## Council Studies Tax Rate

# Spending Cuts Planned

By Wes Burnett

The Post City Council spent six hours searching for ways to trim the 1984-85 budget expenses to avoid imposing a tax increase during last weeks budget meeting.

Through a tortuous line-byline procedure, council members made a number of adjustments and directed city manager Bill Pool to prepare a detailed revision for the September 10 meet-

The tentative budgeted revenues are expected to be \$1,042,075, which city council members believe will meet expenses. The worksheet budget included a tax rate of .22 per \$100 evaluation, which would be an increase from the current .20.

With proposed spending cuts, the council aimed toward eliminating the need for an increase.

One of the ways the council expects to raise additional funds is through the recently increased water and sewer rates.

The council also voted to increase the occupational tax on oil production from .75 percent to a full one

The city has the authority to raise that rate to a full two percent, which is what the utility companies cur-

rently pay. Through the first six months of 1984 oil production reported to be \$8.6 million, annualized this would pro-

That represents a \$40,000 increase from last year.

duce \$170,000 in taxes to the

During the budget review, council member Weaver McKamie asked the city manager for a justification of the code enforcer position and then moved to strike the position from the budget.

Pool provided a list of specific accomplishments of the code enforcer, Delbert Rudd, and explained to the council that the position was important if city ordinances were expected to be enforc-

Among the jobs that are included in that position has been the removal of 300 junk cars, condemnation proceedings on six delapidated homes, enforcing 31 mobile home ordinances, assisting with the paving project, coordination with sewer and water grant in

East Post, serving as emergency manager for Post, helping with the trash and clean up, taking complaints and follow-through on animals and assisting in the office.

McKamie insisted that the position is actually an assistant city manager and that she was elected to specifically remove that position.

Council member Lewis Holly retorted that if the code enforcer was to be considered an assistant city manager, then all other office personnel would have to be classified in that manner also.

"Everyone of them assists the city manager," Holly commented.

Mayor Giles McCrary emphasized that the city manager could not be expected to enforce all the city ordinances and that with the lack of law enforcement attention, the city needed someone to see that the ordinances were obeyed.

Jack Ault seconded the motion and the vote for included he and McKamie, voting against was Maxine Earl and Holly.

New council member Larry Mills asked for a little time to study the matter and after hearing a lively dis-cussion, including a statement by city manager Pool that in order to get the job done the position was needed, he voted in opposition to sales in the city limits was the motion, and the position remained in the budget.

Maxine Earl responded to McKamie's comment about having to raise taxes to pay for the position, "Weaver you yourself voted to inccrease the city manager salary to \$23,000 and even submitted the motion and the only employee increase we had considered until tonight was the one you recommended."

Earl pointed out that the overall salary budget is a decrease from last year.

In other budget considerations, McKamie questioned the average monthly utility cost of \$250 at the fire department and city manager Pool explained a savings of \$1,000 per year would be realized by removing an unused telephone at the fire department.

He credited McKamie with the savings by her question about the monthly telephone statement.


## Ruby Williams Honored


# School Board 'Attacks' State Funding, Changes

A budget of \$3,987,135.57 for the 1984-85 school year was approved by the Post Independent School District board of trustees at a called meeting August 31.

The new budget included a tax rate increase from 50 cents per \$100 evaluation to 56 cents.

The additional tax rate was implemented to offset the loss of state revenue to the district, which is a result of the recently enacted state legislation on school re-

School superintendent Bill Shiver told trustees that the state funding is estimated to be \$1,002,000 and that the current tax rate would create a shortage of \$322,314. The total certified tax roll

Included in the new budget was a three year property insurance agreement with Bryan J. Williams and Son, agents for the district.

Bryan J. Williams explained to the trustees that total property values were increased \$2 million as a result of a recent review of school property and that the premiums would be adjusted an additional \$18,000 to cover the higher values.

The buildings are covered for full replacement costs.

During the discussion about the new budget, board member John Boren expressed his concern about having too many teachers for the pupil load.

Shiver explained that in order to meet the new state requirements for curriculum that school districts the size of Post will have to look toward multiple certification for teachers.

"This would mean that we will need teachers to handle more than one or two different subjects," Shiver outlined, "and the board needs to carefully consider a special incentive for teachers who can be certified in three or more areas."

Shiver also told board members that one of the problems with recruiting teachers is beginning to surface. "The McAllen school dis-

trict received an additional \$9.5 million from the state, and they applied all of that extra funding toward teacher salaries," Shiver said, "and this may explain why we are having trouble finding a Spanish teacher this

Shiver said he did not know if this was a statewide trend, but that it points out the problems facing many West Texas school districts with the new formulas for state funding.

"Aren't we really looking at the state trying to force all teachers to be on the same pay line?" board member Tom Middleton asked.

Attending the meeting were board president Jack Kirkpatrick, and members Tom Middleton, Don Payne, Pru Basquez and John Boren.
