

The Way I See It...

I will say a few things this week about the people of Post, which comes from almost two years of observation.

Since I am still getting to know you, excuse the generalities that may creep into my comments.

Having lived in eight Texas cities during my life, I have come to appreciate the variety, yet the common elements of our culture.

You may hear that West Texans are more friendly than East Texans...could be...but having been born in

East Texas and having spent major slices of my growing up days in that hot, sultry, rainy country where my ancestors trod, I can not necessarily make that generalization.

True, I believe, new folks moving to West Texas towns are accepted faster and appear to blend in easier.

But the common element in East and West has to be our strand of heritage, which in many cases reaches back into the old south, Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri and other pioneer

states. That idea of welcoming the stranger in our midst was a fiber of life and culture hundreds of years ago, and happily has survived in varying degrees today.

C.W. Post was not a Westerner nor a Texan...but he understood western ways and the adaptability of Texans.

That's why this town and county came to be in the first place...because C. W. Post had the audacity to dream what wasn't...and convinced others to share that dream and risk all they had to come out here to absolutely nothing and dare

to build from scratch. Those people were pioneers of the real stuff.

And some of them are still with us, although their numbers are dwindling. We need their spirit of adventure and dare-devil approach today.

Too often I see and hear folks in Post city who are a long way from the roots of those pioneers.

Perhaps C.W. Post set it up too smooth...the reliance on the mill and all that it meant, could have been too secure.

When people get snug and secure...somehow they lose that edge of desperation which is the ingredient for

trying something risky and different.

I call on you, the people of Garza County, to take time to visit with some of those "old-timers" who came here early enough to really know about hard times.

You don't have hard times today...you may think times are tough...but you take the effort to listen to the difficulties facing your ancestors when they came to this country...then you'll understand how easy you have it.

Drainages Street Grant Planned

The first of two public hearings was conducted Monday night on a grant application for drainage and street improvements to residential areas in east Post.

The hearing was held at the Lorenzo Alexander Community Center, with area residents hearing explanations of the project from city council members and city manager Becky King.

Mayor Giles McCrary told the citizens that the street paving and drainage project, if approved by the state, would solve many of the water run-off problems in the area.

The grant application of \$166,000 would be 100 percent funded through the Texas Community Development Agency.

Another public hearing

will be held June 4. After engineering studies are completed and other complicated procedures are met, the city will submit the application to the state.

If approved, work on the project would start next year.

After the public hearing, the council met in special session, electing council member Bill Pool as mayor pro-tem.

The council also heard a report from city manager Becky King on repairs that need to be done to the swimming pool.

Winter damage to the filtering and chlorinating systems will have to be repaired before the pool can open. King told the council that minimum repairs would be made to the out-dated equipment, recognizing that major renovation work will be done next year as a result of the recent tentatively approved Texas Parks and Wildlife grant.

Attending the public hearing and council meeting were Mayor McCrary, council members Jack Ault, Lewis Holly, Weaver McKamie and Maxine Earl.

Merchants Study Mainstreet Project

A group of Post merchants and interested citizens met here Monday morning with Hillsboro's Texas Mainstreet Project manager, Kent Collins.

The question and answer session outlined some of the problems and solutions to problems with cities looking for ways to revitalize downtown areas.

Collins emphasized that the Mainstreet Project will only work with wide-spread community involvement and support.

"In Hillsboro the effort really got started with a small group of people who worked to save the old Post Office and eventually restored it for use as the public library," Collins explained.

In 1980 Anice Read, Texas Mainstreet Project director, looked to Hillsboro as one of the first five participating cities.

"No one in Hillsboro really believed that the city council would approve a \$25,000 per year budget," Collins added. He told the Post group

that hiring an outsider as project manager is the best way to begin, "that person comes in with fresh ideas and isn't burdened with past history of problems and personality conflicts in the community."

Hillsboro is similar to Post in its relation to the bigger city down the road.

"We are not a bedroom community, that is, people in Hillsboro by and large do not work in the Dallas metro area, so we don't have the Continued on Page 2

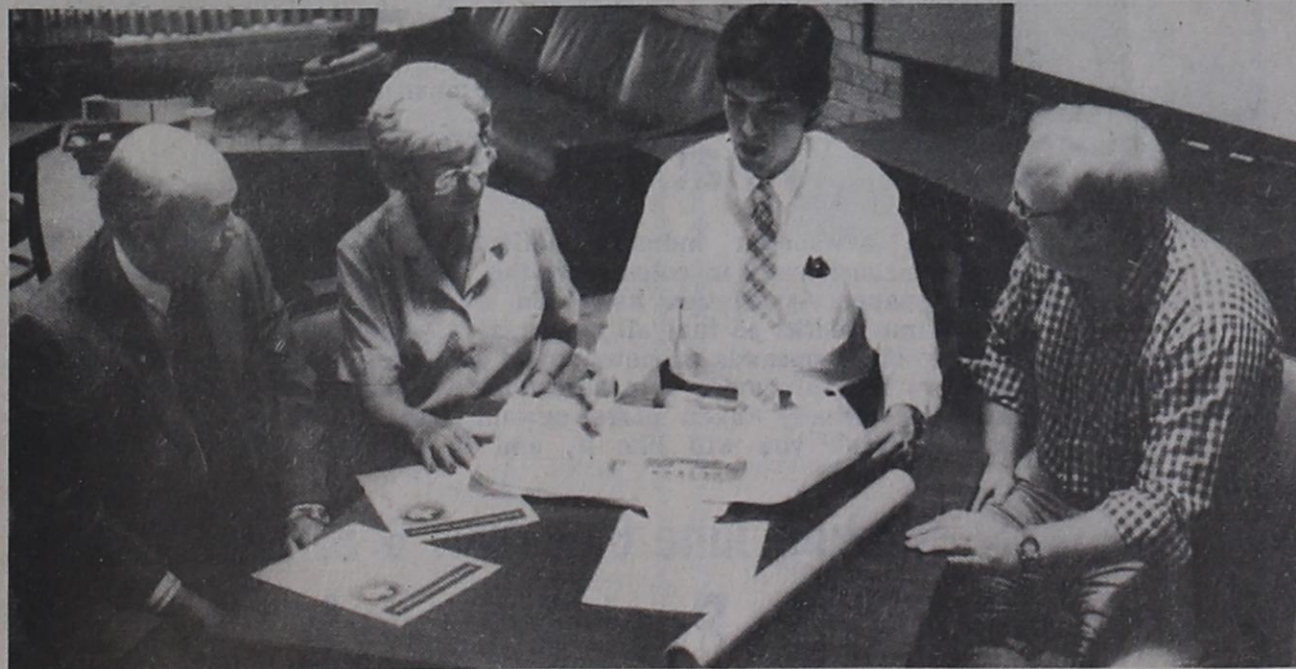
Residents of Post are piling cumbersome materials near the trash cans in alleys and calling the city hall for

Okay, I'll admit, there are many of you out of work who need to work and are still hurting from the closing of Burlington's mill.

And, there are some whose financial status has suffered indirectly from the closing of the mill. Complaining and griping and pointing fingers at someone else will not solve the problem...it didn't work in 1910 and it won't work now.

What does work is attitude.

It's the same attitude I have mentioned in the previous articles in this series.

You fail or succeed according to your attitude.

Blaming others for your situation may make you feel a little better, but when all the talkings done, you're no better off than before.

There have been others before you who faced these sort of temporary problems...those who survived found inspiration to try something different.

I am still old fashioned enough of an American and Texan to believe that there is a way to get out of a bad situation.

There is opportunity for success waiting for those who are willing to let go of the sure thing and plunge into the unknown.

Towns, I think, have personal ities...just like people, and what we are really as a town is a collection of different people.

The one thing we have in

common that shows visibly is our physical location in the world.

We bring to this location tons of personal beliefs and understandings, some of which are common, much of which is not.

I call on you to build on our common ideas and especially those which are strong and vibrant.

I also urge you to cast off those ideas which create rifts between you and your neighbor.

Emphasize in your personal relationship with others those things which may be shared with enthusiasm.

Let those old grudges be forgotten...remember that God forgives you...and the full meaning of forgiveness includes forgetting.

Too many times I hear about the old grudges...and to the newcomer, they seem so petty...as a community we can not afford the luxury of nursing old wounds . . .

As people we must forge a new frontier with new ideas and dare to risk the uncertain.

Look around you...what kind of town do you see?

Is this the sort of town you want to leave to your children or grandchildren? Or, do you plan to move on to greener pastures somewhere else?

That is the easy route...leave the problems to someone else to solve...if you're able...it is much simpler to pack up and go to the metro areas where you can be lost in the crowd.

I challenge you to stay put . . . and more than that, to make a personal investment in your community.

If you're not actively involved in some kind of project to make Post a better place to live...then perhaps you need to move on. I'd much rather have an empty house in my neighborhood than to know that you are unwilling to share the burden of improving our quality of life.

That quality of life starts at home.

In our residential areas and in our business districts.

Here are a few things I'd like to see from the people of Post city:

1. Quit griping about the way things are and start helping find ways to make things better.

2. Stop spreading rumors and half-truths...take care in repeating gossip.

3. Treat your neighbor as yourself...surely you wouldn't throw garbage and beer bottles in your own front yard...those of you who are guilty of littering our streets.

4. Be involved in city, county and school government...that means taking the time to attend the public meetings. Know what you're complaining about first hand, instead of what you've heard on the street.

5. Don't be so quick to run off to Lubbock to spend your money...every dollar you take out of town ends up hurting our town in seven different ways.

6. Spend your money at home...every dollar you spend in Post provides extra bucks to the city and county treasury so that more improvements can be made to make life here a little bit better.

You, the people of Post and Garza County, can make the difference in success or failure...it is your enthusiasm, loyalty and interest in your town which sets the course for the future.

It's your decision. I trust you will carefully consider the consequences of your attitude and actions.

Continued From Page One benefit of the metro area growth," Collins continued.

"You have a great opportunity here," he added, "Being on a main highway with no by-pass, and with such an interesting history."

Economically, Hillsboro has seen a steady eight percent increase in sales tax receipts since 1981 and this year has been 13 percent over the same period as last year.

"It seems the more revitalizing we do," Collins emphasized, "the more others want to get in on the action...and it just sort of multiplies."

"What has worked in Hillsboro, might not work here, and what hasn't worked in Hillsboro might be successful here," Collins cautioned about trying to find simple answers to problems.

During the slide presentation, Collins showed a number of "before and after" photos, many of which drew "oohs and ahhs" from the local merchants.

Much of the renovation and exterior work was inexpensive, some as little as \$500.

"A little cleaning up and painting can sometimes make the difference," Collins added.

Post Merchants' Association president Mike Barber and renovation committee chairman Marie Neff hosted the Post Chamber of Commerce sponsored meeting at the First National Bank.

State Senator John Montford met with a group of interested citizens Monday afternoon in a "Town Hall" discussion of education proposals expected to be on the agenda of a special session of the state legislature this summer.

Montford explained a few of the more controversial proposals which have been recommended by the state special commission on education, headed by H. Ross Perot.

The senator expressed his commitment to represent the 28th Senatorial District, asking for citizens to let him know how they feel about the issues.

"I find in these Town Hall meetings," Montford commented, "that generally there is overwhelming support for better pay for teachers."

He also responded to local comments about taxes, "I join you in supporting a sales tax and or gasoline tax

5. That congress be encouraged to support aid to freedom fighters in Central America to help allies of non-communist countries.

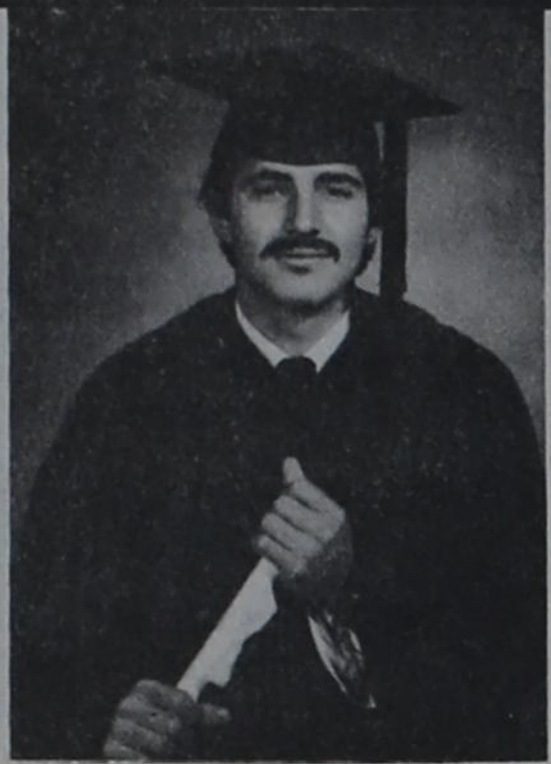
6. That Texas congressmen be urged to support an amendment to the U.S. Constitution to protect human life at every stage of

The D. W. I. question. I am not against this, as our jail docket will show. We have them in jail all the time. The court is doing a good job on them too, giving them 60 to 90 days, but if one over does this, where am I going to keep them? As everyone knows, this is a very small jail and if it gets overcrowded, the Jail Standard Act will shut it down. Then you have nothing to keep anyone in.

Then there is the problem of the trucks running the traffic lights. We work this when we have time and we catch some of them, but it is not easy. They all have C. B. radios and the first one that sees the patrol car then squeals the word and sometimes we don't even get one.

Yes, I have three deputies here that live out of the county. I had rather they live here, but if I let them go, there is no one to take their place, so I have to put up with it at least until something turns up.

The school zone. There are officers there three times a day and have been ever since I have held this job. The ball games also, unless they are called away on an emergency, which of course cannot be helped.

We also help all we can at the fires and we do assist the E. M. T.'s, of course, there are a few times when we are on something else that cannot be dropped to get there in time to help.

As I said previously, it is not an easy job and anyone getting elected to the Sheriff's Office is going to be faced with the same problems I'm faced with. At least I have the satisfaction of knowing I have never been filed on and I don't spend all the money the commissioners budget me for.

The Commissioners are hard put to support all the different divisions of County Government to make the taxpayers money cover it all. I do all I can to help with this as their job is like mine, it is not easy.

The run-off is June 2 on Saturday, so please try to find the time to go and VOTE. When you get to your voting box, just use your best judgement and vote for the Candidate of your choice, and you will have done your duty as a voter and a good citizen.
