

Antelopes Advance to Bi-District

The Post Antelopes will play the Seminole Indians for the Bi-District Championship basketball trophy, following the 'Lopes second place finish in District 3AAA competition.

The bi-district contest tip-off is set for 7 p. m., Thursday, Sept. 23 at Lubbock Coronado High School, with a double-header scheduled.

The Idalou Wildcats, District Champions by a one-game lead on the 'Lopes, will face the Frenship Tigers, who placed second in District 4AAA.

The Idalou-Frenship game will begin immediately after the Post-Seminole contest.

Winners of the bi-district games will then advance to area competition before earning berths in the regional tournament.

"I really had my doubts at the beginning of the season," Antelope basketball coach Ken Plumlee admits, "but this team has really come through with determination and intensity in every game."

"It's a great accomplishment by a great bunch of youngsters," Plumlee adds, "and they'll remember this year for a long time."

The last time an Antelope team advanced past district level was in 1975.

"We know that we're going up against a really good basketball team," the coach continues, "Seminole has a 23-6 record and a 10-0 district standing."

The Indians' coach Leland Caffey alternates 10 players consistently and the team is noted for its quickness and outside shooting ability.

"They like to use the full court press," Plumlee explains, "and in that way, they're

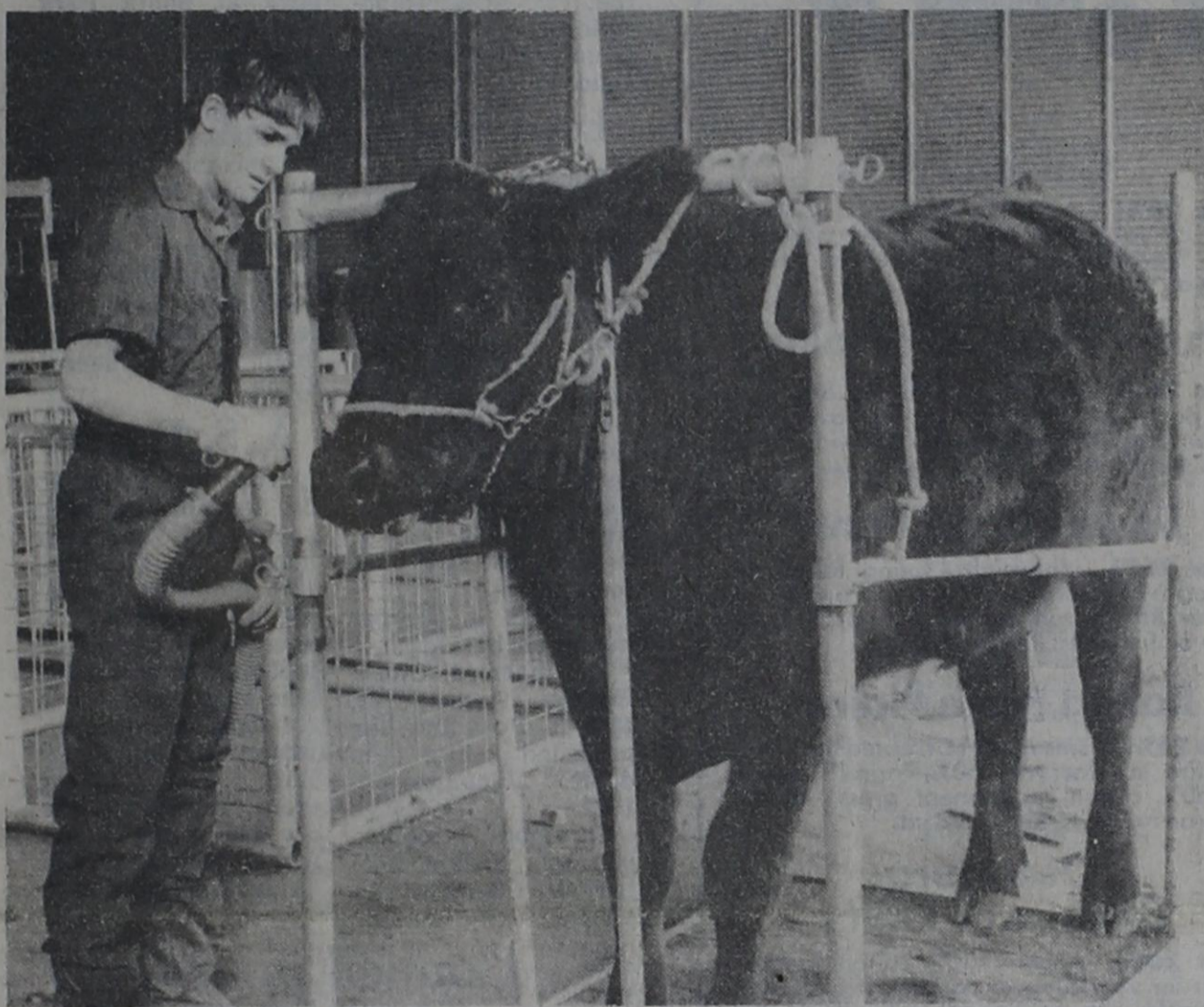

Livestock Show Opens Next Thursday

The 19th annual Garza County Junior Livestock Show, Sale and Fair will be held Feb. 23, 24, and 25th at the stock barn on North US 84.

Entry card deadline for animals in the show will be Wednesday, Feb. 15. Entry cards are available from the Post FFA and Southland FFA Instructors as well as the Garza Co. Extension Agent Office. Other rules for the show include exhibitor must be from age 9 thru high school and actively enrolled in a county 4-H club or an FFA chapter. The exhibitor must have owned and cared for his or her animal for 90 days prior to the show.

The show will begin with weigh-in of the animals after school on Wednesday, Feb. 22, at 4 o'clock.

The first exhibition will be Thursday afternoon at two o'clock with the rabbit show followed by the poultry show at three. Judge for these two shows will be Lynn Walling, Head of the Agriculture Department at Howard College at Big Spring. Superintendent will be Tommy Young.

The swine show will begin at 7:30 p. m. Thursday, Feb. 23 with approximately 100 entries expected. Serving as judge of the swine show will be Dwayne Brown Vocational Ag. Instructor at Klondike High School. Tony Conner will be swine superintendent again this year.

Friday afternoon at 2 p.m., the horse show will begin, with classes for mares and geldings according to age. Judging the horse show this year will be Kent Mills of Hermleigh with Mrs. Bill Hedrich as shown superintendent.

At 7:30 p.m. Friday evening, the lamb show will start with light and heavy weights for four divisions. Marvin Ensor, Scurry County Extension Agent, will judge the lamb show with Rusty Wood serving as show superintendent.

Saturday morning at 9 a.m., the heifer show will begin followed by the steer show with four weight divisions. Judging will be done by Joe Ed Wise of Santa Anna and formerly an extension agent at Dawson County. A new cattle superintendent, Ronnie Hardin, has been appointed this year to replace Neal Clary who has served for several years.

Highlight of the three-day event will begin at 1:00 p.m. with the presentation of awards for the show and the sale at 1:30 p.m. Auctioneer for the sale will be Bobby Fletcher of Wolfthor.

Presenting the awards this year at each of the shows will be the Garza County 4-H Princess, Keitha Beth White, and Sweethearts of the Post FFA Chapter, Misses Pam Ehret and Alicia Pettyjohn, and the Sweetheart of the Southland FFA, Miss Tanya Basinger.

Directors of the Garza Co. Jr. Livestock Assn. have been busy preparing the barn for the show and will meet again Saturday for a work day. All directors are urged to be there. Officers for the year are Noel White, president, Jimmie Bartlett, vice-president, Mack Terry, secretary and Orabeth White, corresponding secretary.

Zoning Board Appointed

The Post City Council has asked seven local residents to serve on the newly established Planning and Zoning Commission, with the appointments approved during Monday evening's regular meeting.

Asked to serve on the zoning commission are James O. Mitchell, Ray Bagby, David Newby, Patty Kirkpatrick, Bob Terry, Pru Basquez and Robert Cox.

The planning and zoning commission will be responsible for recommendations to the council for zoning ordinances.

In other action Monday night, the council tabled requests for establishing commercial ventures in residential areas and approved the installation of a mobile home on a commercial lot.

The council named city manager Rebecca King and secretary Wanda Wilkerson as authorized signatories for the Texas Department of Community Action funds transactions. Council members Jack Alexander and Mayor Giles McCrary abstained from the discussion and voting as a result of the new state law on conflict of interest by elected officials.

Alexander is an officer at the First National Bank and McCrary is a director.

The council also approved the non-discrimination policy continuation and conducted the second reading of an amendment to the competitive bidding and purchasing ordinance.

The amendment places the ordinance in compliance with state authority.

The Star Cable TV request for rate increase was approved, subject to the verification that service is being offered specifically to residences east of Hwy. 207.

Star Cable TV had promised in their original application for franchise that the company would provide service to all homes in the city limits.

A March 14 noon date was set by the council to open bids for paving and street improvements. The same meeting will approve ballots for the April election.

An emergency repair need was declared by the council concerning electrical wiring in the older portions of the upstairs of city hall and the library.

The original wiring in the building has been termed dangerous, and the council authorized the city manager to request competitive bids and select a contractor to perform the re-wiring.

When finished, wiring for the upstairs will be completely redone and separate systems for the library, city hall and the EMS facility upstairs.

Funds for the project were included in the budget for building maintenance.

The council also approved the purchase of a used IBM computer to match city computers.

The used model will cost \$3,500 and will replace a unit which has not been compatible with the computer system.

The unit being replaced will be advertised for sale by bids.

All they needed was boys would go into one more win, and bi-district competition the Antelope varsity



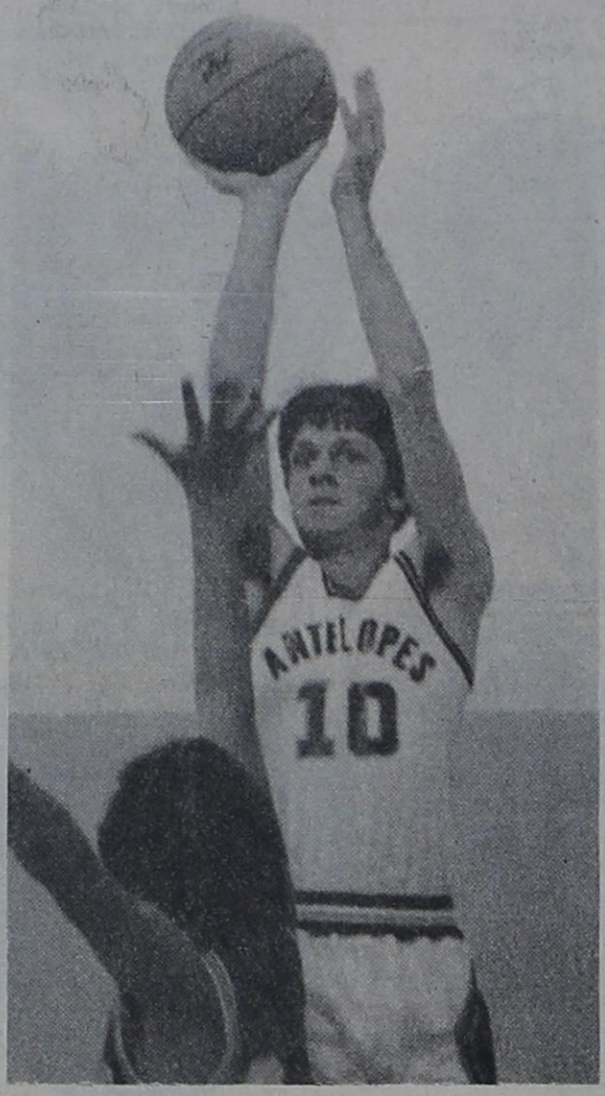

'Lopes steal crown from Bobcats

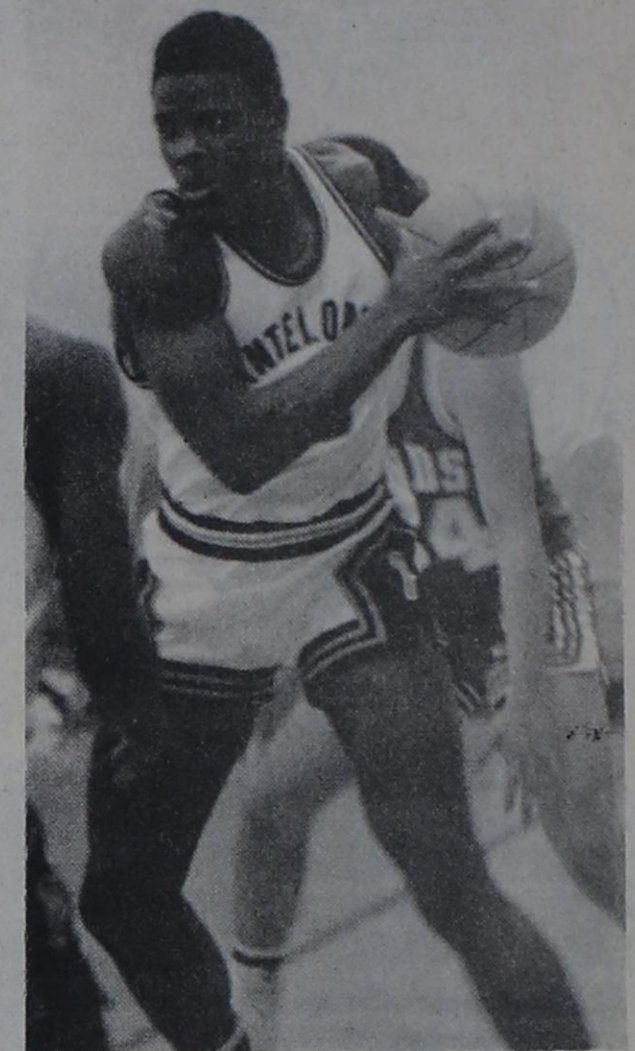

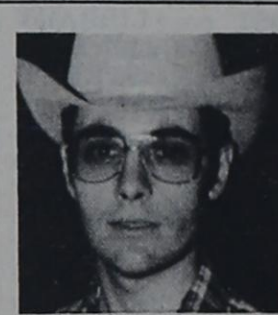

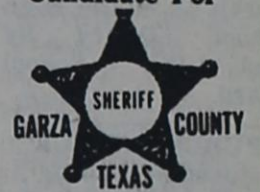

IRS lists hints

Working couples will get a bigger tax break this year when

filing their federal income tax returns, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Two-earner couples will be allowed to deduct up to \$3,000 on their 1983 tax returns.

Here's how the deduction works, IRS explained. If you and your spouse file a joint return, you will show your total combined gross income just as you always have. Now, however, you may deduct from your gross income either 10 percent of the earned income of the spouse with the lower income or \$3,000, whichever is less. There are some rules about the kinds of income that qualify so the IRS advises you to read the instructions carefully.

The deduction may be claimed by both 1040 and 1040A filers.

For further information on how to claim the deduction, check the instructions in your tax package.

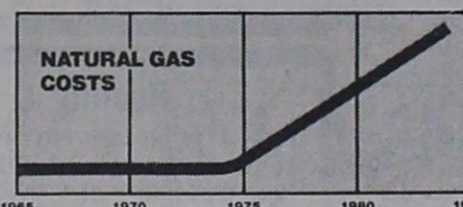

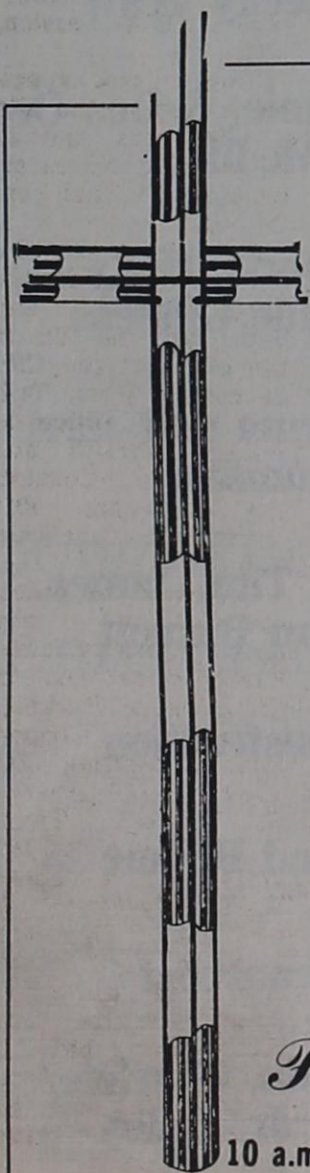
