

High School Band, Choir Leaders Killed in Two-Car Accident Sunday

A tragic two-car accident Sunday evening on Hwy. 84 just east of Loop 289 in Lubbock sent shock waves through Post with the death of Steve and Dianna Ladd.

Memorial services will be held today at 2 p. m. in the new school auditorium.

He was the Post High School band director and she was PHS choir director.

Their two year old daughter, Stephanie received a severe concussion and as of Tuesday was listed in serious condition at Lubbock General Hospital's pediatric intensive care.

The accident appears to have been caused when a vehicle driven by Margaret Selby of Lubbock veered off the right side of the west bound lane, then cut across the left, over the median and slammed into the east bound auto driven by Ladd.

Friends of the Ladds reported that they

had been to Petersburg earlier in the day to hear a band concert directed by Ladd's brother, Clint.

After the concert, they went to Lubbock and were returning to Post at the time of the accident.

Investigating officers said Mrs. Ladd was in the back seat of their sub-compact auto with the baby, and that Mrs. Ladd was killed on impact.

Ladd, who was rushed to Lubbock General Hospital, died at 8:48 p. m.

The accident, which happened around 7 p. m. was located just across from the Lubbock Power and Light generating plant on what is known as the Slaton Hwy.

The Ladds came to Post in the summer of 1981 from Oklahoma.

Hundreds of Post school students are affected by the deaths, as both Steve and Dianna worked with fifth grade through high school in band and choir.

Principals, Coach Contracts Extended

Post Independent School Board trustees voted to extend contracts to principals Joe Giddens, Bud Davis and Dan Rankin and approved a \$3,420 one-year salary increase for athletic director David Thompson during last week's regular board meeting.

The decision followed a two-hour executive session discussion on personnel matters.

Thompson's salary increase takes affect with the 1984-85 school year.

Earlier in the meeting the board heard from architect Hal Schauer of Norm Igo - Schauer and Associates of Lubbock concerning the firm's interest providing services to the school district.

Superintendent Bill Shiver reported to the board that the air safety control board had given the school a clean bill of health following recent removal of asbestos from the elementary gym and dressing rooms.

The complete removal of the materials from school property will be finished before the next school year, according to Shiver.

Although there has been no evidence of any problems with the asbestos here, Shiver

told school board trustees "it's better not to take any chances, we'll get rid of all of it."

Former school trustee president Jack Lott, now a member of the central appraisal district board of directors, reported that another \$38 million loss in mineral evaluation may be expected in 1984.

He cautioned board members that the continuing downward trend in mineral evaluations could create problems in preparing next year's budget.

There was a \$17 million loss in mineral evaluations between 1982 and 1983. Lott said

that depletion and lower prices for oil seem to be the main causes of the decline.

Shiver reported to the trustees on a recent communication from the state comptroller's office on school financing.

The board approved investment of certificates of deposit of \$425,000 at 8.25 percent, \$1,785,000 at 8.2 percent, \$886,275.37 at 8.12 percent and \$546,000 at 8.3 percent.

The board accepted the only bid offered of \$1,000 from R. G. Wilkerson for purchase of Lot 11, contingent on approval from other taxing authorities.

Entries Pile Up in Stock Show

A near record with 301 entries, the annual Garza County Junior Livestock Show opens Wednesday with the weighing in of all animals.

The weigh-in will begin at 4 p. m. at the livestock barn on the Lubbock Highway.

This year's show will have 121 different youth entries with 24 Southland FFA members participating, 28 Post FFA members and 69 4-H members.

Entries of animals will include 35 steers, three heifers, 122 hogs, 110 lambs, 10 horses and 21 head of rabbits.

Following the weigh-in on Wednesday, the Rabbit Show will be held Thursday, February 23 at 2 p. m. with Lynn Walling of Big Spring serving as judge.

The swine show will begin at 7:30 p. m. Thursday night with Dwayne Brown of Klondike, judging.

On Friday, February 24 at 2 p. m. the horse show will be held with Kent Mills of Hermleigh as judge and Friday night at 7:30 the lamb show with Marvin Ensor of Snyder as judge.

Saturday morning at 9 a. m. will be the Steer and Heifer show with Joe Wise of Santa Anna as judge and at 1 p. m. the sale preliminaries and presentations will be held followed by the big auction sale.

The annual Garza County fair will also be held in conjunction with the livestock show with judging beginning at 1:30 Thursday.

Categories in the fair division will include Art, canning, clothing, crafts, culinary, flowers, handwork and photography.

Every exhibit in the fair must be in place and properly installed by 12:30 p. m. Thursday and remain in place until check out time Saturday at 3:30 p. m. or until the auction is completed.

Only Garza County residents may compete for ribbons and no entry fees will be charged.

Ribbons will be awarded to all deserving entries and rosettes will be given to the best entry in each of the eight divisions in both youth and adult sections.

A concession stand will be available by the County Extension Clubs throughout the stock show and sale.

Letter to Dabney

Dear Dabney Post,

Shame, shame on you for giving the wrong title to Mr. Rudd. Let's set this matter straight. He is a "Code Enforcer" and if you don't believe it just ask City Council. I called 3 out of 5 councilpersons and got the same answer. He is not the City Manager, Mrs. King's assistant even though that is what he will be doing as, "She didn't have enough time to get it all done." I have no quarrel with Mr. Rudd nor Mrs. King, I don't know either one of them personally but I'm sure they are fine people.

What I do object to is the fact that a few years ago when Pete Maddox was working for the city, Jim Jackson, councilman, warned us through a public letter that our council was going to waste money by hiring a city manager. A large group of interested taxpayers appeared before almost the same sextuplet, (A.C. Cash was not on the council at that time) and everyone of those council members looked us in the eye and stated that, "We are not going to hire a city manager and what are you people so upset about." We were also afraid that Pete Maddox was going to lose his job but we were assured that even should we ever hire a city manager which we were not going to do, "They would have no authority to make city policy nor could they hire and fire."

Well, we have a city manager at \$20,000.00 per year with a car and expenses furnished. Now we have a "Code Enforcer" budgeted by the City Council and hired by

the City Manager according to 2 out of the 3 council members. (The third did not know who hired him.) The Code Enforcer will receive a salary of \$15,000.00 per year but when I asked if he would also have a vehicle furnished to him the reply was, "There are things on down the road that I am not at liberty to say at this time."

We also have some new "zoning laws" coming that will be shoved down our throats so quietly that we will never know it until it's too late as usual. This will also be part of the new job I was told. I don't know how you people feel about it out we bought and paid for our property and if we want to build a 2 x 4 shack in our back yard, we should be able to do so without 6 people, the mighty sextuplet, telling us how to build it and where on our own property we can set it. As long as we do not infringe upon our neighbors and it sets inside our fence, it's no one else's business.

There seemed to be a lot of talk by council members about trailer houses. Most of us in this town do not know what it is to try to find a place to live that we can call our own. I assume that if we were to ask most of the people with trailers, they would rather live in a big brick home but simply can't afford it. There are no rent houses in this town and to build your own home is too expensive to what other recourse do most of them have? Would you rather pitch a tent? Are we going to change our zoning

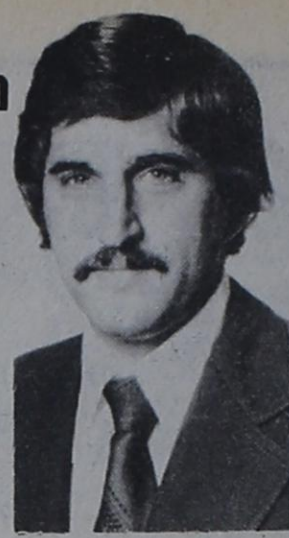
First Baptist Church calls McMeans to serve as Pastor

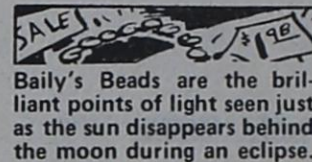

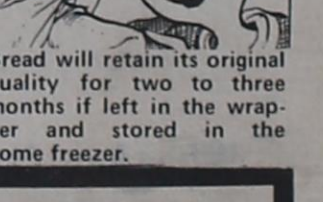

God's Way

(Continued from last week)

Ephesians shows that the family is like a body. Different parts have different functions, but each is important to the success of the whole. I Corinthians 12-14 also shows this thought. Man is to encourage, strengthen, rebuke if needed, support and lift up his brothers. To oversee this family, church or body, God said he wanted bishops, elders, overseers or shepherds to do the work. These men had to have certain qualities, as read in I Timothy 3 and Titus 1. The men had to be spiritual men, with love for others an important part of their makeup. To oversee a family of people, with different ideas, wishes, and goals, the shepherds had to have wisdom. God said He could and would supply that wisdom (James 1:5). In the Bible the shepherds were to be over the ones among them, or a local congregation. If you study the works to be done by the bishops, shepherds, elders, etc., you will find they all refer to the same group of men, but emphasize different functions. Here in particular, God's wisdom is seen. For instance, if a local group of bishops leave the love for truth, and want to be pleasers of men, rather than pleasers of God, only that local group of Christians leave God's way of doing things. God knew that no one in another city could know the needs of a people far away, so He had local men oversee the local congregation.

Let us now look at some ways man has tried to improve on God's plan, and see the mess it has led to. Over a period of years, man decided that for some reason, there needed to be a group of men meeting to decide issues that come up across the brotherhood. These men were selected from among the different cities. The new group later began to make decisions that were bound on all cities in their area. Distinctions began to be made between shepherds and bishops. One began to be over others. Over a long period of time, other forms of government began to appear. After these changes, the local congregation was controlled by someone in another city. Man began to make decisions that determined what the group was to believe, and how they were to conduct their worship. It did not matter what the local people thought of these decisions. They had to go along, because their leaders said so.

Today, we have religious leaders making decisions for their group of believers as to where they stand on issues of war, who can preach, etc. For instance, we read of religious groups trying to decide whether or not homosexual people can be ordained to preach, and these decisions are legislated on local congregations. Many members of these groups, especially older members, resent the fact that their church is ordaining homosexual people that God condemns in Romans 1 as being perverted. We then have a religious organization that recognizes such people as God's ministers, when God condemns their life style.

Division, frustration, anger, resentment and a number of other attitudes manifest themselves in the lives of good people, all because their leaders tell them to believe something the Bible condemns.

These same leaders over a religious organization make decisions to help leaders in foreign countries that do all they can to destroy Christianity and promote Communism. Members of the rank and file detest such positions but have no voice in it, because their leaders are far removed from them. The reason these problems come up is that man has gotten away from God's way of operating the church. God said for local men to oversee the local church. The Bible has nothing to say about any other group of persons to oversee a number of local congregations. There is nothing about qualifications of such men, because no such group is needed. Man thinks there is a need for the overseers, so that the whole church can believe the same thing and teach the same thing. Yet, when the leaders make decisions, the people back home do not believe the way leaders have said for them to. So, peace and harmony is not helped, but is hindered.

When the local leaders leave the truth of God, the local people can remove them from the position of leading, and get men who believe the Bible is God's infallible word. Then, when a local congregation leaves the truth, the whole brotherhood is not led astray.

Truly, God was and is wiser than man. He realized man's weakness of wanting to rule others. God realized that local people know the local circumstances, needs, and who to use to get these things accomplished. People in other cities can not know all the facts needed. God gave qualifications of men he wanted to oversee His people. Man has not been content to listen, and has torn up believers and unity among them by leaving God's way of leading His people.

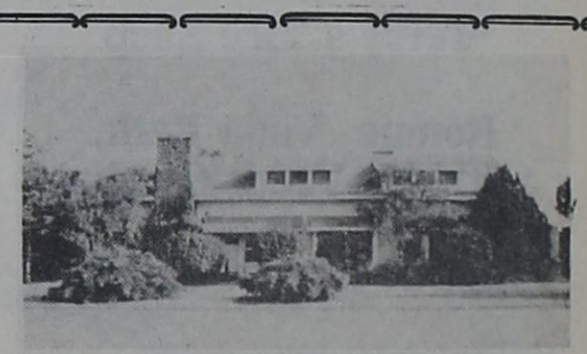

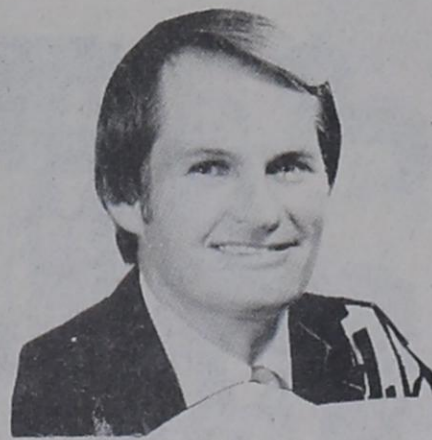

PUC asks for extension in bills

The Public Utility Commission of Texas is asking electric utilities to place a moratorium on service disconnections for customers unable to pay unusually high December bills.

In a letter to chief executive officers of Texas electric utilities, Chairman Al Erwin outlined the program which utilities may participate in voluntarily. The voluntary moratorium applies only to electric utilities.

Guidelines are: 1) customers must request that the utility not disconnect their service; 2) utilities may offer extensions or payment plans following PUC rules and 3) the moratorium is voluntary and statewide.

The plan is intended to address only the December usage and billing period. Almost \$300 million in statewide damages resulted from the unusually cold weather which was experienced throughout Texas in December.

"We hope that the electric utilities will want to participate in the moratorium in order to prevent service disconnections to customers unable to afford a single payment for December's usage," said Chairman Erwin.

Utilities participating in the program are asked to inform the PUC's Consumer Affairs Office (512 458-0252). Utility customers may contact the Consumer Affairs Office for this information.

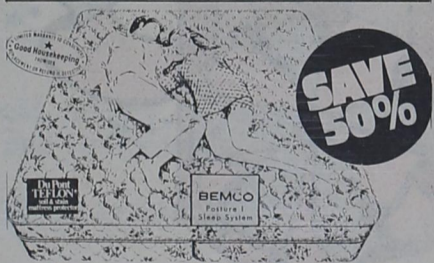

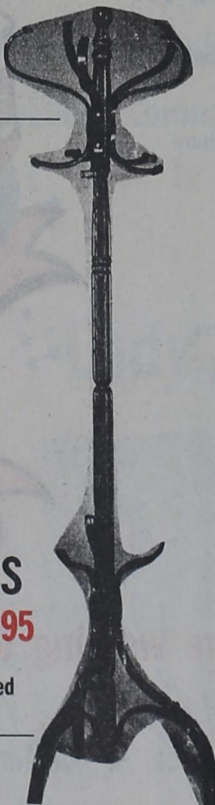

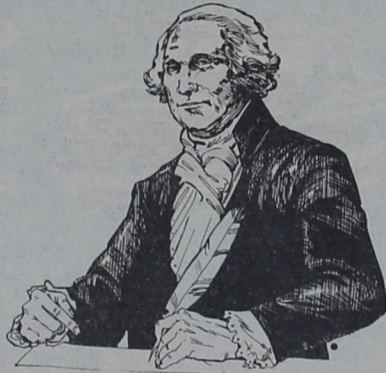
