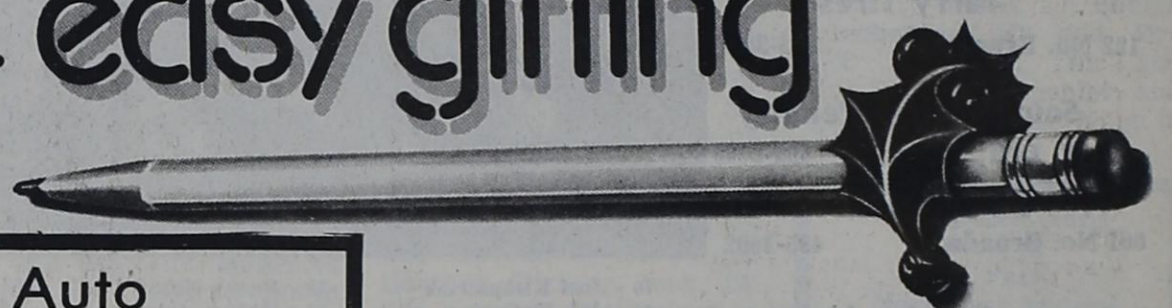

Antelopes Send Wildcats Licking Wounds

The Post Antelopes put it all together in one basket last Saturday night in Pecos, whaloping the Fabens Wildcats 75-14 in the bi-district championship.

The tone for the night was set early, as the Antelopes won the toss, took the kickoff and with 17 seconds expired on the clock took the lead for good.

Mike Bartlett took the kickoff, handed to Greg Storie who then handed off to Bruce Crenshaw and

he raced down his left side line for 75 yards for the touchdown.

Fabens got a favorable penalty on the ensuing kickoff, and started their drive at the Post 48 yard line.

Unable to move the ball against a tough Post defense, the Wildcats punted the ball dead at the Antelope five.

Ten plays and five first downs later, the 'Lopes struck again, with Ben Kirkpatrick running over left guard to the end zone.

The next Fabens offensive effort was stalled as Crenshaw intercepted a pass on the Post 26 yard line and returned it to the 34.

With 2:01 left in the first quarter, the 'Lopes opened up a seven play drive, capped by Tracy Price blasting over right tackle from the one inch line.

The drive was highlighted by Benny Hair, Ben Kirkpatrick and a pass play to Danny Foster who took the ball from the 25 to near the end zone.

The point after kick put the 'Lopes out front 21-0, with 11:33 left in the first half.

Another four downs for Fabens put the punt at the Post 35 yard line.

Starting the touchdown drive with 9:52 left in the first half, the Antelopes marches the 65 yards in five plays, using Hair, Price and quarterback Joel Kirkpatrick on the option.

Price got the touchdown on a sweep around left end behind a

key block by Hair.

A personal foul on Fabens had the ball set on the Wildcats' 30 yard line for the kickoff.

They drove the ball to the Post 44, before being pushed back to the Fabens 48.

On fourth down the Wildcats attempted a fake punt and pass play, which did not fool the 'Lopes as Steve Pena grabbed the pass at the 35 of Post and returned it to the Fabens 30.

A clipping penalty set the ball back to the Fabens 45.

It took three plays for 'Lopes to bring the score to 34-0.

Price went to the 33, fumbled at the end of the play, which was recovered by Crenshaw, then Joel Kirkpatrick threw a pass to Foster on the 17, who escaped tacklers to the two.

From there Price put his shoulder low over right guard to the end zone.

Fabens could get no respect from the 'Lope defense, as on their next possession a quarterback sack and recovery of the fumble at the 11 yard line set up another Post touchdown.

With 13 seconds left in the half, Joel Kirkpatrick rolled to his left, after faking the hand off to Price, and threw a picture-perfect pass in the end zone to Foster.

Price's extra point kick with eight seconds left in the first half, put the 'Lopes on top 41-0.

Second Half

Another four downs and punt in the opening of the second half gave the 'Lopes the ball at their own 39 with 10 minutes left in the third quarter.

The ten play scoring drive was capped by a four yard run by Hair behind the blocking of Keith Craig, Jay Fluitt, James Mock and Ron Graves.

Hair and Price shared running chores during the drive.

The defensive shutout was marred on the following kickoff as Wildcat running back Sammy Ceasear slipped by several would-be tacklers and went the distance to the goal line.

He took the ball at the goalline, and was credited with a 100 yard kickoff return.

The Antelopes didn't waste any time returning the favor, as Bartlett took the kickoff on the 18 and returned it to the Fabens 47 with a key block by Keith Craig.

With 4:34 left in the third quarter, it took the champions five

plays to get another six points.

On first down Joel faked the handoff to Price, and found a wide open Foster at the 32 yard line at the end of a pass. Foster scrambled to the 14.

After an offside penalty, Joel threw a pass to Sam Binford at the 10 and then Price went to the four.

Joel picked up the touchdown as he pulled the option around his right side, cut inside at the last second and with 2:07 left in the third quarter the Antelopes led 53-6.

Price's kick was good, the scoreboard read 54-6.

With time running out in the third quarter, Fabens was forced to punt on fourth down from their own 15. Delton Osborn and Adam Perez rushed the punter, blocked the punt, the ball fell back to the end zone and Perez fell on it for another Antelope touchdown.

Another Price extra point kick put the 'Lopes ahead 61-6.

Fabens got a first down on their next series, but gave up the ball on a punt with 9:02 left in the game.

Starting at the Fabens 46, it took seven plays to reach paydirt.

Reserve quarterback Jay McCook guided the Antelopes, with running provided by Ben Kirkpatrick, Greg Adams and Eddie Moat.

Adams got the touchdown on a nine and one-half yard race over left tackle with 5:45 left in the game.

Again Price's extra point kick was good, the 'Lopes jumped out front 68-6.

Crenshaw got the next punt at the Post 38, then went down his left side to the Fabens 48.

The reserves were determined to score.

With 4:27 left in the game, reserve quarterback Eric Reece handed the ball to Bartlett, who put on a show for the fans.

Going over right tackle, he cut back to his left, broke through two would-be tacklers, leaving his right shoe on the ground at the 10 yard line as he left the final defender sprawled.

The extra point ended the antelope scoring at 75.

Late in the game Fabens scored.

The Antelopes travel to Hereford this Saturday for a 2 p.m. kickoff, facing the Perryton Rangers, District 1AAA champions and winners over Tulia last Friday.
