Pectin determines the firm ness of the jelly. Too little pectin can produce a
soft to hold its form
ort to hold its form. But good homemade jellies don't have to have as much pectin as commercial jellies, withstand shipment. Different kinds of pectins produce jellies with various degrees of firmness pectins yield jellies that break easily into small clumps, while aple pectins create more elastic jellies. The acidity of the fruit also
has something to do with firmness.
Juices from higher acid fruits yield firmer jellies than
juices from lower acid fruits, juices from lower acid fruits, is the same.

the chrysanthemum, the candle tree, the copper plant and Joseph's coat.
Each has advantages and disadvantages, but they all

mum, is considered the queen of fall flowers.
The plants, which are generally 12 to 24 inches tall, are covered with. colorful
blooms. Mums
drained soil, ample water and fertilizer.
It is suggested that you use such as $5-15-10$ at the rate of two pounds per 100 square feet. nou need to complete transplanting of mums in June or early July.
Keep terminal buds pinchKeep terminal buds pinch-
ed through July to promote side branching.
The candle tree offers
showy yellow flowers in the fall and is flowers in the fall and is best used as a beds.
The plant also has attractive foilage and grows to a height of four to six feet. Candle trees prefer rich,
moist soil and should be moist soil and should be
fertilized each month with a complete fertilizer such as 5-15-10 at the rate of two pounds per 100 square feet of soil surface.
Copper plants, with their
rich bronze foliage, are attractive in summer as well as fall. normally grow 15 to 30 inches tall in moist, fertile
soil. soi a rate of about two pounds
a per 100 square feet of soil 495-3746.
surface, using a complete and balanced fertilizer such as $10-10-5$.

Joseph's Joseph's coat, famous for its colors of red, orange, green and yellow, are available.
Usually under 15 inches tall, this native of Brazil is most commonly of used as a low spreading border. Like the other fall plants, Joseph's coat flourishes in Small plants are available at nurseries and garden centers, or cuttings may be easily rooted from larger
Spider Mites - Tiny Pests Cause Big Problems Spider mites are tiny but
they can cause big problems they can cause big problems
in home gardens. in home gardens. Spider mites, also called
red spiders, are only $1-60$ th red spiders, are only $1-60$ th
inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.
These pests prefer tomatoes, beans and peas and do most of their damage in hot,
dry weather.
The tiny pests can build up quickly and completely engulf plants. They lay eggs on the underside of leaves, which hatch in four to five days.
A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year. Mites spin a thin web which
often can be seen on the often can be seen on the
underside of an infested leaf. They feed by inserting their mouth-parts into the tissue and sucking juice from the plant.
While
While feeding, they inject oxic substances into the
Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on the underside of a leaf.
Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first
along the main leaf veins and then throughout the plant. The plant may also shed buds and small fruit.
Spider mites can completecontrolled.

## Control of spider mites is

 often difficult and requires from two to four applications of insecticide at five-dayintervals. Plants should be checked frequently for spider mites
since the pests can build up since the pests can build up Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazinon, kel-
thane, malathion, ethion and sulfur.
However, avoid using sulphur on vine plants as severe plant change could occur. label directions on all insectilabel
cides.
