'Wizard of Oz' Staged Friday

Two performances of "The Wizard of Oz" will be offered this week by the Post High School drama class, featuring actors and actresses from all grade levels. The first performance will be held Friday at 7:30 p.m. followed by a second offering Sunday at 2:30 p.m., both at the School Auditorium in the Elementary building.

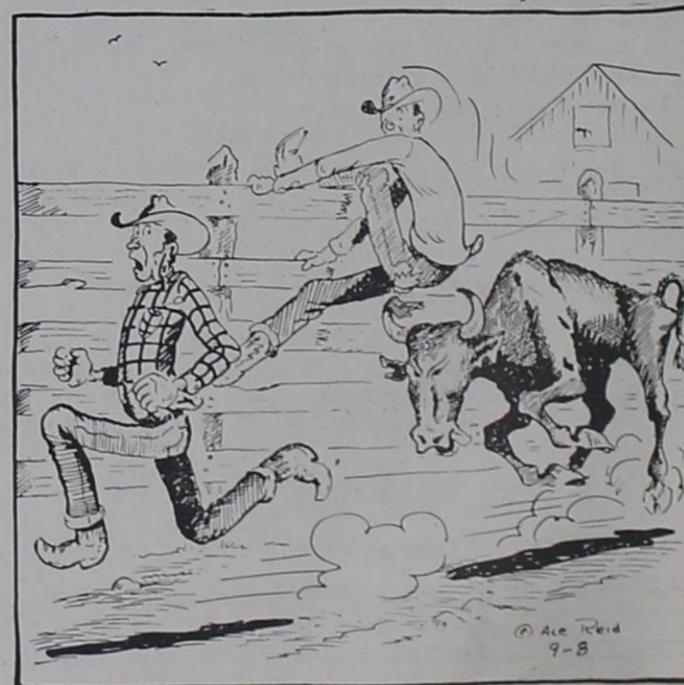



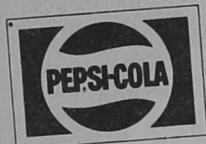

Antelopes Defuse Bearcats to Win 21-12

Two sophomore running backs, a veteran quarterback and a come-from-behind second half defensive effort earned the Post Bold Gold Antelopes a quarterfinal

berth following last Saturday's 21-12 Regional Championship win over Ballinger in Snyder.

Trailing 12-7 at halftime, the antelopes mustered up a stiff defense against the pass conscious

Bearcats in the opening of the third quarter, and then put on a time consuming touchdown drive to take the lead.

The Antelope offense controlled the line of scrimmage effectively, especially in the fourth quarter, when the Bearcats were unable to convert a first down and only had three snaps from center in the final stanza.

The turn-around was due in part to the aggressive pass rush by defensive tackle James Mock, who pressured Ballinger's Eric Lugo on a number of pass plays, while Antelope linebackers Eddie Moat and Delton Osborn, along with the secondary held the Bearcats to no first downs in the fourth quarter.

Getting Behind

The 'Lopes took the opening kickoff and rammed the ball from their own 20 to the Bearcat one yard line, before stalling on fourth down.

Tracy Price, Ben Kirkpatrick and Benny Hair, with the option running of quarterback Joel Kirkpatrick, set up a first down at the Ballinger 32.

Price blasted over left guard to the 30, then Joel pulled the option, pitching the ball as he was being tackled, to brother Ben around left end and he avoided tackles to the 27.

On third down Hair went over right guard to the 28 and on fourth down Joel fooled the Bearcats with a fake handoff to his left, the "bootlegged" the ball around right end for the important first down at the 20.

The 'Lopes were on a roll. Price got the call on a sweep around right end...and suffered an ankle injury on the play.

Greg Adams came in at tailback and promptly sliced through the Bearcat defenders to the 12, then over right guard on second down to the four, setting up a first and goal.

Adams went over right tackle to the two, then a pass to Ben Kirkpatrick went too high and on third down Hair went over right guard to the one.

The Bearcat defense was ready for the option left, as Joel was trapped at the three yard line on fourth down.

With 5:03 left in the first quarter, the Bearcats mounted a 17 play scoring drive, going into the end zone with 10:15 left in the second quarter.

The extra point kick by Cory Lee sailed wide right, the Bearcats led 6-0.

The 'Lopes Strike Back

Taking the ball at the 19, Greg Storie handed the kickoff to Bruce Crenshaw, who raced down the left sideline to the 33.

Nine plays later the 'Lopes led 7-6, on the running of Ben Kirkpatrick, Hair and Joel Kirkpatrick's key pass play to Danny Foster which set up a first and goal at the eight yard line.

Ben carried around left end to the four and on second down Hair plunged over left guard to the end zone.

Crenshaw kicked the extra point for the Antelopes, who then led 7-6.

The Bearcats came right back, mixing up running and passing as they scored on an 11 play drive, covering 66 yards with 2:14 left in the half, the two point conversion attempt failed when Osborn deflected the pass to Grant Teplicek in the end zone.

Following a punt on the next possession, the Bearcats were stopped when Mock's smashing tackle of Lugo caused the ball to pop loose and Adam Perez fell on it at the Post 32 yard line.

An impressive Antelope offensive drive was stymied with 11 seconds left in the half when Lugo intercepted Joel's pass to Crenshaw near the Ballinger end zone.

Second Half

Echoing an age-old saying, "there are two halves to a football game," the Antelopes came out of the locker room with a different attitude in the third quarter.

Ballinger got the kickoff and using the Antelope "starburst" return plan, advanced to their own 33.

The Bearcats managed seven plays before being forced to punt, as the Antelope defense, led by Moat and Osborn, stopped Ballinger.

The punt went short into a stiff northerly breeze, as the Antelope offense sprinted onto the field at 8:54 into the third quarter on their own 33 yard line.

The offensive line went to work, and with tailback Greg Adams also sidelined with an injury, sophomore Mike Bartlett took up the tailback duties, lined up beside sophomore starter Ben Kirkpatrick.

Kirkpatrick took the first play over left guard to the 42, then Joel found Foster across the middle to the Ballinger 42 and a first down.

Hair pounded over right guard to the 36 and a holding penalty set the ball back to the Post 48.

Joel scrambled out of the grasp

of would-be tacklers to the Ballinger 49.

Hair went over right guard to the 41 and a delay of game penalty on third down set the ball back to the 46.

The big play of the series then came on a flair pass to Ben around the left end and he poured on the steam from the 40 to the nine yard line for a first and goal.

Bartlett was sacked on the sweep to the 13.

On second down Joel rolled to his left, and threaded the needle on a pass to Crenshaw, who was sandwiched between two Bearcat defenders in the left end zone corner.

Crenshaw's extra point kick was all the Antelopes needed, as they led 14-12 with 4:45 left in the third quarter.

Now it would be up to the defense to contain the explosive Ballinger offense.

On third down at the Post 41, Mock slammed Terry Strambler to the ground for no gain, and the Bearcats were forced to punt.

Against the wind the punt went less than 20 yards with 1:53 left in the third quarter, the 'Lopes would start the final touchdown drive.

Time-Eating Drive

It was a 17 play, 73 yard effort and ended with 5:37 left in the game.

First downs came with Ben on a

Defense, Offense Improves

"We felt all along we could win," coach David Thompson says about last Saturday's 21-12 win over Ballinger, "it was just a matter of our players giving more intensity."

Trailing 12-7 at halftime, the Antelopes came out in the second half, controlled the ball offensively and played stronger defense.

"We hit real good throughout the game, but you know, Ballinger has a good football team, and they played real good," Thompson adds.

"The team showed a great deal of character, coming back and winning, especially considering the number one and two tailbacks were out with injuries," the coach observes.

He praised Ben Kirkpatrick, Benny Hair, Joel Kirkpatrick, Mike Bartlett, Danny Foster and Bruce Crenshaw for their performances.

"Again, our offensive line played outstanding football," the coach emphasizes, "and I can't say enough good about the way they execute on blocking assignments."

"We were just a little more physical than they were," Thompson continues.

"I think Foster had his best game," he adds.

delay over right guard to the 41, Bartlett on the sweep around left end to the Ballinger 47, again Bartlett on the sweep around right end to the 32, Hair over right tackle to the 21 and Hair over left guard on third down to the eight.

The final eight yards were tough, with Joel keeping the ball over left tackle to the six, Bartlett getting no gain on the sweep and on third down Joel pulling the option around left tackle to the one.

Ballinger called time out with 5:40 left.

On fourth down, fans on their feet and coaches on the edge of the field, the Antelope offensive line sprinted to the line of scrimmage...Joel handed the ball to Hair, who slammed behind the right side on a dive play to the end zone and the six points.

Crenshaw put the finishing touches on the scoring with his extra point kick, separating the teams by nine points.

Ballinger would have to get more than a touchdown to win.

The Antelope defense pinned their ears back for an all-out rush on Lugo and on first down at the 33, following the kickoff, Mock pressured the Bearcat quarterback into an early loss of the screen pass to Strambler.

Without proper time, the screen play was nipped by a quick reacting Rodney Oden, who wrapped up Strambler at the 37.

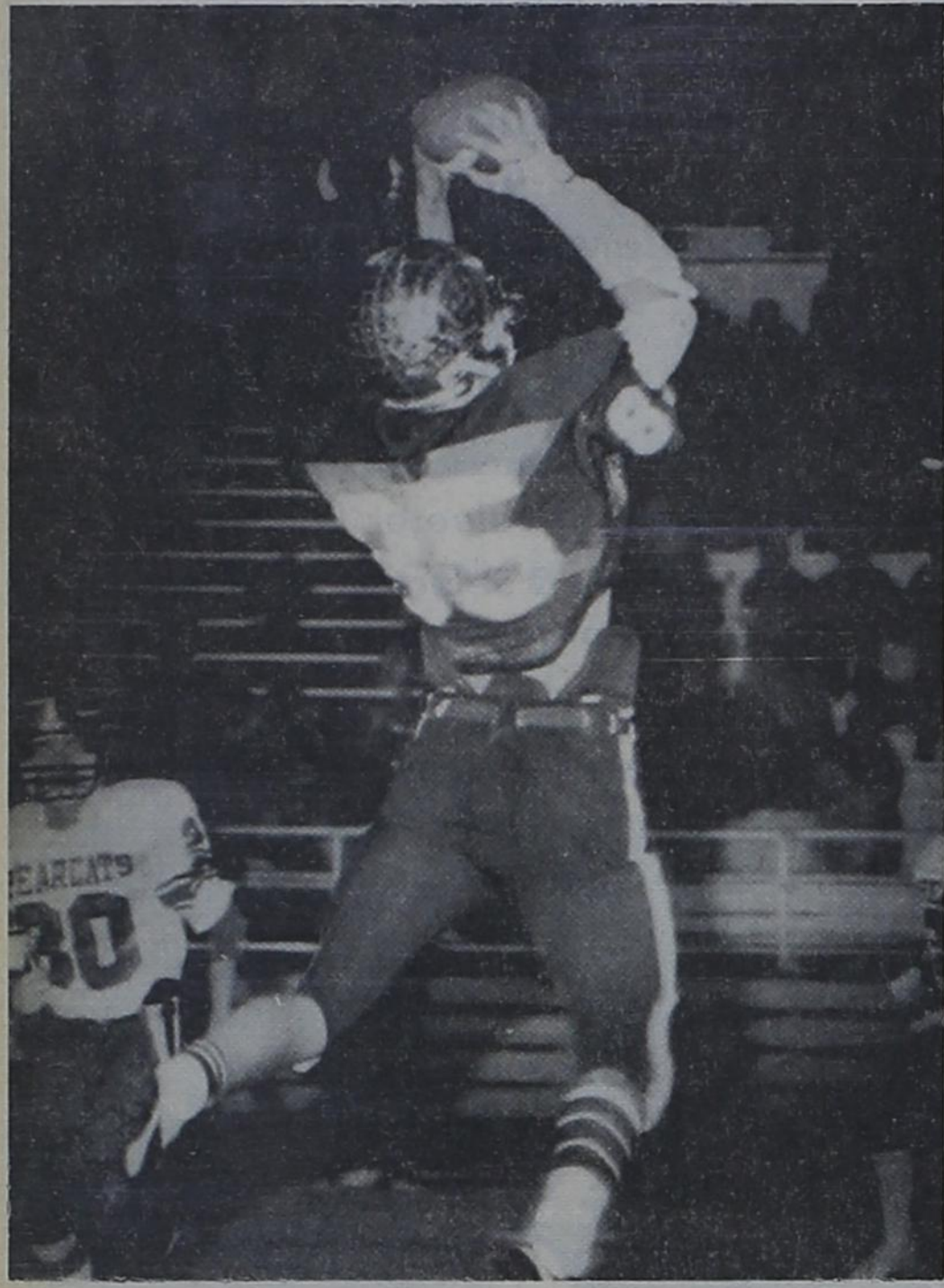
On second down Lugo threw a completed pass to Brad Matschek at the 46, who was pounded after the reception by Steve Pena; Hair and Oden...

Thawing a Turkey

Most traditional roast turkey Thanksgiving dinners start out with a frozen bird.

They should also start with a safe procedure for thawing the turkey.

You can safely thaw a frozen turkey in one of three ways.

The simplest method also takes the longest time.

Leave the turkey in its original plastic wrapper and place it on a tray in the refrigerator.

It will take about 24 hours for each five pounds of turkey to thaw.

That's three days for a 15-pound bird.

With the second method, you leave the turkey in its original plastic wrapper, cover it with cold water and change the water frequently.

It will take about half an hour per pound to thaw, or eight hours for a 15-pound turkey.

Using your microwave oven will be the quickest method of thawing.

Follow the directions that come with the appliance for times.

You may need to turn the turkey so that it will defrost evenly and not start to cook.

If you thaw the turkey using either the water method or a microwave oven, be sure to refrigerate or cook the turkey as soon as it is thawed.

down on seeds collected from various parts of the field.

"If you hear the seed coat crack when you bite it, the seeds are dry enough to be processed."

"If the seed is soft and just mashes down without a distinct crack, the moisture content is still too high," he said.

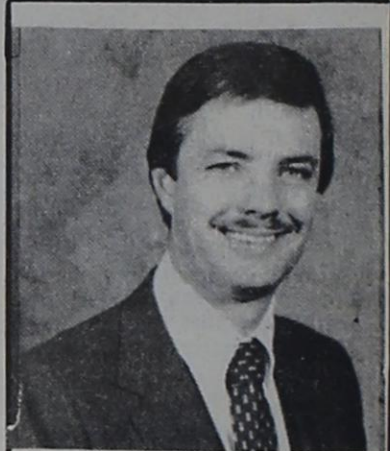
Also, most delinting plant operators have moisture meters and are willing to check the moisture content of seed cotton in the module or even before harvest as a customer service.

If you want the seed for planting and it still is too moist, the best thing is to delay harvest for a few more days, Supak advised.

"We do have a hard freeze in the weather forecast," he said. That, followed by a few days of open, dry weather, should finish the drying process, he noted.

"We think this (high seed moisture) is just a short term problem," Supak said. "We are in that time when the fiber and bur are dry enough to harvest, but the seed is still too green to process."

Cotton harvesting is moving into full swing from San Angelo and Big Spring northward across the South Plains.

The crop is reported to be stripping and ginning well, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

But he cautioned producers who are catching seed for planting next season to check their seed moisture carefully before taking it to the delinters.

"There have been reports of problems with seed that is to be delinted and used as planting seed," said Dr James R. Supak, Extension cotton agronomist. In many instances, the seed moisture content is still too high, he explained.

Supak noted that to avoid damage during delinting, the seed moisture content must be below 10 percent, preferably 7 to 8 percent.

"They've been getting quite a bit in the 12 to 15 percent seed moisture range, and that's too high for delinting," he added.

The high moisture content can cause the seed to go through a natural heating process which damages seed quality during storage in modules, or it can result in damage to the seed during the delinting process, he said.

The Extension specialist said a good way to check seed moisture, if the field is ready to strip, is to walk through the field and bite

Seat Belt Law to be Enforced...

Department of Public Safety enforcement of the new Texas safety belt law began on Sunday, Dec 1, 1985.

The law, expected to save hundreds of lives a year in Texas by encouraging more motorists to buckle-up, took effect Sept 1.

Drivers and front-seat passengers of cars and trucks up to three-quarter ton capacity will be subject to fines of \$25 to \$50 for violations committed after December 1.

"Informal observations by DPS troopers indicate that two-thirds of Texas motorists are already complying with this law," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director.

"Those motorists who are not observing this statute are risking losing their lives or being seriously injured in a vehicle accident, and soon they'll also be facing the prospect of paying a fine for their oversight."

Adams said that in most instances, troopers will be checking for compliance with the safety belt law during routine traffic violator contacts.

However, he pointed out that troopers will have the option of stopping motorists if the officers have probable cause to believe the law is being violated.

"The possibility of paying a fine for failing to use a safety belt should increase the incentive for observing this law, but much greater consequences could be involved for motorists who don't use this proven, lifesaving device," Adams said.

"What value can be placed on the loss of a human life or a long-term, serious injury resulting from a crash in which a safety belt could have made the difference?"

The new law did not change the child safety seat statute, which provides that children under two years of age must be secured in a federally-approved child safety seat system when they are riding in a passenger car or light truck (¾ ton capacity and less).

Children from two to four years of age must be secured by a safety belt or safety seat system when riding in a car or light truck.

The only persons exempted from the safety belt law are U.S. Postal Service employees while performing their carrier duties and motorists who possess a written statement from a licensed doctor stating that the person cannot wear a safety belt for medical reasons.

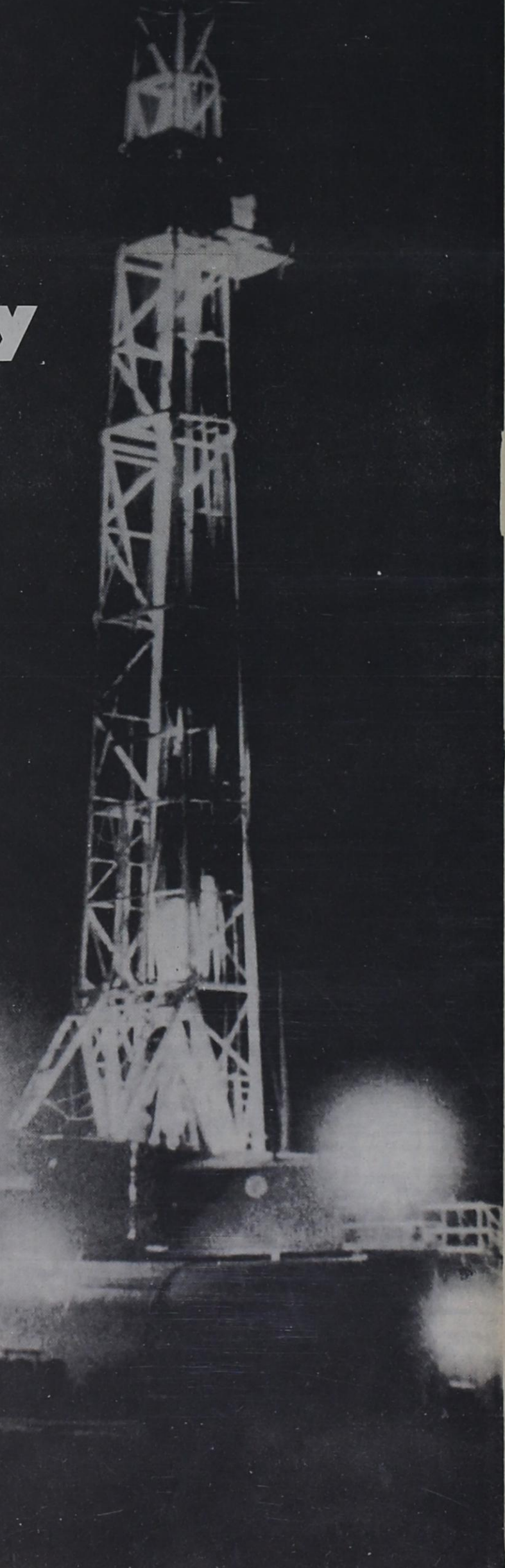


