Economic Development Topic Highlights City Council Meeting

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby gave Post City Council members a briefing about the formation of the Post Economic Development Corp. and its purpose at the regular council meeting Monday evening in City Hall.

Judge Dalby, along with PEDC organizer Jack King, answered specific questions from council members concerning the non-profit corporation.

The PEDC was organized, the Judge told council members, in order for Burlington Industries to donate its property for charitable purposes.

"Burlington had determined to donate the property and it could have gone to a wildlife group," the Judge reported.

"We felt that by establishing this non-profit organization and accepting Burlington's offer of the property that it would be in the best interest of the people of this community," he added.

Membership in the PEDC is open to anyone and any amount of contribution is accepted, but voting is limited to \$500 or more donations.

Judge Dalby explained that voting members as of October 17 will be asked to attend an October 22 meeting to elect a board of directors to establish a plan to find industries for the facility.

The board of directors to be elected by members will also face the task of determining how to dispose of various Burlington properties.

"No decisions will be made about the property or plans until the new board is named," Dalby emphasized.

He also told council members that Burlington will pay taxes on the property for this year and next and that PEDC will pay the taxes after that.

Donations to the organization are not refundable, but are eligible for tax deductions.

Jack King suggested that the October 28 planned two-hour air show to celebrate the renovation of the city-county airport would be a great opportunity to invite a large number of out-of-town guests to see the potential of

the Post industrial facilities.

"The only thing to hold us back is our own creativity," he said, "we can really just about do anything and the possibilities are exciting."

Dalby added that the major emphasis of the PEDC will be to find an industrial prospect who will hire 200-300 local employees.

"We have a few who are interested," he said, "but until the members name a board, we're not in a position to make decisions now."

Post Lake Report

"I am now convinced that the Post Lake will be a reality and it could be in three to five years," Post appointee and White River Municipal Water District chairman Bo Jackson told the council in a special report.

Jackson told council members that the White River board had voted to pursue the development of the Post Lake at its last meeting.

He also said that the board met with Lubbock city officials to discuss plans for the Post Lake. The Post Lake, Jackson explained, will be 57,420 acre feet, compared to White River Lake's 47,000 acre feet.

The average depth at Post Lake will be 25 feet, with a maximum of 68 feet and the total contributed drainage will be 568 square miles.

He explained that the recreational use of the lake will be the single most important factor for Post.

The next stage in the lake development is an October 24 hearing by the Texas Water Commission on a permit extension of four years.

The council voted without objection to a resolution supporting White River Water District in its plans for developing the Post Lake.

In other action, the council approved a compromise rate increase for Energas, which will raise the average customer's annual cost of natural gas by approximately \$20.

The council discussed annexation and voted to support a state-wide campaign to amend state law to increase annexation powers of general law cities.

A problem with out-of-city users at the city landfill was discussed and city manager Bill Pool was instructed to research the matter and offer solutions.

A decision on filling the November expiring terms of Airport Board members Bill Pool, Bob Macy and Cecil Foster Jr., was postponed.

The council discussed and asked for clarification of the use of the old theater buildings, which have been offered to the city as a donation by the owner, but with certain restrictions for use.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Pro-Tem Maxine Earl, council members Weaver McKamie, Jack Ault, Lewis Holly, and Larry

Mills, city manager Bill Pool and city secretary Wanda Wilkerson.

Local People Have Money

One of the most important responsibilities of the State Treasury is to administer the State's unclaimed property law. The Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund holds money turned over to the State of Texas under the law.

Banks and corporations have an obligation to try to locate owners of accounts which have been inactive for seven years or more. If such efforts to locate the owners fail, the unclaimed money or property is turned over to the state.

Last year, the State Treasury was able to return more than \$2.1 million to the citizens of Texas because of the help of diligent public servants such as yourself.

A male subject was arrested on an outstanding DPS warrant October 2 and was released after paying \$225 in fines;

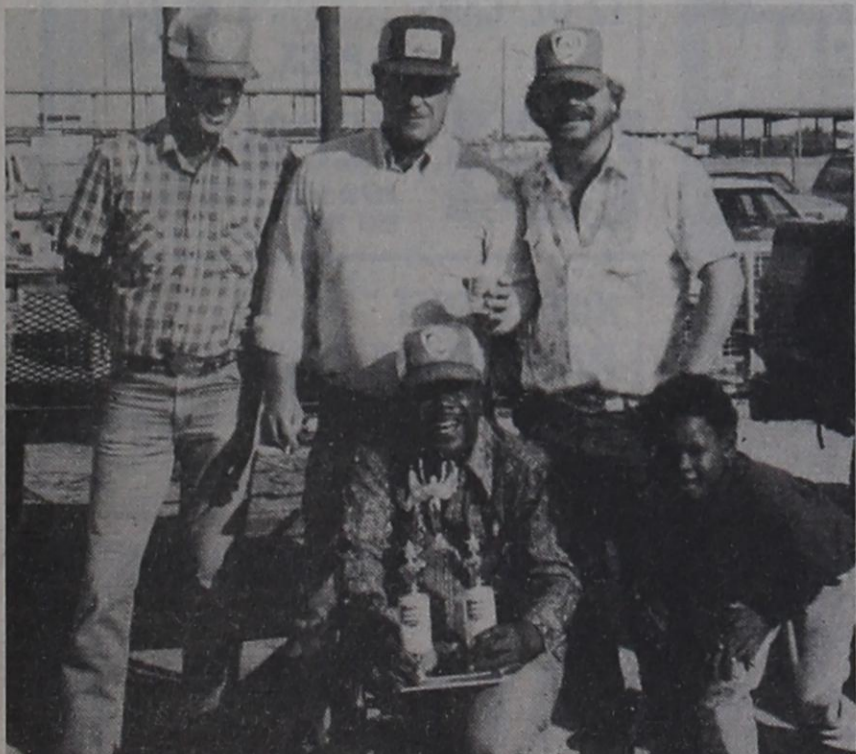
A female subject was arrested Wednesday, October 3 for shoplifting and was released on a \$200 bond;

At the end of the first quarter at Roosevelt last Friday night, the Post Antelopes were leading 19-0, setting the stage for a 52-0 second district win for the defending champions.

Working to keep from running up the score, Antelope coach David Thompson substituted freely in the second half and had the team punt on first down late in the game.

Post opened the game kicking off to the Eagles who punted after four downs.

The Antelope scoring spree started with a six play drive from their own 40 yard line with three first downs highlighted by a Joel Kirkpatrick quarterback option left to the three yard line from the Roosevelt 40.

Tracy Price went in for the touchdown from the one-half yard line on second down.

Another punt by the Eagles set up the second score as Simon Salinas scooped up the football at the Post 15 and returned it to the 33.

Kirkpatrick was sacked to the 28, then he called Price's

number who took the pitch-out around right tackle and ripped off a 72 yard touchdown run and with 4:22 left in the first quarter, the Antelopes led 13-0 following Chuck Morris' extra point kick.

Rodney George arranged for another Antelope score when he intercepted an Eagle pass on the Roosevelt 30 and returned it to the seven.

One play was all it took as Price blasted over left tackle and the score board tallied 19-0 for Post with 3:38 remaining in the first quarter.

Post got the ball back early in the second quarter when Kirkpatrick's pass to Bruce Crenshaw for a touchdown was called back on a penalty.

The next play Kirkpatrick pitched the ball to Price who scampered around left tackle 28 yards to paydirt.

Leading 25-0 at 11:23 left in the half, Morris' kick made it 26-0.

The Antelope defense stymied every attempt by Roosevelt and another punt opened the next touchdown drive.

Taking the ball at the 50 yard line, the 'Lopes marched in six plays to the end zone, capped by Price's eight yard dash over left tackle.

Others carrying the ball in the drive included Benny Hair and Rodney Hays with Hays also catching a pass on the 35 and rambling to the 14.

The clock showed 6:31 with the 'Lopes out front 33-0.

Second Half

The Antelope second team scored the next touchdown with 1:09 remaining in the third quarter.

With Kirkpatrick at the helm, the team went 38 yards in nine plays behind the running of Chuck Morris.

The big play was a quarterback option pass to Price on the Roosevelt 25 which he carried to the 10.

Morris hit left tackle to the three, right tackle to the one and then over right tackle again to the end zone.

The 'Lopes led 39-0.

They got the ball back early in the fourth quarter and with Ricky Moore at quarterback, the 'Lopes started at the 50 on a four-play scoring drive.

Hair surprised the Eagle defense and blasted over right tackle to the 12.

Hair went around left end to the eight, Hays carried it over right guard to the seven and then Rodney Tidwell scampered into the end zone over left guard.

With 9:44 left in the game,

the 'Lopes were leading 46-0.

The Eagles sustained an 11 play drive, which was snuffed on fourth down at their own 37.

Curt Greer came in and punted for the Antelopes.

Six plays later the Eagles gave the ball up at their own 10 and Morris came off the bench to kick a field goal.

Leading 49-0, the 'Lopes tried not to score again.

Then the Eagles pulled a reverse that backfired with a fumble in the backfield which Kenneth Gill covered at the Roosevelt 21.

Morris came in again and put the final three points on the scoreboard with 2:07 left in the contest.

The Antelopes travel to Cooper Friday for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

Cooper Pirates Look to the Air . . .

"They throw the ball well, they have good receivers and they run well too," Post Antelope coach David Thompson says about the Cooper Pirates.

The Pirates, posting a two-win, two-loss season record, host the Antelopes Friday in a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

The Pirates beat Hale Center 16-12 and Brownfield last week 27-0, losing to Crosbyton 8-14 and Frenship 14-15.

"We're going to have to play really good to beat them," Thompson adds.

The Pirates are a little larger on the offensive line than the Antelopes with 14 pound senior quick-tackle Toby Tumblinson (79) providing the pass blocking.

Other offensive linemen to watch are 215 pound senior strong-tackle Corey Goheen (78) and 186 pound senior center Mitch Sturdivant (55).

Quarterback Bobby Mendez (11) is a 140 pound senior two-year starter, listed as a good passer and

runner. Tailback senior 165 pound Ricky Mendez (30) has good speed and is tough and senior 160 pound Chris Mendez (8) is a respected receiver.

The Pirates like to use the I Pro Right offense with I Pro Left and I Slot Right as other favorite backfields.

They run 63 percent of the time and pass 37 percent.

Defensively the Pirates use a four-down linemen front with two linebackers in the slot.

Jesse Infante, 150 pound senior (51) is the mainstay at linebacker. He is quick and will try to run through the line.

Tumblinson plays at the tackle slot and is also quick.

Marcus Bednarz (44), a 165 pound senior nose guard, is listed by the Post Antelope coaches as the best Pirate lineman.

"We're all healthy with the exception of Greg Adams," coach Thompson reports, "and we know what we have to do to win."

All but one Antelope player saw action against the Roosevelt Eagles during last Friday's 52-0 rout, with Greg Adams still recovering from a broken arm and unable to see duty.

"We are playing much better offensively and defensively," Post Antelope coach David Thompson observes, "and we are pleased with the team attitude."

The 'Lopes collected 413 yards total offense and allowed the Eagles only 99 total yards.

Tracy Price was the leading ground gainer and scorer with 141 yards on eight carries and five touchdowns in one and one-half quarters of playing time.
