The question about this week's editorial has to be... does Post and Garza County want or need a full-fledged hospital?

This question needs to be asked publicly, if for no other reason than because it is whispered from time in private conversations.

And that kind of murmuring is not only harmful, but downright dangerous.

I can not speak for the majority of this community in answering this question.

I can speak for those of us who want to see Post grow and hope for a bright economic future with a place

for our children and their children.

So I tackle the issue of our hospital with a certain amount of timidity... mainly because I am really not educated properly to talk about specific hospital administration.

But I am versed enough on personal experiences in hospitals, around hospitals and working with hospital people through the years, to offer suggestions for what our hospital should be expected to do for our community.

I am also enough of an optimist and dreamer to believe that with proper support, we can have as good

a medical facility as any in towns our size.

The philosophy I am urging comes from an experience I had as a young airman in the U. S. Air Force.

I wanted to get promoted... I needed the money.

My boss, a tech sergeant, offered me the sagest of advice:

"Burnett, if you want to be

the sergeant in charge, start acting like one and that'll get you there."

Best advice I believe I've ever gotten.

If you want to be a modern city with growth and vitality...start acting like it.

That attitude includes all the government agencies I have addressed in previous comments, and this week it is directed to members of the

Garza Memorial Hospital board of directors:

Should We or Shouldn't We?

To the original question... does Post and Garza County need or want a full-fledged hospital?

Some say yes, some say no. Here's my ideas.

Pretend you are getting ready to move to a town where your company is considering building a plant.

They want you to move your family to that town and set down roots.

You ask questions...and one of them has to be about medical care.

What kind of doctors...what kind of hospital...?

Council Okays Airport Construction

In a joint city council and county commissioners' meeting Monday night, the two groups heard an engineering report on repairs and improvements at the airport, then the council approved the low bid contract for the work.

Newly elected council member Weaver McKamie was the lone dissenting vote on the project.

Bill Wauer, certified engineer for Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock, told the two government agencies that construction could begin in early June and is expected

to be completed by early September.

Wauer explained the joint efforts of contractor, engineers and the Texas Aeronautical Commission to find cost-cutting areas in the overall project. He also pointed out that the TAC funding was increased by \$29,475 over the original funded amount of \$196,500.

The state grant is matched by city and county funds of an additional \$39,578, although the two local government units will be paying only 12.5 percent of the total cost.

County officials delayed action on the bid proposal until the regular commissioners' meeting next Monday morning.

The council also approved a project initiated by the Post Merchants' Association to provide free public parking on vacant lots in the downtown area.

PMA president Mike Barber presented the idea,

which will utilize existing vacant lots with owners' permission and the city will provide gravel and emulsion for the improvements at a cost of approximately \$420.

Annual leases will be arranged with lot owners with the amount of the lease to be equivalent to the annual city tax...which is approximately \$50 per year.

Barber told the council that

all vacant lot owners had been contacted and verbal agreements had been reached.

The free public parking will allow for employees of Main Street businesses to park away from store fronts, which will help in traffic flow and customer parking downtown.

Three Local Races Enter Run-Off

Over 50 percent of registered voters in Garza County turned out at the polls Saturday in the Democratic Primary and forced a runoff in three local races.

The sheriff's race, which had the most candidates will have a runoff between Donney Walker who garnered 556 votes against incumbent Sheriff Jim Pippin who had 474.

In the commissioner precinct 1 race, T. D. (Buck) Craft will face Darrell Jones in the June 2 runoff. Craft had 161 to Jones' 112.

In the precinct 3 commissioner race, incumbent Mike Cisneros will be pitted against Tommy Young. Cisneros received 156 votes while Young had 133.

Tax Assessor-Collector Ruth Reno received another four year term over opponent Ronald Metsgar when she took 64 percent of the vote with 921 votes while Metsgar received 526.

In other local races, Preston Poole who was unopposed for county attorney received 1,233 votes while Shelia Melton, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 had 375.

Lonnie Gene Peel, constable of precinct 1 received 325, while Leroy Demming, constable, precinct 3 had 343 and Cephas Bilberry, constable, precinct 4 had 158.

County Chairman J. E. (Dick) Tanner had 1,213 votes and retains his chairmanship.

In the contested races,

other vote getters were O. G. (Junior) Shepherd with 269; V. L. (Buster) Shumard, 41; Tommy Duncan, 41; Mike Harper, 61;

County Commissioner, precinct 1 contestants: J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman, 73; Elton Lee, 39; Jay Hart, 31; Keith Adams, 156.

County commissioner, precinct 3 contestants included: Cecil Foster Sr., 89; John Bustos, Jr., with 31.

Kent Hance received Garza County support in his bid for the Senate with 1,158.

Montford Calls for Optimism

"I believe the legislature will pass a state-wide water bill, a package that will address the problems of all areas of the state," State Senator John Montford told a Texas Municipal League region meeting in Lubbock last week.

Montford urged that these times require a lot of optimism and emphasized that special interests must not be allowed to stall the state-wide water plan.

"This problem can not be procrastinated," the senator told the audience of city officials and their guests.

Attending the event from Post were Mayor Giles McCrary, council members Lewis Holly and Maxine Earl, city manager Becky King and Post citizens Jack

King, Mike and Debbie Barber, Wes and Pat Burnett, Mary Nell Holly and Post Chamber of Commerce manager Lewis Earl.

Montford pointed out that it is cheaper to go ahead with a

water plan now than to wait... "the longer we wait the more it's going to cost," he added.

He said the plan will cost approximately \$1 billion, by using loan guarantee development bonds.

Sewer, Water Work Start

The low bid of \$53,148 from Panhandle Construction Co. was accepted by the Post City Council at a special meeting last Thursday for water and sewer work.

The improvements are part of a Texas Community Development block grant to provide sewer and water lines to areas in east Post.

The other bidder was Plains Utility Co. at \$59,124.30.

The TCDA grant totals \$94,000 and is a 100 percent funded project by the state.

Following council approval of the bid, the state agency will review the contractor and bid, then construction will begin.

New sewer and water mains will be provided to the area east of the railroad tracks.

The Panhandle Construc-

tion Co. work includes providing sewer and water mains and fire hydrants on city property.

The grant includes the use of state funds to assist qualified homeowners in connecting to the lines. Homeowners must meet state qualifications and approval is handled by the state agency.

The council also accepted the low bid of \$15,236.15 from Arroyo Country

Motors for a new fire truck. Although other bidders were solicited, only one was offered.

The truck is a cab and chassis, with fire equipment to be installed by fire department personnel using existing equipment.

City manager Becky King informed council members about the need to replace utility poles in the baseball park and to install new quartz lights.

She also explained that the Double U is

prepared to erect a fence dividing the ranch property from the ballpark, and asked for permission for the city to pay for the costs of surveying, with Double U building the fence on its property line.

Council members approved both suggestions.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Giles McCrary, council members Lewis Holly, Jack Ault, Weaver McKamie and Maxine Earl, along with city employee Delbert Rudd and secretary Wanda Wilkerson.

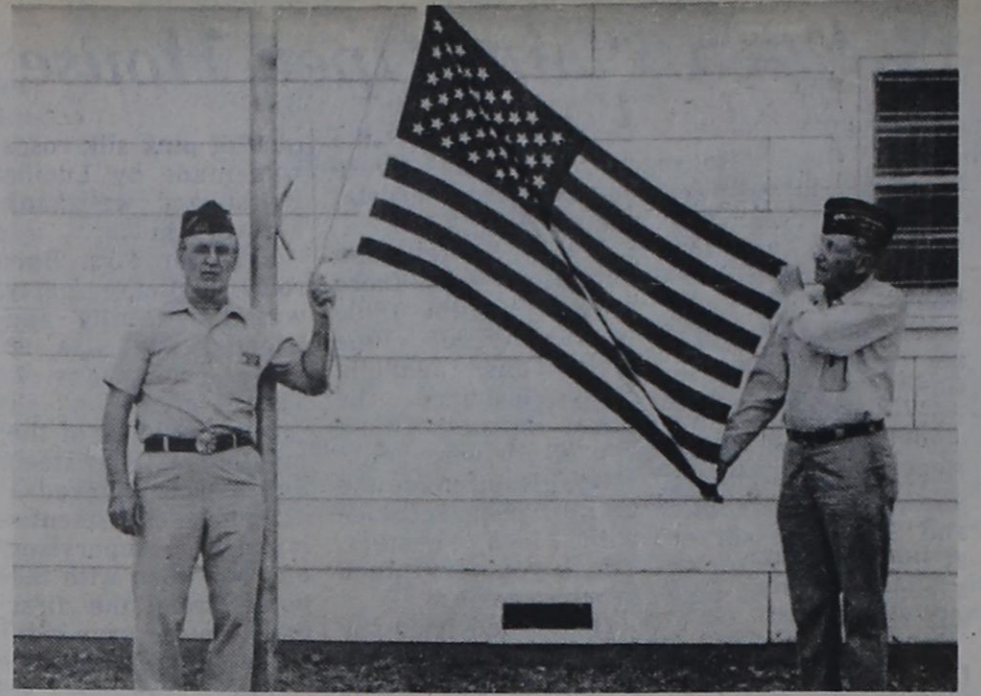

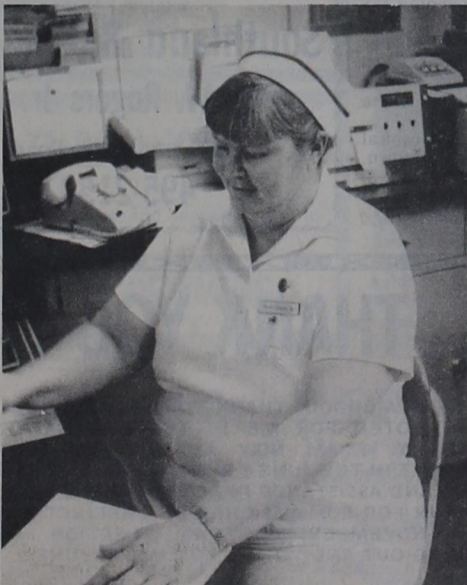

During the Monday night meeting, all but one of the city-county appointed boards provided reports.

City Housing

Juanita Peel explained the city housing board's operation and asked for help in slowing traffic on Burlington Place and Pine Street. The council approved establishing an ordinance for 15 mph zone on both

streets. She also complained about the motorcycles and 'dirt bikes' that create noise nuisance and hazards for residents in the housing projects...council members discussed about complaints that he has made to the sheriff's department.

Mrs Peel was told "there's nothing we can do."

Mrs Peel reported that there is a waiting list for housing, and that all 30 of the soon-to-be-built units off of 15th and Ave S have been committed.

Jack Alexander, David Newby and Zoe Kirkpatrick reported on the condition of the swimming pool and pool facilities, explaining the poor plumbing situation.

They also outlined the park board's application through the city for a state grant to make improve-

ments at the park. Lewis Earl presented an explanation of the application, which includes improvements at the Nichols Ball Park and the city-county park.

Earl was named by the council to attend the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department hearing in Austin this Thursday when the Post grant application will be reviewed by the commission.

If approved, the grant will be a matching fund of approximately \$109,000 and will provide for complete renovation of the swimming pool bathhouse, restroom facilities, plumbing and electrical wiring as well as electrical wir-

ing improvements at the ball park and the addition of a soccer field.


Community Action
Sue Shytle and Connie Flores provided a briefing on community action and asked the city to help in referrals, especially for the job training program. No financial assistance is expected to be requested from the agency.

In other action, the council authorized city manager Becky King to initiate the summer youth program, which this year will provide jobs for eight Garza County youth.

A public hearing for the 1984-85 Texas Community Development Block Grant has

been scheduled for and again June 4 at Monday, May 21 at the regular city council meeting, 7:30 p.m. in the Lorenzo-Alexander Community Center

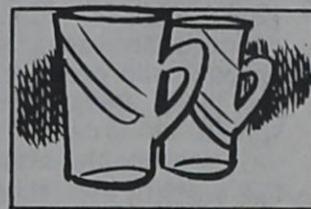

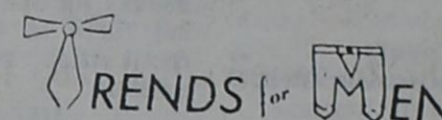
