

PROPOSED PROJECT - This map shows the general location of the proposed Mexia Creek lake near Baird. The approximate location of the dam is indicated by the heavy line. The oblong, checked line indicate the general location of the lake. The pipeline, about 9,000 feet long, would extend to the municipal power plant where the filter facilities would be located. The heavy square within the city is the Callahan County Courthouse. The old route of U.S. highway 80 is shown. Engineering for the project is being done by Freese and Nichols of Fort Worth. The lake would contain about 2,000 acre feet of water and provide a million gallons of water a day. The town's present minimum need-the amount it must have is estimated at 125,000 gallons a day,, so the lake would provide for future growth. Freese and Nichols estimate the lake would cost the water district \$188,870.
