## Justiceburg Hearing Set

The Texas Water Commission will hold its hearing on the application for the Justiceburg dam permit Aug. 6 in Austin.

The application from the city of Lubbock to build the reservoir has been recommended to be approved by TWC hearing examiner Jim Rourke.

The dam is to be located on the South Fork of the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River near Justiceburg.

The city of Lubbock has indicated its interest in

purchasing water from the White River Municipal Water District's Post Lake, when the Justiceburg project is completed.

The permit to construct the Post Lake was issued two years ago and has been in litigation with land owners filing suit in the Travis County District Court.

White River district superintendent Al O'Brien told board members last week that the district's application and fee for extending the permit were on file in Austin.

TWC explained to the Dispatch that the White River application has been sent to the legal department for review.

TWC staff members added that the permit is considered valid with the application on file.

Construction on the Post Lake dam could not have been started during the previous two years, O'Brien

said, due to the litigation.

No date has been set by the district court for hearing of the suit and the TWC has not announced a hearing of the Post Lake permit.

The White River MWD representatives for Post are Bo Jackson, chairman of the board, Everett "Heavy" Windham and Jack King.

The board includes representative from Spur, Ralls, Crosbyton and Post.

for consideration at the Area II level were presented award medals for the National FFA Foundation Inc. at the recent area banquet.

Williams, the son of Mr and Mrs Nolan Williams of Post, entered the Agricultural Electrification competition, co-sponsored by the Food and Energy Council, Inc., Columbia, Mo. and the Winpower Corp. of Newton, Iowa.

Osborn, the son of Mr and Mrs Jerry Osborn of Post, entered agricultural mechanics, sponsored by International Harvester of Chicago, Ill.

Osborn will also receive the State Farmer Degree at the State Convention.

## School Budget Waits for State Funding Details

"We're not going to be able to look at budget details until August," Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver told trustees last week, "we just don't know what the impact of the state changes will be."

Shiver explained that new state school financing details were expected to be sent to administrators in the next few weeks.

"The final bill is 200 pages," Shiver added, "and I only have 100 of those pages to look at."

The board will probably hold two meetings in August to assess the overall implications to the school system and begin to formulate budget plans for next year.

Normally, budgets are prepared in July and by September are approved by the board.

Shiver also told the board that the football stands will be ready by the first home game September 14 and should make it through one more season.

"I think our number one priority in the spring will have to be to repair and renovate the seating and press box, at the least," Shiver commented.

In other action at the 30 minute meeting, the board accepted the resignations of Dina Cordell and Mrs Beth Cook.

Cordell, who had been hired to teach Spanish, notified Shiver that she had decided to go to Odessa.

Mrs Cook's husband is being transferred to Austin.

The board approved the hiring of Charles Tipton as vocal music teacher, Mrs Melinda Claire Arbuckle to teach mathematics and Gary Henry as earth science teacher at the middle school.

Tipton comes to Post from Portales, N.M. where he has served as youth director of his church.

Board members approved a new schedule for the high school, setting the end of the school day at 3:20 p.m.

The new schedule also allows for a 40 minute lunch break for high school.

Buses will begin their departures at 3:25 p.m.

The board approved the renewal of two certificates of deposit, one for \$834,482.71 at 10 percent interest and one for \$1,570,000 at 10.25 percent.

Board members attending the meeting were president Jack Kirkpatrick, Don Payne, Pru Basquez, Tom Middleton and John Boren.

## Hospital Board Studies Request

Following lengthy discussion, Garza Memorial Hospital board members, meeting in regular session last Thursday morning, voted unanimously to reject the buying of new ambulance equipment consisting of a defibrillator and ECG monitor with radios for the equipment.

After studying the application for the equipment and lengthy discussion with the hospital attorney, the board decided they were not in any way opposed to life-saving equipment, but the risks involved were innumerable and they felt more study was

needed on the equipment before approving the request.

Board members also noted that the hospital now has portable monitor equipment which is available at doctors' request to go on ambulance transfers.

In other action, the board approved an indigent applica-

tion and denied another; approved a medical care evaluation study on diabetes mellitus and approved the writing-off of delinquent accounts in the amount of \$3,952.37.

The delinquent accounts will be transferred to a collection agency.

## Swollen Legs are a Common Problem

For many people, swollen legs are a common and uncomfortable problem. According to the Texas Medical Association, this disorder can result from sitting or standing for too long without moving around.

It may also be caused by disorders of the heart, blood vessels, kidneys or liver.

More women than men suffer from swollen legs. They are also more common among over-weight people and during hot weather.

After a day of constant sitting or standing at work, a person may have swollen legs simply because of gravity. Blood and other fluids accumulate at the body's lower levels.

The Texas Medical Association says that varicose veins as well as medications such as cortisones, birth control pills and other hormones are also sometimes related to swelling.

One thing you can do if you notice persistent swelling, is to start moving.

Try spending less time sitting or standing and more time walking or lying flat.

By moving you can keep your blood circulating. Take time away from your desk

during the day to stand up, stretch and walk around.

As you sit at your desk, elevate your legs occasionally. If you have varicose veins or a job that requires much standing, support stockings can be helpful.

If you still have a problem with swelling, check with your doctor. He or she can determine if the conditions are related to a disease that requires treatment.

## Making Jelly

The "secret" to making good jelly is no secret at all - it's a combination of pectin, acid and sugar in the right amounts.

Whether you make your own jelly each year or you're trying it for the first time, it pays to know how these ingredients work together.

Pectin determines the firmness of the jelly. Too little pectin can produce a jelly too soft to hold its form.

But good homemade jellies don't have to have as much pectin as commercial jellies, which must be firm enough to withstand shipment.

Different kinds of pectins produce jellies with various degrees of firmness.

For example, cranberry pectins yield jellies that break easily into small clumps, while apple pectins create more elastic jellies.

The acidity of the fruit also has something to do with firmness.

Juices from higher acid fruits yield firmer jellies than juices from lower acid fruits, even where the pectin content is the same.

Fruits usually have a mixture of acids in them. But tartaric acid, which is plentiful in grapes and currants, is more efficient for jelly-making than citric or acetic acid.

Perhaps the biggest question in jelly-making is how much sugar to add, since that can vary from fruit to fruit.

Most of the time, it's better to use too little rather than too much sugar if you want a jelly that will hold its form.

Experiments show that three-fourths cup of sugar per cup of fruit extraction works better than a cup or more of sugar.

Partly ripe currants, gooseberries and grapes may need one or more cups of sugar, but that depends on their stage of ripeness and the

amount of water used to cook them.

Having low acid or low pectin fruits does not mean you have to give up on making jelly.

Low pectin fruits can be

made into excellent jelly if commercial pectin is added.

And acid can be increased in a fruit juice simply by adding lemon juice or combining it with other acid fruits.

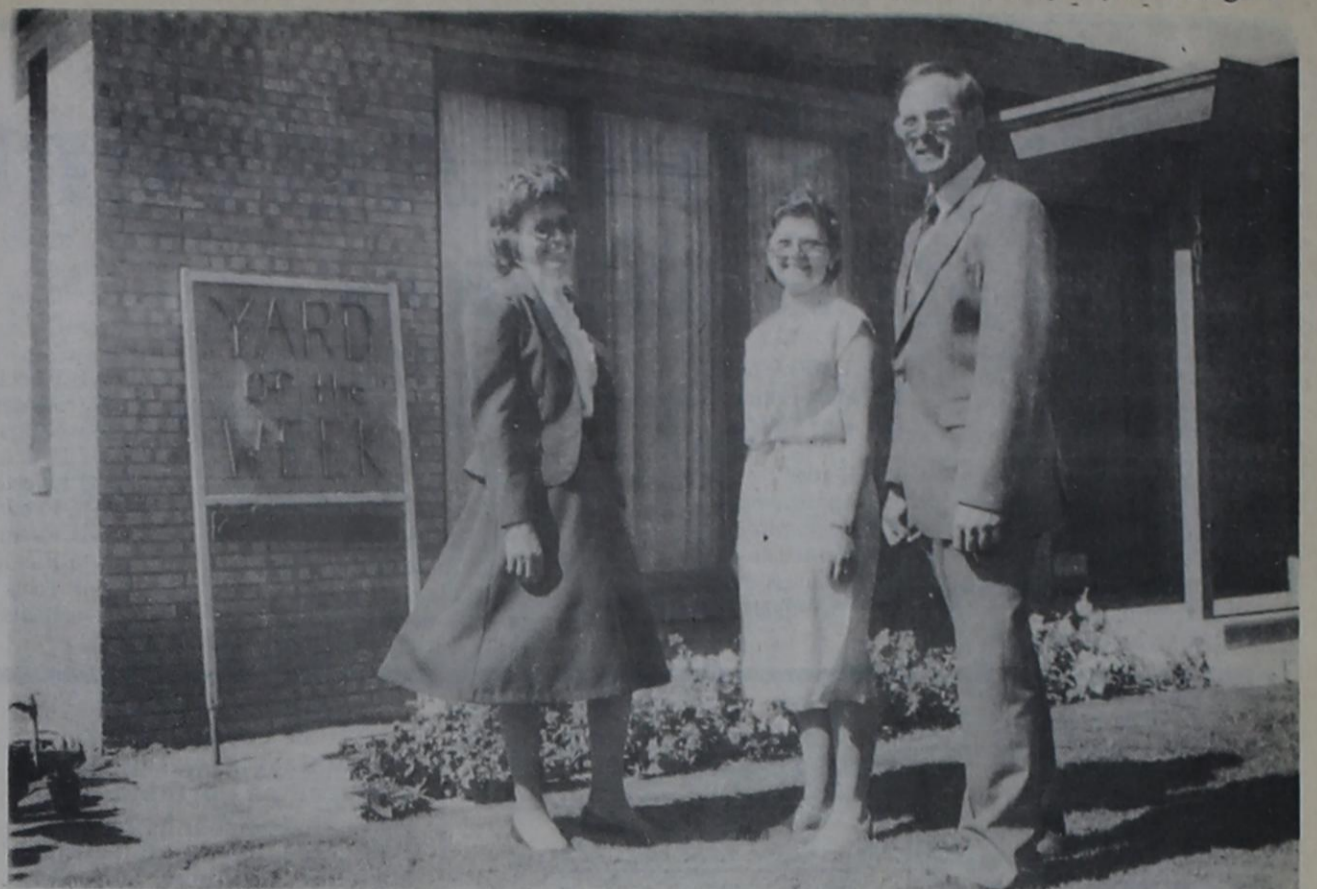

The Extension Way

Planning now can mean a brilliantly colored landscape this fall.

Four popular plants well-known for their fall color are the chrysanthemum, the candle tree, the copper plant and Joseph's coat.

Each has advantages and disadvantages, but they all offer beauty and eye-pleasing color.

The chrysanthemum, or mum, is considered the queen of fall flowers.

The plants, which are generally 12 to 24 inches tall, are covered with colorful blooms.

Mums require a well-drained soil, ample water and fertilizer.

It is suggested that you use a high phosphorus fertilizer, such as 5-15-10, at the rate of two pounds per 100 square feet.

You need to complete transplanting of mums in June or early July.

Keep terminal buds pinched through July to promote side branching.

The candle tree offers showy yellow flowers in the fall and is best used as a background for wide flower beds.

The plant also has attractive foliage and grows to a height of four to six feet.

Candle trees prefer rich, moist soil and should be fertilized each month with a complete fertilizer such as 5-15-10 at the rate of two pounds per 100 square feet of soil surface.

Copper plants, with their rich bronze foliage, are attractive in summer as well as fall.

They normally grow 15 to 30 inches tall in moist, fertile soil.

For best results, fertilize at a rate of about two pounds per 100 square feet of soil

surface, using a complete and balanced fertilizer such as 10-10-5.

Several varieties of Joseph's coat, famous for its colors of red, orange, green and yellow, are available.

Usually under 15 inches tall, this native of Brazil is most commonly used as a low spreading border.

Like the other fall plants, Joseph's coat flourishes in moist, well-fertilized soil.

Small plants are available at nurseries and garden centers, or cuttings may be easily rooted from larger plants.

**Spider Mites - Tiny Pests Cause Big Problems**

Spider mites are tiny but they can cause big problems in home gardens.

Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1-60th inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.

These pests prefer tomatoes, beans and peas and do most of their damage in hot, dry weather.

The tiny pests can build up quickly and completely engulf plants.

They lay eggs on the underside of leaves, which hatch in four to five days.

A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year.

Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on the underside of an infested leaf.

They feed by inserting their mouth-parts into the tissue and sucking juice from the plant.

While feeding, they inject toxic substances into the plant.

Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on the underside of a leaf.

Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then throughout the plant.

The plant may also shed buds and small fruit.

Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled.

Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires from two to four applications of insecticide at five-day intervals.

Plants should be checked frequently for spider mites since the pests can build up rapidly.

Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazinon, kelthane, malathion, ethion and sulfur.

However, avoid using sulphur on vine plants as severe plant change could occur.

As always, read and follow label directions on all insecticides.

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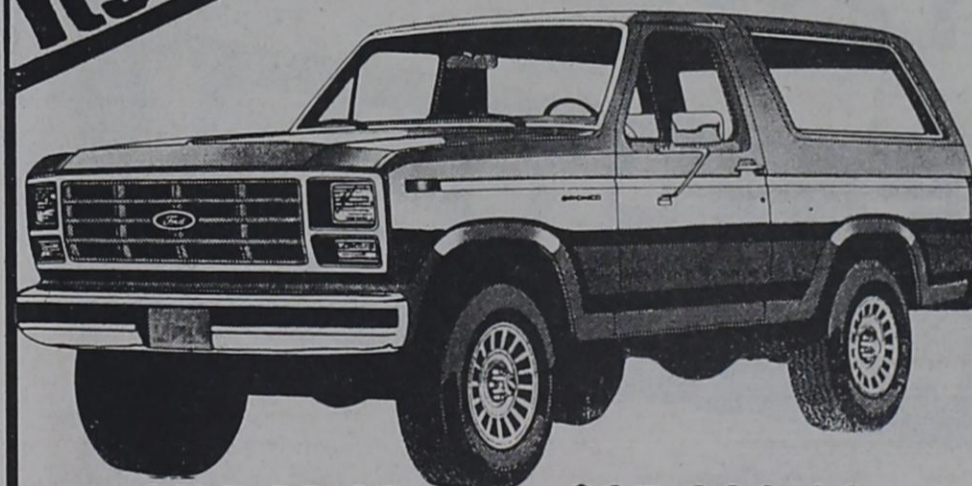
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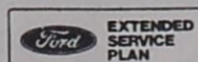
