

# The Way I See It.....

If Texas Monthly's Alison Cook is right, Texas and Garza County could be the fourth national low-level nuclear waste site.

Recently there has been an on-again, off-again discussion about sites for the Texas legislature mandated low-level radiation site, with Garza County being on and then off and then on as a

possible location for the dump.

I have tried to sit back quietly and survey the rhetoric...purposely avoiding writing about the issue for my lack of education and because there is so much emotion on both sides.

These who don't particularly see anything bad about the waste site look at it as a

potential economic improvement...and perhaps even the beginning of new industries in Post.

With a low-level nuclear dump ground just a few miles from town, they argue, Post might become a mecca for such medical industrial giants as Johnson and Johnson, who manufacture large quantities of radioactive hospital supplies.

Being near a low-level

nuclear waste site would have its economic advantages for such manufacturers.

The other folks, those who pledge to fight until the bitter end, can see absolutely no good at all from a low-level nuclear waste site being located here.

Not only would the site be potentially dangerous, they argue, but it would put a stigma on our town and

county that would steer away people by the droves.

Who wants to visit or live in a town with the distinction of being the only nuclear waste dump in the western United States? they ask.

The May 1984 Texas Monthly article carefully lays out the opposition to the Texas nuclear waste site in Hudspeth County...but this same sort of "grass roots" criticism could fit almost all the other counties which have been or continue to be on the list, including neighboring Borden county.

The story behind all this starts with the idiotic mad rush into the atomic age, without regard or little regard for the consequences of the trash atomic fuel creates.

What was supposed to be the final solution to energy problems has turned its ugly face on its creators and is spitting out the most horrendous and foul-smelling

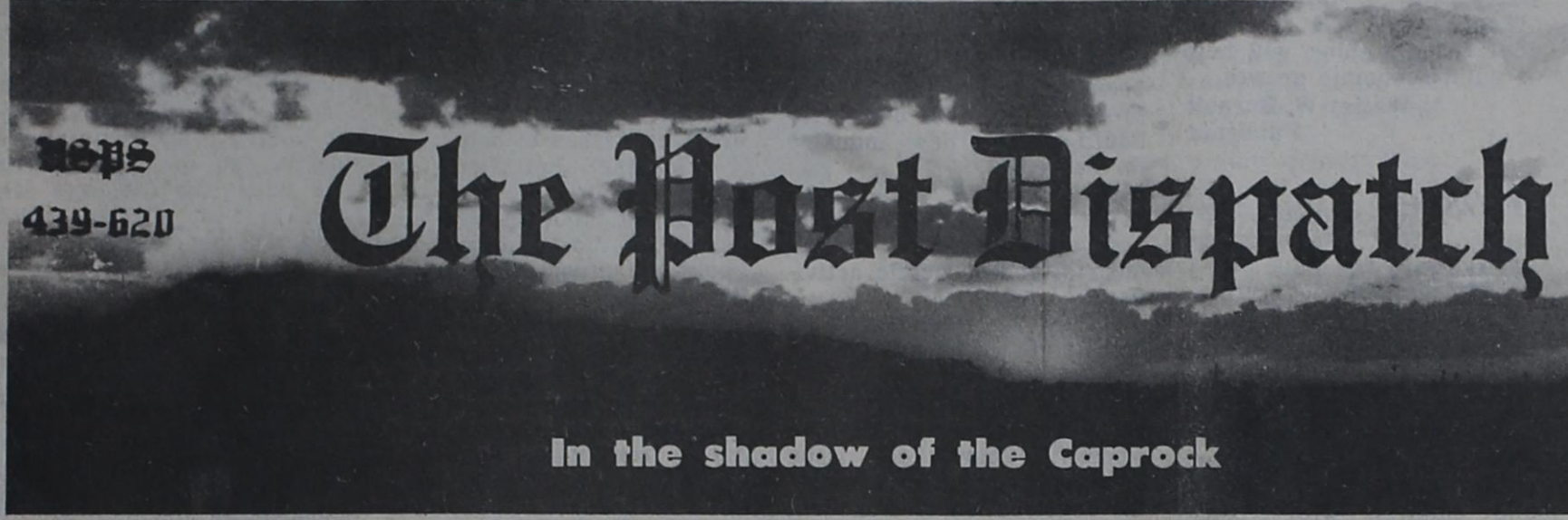

fire that no imaginary dragon could ever match. Most of the high-level nuclear waste takes 10,000 years to deteriorate to a safe level.

The low-level waste would take 1,000 years to become safe.

I can not deny that the medical advances through the use of radioactive materials is important...I can not deny that, yes, those wastes have to be stored somewhere safe.

True, there is a need...but I am opposed to the location of a nuclear waste site in my backyard or anywhere near my town.

I am opposed for these reasons:

1. The psychological negative impact on Post would be immeasurable. I agree with the opposition, who wants to live in a town known as the only nuclear waste dump in Texas? The mere fact of its location near Post (even 25 miles is too close) would scare people away.

2. I doubt its location here would be a significant factor on getting new industry for Post. More likely, folks like Johnson and Johnson, who already have plants in Texas, would simply enjoy the benefit of increasing or adding production at current facilities and sending their nuclear garbage to Post.

3. Tourism would be adversely affected. Can you imagine the "radiated"

jokes that will be spread among travelers headed north or south on Hwy 84? I fear that as ignorant as it sounds, there would be many people who would not stop in Post simply because of fear that food or water might be contaminated. This one reason alone to me is the single most important one for opposing the location of a nuclear waste site in Garza County. The only real chance for our town to see immediate economic growth is through the folks who choose to stop here during their trip on Hwy 84. A nuclear waste dump would ruin that trade.

4. The future use of the site is in question. I do not trust the bureaucrats, state or federal, who say the site will be used only for low-level waste. I have been around government long enough to know that once the machinery is in gear, no one can stand in its way safely...the next step after the site is built is for the feds to put pressure on the state and then we've got the high-level waste in our backyard. No thanks.

5. Radioactive traffic. Once a site is built, trucks will be rolling through town with "Danger, Radioactive Materials" plastered on the sides and back...another psychological negative...it makes me nervous thinking about it.

The Garza County Commissioners recently signed a letter opposing the site to a land owner who had ex-

pressed an interest in selling property to the state.

I call on all of our elected officials to join in this opposition both verbally and in writing.

Alison Cook is right...the state agency handling this problem is more likely to pick a spot with the least political opposition.

For the sake of our future, let's not allow Garza County to be that place known to the world as **The Only Texas Town with a Nuclear Waste Dump.**

That's not the sort of advertising I think will help us build economic growth.

secure and emotionally stable home.

Foster parents are needed to provide placements for older children, ages 10 and above, handicapped children and children with special medical problems. There is a demand for hispanic and black foster homes as well as anglo foster homes. Training is provided for prospective foster parents.

"Texas State Foster Parents, Incorporated, 62 local foster parent associations and 2,500 Texas Foster Parents have begun to create a greater public awareness of the needs of foster children and the roles and responsibilities of foster families."

Many questions have been directed in recent weeks asking just what has been done or is being done presently in the quest for additional or new industry for our city.

Perhaps it would be good at this time to bring everyone up-to-date on industrial and economic activities.

Over a year ago an industrial corporation was created, which has the capacity, upon consent of the Garza County Commissioners' Court, to issue industrial revenue bonds for the construction or financing on any worthy industry that meets financial requirements.

Later, the Post Industrial Commission was formed, consisting of some 15 local business and government people, each trained in a specific area of potential industrial interest.

From housing to utilities to finance to taxation to transportation, this commission is prepared to handle any question posed by an outside source.

Several interviews have been handled, but none has yet materialized in an industry locating in Post.

It is difficult to list the number of letters and telephone calls that have been made to such firms as Levi Strauss, Walls, Wall-Mart, Frito Lay, Texas Instruments and many, many others as we have attempted to find a lead of any kind to replace Burlington.

Incidentally, the city manager has been in contact constantly with Burlington and its designated real estate representative, Marvin Baugh of Greensboro, N.C. and George Puckett of Austin, a nation-wide industrial real estate agent.

Chamber of Commerce manager Lewis Earl recently returned from Austin, where he visited with the Texas Economic Division, Water Board members and the Attorney General's office.

Your Chamber of Commerce has, as its number one priority, the location of industry for Post.

Brochures are being developed by the Chamber, telling the Post story, that will be distributed across this country and to a few foreign countries.

Professionally produced advertising will soon appear in trade journals telling various industries to "look us over" before they make a final decision.

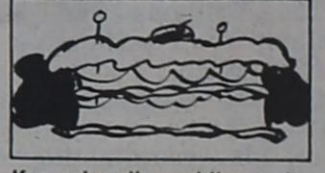

That we're only mortal and soon will be gone.

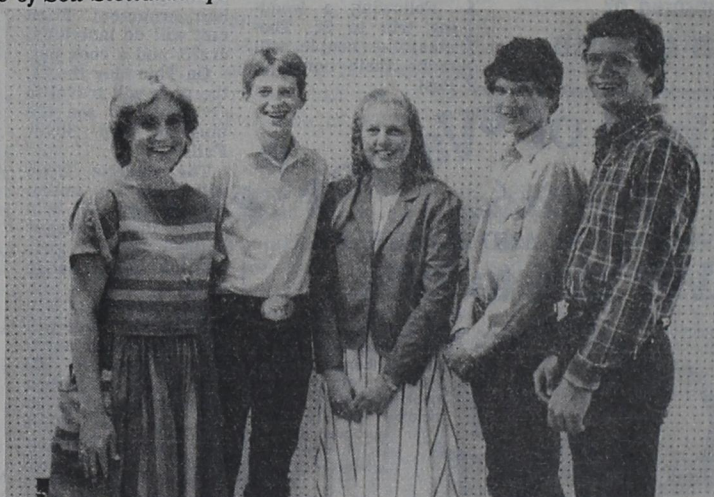
We each have a duty to God our Creator

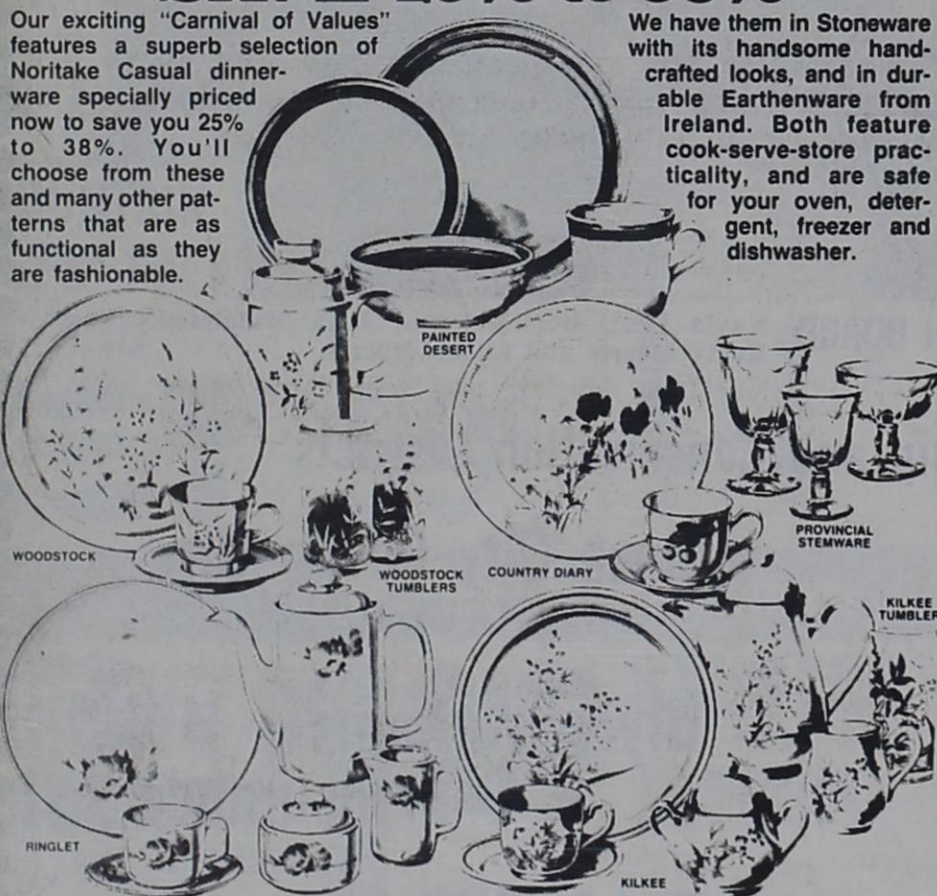

# Surviving a Tornado

When the storm sirens blare and the radio warns that a "twister" is on the way, what can you do to improve your chances of surviving a Texas tornado?

ies show that if you're in your house, you should stay there. Only 3 per 1,000 people in houses hit by tornadoes are killed-or, put another way, 99.7 percent survive.

This somewhat comforting statistic is especially welcome to the older workers enrolled in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employment program, because most of them live and

work in the northern half of the state so often assaulted by spring storms.

More than 50 Green Thumbers from 6 counties attended a training session at the senior center in Crosbyton, Texas on May 22, 1984, and learned how they could save their lives if a tornado should come their way.

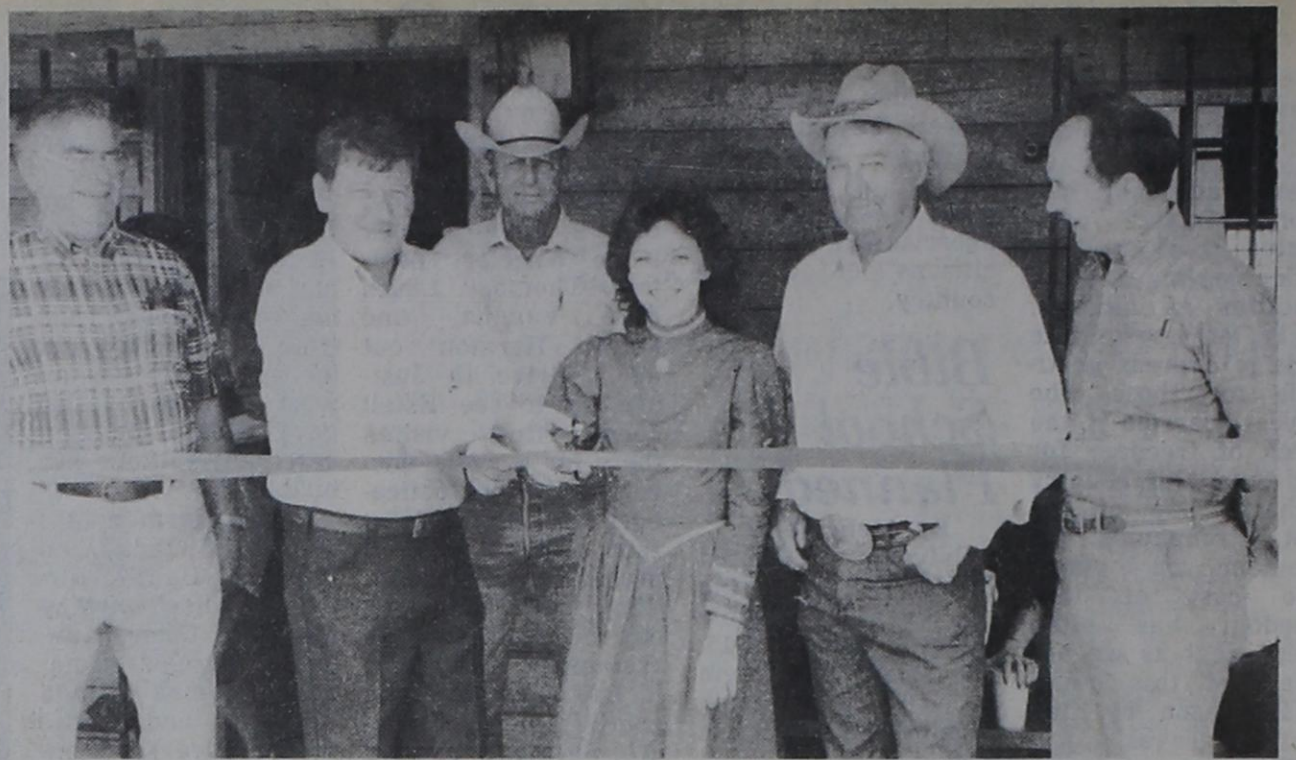
"In the case of severe storms, there truly is no place like home," says Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish of Waco, "provided your home is a sturdy house."

Parrish used a slide presentation to illustrate the kinds of tornadoes that can develop and to describe the techniques most likely to enhance survival. Slides of twisters that hit Lubbock, Waco, Wichita Falls, San Angelo, Clarendon, and north-east Texas were used in the presentation.

According to Parrish, most tornado deaths result from head injuries caused by flying debris. People in mobile homes are at much greater risk, and in fact may be even more vulnerable than persons in cars.

"The key to survival is to stay in your house and put as many walls as possible between you and the tornado," she said, adding that most tornadoes approach from the west and southwest. "And don't try to outrun the storm--many people are killed when they try to escape in a panic."

Also addressing the group was Gayla Roberts from Lubbock Red Cross who gave basic first aid information and Patricia Doyle, also from Lubbock Red Cross, who gave additional information on tornado safety and awareness.

Not only did David

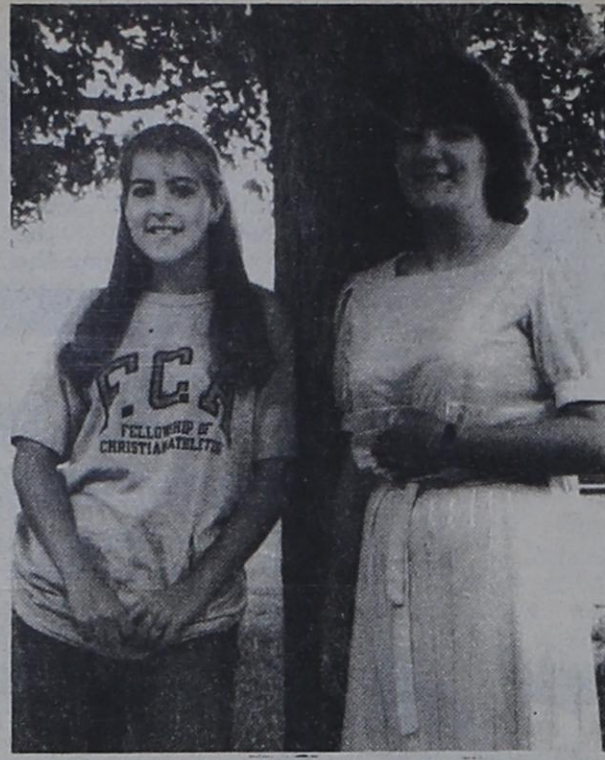
maintain a high grade average throughout his high school years, but he was also an exceptional athlete.

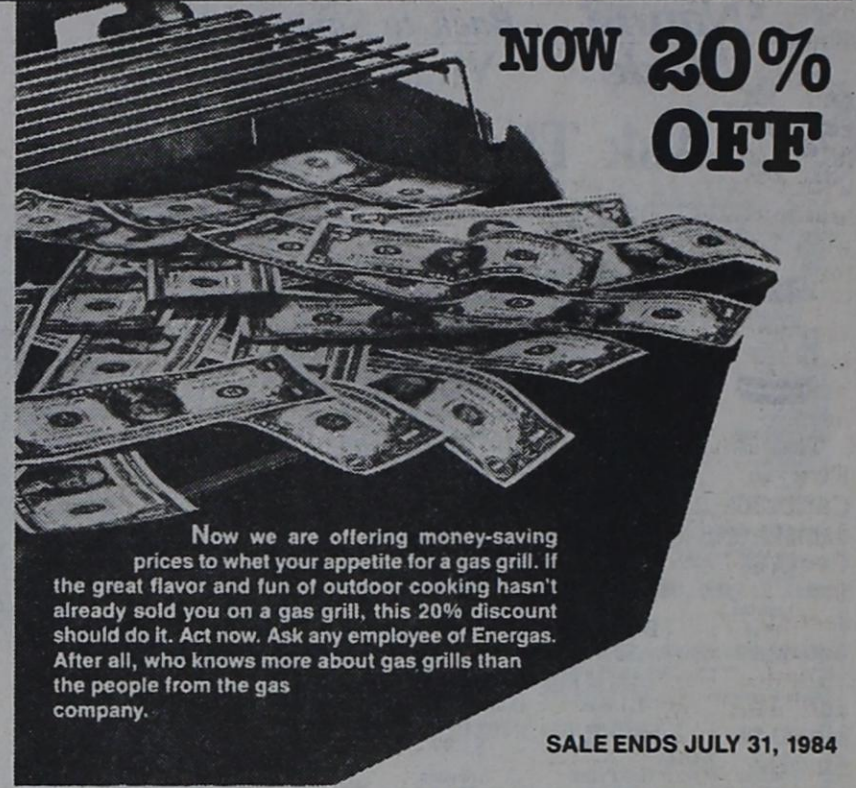

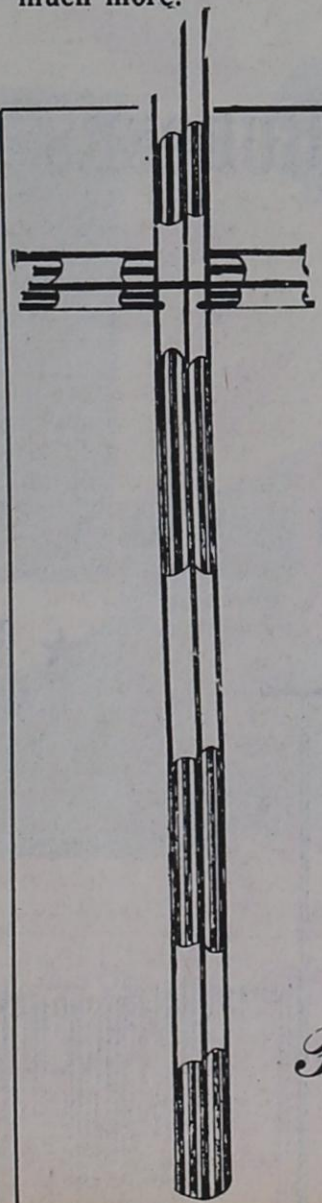

**Soil Stewardship week is**  
May 27-June 3

High winds have kicked up dust storms this spring throughout much of Texas, and heavy rains that are sure to come sooner or later will rob more lands of precious topsoil. All this points to a greater need for soil conservation.

And calling greater attention to soil conservation is what Soil Stewardship Week is all about.

The annual nationwide observance will be May 27-June 3 this year, with the theme "Conservation: A Common Commitment."

"Commitment is what is needed from everyone to reduce the loss of our valuable soil and water resources," says Dr. B.L. Harris, a soils specialist.

"We must all make a commitment to work toward this common objective, for it is from these natural resources that we reap the food and fiber that enables our very existence," emphasizes Harris, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The Extension Service is joining the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the State Board plus the Soil Conservation Service and others in this week-long observance.

"We must accept primary responsibility as caretakers of God's earth," adds the specialist. "We are prepared to eat the fruit, but often we leave the task of caring for the land to a handful of people who sincerely care about perpetuating our forests, preserving our rivers and renewing the topsoil."

Harris emphasizes that there is no time like the present to join the common commitment to soil and water conservation. "Our long-range food supply may depend on it. Our farmland is under a lot of pressure—from erosion, urbanization and pollution. Everyone can help conserve our natural resources."

"Let's keep America, the beautiful, and America, the greatest

agricultural country to protect our soil on this earth," says Harris. "Join in local conservation efforts and water resources."

### Popular Foods Can Have Fewer Calories and Nutrition

Some of those favorite casual summer meals like hamburgers, pizza, tacos, quiche and chef's salad, can be high in nutrients and lower in calories with just a few variations.

Perhaps because children and teenagers like them so much, many people think these dishes are

"junk food" or somehow inferior to other kinds of meals. But in fact these dishes may contain foods from each of the four basic food groups: protein foods like meat, poultry, fish, eggs and legumes; fruits and vegetables; dairy products; and breads and cereals.

You can enhance the nutritional value and cut the calories of these popular foods by doing the following:

Add the nutrition of dairy products by making your hamburger a cheeseburger and serving tacos with cheese.

Include vegetables in these dishes by adding fresh green lettuce and a tomato slice to your cheeseburger. Serve tacos with shredded lettuce

and tomatoes. Add a generous amount of mushrooms, sliced green pepper or other vegetables to pizza, and add spinach or broccoli to quiche. Reduce calories from meat by starting with lean ground beef. Make sure you drain the fat from

beef before preparing taco filling or using it on pizza.

Add protein to a chef's salad by including hard-cooked eggs, strips of cheese, lean ham, beef, chicken, or turkey, and croutons.

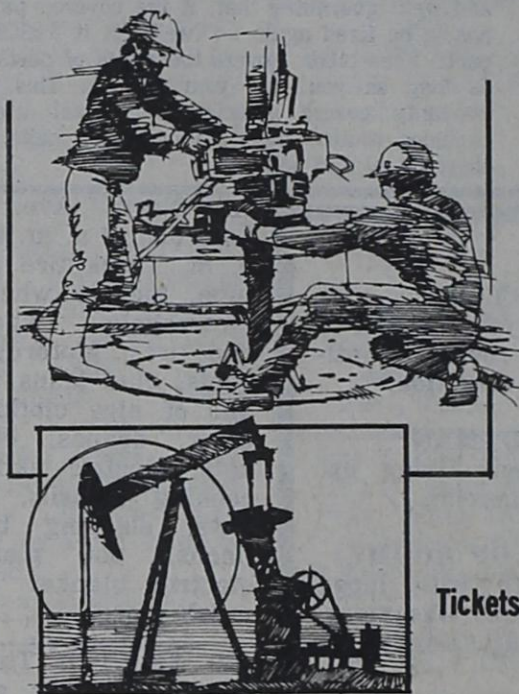
