Democratic county chairman Dick Tanner reported that Sheriff Jim Phippen and V.L. Buster Shumard joined four other candidates in the race.

Filing earlier for the sheriff's office were Donney Walker, Tommy Duncan, Mike Harper and O.G. Junior Shepherd.

Other contested positions include Precinct One commissioner with five candidates challenging incumbent Buck Craft.

The other candidates are Jimmy Holeman, Elton Lee, Keith Adams, Darrell Jones and Jay Hart.

Precinct Three commissioner Mike Cisneros is challenged by Cecil Foster Sr., Tommy Young and Juan (John) Bustoz.

Unopposed in the election are county attorney Preston Poole, tax assessor-collector Ruth Reno, Justice of the Peace Precinct One Shelia Melton, constables Precinct One Lonnie Gene Peel, Precinct Three Leroy Demming and Precinct Four Cephas Bilberry.

The primary election will be held May 6.

The council meeting last Monday also included the call for bids on paving and seal coating.

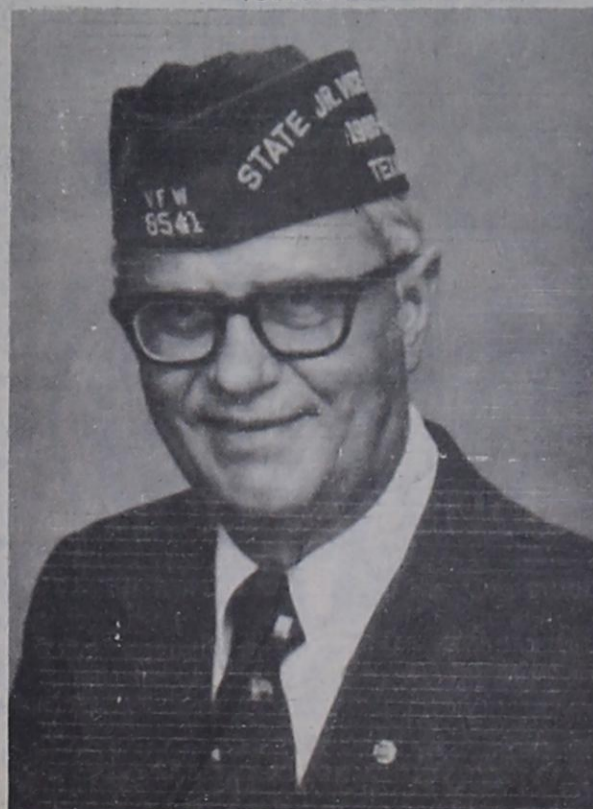
### Ashley advises farmers to consider program

Now that the acreage reduction sign-up period is underway, Victor Ashley, local ASCS director, advises farmers to seriously consider program benefits. The sign-up ends February 24.

The acreage reduction program enables all farmers to work together to help control stocks and improve crop prices by reducing production. At the same time, it protects them from economic disasters.

Farm program participants who reduce their wheat acres by 30 percent will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.45 per bushel, price support loans at \$3.30 per bushel and the option to reduce their acreage an additional 10 to 20 percent for payment-in-kind at 75 percent of their program yield.

Target prices act as insurance to keep

**Community Center Board Reviews Policies**

Members of the Community Center Board met Friday and reviewed recent policy and rental changes for the Center. Rental fees have been approved by the City of Post and Garza County, effective January 1.

In setting the new rates, emphasis was placed on keeping the fees low to encourage more use of the Community Center for varied functions in the community. Rates were determined for a half-day basis which would enable the facility to be available for more than one function in a day, which

farmers in business, if prices stay below acceptable levels, Ashley said. Farmers need money to operate. If they get a loan through our program it will give them time to hold for a better market.

The 10 percent feed grain acreage reduction program offers farmers target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 a bushel for oats. Program participants also will be eligible for loan rates of \$2.55 a bushel for corn, \$2.42 for sorghum, \$2.08 for barley and \$1.31 per bushel for oats.

Farmers who reduce their upland cotton acres by 25 percent are eligible for an 81 cents per pound target price and a 55 cents per pound loan rate.

Ashley said farmers need to use the acreage reduction program as a safety net, particularly for wheat since supplies still remain above desirable levels. Strong participation will further reduce stocks and continue to balance supply with demand so that the market will pay a profitable price. The ASCS official said farm price improvements will depend greatly on the willingness of farmers to participate in the programs.

Garza County farmers are urged to consider the acreage reduction program for their farm operations and visit the local ASCS office at their earliest convenience.

**Directors Approve Budget**

The Post Chamber of Commerce board of directors has recently approved the 1984 budget, to include revenue from the motel occupancy tax for tourism development.

The 1984 budget of \$23,650 provides a total salary of \$7,200 per year for the chamber of commerce secretary and manager.

Newly appointed chamber of commerce manager Lewis Earl is reimbursed for his expenses and does not draw a salary.

An itemized list of anticipated expenses and revenues is as follows:

Anticipated expenses: Salaries \$7,200; payroll taxes, \$1,000; Travel, \$3,000; office

supplies, \$300; advertising, \$250; organization dues, \$250; postage, \$250; telephone, \$700; annual banquet, \$2,800;

Taba'na Yuan'e, \$500; July 4th, \$2,400; Rodeo Parade, \$250; Agriculture Appreciation, \$650; Petroleum Appreciation \$500; brochure, \$2,500; miscellaneous \$500 for a total of \$23,650.

Anticipated revenues include: Organizational dues, \$11,000; banquet, \$3,000; Taba'na Yuan'e, \$600; July 4th, \$2,700; Double U Sale, \$150; Agriculture Appreciation, \$700; Petroleum Appreciation, \$500; Room Occupancy tax, \$4,000; interest bank account, \$1,000 for a total of \$23,650.

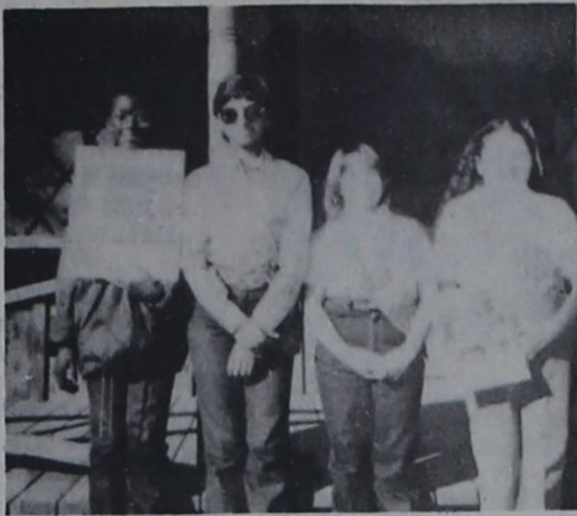

Welcome are paintings of all media, photography, graphics sculpture and fiber art. The entries need to reflect cotton or a cotton country theme.

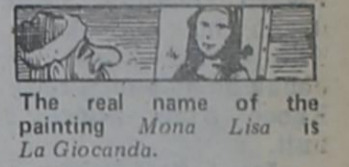
Entries are due on Wednesday, April, 11 in the main banquet hall of the Civic Center. The fee is \$4.00 per entry.

 When asked his age, Joe Moore comes back with a ready reply, "eighty-eight and kicking toward ninety," and with his outlook on life, his odds of making it look pretty good from where I sit.

Joe has been a widower for three years, but the loss of his beloved Martha left him with sixty-four years of fond memories of their married life together.

Many men left alone at the age of 85, of necessity, are entirely dependent on their children or others, but fortified with a physical and spiritual strength, Joe maintains his own home and is able to remain independent with the help of his daughter and son-in-law, Wanda and Robert Cox.

Joe does his own housecleaning, laundry and cooking, but due to vision, no longer drives the car therefore Wanda provides his transportation for trips to the Doctor or grocery stores.

The only thing that gets Joe down, he says is an occasional flareup of "Ol Arthur." He plans to plant his backyard garden this spring and freeze, can and make jelly again this year. His favorite past time when he can't be outdoors is to read western and detective novels. He is a Baptist and attends Sunday morning services at the First Baptist in Lubbock via way of television each week.

Joe and Martha came to Texas from Oklahoma in 1917 to farm at Ralls. They bought their own farm and moved to Garza County in 1950. They later sold their land and purchased rental property in Post. Joe continues seeing after his three rent houses next door to him on the corner of Sixth and Ave. S.

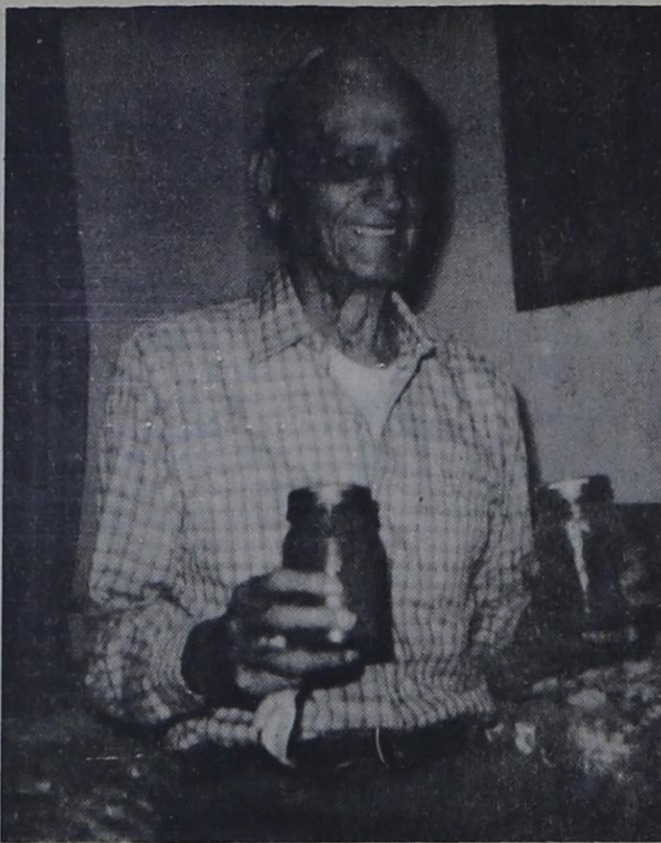

Martha was an excellent cook and the following are recipes from one of her favorite cookbooks.

**Quick Mix Cookies**  
 2 cups sifted flour  
 1 egg  
 1/2 tsp. soda  
 1 tsp. salt  
 3/4 cup shortening  
 1 cup brown sugar  
 1 tsp. vanilla  
 2 tbsps. milk  
 1/2 cup chopped nuts  
 1/2 cup coconut  
 1/2 cup cherries

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Cream shortening with sugar, and add egg. Add milk, vanilla and dry ingredients. Beat 2 minutes. Stir in nuts and fruit. Drop by spoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees, 10 to 15 minutes.

**Old-Fashioned Pulled Taffy**  
 2 cups sugar  
 1/2 cup light corn syrup  
 1 cup water  
 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar  
 2 tbsps. butter or margarine  
 2 tssps. vanilla extract.

Butter well a large, shallow platter. Combine sugar, corn syrup, water and cream of tartar in a saucepan. Bring to a boil over moderate high heat (about 275 F.), stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Continue cooking, without stirring, until a candy thermometer registers 260 degrees F., or a small amount of mixture forms a hard ball when dropped into cold water. Remove from heat and stir in butter and vanilla. Pour syrup into the buttered platter. Let stand until cook enough to handle. Pull and twist candy with lightly buttered fingers until it has a satinlike finish and changes from clear to milky colored. Pull into long strips 3/4 inch in diameter. Cut into 1-inch pieces with scissors. Wrap individually in wax paper. Makes 1 pound candy.

**Strengthening Families: Family Roles & Relationships**  
 Each of us plays a "role" in our families. A role is simply a set of behaviors that others expect of us and we expect of ourselves. Family roles tend to define our family responsibilities. Roles can vary, depending upon the kind of family, their situation and stage in life. For example, the role of a single-parent father will probably be different from the father whose wife is a full time homemaker.

Family relations experts tell us that in strong families — no matter what type — members are generally satisfied with their roles. When a member is not satisfied, it produces family stress. Some employed women, for example, attempt to continue doing everything they did as full time homemakers. The employed woman who tries to cook, sew and keep up the garden and house with no assistance may find this "super woman" role impossible.

Role dissatisfaction doesn't always result from self-expectations. A man who is laid off from his job, for instance, may find that he dislikes being expected to be a "house-husband," even though it is a temporary situation. Role problems can create tensions and resentment among family members. But in a strong family, members learn to be flexible — either to adjust the role expectations that cause them problems, or to adjust to the role and get the most out of it. Family members talk out their expectations about each other's responsibilities and help each person find a role that is suitable and satisfying.

In single parent families, or families where both parents work, for instance, members have had to change expectations about who does what. Older children and teenagers have learned to take on responsibilities for cooking, cleaning or other chores that were traditionally done for them by their parents.

A role change imposed from the outside also requires adjustment. In strong families, members help each other adjust by finding new and meaningful responsibilities. A newly retired husband, for example, can learn to do more household tasks with his wife, and she can learn to let him share in those chores. He may also need to find new roles by engaging in volunteer activities, expanding hobby activities, or developing new interests.

Strong families seem to anticipate the role changes that come with different stages of life or circumstances and learn how they can best deal with them.

Last Friday's district match-up with the Lockney Longhorns kept the Post Antelopes in the heated race for the district championship or at least a second place finish or tie.

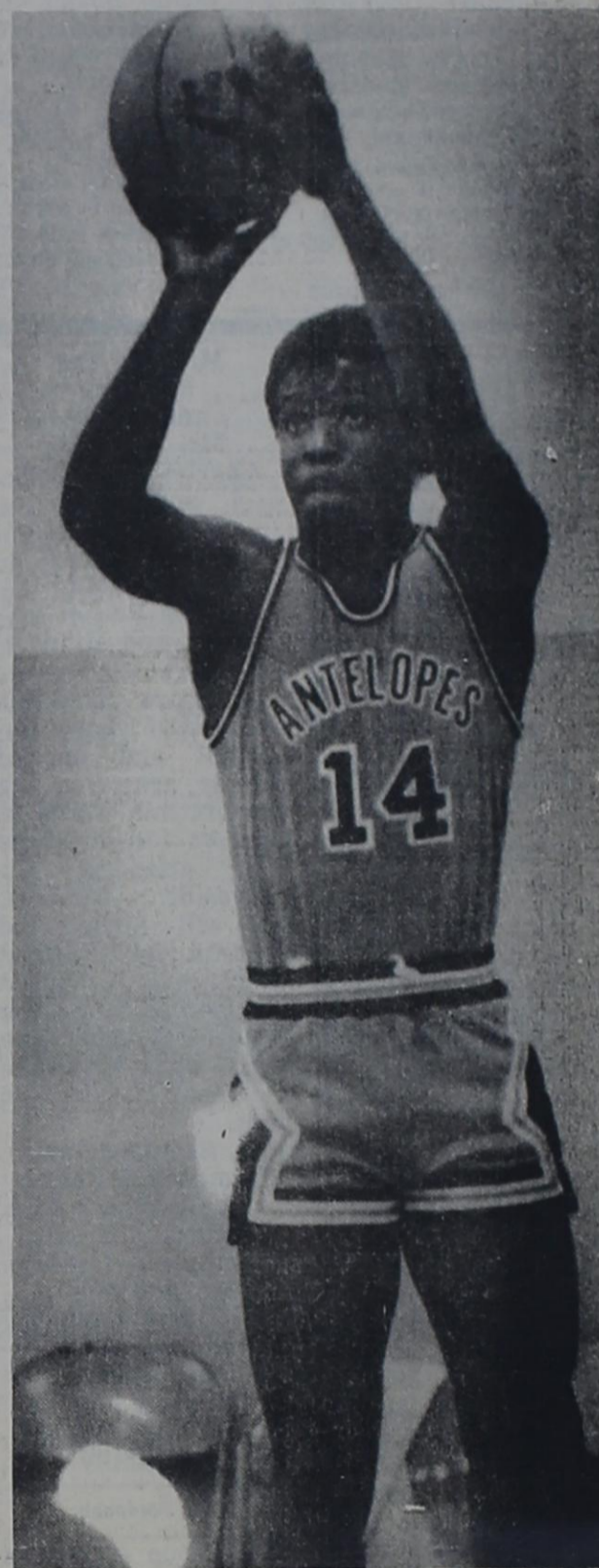
The 'Lopes plastered the visiting 'Horns 77-47, leaving no doubt that the swift Post team is aiming for a play-off berth. A win at Childress

## Postal Advice

If you want your valentines to be delivered on target and on time, you can help the Postal Service by addressing them properly, Postmaster A. J. McAlister said.

"A return address should be the first address a person puts on an envelope," he said. "If there is a delivery problem, it will allow us to return the letter, card or parcel to the sender."

Both the return address and mailing address should contain complete address information. This includes all of the following elements that apply:

Full name of recipient; apartment mailbox number or apartment number; rural route number and box number; street name and number or post office box number and city, state and — very important — ZIP code.

Postmaster McAlister also urged use of legible handwriting, a ball point pen (felt tips smudge easily) and correct postage (oversized cards require extra postage.)

"Proper addressing is especially important around holidays such as Valentine's Day, when many people do not use their return address in order to momentarily surprise the recipient. But when the card or letter is undeliverable, the one who is surprised is the sender when he or she discovers it was not received," McAlister said, "use a little care, and we'll get it there."

# Emergency loan applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Lynn County FmHA county supervisor Curtis Barlow said today.

Lynn County is one of 50 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Curtis Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5 percent; interest rate is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Mr. Barlow said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 19, 1984 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Mr. Barlow said.
