

# Barbara Fairchild Headlines Cowboy Crusade

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Post, Texas, will be the site of an interdenominational Christian Crusade, sponsored by Cowboys for Christ and featuring nationally-known figures in the art and entertainment fields, according to evangelist Ted Pressley, Fort Worth, Tex.

Scheduled for March 17 and 18 in the Post Community Center, the meeting is expected to

attract participants from throughout the tri-state region of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Pressley, president and founder of Cowboys for Christ, will preach both evenings, and the entire weekend will be packed with Christian teaching, worship services and entertainment.

"The ministry of music" says Pressley, "will be enhanced through the singing of nationally known recording artist Barbara Fairchild, the guitar artistry of Milton Carroll, and a gospel group from Fort Worth, Bobby Miller and the New Jerusalem Singers."

Milton Carroll was one of the country music's "outlaws" in the 1960's rebelling against the "syrupy" lyrics of the music generated in Nashville.

A contemporary of Willie Nelson in Austin music scene, he composed many songs which were recorded by some of the top stars.

A gifted guitarist, he toured with Willie Nelson and fronted for him as the opening act. He also fronted for the Larry Mahan show.

Milton's wife, Barbara Fairchild, has recorded 14 albums and has made guest appearances on many television shows, including Hee Haw and the Tonight Show.

She was nominated for the Grammy

Award with her number one song, "Teddy Bear" in 1972.

"Kid Stuff" was also a number one hit immediately following "Teddy Bear".

The International Rodeo Association named her "Entertainer of the Year" in 1983, and she has made guest appearances to sing the national anthem at the International Finals Rodeo the last several years.

Both husband and wife are dedicated Christians and active workers in their church. Visual arts, as well as the musical arts, will have their place in the crusade as well.

Nationally known artist Chuck DeHaan will bring a special message during the teaching sessions, using examples from his paintings as emphasis and illustration related to our Christian walk.

DeHaan, a former RCA bronc rider and a well-known cutting horse trainer, now ranches near the West Texas community of Graford.

Paintings by DeHaan have appeared in most of the major livestock and horse magazines published west of the Mississippi, and both his prints and the original paintings are in great demand.

Firsthand knowledge of horses, livestock and tack combine with his artistic gifts to produce drawings and paintings of exceptional merit.

## "Chief" Runkles Prepares Taba'na Yuan'e

The first day of Spring may be March 20 on your calendar . . . but by the Plains Indian reckoning, it is March 22 . . . and that's when "Chief" Frank Runkles will repeat the ancient Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony in Post.

As he has done since 1973, "Chief" Runkles will direct the authentic Indian ceremony, which is watched carefully by area farmers and ranchers as a hint for what is to come in 1984.

The event will be held at the South Lake. "Chief" Runkles will be there way before sunrise, and will carefully set up the circle of council, build a small fire, which he does without matches or other modern tools, and prepare for the sun to peak over the horizon.

Just as the sun begins its rise, the smoke from the fire will drift in the direction of the wind and Runkles will point the peace pipe toward the wind.

That moment will tell area farmers and ranchers what they can expect this year.

A poor year will follow a west or

southwest wind.

A very bad year is in store if the wind comes from the south or southeast.

An average year is expected with the wind from the north or northwest.

A very good year comes from an east or northeast breeze.

Last year the wind predicted a very good

year.

Sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, the Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony begins before sunrise and visitors to the event should be at the South Lake by 6:45 a. m. to catch the entire event.

Visitors are reminded to respect the circle of council which will be clearly marked.

# Jana Terry on WTC Rodeo Team

April 12-14 will be an important time for Jana Terry and other members of the Western Texas College rodeo teams. On those dates WTC will be hosting a National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association rodeo in the Scurry County coliseum, competing against outstanding rodeo contestants from area colleges before a "hometown" crowd.

Jana is a sophomore at WTC this year and is majoring in Animal Science. A graduate of Post High School, she is the daughter of Mack and Jane Terry. She competes in barrel racing for WTC.

Miss Terry was raised on a farm and has been around animals all her life, so the Animal Science major was a natural selection for her. As a student in high school, she was a member of 4-H and FFA. She showed hogs, lambs and steers in 4-H shows and in the two years she was in FFA showed lambs. She also worked part-time for Dr. Larry Mills in his veterinary practice.

At WTC this semester, Jana is enrolled for a full class load with government, computer science, math concepts, rodeo production management, English and beginning typing. Members of the men's and women's rodeo teams also spend several hours a week keeping in practice for the events in which they will be competing. They will be competing in col-

lege rodeos every week in April and the first week in May to complete the regular schedule. The two top men's teams and women's teams from each region are eligible for the National College Finals Rodeo in the summer. The top two individuals in each event also go to the Finals.

"Jana is a very good student and we are pleased to have her working with our women's rodeo team," Bob Doty, Assistant Professor of Agriculture and rodeo coach, said. "Our women's team is off to a good start for the season and we hope to be among the top contenders in the region. We invite all rodeo fans to come for our rodeo in April and will be reminding them of the dates again later."

Jana will be riding a new horse, Sweep-a-quarter, in barrel races this year and thinks he is the best horse she has had. A teammate, Kellie Kyle from Quanah, was leading the region in barrel racing and All-Around points going into the Sul Ross rodeo Feb. 16-18, but nobody is ready yet to say who will be in the top slots when the season ends.

Library Week doesn't come until next month anyway, so you have some time to think about your answer. And while you

think about your answer, I'll give you a report on what's been happening at the Post Public Library.

Through the first two months of the year, 1344 adult books and 413 juvenile books were checked out, for a total of 1,757. At that rate, we will circulate over 10,000 books this year for the third year in a row.

We have added 96 titles to the shelves

already this year. So far, no books have been lost (that we know of). Spanish cassettes and fine art prints have not been checked out all this year. The library secured eight books through Inter-Library Loan. Our Texas Instruments Computer continues to draw heavy use and interest: the TI-Basic was used 11 times, and computer modules used 115 times. Two classes visited the library. Mrs. Pierce is always glad to work with teachers in scheduling a visit. The Library Board met and voted to request panelling for the children's section of the library. Remember that Library Hours are 2-6 PM weekdays, and 7-9 PM Tuesdays and Thursdays...
