

Stiff Winds Hit Mobile Home

A near disaster was averted last Tuesday afternoon in Post as a mobile home with nine people inside was toppled over by the wind. There were no serious injuries in the incident, which happened approximately 3:30 p. m. March 27.

Mrs. Jackie Leverett, Mrs. Mary Dison and Mrs. Leverett's daughter, Darlena, were in the mobile home with six small children, when they felt the structure beginning to roll over from the stiff westerly gusts. The mobile home, owned by Mr. and Mrs.

Darvin Leverett, is located on the Truelock Construction Co. lot on West 15th St.

The mobile home had not been tied down, as is required by a city ordinance, and would have completely turned over were it not for an old washer and dryer which were waiting to be hauled off.

The washer and dryer, along with fast acting help from neighbor Buck Craft, were positioned on the East side of the mobile home, which kept the structure from landing on its side.

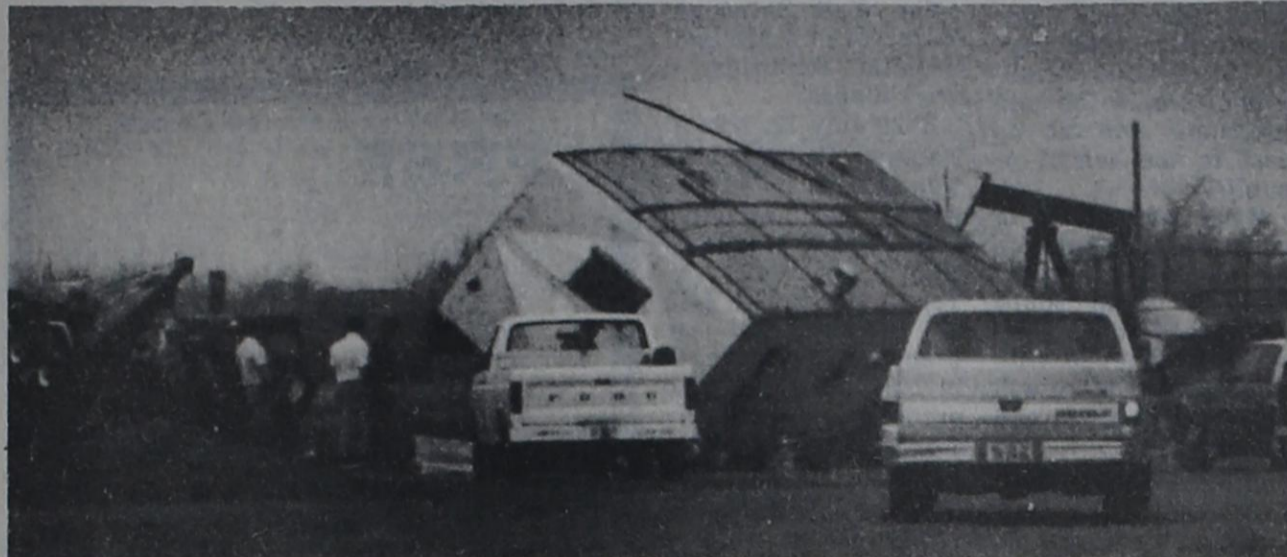
Craft, who owns a one-ton steel bed pick up truck, moved the vehicle along side of the mobile home on the East side.

When the mobile home toppled, Mrs. Leverett's daughter managed to get out through a window, jumped into an auto with her baby and rushed off to get help.

A few blocks later the vehicle she was driving collided with a vehicle driven by Greg Massey, as she apparently went through an intersection without giving right-of-way.

The mobile home was situated with its long side facing the West.

It has since been properly tied down.

Post among areas lowest tax rates

A recent report by the Texas Town and City magazine shows Post with one of the lowest tax rates in Texas at .200 per 100 of assessed valuation.

Other area cities included in the report show Tahoka with a .490 rate, Littlefield at

.418, Brownfield with .483 and Sweetwater at .960.

Snyder has a tax rate of .291 and Lubbock's .610 is three times the rate of Post and higher than Abilene's .480.

All of these other cities have indebtedness, with Post showing a clean slate with no indebtedness.

Part of the lower tax rate in Post is attributed to the revenue from petroleum production, as is the case in Snyder.

Another reason, which is less apparent, is the careful attention the city council has devoted to the budgeting process for the past few years and the emphasis on daily

management of the city resources.

In addition to the lower tax rates, Post city taxpayers also benefit from the lowest water rates in West Texas and considerably lower than many cities in most other areas of the state.

Direct petroleum revenues from royalties and leases has reached \$91,436.67 as of April 1 and the total estimated budget for 1983-84 fiscal year is \$200,000.

The estimated revenue represents 14 percent of the city's total budget.

In fiscal year 1982-83 this category represented six percent of the actual revenues received by the city.

Senator John Montford Plans Town Hall Meeting here April 30

State Senator John T. Montford has announced he will be holding Town Hall Meetings throughout the 28th Senatorial District in order to get input and ideas from the public concerning the recent report issued by the Governor's Select Committee on Public Education. Senator Montford will be in Post, Texas at the Primary Auditorium on Monday, April 30, 1984 at 5:00 p.m.

The Select Committee, headed by Dallas Businessman H. Ross Perot, recently issued a detailed report with recommendations for changes in the public school systems in Texas. "As a result of this Perot Committee Report, we are expecting the Governor to call the Legislature into special session to enact many of these recommendations," Senator Montford said. "These town meetings will give me the opportunity to visit with people and get their ideas on these various changes which have been suggested. I hope everyone will make an extra effort to attend one or more of these town hall meetings in the District," Senator Montford said.

Some of the suggested changes in the public schools as recommended by the Select Committee are to add 10 days to the school year, open school to 4 year olds for an optional pre-kindergarten program, lower the compulsory age for beginning school from the current 7 years old to 5 years of age. Other

proposals include a reduction in state funding for vocational programs, a requirement that all teachers pass a basic skills test, establish a career ladder for teachers that would take them through four rungs from beginning teacher to master teacher, replace the current State Board of Education which is now elected, with an appointed board, require annual testing of all students in Texas Public Schools to measure educational progress and require all students to take a set number of academic courses and fewer electives.

"Indications are that Governor White will call a special session to discuss these education proposals in mid-May or early June of this year. Now is the time for public response and that is the reason for these town meetings," Senator Montford said.

"I would like educators, parents, school board members, taxpayers and even the students to attend and give me their views. Then when I go to Austin during special session, I will have the views of the district, the people I represent, when I make the decisions," he added.

Senator Montford is a member of the Senate Education Committee which will be directly involved in shaping the legislation effecting public education.

I also realize that through the years there have been many deserving teachers and educators that are worthy of this honor. I have lived in Post for 20 years, since 1964, and I know of several such teachers, but none of them have been taken from us in such a tragic way. I am not sure why, but tragedy has a way of making us remember. We all remember our favorite teachers and what they have done for us, but we feel that because of the tragic way the Ladds died that our children will remember them in a different way from other teachers. We feel this would be a positive way for them to be remembered.

Another reason for wanting the name change is that many of our older students feel a little degraded by having to say the "Primary" auditorium.

everywhere have stadiums, fields and auditoriums named for someone who gave a lot of money or did something outstanding for the town, so why can't Post?

Maybe we need to get our heads together and come up with a name for our new auditorium. We felt that the Ladd Auditorium would be appropriate and at no cost to the school or public.

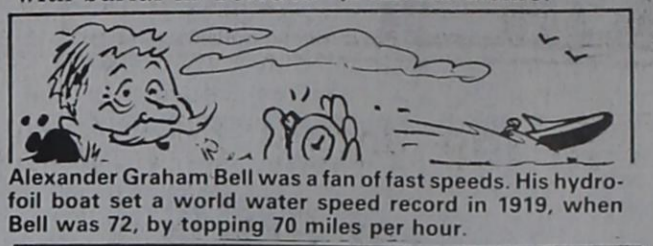
Born February 20, 1893 in Indian Territory, Oklahoma, she died Sunday, April 1 in Garza Memorial Hospital following an illness.
