## Texas Water Commission Hears Post Lake Petition

An extension to build the Post Lake was granted in July 1982 and was for a two year period, although construction on the dam could not have been started due to litigation by opponents.

## Council Studies Tax Rate Spending Cuts Planned

The Post City Council spent six hours searching for ways to trim the 1984-85 budget expenses to avoid imposing a tax increase during last weeks budget meeting.

Through a tortuous line-by-line procedure, council members made a number of adjustments and directed city manager Bill Pool to prepare a detailed revision for the September 10 meeting.

The tentative budgeted revenues are expected to be \$1,042,075, which city council members believe will meet expenses. The worksheet budget included a tax rate of .22 per \$100 evaluation, which would be an increase from the current .20.

With proposed spending cuts, the council aimed toward eliminating the need for an increase.

One of the ways the council expects to raise additional funds is through the recently increased water and sewer rates.

The council also voted to increase the occupational tax on oil production from .75 percent to a full one percent.

The city has the authority to raise that rate to a full two percent, which is what the utility companies currently pay.

Through the first six months of 1984 oil production sales in the city limits was reported to be \$8.6 million, annualized this would produce \$170,000 in taxes to the city.

That represents a \$40,000 increase from last year.

During the budget review, council member Weaver McKamie asked the city manager for a justification of the code enforcer position and then moved to strike the position from the budget.

Pool provided a list of specific accomplishments of the code enforcer, Delbert Rudd, and explained to the council that the position was important if city ordinances were expected to be enforced.

Among the jobs that are included in that position has been the removal of 300 junk cars, condemnation proceedings on six dilapidated homes, enforcing 31 mobile home ordinances, assisting with the paving project, coordination with sewer and water grant in

East Post, serving as emergency manager for Post, helping with the trash and clean up, taking complaints and follow-through on animals and assisting in the office.

McKamie insisted that the position is actually an assistant city manager and that she was elected to specifically remove that position.

Council member Lewis Holly retorted that if the code enforcer was to be considered an assistant city manager, then all other office personnel would have to be classified in that manner also.

"Everyone of them assists the city manager," Holly commented.

Mayor Giles McCrary emphasized that the city manager could not be expected to enforce all the city ordinances and that with the lack of law enforcement attention, the city needed someone to see that the ordinances were obeyed.

Jack Ault seconded the motion and the vote for included he and McKamie, voting against was Maxine Earl and Holly.

New council member Larry Mills asked for a little time to study the matter and after hearing a lively discussion, including a statement by city manager Pool that in order to get the job done the position was needed, he voted in opposition to the motion, and the position remained in the budget.

Maxine Earl responded to McKamie's comment about having to raise taxes to pay for the position, "Weaver you yourself voted to increase the city manager salary to \$23,000 and even submitted the motion and the only employee increase we had considered until tonight was the one you recommended."

Earl pointed out that the overall salary budget is a decrease from last year.

In other budget considerations, McKamie questioned the average monthly utility cost of \$250 at the fire department and city manager Pool explained a savings of \$1,000 per year would be realized by removing an unused telephone at the fire department.

He credited McKamie with the savings by her question about the monthly telephone statement.

The new budget includes

an overall six percent pay raise for city employees.

The meetings, which began at 7:30 p. m. last Thursday, adjourned at 1:30 a. m. Friday.

Attending the meeting were Mayor McCrary, council members, Maxine Earl, Weaver McKamie, Jack Ault, Lewis Holly and Larry Mills.

## School Board 'Attacks' State Funding, Changes

A budget of \$3,987,135.57 for the 1984-85 school year was approved by the Post Independent School District board of trustees at a called meeting August 31.

The new budget included a tax rate increase from 50 cents per \$100 evaluation to 56 cents.

The additional tax rate was implemented to offset the loss of state revenue to the district, which is a result of the recently enacted state legislation on school reforms.

School superintendent Bill Shiver told trustees that the state funding is estimated to be \$1,002,000 and that the current tax rate would create a shortage of \$322,314. The total certified tax roll

for the district is \$522,531,677.

Included in the new budget was a three year property insurance agreement with Bryan J. Williams and Son, agents for the district.

Bryan J. Williams explained to the trustees that total property values were increased \$2 million as a result of a recent review of school property and that the premiums would be adjusted an additional \$18,000 to cover the higher values.

The buildings are covered for full replacement costs.

During the 10 years of volunteer service, she has served as president of the local chapter, secretary, worked on the annual crusade drives, and for the past several years has handled the memorials.

They have ministered as far north as Ethiopia. Recent ministry has taken

them to Zaire where they feel a great desire to help national churches and missionaries to establish Bible Schools in strategic locations around Lake Tanganyika which is Africa's second largest lake, stretching over 400 miles in length and surrounded by Burundi, Tanzania, Zambia and Zaire.

In an area of central Africa where the church has grown tremendously, there is a great need of preaching.

These Bible Schools will serve to train hundreds of pastors, evangelists and church workers as they continue to evangelize their own people.

The public is invited to attend the revival.

David Livingstone was the great Scottish missionary and explorer. He was a 30 year veteran of the African continent when visited by journalist H. M. Stanley. The American writer spent several months with Livingstone, a man given to spreading the Gospel.

But Livingstone never spoke to Stanley about spiritual things. The American journalist watched the elderly missionary closely.

Livingstone's habits were beyond his comprehension, and so was his patience. Stanley could not understand Livingstone's sympathy for the Africans. For the sake of Christ and His gospel, the missionary doctor was impatient, untiring and eager, spending himself and being spent for His Master.

Stanley wrote, "When I saw that unwearied patience, that unflagging zeal, those enlightened ones of Africa, I became a Christian at his side, though he never

spoke to me about it."

The American tried to persuade the ailing doctor to return home. Convinced that God still had things for him to accomplish, he refused. Less than two years later his serving God, his life of peace ended in death.

But many have paid tribute to this one who did so much for a continent. The many lives he touched like that of the American journalist, saw a dedicated Christian in action. They were forever changed by a theology that was displayed in every day living.

We each have one life. As a Christian it has that opportunity to put into practice righteous deeds. That one life can be the best argument for the Christian faith to others.

May it mirror the thought that no teaching of the Christian religion is worth keeping that cannot be verified in daily life.

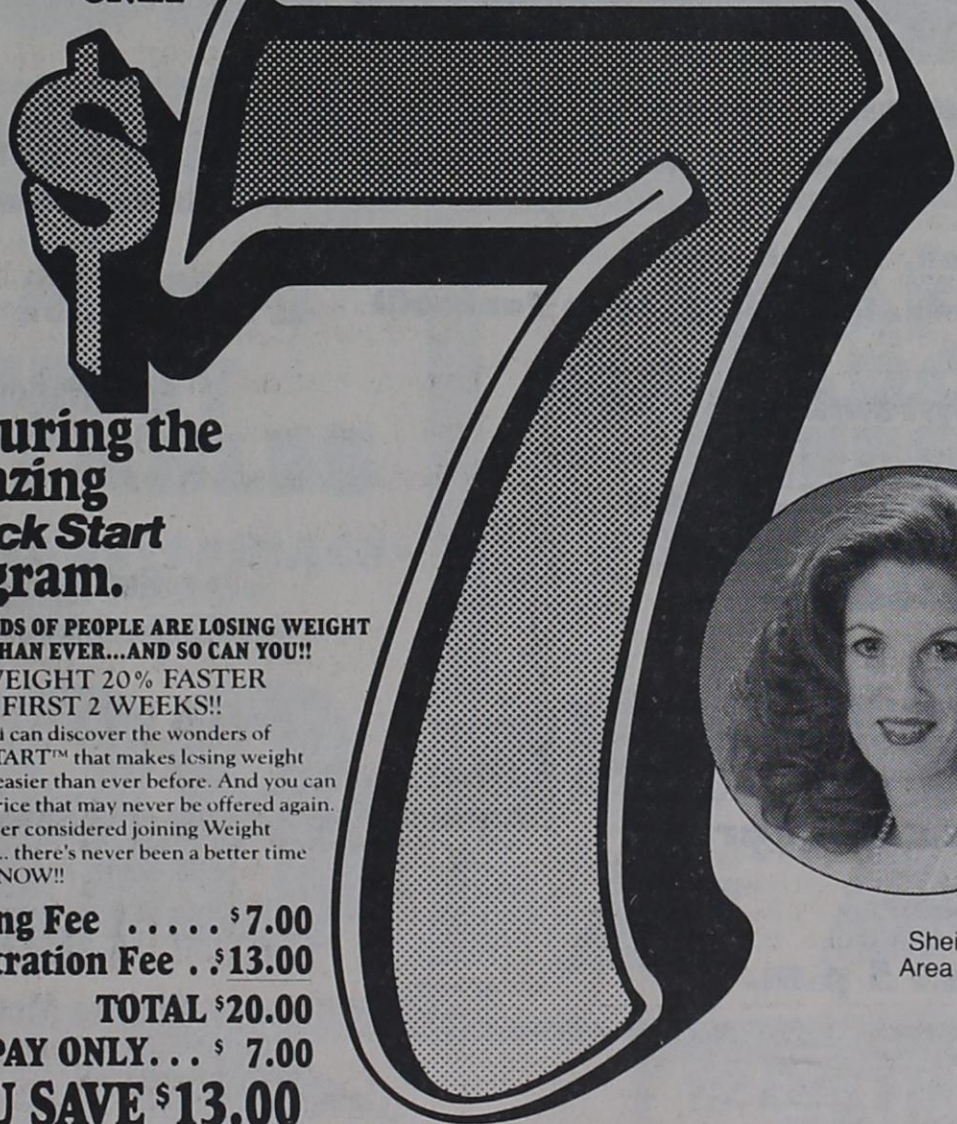
