

## The Way I See It...

This week I am opening the first of a weekly series of articles that will expose a variety of issues in this community which I feel need public attention.

These articles are being published in the hope that some positive action will result in the improvement of our community.

I believe our town sits at the crossroads of a critical turning point in its life...as a citizen, taxpayer, property owner and businessman, I am concerned at the direction we might be headed.

It will be my goal in this series of articles to discuss the important issues which will ultimately decide which

road we take.

The choices are relatively simple...we can bemoan our current plight and take the easy route...let someone else do whatever job needs to be done and hide our heads in the sand...then quietly watch C.W. Post's dream for a city with a future slowly suffocate on the dust of its apathy.

The other road, one that takes a whole lot more energy...will lead Post and Garza County to a position of strength, vitality and enable its people to individually and collectively to achieve common goals of success.

At times these articles

will touch sensitive nerves... and many will take offense at my audacity to hang out the dirty linen for all to see.

That is a risk I'm willing to take, and more importantly, I believe it is my obligation as publisher of The Post Dispatch to follow the example set by the late Jim Cornish, who I am told stepped on many a toe with his editorials.

There are warts that some want to hide, others pretend they don't exist and more simply see them as part of the landscape, "they've always been there." I will raise questions about these warts.

I am inspired to begin this series because of my love for Post and my enthusiasm for the future here.

This is my town...it is

my place to live and enjoy life.

The future is what this series is all about...I am shielded from the past, both failures and successes, personal feuds and longstanding grudges. I will be spared the pitfalls of "we tried that before and it didn't work."

The series will be directed at our governing bodies, elected officials, merchants and citizens.

This week I begin with an open letter to the city council.

You, the elected representatives of the citizens of Post (well, elected by at least 500 of the 2,000 or so registered voters), have the dubious honor of charting a course for a troubled town.

The most vocal criticism comes from those who want

little or no government and have difficulty explaining their opposition. It is my observation that those folks would be just as pleased if there were no city government at all.

To them junk cars and trash and rotten streets and hodge-podge zoning is okay, 'cause that's the way it's always been.

They are satisfied with the status quo until they want some specific sort of service...then they want you to solve their problem and right now!

As city council members you are in a no-win situation. You vote for more efficient government, better services, improved streets or whatever, and bang, some doomsdayers are calling you at home and blasting your (Continued on P.2)

## School Board—

# Plans for Stadium Repair Approved

Post Independent School District board of trustees wrestled with proposals for building improvements during the regular meeting last Tuesday night, finally settling on repairing the stadium press box, extending stadium and adding a visitors' side concession stand and restroom facilities.

Board members Royce Hart, Charles McCook and Don Payne pressed for a bond election to include improved dressing rooms, gymnasium, vocational education building and air conditioning of the schools.

Although the discussion continued for two hours, school board members could not agree on a full-scale plan and the proposed bond election issue was not formally introduced.

Earlier in the meeting, school superintendent Bill Shiver asked board members, "What is your feeling about adding an assistant band director next year, the people we are interviewing for band director are asking us?"

"If we can't find the money to make our building improvements, I don't think we can afford an assistant band director," Hart responded.

No school board member expressed support for the assistant band director.

The board approved Shiver's recommendation of retaining Stephen Hinman for the remainder of the school year as assistant band director.

In other action, the board authorized the senior class to decide on a graduation site, Mrs. Giles Dalby had asked the board to move the graduation exercise from the auditorium to the football field so that all family members could attend.

The board authorized Shiver to retain Mrs. Barbara Babb as choir director for the remainder of the school year.

Two certificates of deposit were renewed, one for \$865,832.97 at 8.7 percent and one for \$1,860,000 at 9.0 percent.

Judge Giles Dalby administered the oath of office to reelected members Jack Kirkpatrick and Royce Hart.

Kirkpatrick was elected as president, McCook as vice president and Hart continues as secretary.

What to Do?

During the discussion about building improvements, board member Tom Middleton repeatedly asked other board members just exactly how much money would be needed to do the work.

Kirkpatrick reminded the board of the predictions of lower revenues from oil production and the possibility of legislative action which would cut into state funding.

"We just don't know

right now how much we'll be getting next year," he added.

McCook emphasized that the board is now operating with a \$600,000 reserve, with \$1.6 million in the bank.

"If we propose a bond election," Hart repeated, "then the people can decide."

"The problem as I see it," Middleton responded, "is that we don't know how much of a bond issue we want...how much money are we asking the people to approve?"

Payne expressed frustration that the board has discussed this issue for the past several months and just

can't come up with any action.

"I want to see something good for our kids," he emphasized.

Hart reminded board members that if the building improvements are done piecemeal with existing revenues that some people will be happy, but many will want to know why their favorite item was not included.

"With a bond election, we can include all the needed work at one time...a new gymnasium, field house, stadium improvements, vocational ed building and air conditioning," he commented.

John Boren suggested

setting a budget of \$500,000 for the improvements to come out of the current reserves.

"If the people know how crowded our kids are in these dressing rooms and how much these improvements are needed, I think they'll say yes."

"I wasn't on the board when the \$200,000 was spent on remodeling the gym, but I'll tell you that was a complete waste of money," Payne jabbed.

"That's what happens when you piecemeal these things," McCook continued.

"You know, that if we start spending money on athletic improvements and leave out other programs,

we're going to get the phone calls," Hart added.

Middleton expressed his desire to see a strong vocational education program.

On air conditioning, Boren commented, "refrigerated air for the entire school is spending money we don't have."

Hart added that he is in favor of evaporative cooling for air conditioning.

But in the end, it was Middleton's compromise proposal which found support...authorizing the superintendent to contact Hal Schauer of Lubbock to present a proposal to the board of improvements at the football stadium.

## Hospital Board Postpones Officer Election

Following the canvassing of election ballots, David Tyler was sworn in on the board of hospital trustees during a regular meeting of the hospital board Thursday, April 12.

David Newby was unavailable for the meeting and will be sworn in at the May meeting.

Due to the absence of new member, Newby, election of officers for the

trustees was postponed until a later meeting.

Ignacio Varela was given appreciation by the trustees for his years of service to the hospital.

In other action, trustees

wrote off delinquent accounts in the amount of \$8,802.29 held from the last board meeting until accounts in excess of \$100 could be contacted by the attorney was approved. The accounts are now ready for a collection agency.

The application of Alberto G. Gerds, M. D. to the medical staff of Garza Memorial, limited to consulting pathology was approved by trustees and application by Dr. Gerds was approved by the medical staff at an earlier date.

One bid was received on the remodeling of the hospital nursery and went to Dwayne Capps for \$1,860.

ears with their pitiful fears and petty gripes. You vote to do nothing and get accused of not caring about the town...then the gossip and rumors sneak like cancer through town...chipping away at you, until, in desperation, you throw in the towel and let someone else take the flak.

But, now you are in the hot seat. Take my advice, listen to the gripers and complainers, review their situations, educate yourself, then make the decisions.

Some of you have been city servants for a number of years, others of you are relatively new at the job. This is a golden opportunity to meld a variety of viewpoints into a combined effort to set a positive, bright future for Post.

It is your attitude about the future which will have the greatest impact on our survivability as a town.

As a group, I call on you to continue the grueling task of establishing zoning ordinances. This is a high priority for any city which hopes for future growth.

And remember, if you are opposed to growth, you are writing the obituary for your town. There are too many examples that you all know about, where city leadership was unconcerned or downright uncooperative about growth and now those leaders have left their legacy in vacant buildings, broken sidewalks and dusty, empty streets.

I urge you on behalf of all current and future residents of Post, take an enthusiastic and energetic view of what Post can be. Dream the impossible and look for ways to make it happen.

At most city council meetings it will be just you and I.

And your city staff.

Very few if any of the people you represent will actually bother to sit through your marathon meetings. Nor will they appreciate the tedious hours of attention to detail they have assigned you to do.

They also will not understand for the most part, the monstrous work load on your city manager and staff in preparing for the

regular meetings, not to mention the daily routine.

Those non-participating citizens will rely on their trust in you to do what is in their best interest...and expect you to know what that is. And then they might read the report of your meetings in the Dispatch.

Then some people will hear a rumor about you and repeat it, probably without taking the time to read for themselves what has actually transpired.

A recent ridiculous example is one overheard at the hospital...that the city council turned down an offer from a firm to build a fiberglass plant here.

You and I both know that rumor is so ignorant that it hardly deserves mentioning, but I do so in an attempt to show you how important it is for you to portray an active, vigorous and public effort to attract new industries to Post.

The single most important task confronting the Post city council this year is the recruiting of new industries and businesses here.

If that is not high on your list of priorities, I strongly urge you to rearrange your list.

There are good, hard working people in this town who want to work, and many more who would live here if there were jobs, and graduating students who might continue living here if they had jobs to go to.

I am not in a position to offer solutions, I am asking you as the elected representatives to hear the voice of the people crying out for someone to take the lead and get something done.

What better thing for a city council to spend its time doing?

And allow your city manager to do her job, one that is essential to attract new industries. Any potential industrial prospect will want to see a professional staff available to help solve problems. Without that assistance, we are doomed to continue hoping without much hope.

You are fortunate indeed to have such a talented, professional and dedicated public servant willing to take the almost daily verbal abuse, keeping the wheels of city government running smoothly. I make no apology for my admiration of city manager Becky King.

She has brought a measure of efficiency and careful attention to detail that Post can be proud of.

I have lived in five Texas cities in the past eight years, covered city council meetings in them all, and I can assure you that none of them can come close to the performance of your city manager and staff.

I am personally appalled at the harping, silly prattle that I hear about your city manager. I call on you to give her support and encouragement so that she can go about the job of helping Post be a better place to live and raise a family.

Afterall, isn't that why we have city employees? And isn't that really what it's all about?

Take your job seriously, but don't take yourself too seriously. And don't expect to achieve too much too soon, but don't lower your sights because of setbacks.

These are a few priorities I believe the people expect of you as members of their city council:

1. Create a plan to attract new industry, aggressively search out and recruit them.
2. Continue the implementation of the zoning ordinances.
3. Begin arranging for a long-range plan to look toward the future.
4. Support and encourage the city manager and staff, they need to hear a thank-you now and then.
5. Insist on active, fair and consistent law enforcement.
6. Look for ways to help businesses already in Post, make us feel good about living here.
7. Keep the people informed on what you are doing to solve city problems.

# Colleen's Comments

**Dye Easter Eggs Naturally**  
The first Easter trail Peter Cottontail hopped down was in Pennsylvania, and

**County Extension Agent-Home Economics**  
that first trip took place in 1728, long before commercial egg dyes became popular. Back then many Pennsylvania

Dutch children used natural dyes from herbs and foods to dye the eggs that were then exchanged as tokens of good times to come. This Easter your children might enjoy making their own dye (with your help) as well as coloring the eggs. They might even learn something about the many uses of food-stuffs along the way.

For softer, lighter shades, prepare the dye and strain it to remove the herbs, roots or foodstuff used to obtain that color. Then, dip and turn pre-cooked eggs in the dye until you get a pretty shade. To create a deeper shade, simply make the dye and cook the eggs at the same time, allowing the eggs to simmer for as long as 20 minutes to reach the deepest hues. Adding vinegar or alum to the dyeing mixture will increase the strength of the dye.

Another method of dyeing eggs is to wrap raw eggs in bits of the dye-making plant or fold and then tie them in cheesecloth. When the eggs are boiled the dye is transferred directly to the eggshell, leaving a unique mottled effect.

Here are some "recipes" for various colors:

For yellow dye use chamomile tea or dandelion blossoms, pour boiling water over the tea blossoms, cover and let stand for half an hour. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Make gold dye by simmering two tablespoons of turmeric for 20 minutes. Add a teaspoon of vinegar before dyeing eggs. Since turmeric does not dissolve, the coloring will be slightly marbled.

A brass-brown shade results from onion skins, even red onion skins. Place the skins in a pan of water and simmer until the desired shade is obtained. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye. Use a similar method to make robins-egg blue from cabbage.

Mint leaves will make pale green Easter eggs. Pour boiling water over mint leaves, cover and let simmer for half an hour. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye.

Any of the dye-stuffs can be wrapped around or folded against a raw egg and enclosed in cheesecloth and then boiled to obtain unusual patterns of color on the egg.





## Who Navigates in your life?

Which way is your craft headed? As an aircrew member I had six years experience as an aircraft navigator. It was my responsibility to always be able to answer that most important question.

Without knowing where we were headed or having current directions based on unreliable data could waste valuable time. It might have prevented completion of our mission, or even meant loss of life.

It is important to know which direction you are headed.

A standing joke among flying personnel concerned the pilot who asks the navigator where they are headed. The navigator looks at his charts, spins a few calculations, plots several points on the chart before him. His response is straightforward. "I don't know, sir, but we are sure making good time just getting there!"

Funny, isn't it? But not when it is a commentary on a life. Which way is

your craft in life headed?

At the outset of the mission, as navigator, I had to determine with greatest precision the heading of the aircraft. This served as a check against a fixed external source, such as the north star which was always in the sky. From that absolute standard, onboard heading systems could be adjusted and trusted. Any inflight turn would once again necessitate the reassuring reference to that outside absolute source with corrections as necessary.

Life needs such heading checks as well. They, too, should be mandatory.

As this holy season is about us in 1984, we need to know the course we are taking.



He accurately states the crux of the problem concerning the Christ. After all, Pilate was not greatly concerned about Jesus.



Jesus was merely a pawn in a great political game. With a restless, turbulent multitude crowding the city, Pilate sought only to settle matters quickly and quietly.


